Sales Tax Rebates Show 89% Increase

State Comptroller John Sharp recently sent sales tax payments totaling \$89.4 million to 974 Texas cities, an 8.8% increase over the \$82.1 million received by cities last April. Munday received \$4,893.87 for this period. That's an 89.46% increase over last April's \$2,583.07. Payments to date for 1992 total \$24,178.65, or a 47.55% increase over 1991's \$16,386.44. Across the county, Goree's rebate for the month was up 60.06% over last year's, with a rebate of \$804.66. Benjamin reported no payment for the month, while Knox City showed a decline of 4.05% as compared to last April's total. All three communities showed a decrease for the year-to-date totals, with Benjamin falling 10.87%, Goree 5.63%, and Knox City .61%. On the other hand, county totals were up 20.68% for the period and 12.92% for the year-todate. Knox County received a total of \$13,357.52 in April, which brings the year-to-date total to

Included in the six violators was Dale Redding of Wichita Falls, who was penalized \$12,500 for five wells on the J. Birkenfeld lease in Knox County.

To date in 1992, the Railroad Commission has levied more than \$328,000 in well plugging and pollution penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed \$733,000 in such penalties. letes and Outstanding Lineman. The public is cordially invited

April 17 - Final Date For Program Sign-Up

If you wish to sign up for the 1992 cotton, wheat and/or feed grain program, and have not already done so, April 17 is the deadline. Call 658-3537 for an appointment.

Failed Crops

If you have a crop that fails due to natural disaster - certify the acres and file an ASCS-574 -Application for Disaster Credit before you destroy the evidence of the crop. A 574 must be filed in order for a later crop to be counted as "ghost acres". A 574 must also be filed in order to receive planted acreage credit if the crop fails before the final reporting date for the crop. The best policy is to file as ASCS-574 anytime you have a crop that fails so that it will be on record.

CCC Warehouse Suspension

The Kansas City Commodity Office has advised the Weinert Grain Company, Inc. Code 8-7680 in Weinert, TX. has been removed from the list of approved warehouses under the Uniform Grain Storage Agreement.

Until further notice, no additional CCC-owned or loan commodities, or commodities delivered to CCC for purchase under a price support program subject to the terms of the above agreement can be stored or handled through this warehouse. ***

Notes From The Rolling Plains


"The river is not long. Perhaps only 20 miles or so. But it is one of the finest fly fishing rivers in the U.S. It has a unique personality and I fear for it. I fear that we are about to see the disintegration of its very soul. It is this that I want to preserve in a book."


This was some of the conversation that I had last week with a book publisher from central Texas as we walked along the rocky course of a small but swift river and discussed the bleak future of the watercourse. A short distance away, the roar of a bulldozer could be heard as the cat skinner pushed tons of rock and mud around the river banks, probably making another road on which more people might infiltrate this pristine land.

Bill's boyhood had been spent along this very river and he knew every swimming hole and bend that the course offered. "In that mot of trees is a beautiful spring that courses down through the rocks. In that bend is a fabulous swimming hole where lots of large bass can be caught on a light fly rod." Bill continued to talk as I listened to the mellow sounds of water splashing over rocks as the clear spring-fed river fell sharply on its path to the Llano several miles away. The familiar sight of beer and cola cans were not to be seen on this day during our travels. It is one of the reasons why Bill wants to publish this book. "People, those from the outside, are finding out about this fabulous place. They are buying land along its course and slowly robbing it of the very spirit that makes it so special. It will be gone in a few years as the outsiders move in and put up the fences and "KEEP OUT" signs. The old people have watched over the land for so long but the years will take them away. When they are gone, there will be no more kind guardians of the old land. The soul of the river and land will go with them."





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

At Your Service by Dr. Larry Fitzgerald Minister, Munday Church of Christ

Q: Why is it that Easter always changes dates? Sometimes it is in March and sometimes it is in April.

Q: Where did the Easter holiday come from?

A: Originally, Anglo-Saxon pagans celebrated a Spring holiday in honor of the false goddess of light known as "Eastre". In about the 8th century A.D., Anglo-Saxon Christians started calling "resurrection Sunday" by the same term as their Spring holiday.



However, resurrection Sunday had long been established as a Christian holiday prior to the application of the term "Easter". The early Jewish Christians celebrated this holiday on the 14th day of Nisan. The same date as the Old Testament Passover holiday. The Jewish calendar is based on the moon's cycles unlike ours

which is based on solar cycles. Roman Christians celebrated the resurrection on a Sunday in the Spring. Thus a compromise was struck in the 4th century. The Sunday closest to the 14th of Nisan would be resurrection Sunday. It was determined as the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox (when Spring begins). Thus the date varies between March 22 and April 25.

Jesus was executed on the Friday of the week of Passover. The following Sunday he came back to life (resurrected). This event gives hope to all Christians that we, too, will have life after death (see 1 Corinthians 11).

The term "Easter" is not found in the Bible except for a mistranslation in the King James Version of Acts 12:4.

Ronnie Whitfield and Missy Reneau won the boys' and girls' singles titles in the South Zone Competition held recently in Aspermont.



Is your life out of focus? Why not ask Jesus to help you get thing into focus? He will help you i your first desire is to know Him I hope to see you in study and worship this Sunday!





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




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
