The Munday Courier.) Hows about a cuppa coffee?

Time was that when this question was answered in the affirmative, you only had to dig down in your jeans for a fivecent piece to buy the friend a cup. If you enjoyed one along with him, it meant a total output of ten cents!

That was in the "good old days." Now, you'd be quite lucky if you didn't have to work the combination to your wallet and come up with "folding money" to finance two cups.

When a local cafe started charging two-bits for a cup of coffee, a lot of people had other ideas. They went other places for their coffee breaks, where the brew could be had in smaller cups but at a reasonable price.

People think of a lot of ways to get around the high cost of coffee without eliminating the stuff. Here at The Courier office, we buy our own coffee, brew it in our own quarters and all take a cof-

fee break at the same time. Some customers who hit the office at break time almost every time complain that that's all we do - take a coffee break.

Now, they say that coffee is being sold over the counter at some city places for 50 cents a cup. And with coffee continuing to go up, with \$4 a pound being predicted before the top is reached, no

telling what a good cupful will cost. But trying to eliminate the stuff is another matter. It's dangerous, according to medical researchers, to completely deny the human body of caffeine that's supplied in coffee. It would likely cause one to suffer irritability, lethargy and constipation. It's just as bad, or worse, than trying to get that tar and nicotine out of the system after prolonged smok-

But why coffee at 50-cents a cup?

If Nita Huber of Tacoma, Wash., can make money out of 5-cent coffee at today's prices, the price of 50 cents seems a mite overboard.

But Nita says she's been doing it since 1967, and she's still making a penny a cup on each sale.

Reminds us of the time a town-wide move got underway in Munday for all places dispensing coffee to advance their prices from the lowly nickel to ten cents. Most places serving food were in agreement, but other places were not.

Leland Hannah, who operated the Eiland Drug, was one who opposed the move. He said he enjoyed seeing his many friends as they came in daily, maybe twice a day, to enjoy a cup of coffee. Doubling the price might keep them away and he wouldn't get to see

them so often. Besides, Leland had figured out just how many cups of coffee he could get out of a pound, and he argued that he could still make money on five-cent coffee. The move didn't go over 100 per-

Jeff Mitchell operated a cafe that went to the higher rate. One day a man just travelling through stopped in the cafe and ordered coffee. He offered some protest at having to fork over a

dime for the brew. Two weeks later, maybe, Jeff received a collect telegram. Being reluctant to refuse the message, he paid the fee and learned it was from his coffee customer, who told how many miles he's traveled and that City Cafe in Munday was the only place a cup of coffee cost him ten

Many years ago, we'd become tired of the No. 2 washtub type of bath by week's end and would hie ourself down to the tailor shop on Saturday night for a hot shower in the shop's boiler room. This went on for some time, but Roy Horn, the owner, told us one night: "It'll cost you 25 cents, we've gone up. The reason: We can make more money

that way." Perhaps that applies to the price of a cup of coffee, too.

The Munday Moguls traveled 175 miles to Forsan Friday night to sour the Buffaloes' homecoming celebration by taking a 55-0 victory.

The outclassed Buffaloes' troubles began on the opening kickoff as the hardhitting Moguls recovered a fumble on the 30-yard-line. Robert Hemphill, playing at fullback in his first start of the year in place of injured back Ronny Lowrance, ran for 10 yards over right tackle before a mixup in the backfield caused the Moguls to fumble and Forsan recovered on the 19. Two plays later, the Buffaloes fumbled again, and Munday took possession on the 23. Tim Collier, playing for another injured Mogul, Quincy Adams, carried for five yards, then Dent Offutt scored from 18 yards out with 10:17 left in the first quarter to give Munday a quick lead. The PAT try failed, but the Moguls were off and run-

The Munday defense stopped Forsan all night; only once were the Buffaloes able to put together more than one first down. Tim Collier intercepted two passes, Neil Waggoner recovered a fumble and other alert Moguls came up with two more. Forsan was held to only seven first downs and a total of 99 yards offense by the aggressive young Moguls of Munday High.

The Mogul second team received valuable playing experience as Coach Edwards started spot substitutes early in the first half, and every player suited out received some action before the clock sounded to end the game.

The Moguls' next opponents are the Electra Tigers, who will face the local team in Friday night's game. Kickoff is at 8 p.m. at Scruggs Field in Munday. The Tigers are a Class AAA team with a 3-1 record this year. 4-6 last year, the Tigers returned sixteen lettermen and are a much improved team. Electra defeated Seymour 23-6 in last week's outing.

Goree Producers Gin reported that Bill and Gerald Myers brought their first cotton in on September 22, and it was ginned the next day.

At press time, neither the Rhineland Gin or Munday Gin and Seed had reported any cotton brought in to be ginned.

Carriker Slates Nuclear Waste Meeting In KC

The Texas Low-Level Waste Disposal Authority will sponsor an informational meeting in Knox City, announced State Representative Steve Carriker. The meeting, requested by Carriker, is in conjunction with a study by the Authority concerning the possibility of a lowlevel waste disposal site in Knox County.

"Several folks have expressed concern about this matter and I believe it is appropriate to let the people in Knox County see and hear from the people who are making this decision," said

The authority has been involved in selecting a location for the waste disposal unit and last year the authority hired an outside firm to determine the scope of Texas' waste storage problem. The report concluded that previous estimates on the amount of waste production were low and approximately 139,000 cubic feet of waste a year will require storage and the bulk of this storage coming from nuclear power plants.

The meeting will be held at the school auditorium on Monday, October 3, at 7:00 p.m. in Knox City. In attendance will be Representative Steve Carriker; Tom Blackburn, Special Programs Director for the authority; Rick Lowerre, an environmental law expert; and Bob King, an energy policy expert with the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The meeting is open to the public and everyone is encouraged to attend.

Dr. Hooker Invited **Into International** Surgical Fellowship

J. Patrick Hooker, M.D., F. A. C. S., of Munday was officially welcomed by invitation as a Fellow of the International College of Surgeons at the annual meeting held in Cleveland, Ohio, on September 28, 1983. Carriker praised the actions of the commission saying "this has been somewhat of a frustrating experience but it has been worked out, the exemption is back in place, and I appreciate the Governor, Commissioner Hightower, and the Commission for their assistance.



These couples made a similar trip last year, and decided that, as Nell Haskin put it, motorcycles are "the only way to go. You see so much more on a motorcycle than
