New Law Changes Vehicle Registration

Due to insurance reforms enacted by the 72nd Legislature, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated in September.

Beginning September 1, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit current proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration or transfer of registration. Also for the first time, Texans will have to show proof of insurance to receive or renew their driver's licenses and vehicle inspection stickers.

"Many states have found that tying these responsibilities to proof of insurance increases compliance with mandatory liability law," said Arnold Oliver, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. "But the Legislature was really responding to public pressure. Insured drivers -- that's about 75% of us -- wanted to tighten enforcement on the other 25%."

The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued to the policyholder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents, certificates of self-insurance, and certificates of bond.

The new law applies to registration handled in person or by

mail. The original or a photocopy of the evidence will satisfy the requirement of proof of financial responsibility. All original documentation will be returned.

Questions about proper evidence of financial responsibility for vehicle registration may be directed to your automobile insurance company, your county tax assessor-collector, or to the local Division of Motor Vehicles regional office. For information about driver's licenses and vehicle inspection stickers, contact the Department of Public Safety.

Got A Ticket? Go To School!

Beginning September 1, 1991, House Bill 70 allows a Texas driver to take a Texas Education Agency state certified eight-hour driving safety course every year to dismiss most moving traffic tickets.

In 1981 it became mandatory for judges to allow a ticketed driver to take a driving safety course every two years. Since then, traffic deaths on Texas highways have decreased by more than 50%.

By allowing a ticketed driver to take the eight-hour course every year, the Texas Legislature hopes to reduce driving-related deaths even further.

Munday ISD Reports Enrollment Figures

With the first week of school now history, the Munday ISD reports an enrollment of 465 students, about the same as last year.

That breaks down to 274 students registered in elementary and 191 in the secondary schools. The fourth grade class has the largest number of students, with 46, while the seniors have the smallest class, with only 19 members.

Elementary class totals include: Pre-Kindergarten, 20; Kindergarten, 32; first grade, 40; second grade, 37; third grade, 32; fourth grade, 46; fifth grade, 36, and sixth grade, 31.

On the secondary level, the seventh grade reports 30 students; eighth, 33; ninth, 32; tenth, 38; eleventh, 39; and twelfth, 19.

Dove Season Opens Sunday, September 1

This Sunday, September 1, will mark the opening day of dove season in the area.

According to State Game Warden Ronnie Ainsworth, official hunting times are from 30 minutes before sunrise to sunset. The daily bag limit is 12, with the possession limit being 24 after the second day of the season.

Ainsworth wants to remind local hunters that shotguns need to be plugged to a three-shot capacity. Also, anyone born between September 2, 1972-1975 is required to have a hunter's safety

certificate, unless accompanied by an adult, 18 years or older.

Hunting licenses are required and may be purchased from Ainsworth in Knox City. Local residents may buy their licenses from Herring Insurance, located at 820 West Main in Munday, through Friday, August 30, or at the Snack 'n Tackle at Miller Creek Reservoir.

To celebrate the opening of dove season, the Munday Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a "Brisket 'n Fixin's" dinner on Friday, August 31 from 6:30-8:30 p.m. in the Downtown Park. Everyone is welcome to attend.

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MICHAEL LATHAM

Local Man's Grandson Battles Against Cancer

When Michael Latham of Burkburnett began to lay around the house and sit out during his Little League games, those close to him knew something wasn't right.

The normally active 8-year-old showed signs of fatigue, headaches and dizziness. His parents, Tom and Stacy (Redder) Latham, took him to the family doctor for a diagnosis. Michael was checked for anemia, mononucleosis and diabetes. Before the test results were in, he developed slurred speech, his eyes wouldn't focus properly and he began walking with a side-to-side motion.

When all of the tests returned negative, Michael was referred to a specialist in Wichita Falls and was immediately hospitalized for

further testing. The results confirmed an inoperable brain tumor.

Michael, who was named to the 1991 Burkburnett Little League All Star team, is currently living at the Ronald McDonald House in Houston. He receives radiation treatments twice-daily, five days a week, at M.D. Anderson Hospital.

According to his mother, six weeks to two months after he completes the treatment program he will undergo a magnetic imaging test to determine the effectiveness of the radiation. If any of the tumor remains, Michael must begin chemotherapy.

Meanwhile, the family continues to be optimistic. Although Michael knows he has a tumor, the family has chosen not to tell him just how serious it is. They feel he will be more optimistic and try harder if he doesn't know.

Following his release, Michael plans to resume normal activities and begin third grade at I.C. Evans Elementary in Burkburnett. In the meantime, he occupies his time with television and coloring books.

The Latham family is no stranger to heartache. Ragine, Michael's younger brother, had surgery seven times before he was three years old, losing a kidney in the process. Two years later, he was critically injured when struck by a car. The newest family member, a daughter, was born August 1, three months prematurely. The Lathams also have another son, Tommy.

Unfortunately, the family has no medical insurance. To assist with medical expenses, accounts have been set up at Parker Square Bank in Wichita Falls and at the Burkburnett Bank. Q: I heard someone say that it never rained on the earth until the Flood of Noah. Is that true?

A: Based on the book of Genesis, there seems to be considerable evidence that it is true that there were no rainstorms until the Great Flood. In Genesis 1:6, we're told of a separation of the water under the expanse from the water above it. This appears to be the "canopy" of waters that surrounded the earth until God opened "the floodgates of the sky" (Genesis 7:11). Also, Genesis 2:5-6 tells us that God had not sent rain to water the earth, but a mist did the job.

It's interesting that this Genesis model fits in well with current scientific thinking concerning the early earth. Even though Genesis is one of the oldest books in the Bible, it is loaded with "new" scientific information such as this. Such evidences confirm our belief that the Bible is from God and is true without error. And that it should not be tampered with using private interpretation. Instead, we should use solid "exegesis" methods for getting at the meaning of the Bible. "...no prophecy

of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by impulse of man, but men moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God" (2 Peter 1:20-21).

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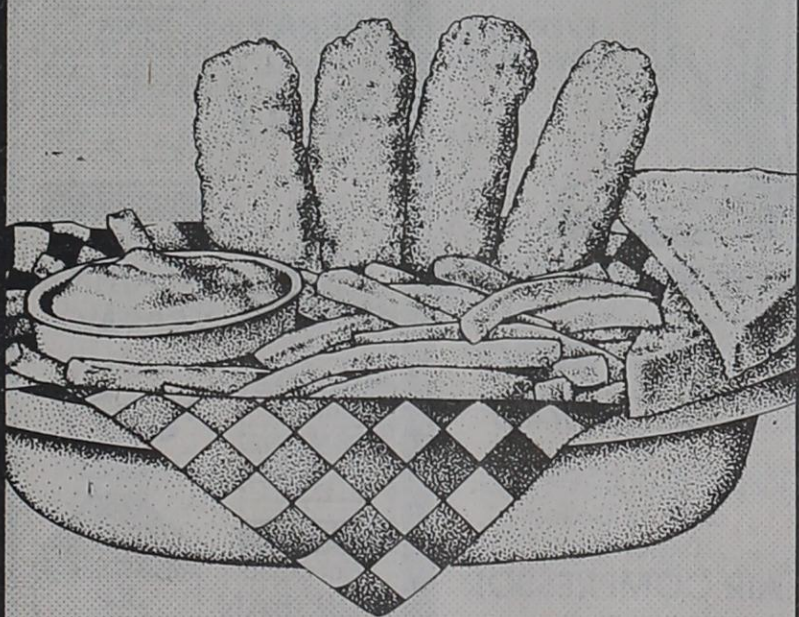


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Huckabee, Hampton Reunion Held Here

certainly does not sound as if Jesus were calling for a relaxing of the standards of The Ten Commandments.

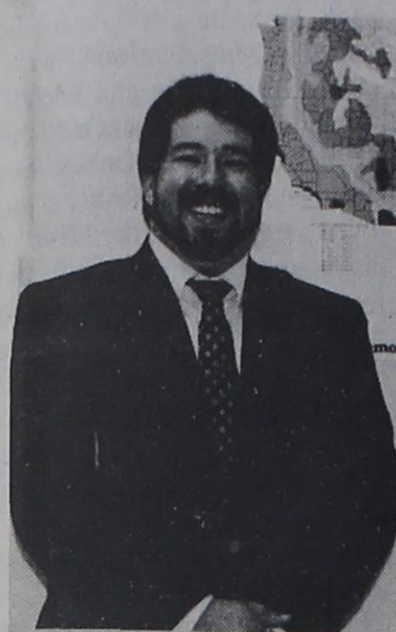

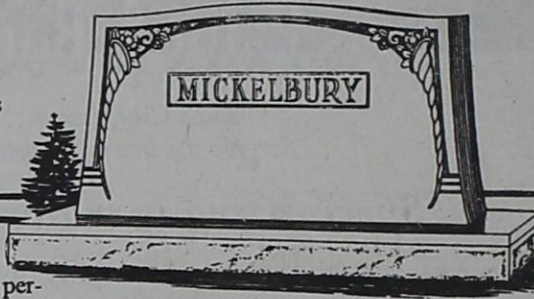

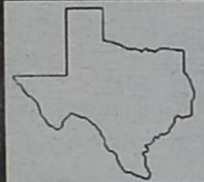

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of .58 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.
