Motorists Urged To Drive With Caution In School Zone Area

Thousands of Texas children have returned to school from summer break. This means making adjustments in their routines. It's also time for Texas motorists to make some adjustments in their driving habits.

The first few weeks of school are the most dangerous, according to Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety. "This time of year presents safety problems for both the school children and the drivers," Major Cawthon explained. "Many kids are attending school for the first time and others might be going to a different school where they are unfamiliar with the local traffic conditions."

Another problem is that during the summer recess many drivers have gotten out of the habit of being alert for both school zones and school buses. Drivers must remember that children have many things on their minds as they go to and from school. They are also easily distracted from important things like remembering to watch for traffic. This is an ideal time for parents to remind their children about school bus safety rules, since many school bus accident victims are struck by vehicles while waiting for the bus. Major Cawthon gave several safety tips concerning this. Children should be reminded to:

- Refrain from shouting or making loud noises that could distract the driver.

- Remain seated for the entire trip.
- Exit the bus in an orderly manner.
- Walk to where the driver can see if they must cross the street, and wait until the driver signals them before attempting to cross.
- Remember that although it is against the law for vehicles to pass a school bus that is loading or unloading passengers, some drivers still do. Student should always check both ways on any street before crossing.

By observing the speed limits in school zones, being alert for increased pedestrian traffic, and watching of school bus activities, we can make this a safe school year for all.

New Rates In Effect At Lake Creek Golf Club

Lake Creek Golf Course board of directors met August 2 to discuss the current costs of operation, overhead, and maintenance of the golf course. Following this discussion, the board voted unanimously to increase green fees to \$7.50 per round and membership dues by \$5.00 per month. Shed fees and tax will remain the same.

The new monthly dues will be \$20.00, shed fee \$5.00, plus \$1.00 tax, making a total of \$26.00 per month. Those without cart sheds will be \$20.00.

The new rates went in effect August 1, 1992.

Tax Rebates For Munday Increase

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered a total of \$157.3 million in August sales tax payments to 1,069 Texas cities and 106 counties, a 4.2 percent increase over the rebates of one year ago.

Munday Sales Tax rebates continue to rise as reported by the state comptroller. Munday received \$9,368.72 for this period, a 31.24% increase over the prior year's total of \$7,138.39. There has been an overall increase of 45.22% for the year.

Knox City received a check for \$13,827.78 reflecting a 20.81% increase with an overall increase of 3.15%. Benjamin received \$681.91, an increase of 7.55% and Goree received \$739.42 for a 38.36% loss from the prior year.

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.82 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

APHIDS ARE BIG PEST IN COTTON

The 1992 cotton season has certainly been filled with many ups and downs to producers. Now another problem is showing up which is the cotton aphid. In a cotton field of David Albus' of Knox City is the cotton aphid. Aphid populations have jumped from zero to 10 aphids per leaf in spotted cotton fields to 40 to 50 aphids per leaf in much cotton,

not to mention all the sticky leaves. What can be done to avoid all these aphids? Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist from Lubbock, conducted a result demonstration in Tahoka in July of this year to control aphids. Leser evaluated three tests five days after treatment. Results are shown in Table 1 below.

Bedrin at 4 and 8 ounces in combination with Karate and Amo gave the best aphid control. Producers are urged to hold off spraying until numbers of aphid reach 50 per leaf so that beneficials may reduce aphid populations and thus

save insecticide applications. Another good thought is that during the past two years, aphid populations crashed around August 22. Maybe it will happen again this year.

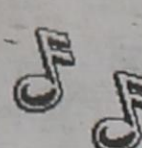
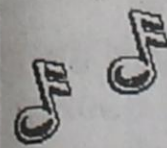
