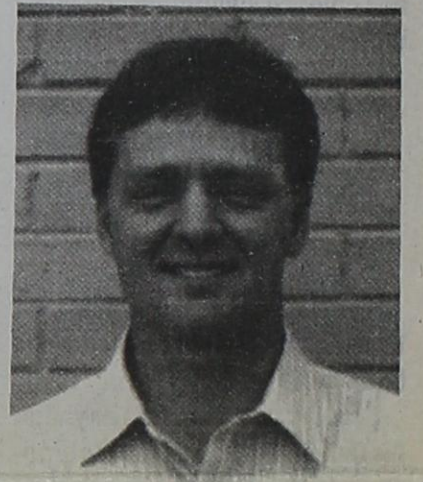
'92 Tax Rate Set By Munday School Board

The Munday Independent School District Board of Trustees met Tuesday, August 25, and set the local tax rate of .40 per \$100 valuation for 1992. This is a reduction from the 1991 rate of .55.

The Multi-County Education District #12 set the C.E.D. tax rate at .9756 for 1992 at a meeting held Friday, August 28. This is an increase from the '91 rate of .58. This increase is mandated by law as the C.E.D. had to raise \$1,947,015 more than in 1991, and had a reduction in its taxable value of \$115,291,212. The total tax rate for 1992 will be 1.3756, compared to a total tax rate of 1.13 last year.

Taxpayers are reminded that the C.E.D. does not tax personal property and home owners were given a double homestead exemption.

The Munday I.S.D. Board of Trustees adopted an operational budget for 1992-93 in the amount of \$2,764,350 at the meeting on August 25.

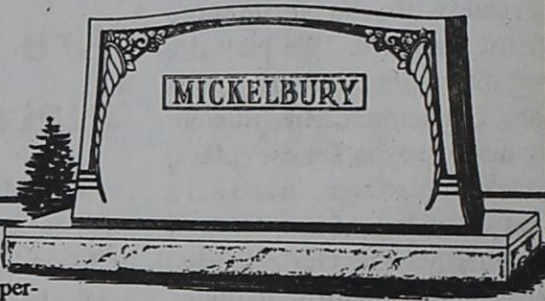

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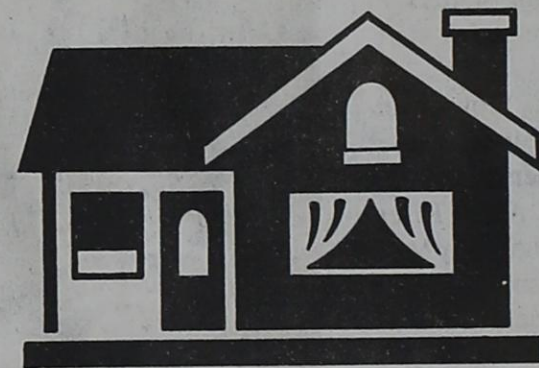
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Tournament Held Sunday

State Well Regulations Restrict Location Of New Diesel Tanks

The most important consideration of your gasoline or diesel storage tank location is how close it is to your water well. State well regulations require that petroleum storage tanks be at least 100 feet from a water well. This minimum separation distance applies only to new wells installation. Existing wells are required by law to meet separation requirements in effect at the time of well construction.

Even a small gasoline leak of one drop per second can release about 400 gallons of gasoline that has the potential of leaching the groundwater each year. A few quarts of gasoline or diesel in the groundwater may be enough to severely pollute a water well. At low levels of contamination, fuel contaminants in water cannot be detected by smell or taste.

Preventing tank leaks is especially important because of how rapidly gasoline and diesel can move through the soil into groundwater.

If your underground storage tank is more than 20 years old, especially if it's not protected

against corrosion, the potential for leaking increases dramatically.

If you have an above ground tank, follow existing regulations for underground storage tanks as a guide.

Q: Sometime I feel so unworthy of being saved. Is there anything wrong with this?

A: Some people never seem to think about their own self-worth or lack of worth. Others meditate on this on a daily basis. If you are one of these latter people, then you can take comfort in the fact that many of the most godly people of the Bible felt such feelings.

Job said: "I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes" (Job 42:6). Ezra was forced to his knees when he confessed to God: "O my God, I am ashamed and blush to lift up my face to you; my God, for our iniquities are increased higher than our heads, and our trespasses have grown into the sky" (Ezra 9:6). Daniel prayed: "O Lord, righteousness belongs to you but to us belongs confusion (Daniel 9:7). Jacob proclaimed: "I am not worthy of the least of the mercies and of all the truth which you (God) have shown me - your servant" (Genesis 32:10). When the prodigal son, of Christ's parable, came to himself, he confessed that he was no longer worthy to be called his father's son (an image of God's relationship with sinful mankind) (Luke 15:19). David's psalms are full of confessions of his own unworthiness.

Does it surprise you that the people of great faith had these feelings? Perhaps when we are completely out of ourselves, in total humility, it is then that God can completely fill us with himself. It is then that our own egos do not get in the way. The Bible tells us that God blesses the humble (2

Chronicles 7:14; James 4:6).

However, we must allow God to lift us up out of these feelings. Then we will feel good about ourselves because God has exalted us (James 4:10; 1 Peter 5:6). If these feelings of unworthiness depress you then please see a minister or other counselor. God wants you to feel good about being a Christian.

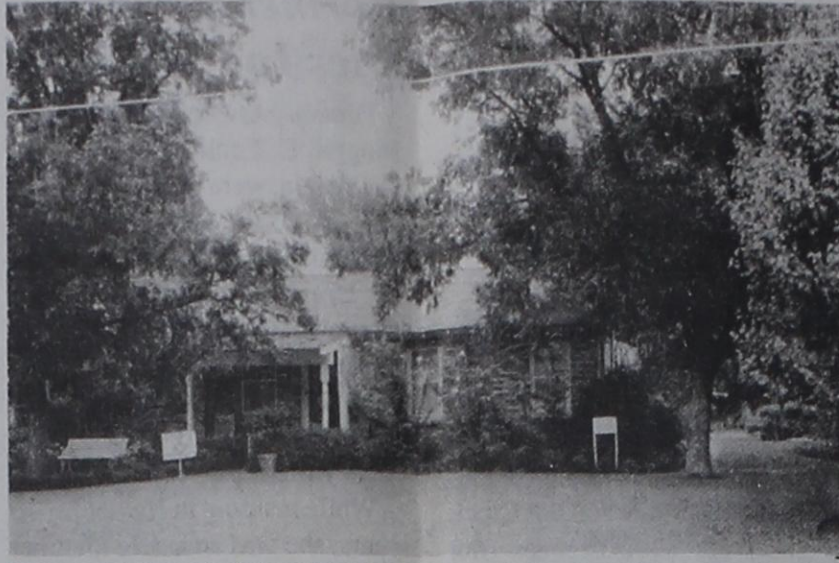

Default Borrowers Of Student Loans To Receive Notices

The Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corporation has mailed the first wage withholding notices to Texans who have defaulted on their federally guaranteed student loans. Recipients have 30 days to make repayment arrangements or file an appeal before their employer is notified to withhold up to 10% of the employees net pay.

Wage withholding is arguably the most powerful tool for the collection of defaulted guaranteed student loan balances. It was made possible in Texas by passage of the November 1991 Emergency Unemployment Benefit Compensation Act.

Defaulted borrowers who enter into voluntary repayment with TGSLLC will not be subjected to wage withholding. Borrowers can call toll-free 1-800-222-6297 to set up a repayment agreement.

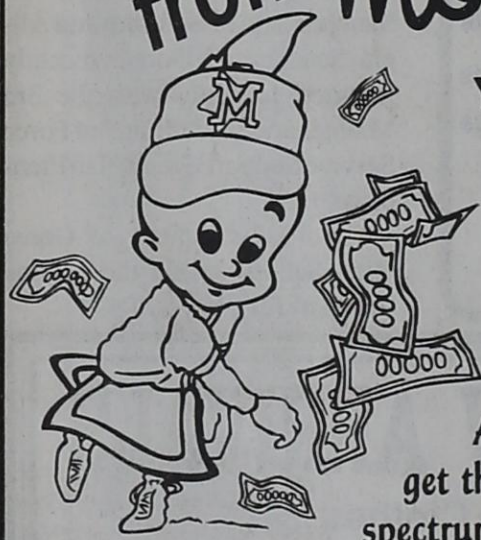

"Ignorance of the Scriptures is a precipice and a deep abyss" (Epipanius, 4th century monk). On a Boy Scout camp-out I watched a Scout make a daring (foolish in my opinion) climb up the cliff of a Black Mesa in Oklahoma. Halfway up he reached a precipice, with the rock ahead looking almost vertical. I told him to stop there, while we meditated on the situation. I really wanted him to meditate on how foolish he had been, just to impress his fellow scouts. I sent another scout back to camp to get a rope while I wondered if the adventurer would land in the water. The Head Scoutmaster came to the scene and said from below: "That's no problem". Then from his position of safety and clear perspective, he directed the scout step-by-step and hand-hold by hand-hold up the precipice to safety. The scout moved very quickly, not giving himself time to think about the danger. On the way back to camp I remarked again of the scout's (and the scoutmaster's) foolhardiness, when a rope would have given some safety.

Epipanius was the Abba of a fourth century monastery. Like the Scoutmaster he had the perspective and experience to guide the young monks under his charge to the safety of the Scriptures. Knowledge of the Scriptures does not rescue us from risk and courage. The Scriptures show us how to get off level ground, start climbing, and see life from the precipice. Why don't you parents have a set-aside time for your family to listen to the stories and sayings of the Bible. Your children will catch hold of a new perspective on life. Get involved in Sunday School

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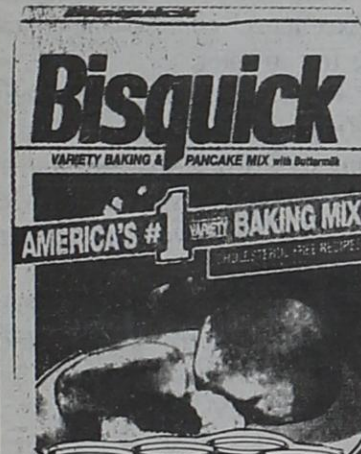
