County Hospital Receives Grant Of \$150,000

The Knox County Hospital was recently awarded a \$150,000 federal grant.

The grant would allow the hospital to receive \$50,000 per year for the next three years. This yearly stipend is contingent upon availability of government funds and the ability of the local hospital to meet objectives set in order to receive the grant.

The Department of Health and Human Services received 445 grant proposals, with only 188 new grants being awarded. The Knox County Hospital was one of 16 agencies in the state of Texas to be awarded the grant.

This money will help provide telecommunications services to local physicians, recruit health professionals to the local hospital and assist in establishing physicians practices in the area.

Moguls Defeat Olney, 14-12 In Friday Night Thriller

Following a slow start, the Munday Moguls hit their stride in the second period and went on to defeat the Olney Cubs, 14-12, in a Friday night football thriller.

After receiving the opening kickoff, Munday completed three of four passes for 53 yards before Olney stopped the aerial performance at the 20-yard line.

In the Mogul second possession, Olney's Cody Slater picked off a Bobby Dockins pass on the Cubs 26-yard line. After one first down, Mogul Chris Scott tackled Bo Hutchinson for an 11-yard loss, forcing Olney to punt.

Munday's first touchdown of the night came after a 10-play drive, all on the ground, with Dockins scoring from ten yards out with 9:23 left in the second period. Dockins kicked the PAT for a 7-0 lead.

Olney came marching back, moving the ball 65 yards in six plays. Cody Dixon made the Olney TD on a one-yard run. The PAT failed, allowing Munday to hold on with a 7-6 lead.

Chad James carried twice for

nine yards before Bobby Dockins broke loose on a 77-yard touchdown run. Dockins kicked the extra point for a 14-6 halftime score.

In the third period, the Moguls outdistanced the Cubs with five first downs to Olney's one. Munday attempted their second field goal of the night, but the kick sailed to the left of the goal post and was no good.

Olney's Cody Slater returned a Mogul punt to Munday's 21-yard line before Daniel Serrato was able to make the tackle. Four plays later, Olney scored again on a six-yard run. The Cubs failed on a two-point conversion try, leaving the score 14-12.

Munday drove downfield in seven plays to Olney's 23-yard line. The second turnover of the night stopped their scoring opportunity as Olney intercepted another Mogul pass. The game ended with Munday on top, 14-12, against the Class 2A Olney Cubs.

October Electric Bills To Be Lower Than Usual

Customers of West Texas Utilities Company have some good news in the form of lower costs for electricity beginning with October bills. The lower costs are produced by a one-time credit and a reduction in the fuel cost portion of the bill.

"Our continuing efforts to lower boiler fuel costs and related transportation costs were successful and prompted the reduction," said Leon Sellers, WTU's area manager. Those efforts include renegotiation of supply and transportation agreements, construction of a gas pipeline to the Fort Phantom power station near Abilene to provide better access to suppliers, and improvements in the efficiency of some plants so they burn less fuel to make electricity.

The credit will be issued on customer's electric bills during the billing month of October. An

average residential customer using 660 kilowatt hours of electricity will see a reduction of \$13.17 on the bill that month. The actual reduction for each customer is based on their previous month's use of electricity.

The reduction in the fuel portion of the electric bill will be in effect for all upcoming months. According to Sellers, it will mean an average 3.5% reduction from costs last year.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) recently granted the company's request to reconcile fuel costs for April 1987 through December 1990 and adjust the fuel portion of the bill to recover projected fuel costs. WTU filed the request last February.

West Texas Utilities Company serves 177,000 customers in a 52 county area that stretches from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

Historical Marker Workshop Planned

The Knox County Historical Commission will hold a Historical Marker Workshop on Tuesday, October 15, at 3:00 p.m. in the fellowship hall of the First United Methodist Church in Knox City.

Mrs. Nancy Marble of Floydada will be the featured speaker. She will discuss guidelines for achieving historical recognition and reasons for placing markers in the county. She will also review the problems and successes met during the last several years as Floyd County has met its goal of dedicating one or more official Texas Historical Markers per year.

The Knox County Historical

Commission, who along with the Texas Historical Commission will sponsor the workshop, has asked Mrs. Marble to explain how churches, school groups, Scouts and 4-H groups, women's clubs, local governments and even individuals can bring recognition to areas of historical significance.

There are three kinds of historical markers: (1) Subject markers, which commemorate a site, event, person, institution or other significant topic in Texas history; (2) Building markers, which honor structures with historical, cultural or architectural value; and (3) Grave markers, which signify burial sites of individuals who made lasting contributions to Texas history, either locally or statewide.

All interested groups, organizations or individuals, especially members of pioneer families, are encouraged to attend. There is no charge for the workshop.

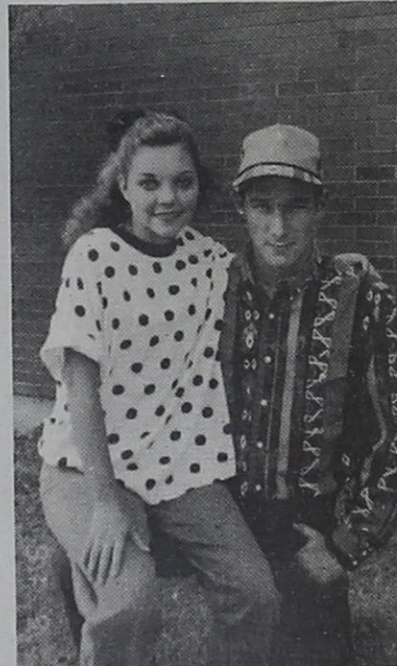
Schumacher Services Held In Rhineland

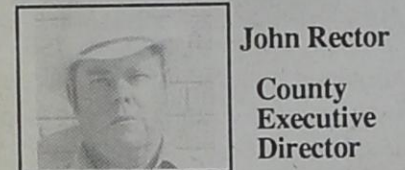

Please remember that ACR (set-aside) and CUPAY acres must be maintained thru the end of the calendar year. There is no problem with sowing these acres to wheat or other small grain; however, if you intend to bale or graze these acres prior to November 1, you need to sign a register here at the office, if you have not already done so.

Blackeyed peas on ACR and CUPAY must be plowed under as a green manure crop. Crop disposition on these acres is being checked which is the reason you were assessed an inspection fee at the time of certification.

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Bloodmobile Drive Dedicated To Mrs. Karen Gardner

The recent bloodmobile drive held in Munday was dedicated to Mrs. Karen Gardner. In March, Mrs. Gardner underwent major surgery at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene and received nine units of blood.

Although the Red Cross operates on an umbrella protection policy which does not require replacing blood used by a member of the community, local residents chose to honor Karen by dedicating the drive to her.

Under the Red Cross philosophy, blood is available to everyone, regardless of whether they or their family has ever donated blood. Statistically, the larger portion of blood users are either above or below the allowable age criteria for donating. This precludes their being able to replace blood which they may use. "Community responsibility" is a philosophy that means peace of mind for older patients and for patients who need repeated or massive blood, without the additional worry of replacing it, or of paying a "non-replacement fee". It's a policy that shares the burden of responsibility for an adequate blood supply equally among all healthy members of a community.

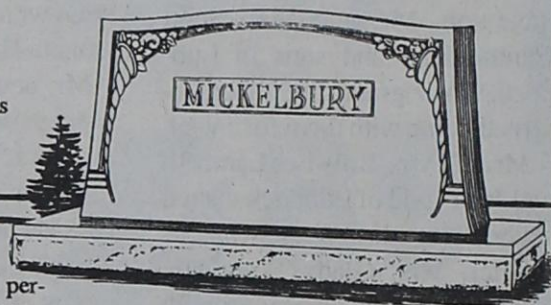

At Your Service

Q: Why does Acts 10:39-40 indicate that Jesus died and then was hung on a tree? Didn't he die while on a cross?

A: The King James Version of Acts 10:39 reads: (Jesus) "whom they slew and hanged on a tree...". This is a poor translation. Remember that the New Testament was originally written in Greek. Some verbal tenses cannot be directly translated from Greek into English because we do not have an equal tense in our language. The word "to hang" (*kremanantes*) is a nominative plural participle and coupled with the word meaning "put to death" (*anairo*) gives us the translation: "They killed him by hanging him on a tree..." (as translated in the New International Version). The unfortunate King James Version's rendering was wrong, but the original Greek is, of course, correct.

Concerning the use of the term "tree" (*exulon*), the first century Romans made their crosses from tall trees. They cut the tree down and removed the branches. Their crosses were not polished, planed or sanded. Nor were they stained and varnished. They were simply trees made into poles.

Concerning "hanging", today we refer to a hanging as a method of execution whereby the victim has a noose around his neck. Do you recall how the term used to be

rendered? "Hang by the neck until dead." Originally, "to hang" meant to be suspended by a part of the body. Jesus "hung" from the cross by the spikes in his hands and feet.

The important thing about Christ's death is that he died in your place so that you might be forgiven your guilt. By Christ's wounds we have been saved (1 Peter 2:24). And Christ's resurrection proves that we have hope of life after death (1 Corinthians 15).

what was going on.

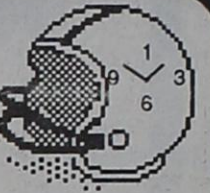
