The grant could not be approved until matching funds could be provided by the City. Several fundraisers, including the "Cans For Kids" campaign, contributed to the success of the project.

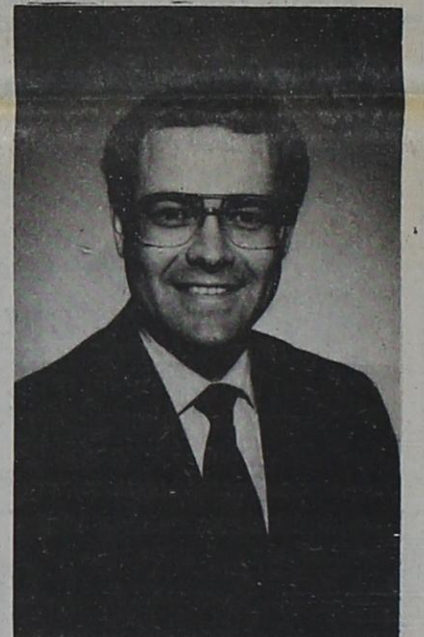
The government funds are provided by the National Park Service, an agency within the U.S. Department of Interior.

## Tragedy Led To Life Of Service . . .

## Robert Dodson To Speak At "Healing The Heart" Seminar

A personal tragedy led to Robert Dodson's life of service. Dodson had to do a lot of soul searching when he heard the news ten years ago. His favorite cousin had been killed in a head-on collision with a drunk driver. The tragedy seemed worse because his cousin, who was as close as a sister, had just graduated from a Christian university. She had been a faithful member of her church and a compassionate and caring young woman. Driving to the lake with another co-ed to celebrate her graduation day, her life was snuffed out quickly.

The tragedy was compounded a few days later when the girl's father, Robert's uncle, died of a heart attack brought on by the

stress of the senseless death of his daughter.

"From that event in my life," Dodson says, "I began to understand what people go through when they suffer grief. That's why I feel it's important that we minister to those who grieve."

## Plan To Use CRP On Highly Erodible Land

The USDA Soil Conservation Service reminds farmers facing conservation compliance deadlines that the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) could be their ticket to staying in compliance, saving soil and making a profit.

The twelfth CRP sign-up will be June 15-26 at the local ASCS office.

The first eleven sign-ups resulted in the acceptance of approximately 4.1 million Texas acres into the program. Under the Conservation Reserve Program, farmers receive annual rental payments in exchange for agreeing to put highly erodible land into permanent vegetative cover for 10 to 15 years.

Landowners wishing to enroll land into CRP state the rental rate they require to take their land out of crop production. Those bids are either accepted or rejected by the USDA based on the environmental benefits anticipated per dollar of cost.

Wes Oneth, State Conservationist, says the CRP is a good option for farmers who must have applied soil conservation systems by 1995 in order to remain eligible for USDA programs.

Oneth explains that the CRP allows farmers to be "in compliance" without having to install various conservation measures, such as terraces and waterways, which can be costly to construct.

Cost-share money is available to help farmers establish permanent vegetation on CRP land.

The Knox County uniform cotton planting date will be set at a meeting scheduled for Monday, April 13, at 6:30 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland. The meeting will feature a fish dinner sponsored by the Knox County Boll Weevil Association.

A short program will be given by Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist, and Billy Warrick, Extension Agronomist. Boring will discuss boll weevil prospects for the 1992 cotton crop and how to keep aphid pressure from appearing. Cotton quality and cotton fertilization will be the main topics of discussion for Mr. Warrick.

Stanley White, famous throughout the United States for his humor and insight, will close the meeting with an after dinner talk.

All cotton producers in Knox County are urged to attend.

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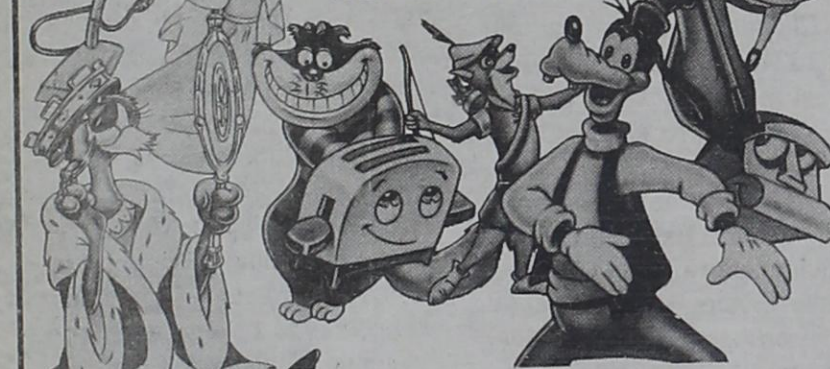

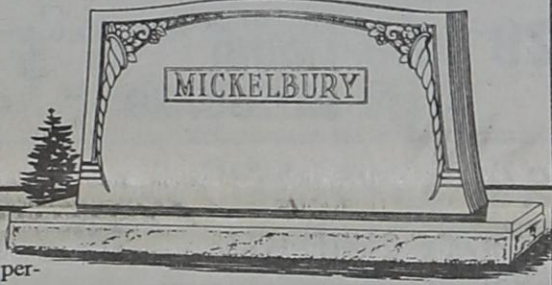

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### Palm Sunday

As we approach Holy Week through the Lent season, I want to discuss briefly the meaning of the five Holy days of the week. We begin the week with Palm Sunday.

In the gospel of John, we have a clear account of the story behind the celebration of "Palm Sunday". Chapter 12: Verses 12-15, states "The next day the great crowd that had come for the Feast (Passover) heard that Jesus was on his way to Jerusalem. They took palm branches and went out to meet him, shouting, "Hosanna!" "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" "Blessed is the King of Israel!" Jesus found a young donkey and sat upon it, as it is written, "Do not be afraid, O Daughter of Zion; see your king is coming, seated on a donkey's colt." (NIV)

In the fourth century, the Christians of Jerusalem began the practice of meeting on the Mount of Olives for the purpose of escorting the bishop into the city in commemoration of Christ's entry. The procession carried palm branches. The custom spread, and still is practiced with modifications in many churches.

This was a time of rejoicing and happiness. The crowd that followed Jesus was praising Him and quoting scripture, which He was here to fulfill.

Then, just a few days later, Jesus was hung on a cross, deserted by the same people who were praising him. In many ways, they were like children, looking to an adult for guidance. When Jesus was taken away and accused of doing wrong, the "children" scattered and would not even admit to knowing Him.

The Lenten season is a time for examination, determination and

growth. Springtime - it is for removing those things which are no longer healthful and adding that which is.

For some people, Lent is a time for giving up certain things such as cigarettes, cakes, pastries, etc. And this is commendable. But Protestant tradition encourages us to make it a time for adding certain practices - a time for determination and growth. Here are some suggestions:

( ) I will read from the Bible - everyday.

( ) I will ask God to speak to me as I read and I will seek to listen.

( ) I will keep my Church vows - to be loyal with my prayers, my presence, my gifts and my service.

( ) I will tithe my income to the budget of the Church.

( ) I will say something good about someone each day.

( ) I will avoid saying negative things about persons.

( ) I will seek to bring out the best in every person I meet.

( ) I will look for ways to be helpful to someone each day.

( ) I will forgive persons who mistreat me.

( ) I will praise God in all circumstances.

As we meet together on Palm Sunday, think on these things and rejoice with Loud Hosannas!

# Public Forums To Be Held On Solid Waste Management

The West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) will be conducting regional public forums on solid waste management April 13 to seek public opinion on issues that will affect local waste activities. As part of the development of a regional solid waste management plan, WCTCOG is seeking input for solutions to the solid waste disposal dilemmas in the counties of Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stone-wall, Taylor and Throckmorton and the incorporated cities therein.

The public, as well as elected officials, are invited to make comments at either of the following meetings: Haskell, Monday, April 13, 10:00 a.m., Council Chamber, City Hall; or Abilene, Monday, April 13, 3:00 p.m., Council Chamber, City Hall. Meetings were also held earlier in the week at Sweetwater and Brownwood.

At each meeting, there will be a brief overview of the regional planning efforts underway, the 19-county area interim solid waste management report and local activities. Public participation is essential in prioritizing goals, evaluating alternatives and recommending the activities and

programs necessary to achieve these goals.

Development of the WCTCOG Regional Solid Waste Management Plan is required by law passed during the 71st Legislature and overseen by the Texas Water Commission. The purpose of the plan is to provide guidance regarding solid waste management in the region including waste reduction, recycling and disposal for the period 1990 to 2010. The WCTCOG regional plan will be a subset of the overall Texas State

Solid Waste Management Plan. Any local plans subsequently developed will be required to conform to the regional plan. This regional plan will guide all solid waste management activities in the region. Any proposed facilities, actions or programs shall be consistent with this plan, which is scheduled for completion in August, 1992.

## Regulations Now In Effect Used Motor Oil And Tire

It is now illegal in Texas to discard used motor oil, or whole used or scrap tires in any fashion other than through proper disposal methods. Under new laws passed by the 72nd Texas Legislature effective April 1, violators face fines of up to \$2,000.

Also, used motor oil must now be taken to a waste oil collection center, such as a quick lube operation or service station. Whole used or scrap tires must be recycled, reused or used for energy recovery.

The Texas Water Commission (TWC) has developed a Waste Tire Recycling Program that has begun prioritizing waste tire sites throughout the state. About 350 illegal tire sites have been identified in Texas to date. The worst sites based on a ranking of four criteria, are being placed on a priority enforcement list (PEL) to be cleaned up first. It is estimated that Texas may have as many as 500 million waste tires stacked up in these illegal sites. Several sites are known to have a million tires or more.

The TWC also has begun regis-

tering potential tire transporters, mobile and fixed tire shredders, and tire storage sites. About two dozen applications have been received from potential tire shredders. Applicants must submit a site engineering plan and post a performance bond in order to qualify. Four applications have been approved to date, and seven more have received conditional approval to operate with final approval anticipated within 45 days.

The program will pay 85 cents for each 18.7 pounds of shredded tire pieces produced. According to the law, at least 25% of all tires shredded must come from PEL sites, with an additional 25% coming from wholesalers and retailers. The remaining 50% can come from these or other sources designated by the TWC. Tire shredders will request to be assigned specific PEL sites for cleanup, but the final decision for assignment will be made by the TWC staff based on several factors. The first assignments are expected to be made by mid-April.

The Waste Tire Recycling Pro-

gram and reimbursement system is being funded by a \$2.00 fee now charged on each new car and truck tire with a rim diameter between 12 and 26 inches. To obtain additional information about the Waste Tire Recycling Program, call 512/834-6683.

Also under the new laws, used motor oil must now be taken to a registered waste oil collector. In most communities, many service stations, oil change businesses and retailers provide this service.

It is estimated that Texans who change their own oil dump about 18 million gallons of used oil on the ground or into storm sewers, or throw it out with their house-

hold garbage. Such dumping is now illegal.

The TWC is required to register all collectors, transporters, marketers, and recyclers of used motor oil. These businesses may call the TWC's new Recycling and Waste Minimization Section at 512/834-6682 for technical assistance.

Collectors must report annually on the amount of oil they collect from the public. They are also required to use only registered transporters to remove collected oil. Transporters are required to keep careful records showing the source and destination of each oil shipment.

Communities that do not have an adequate number of public waste oil collection centers can apply for TWC grants to develop their own programs. This funding is provided by an eight cent per gallon fee on the first sale of all automotive oil in Texas, which became effective January 1, 1992. 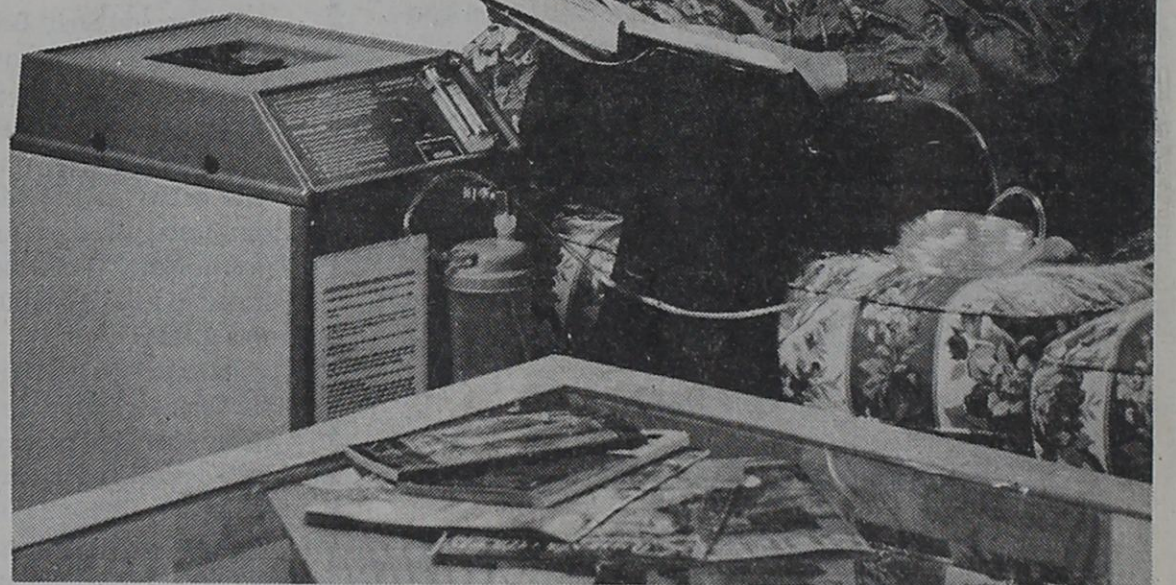

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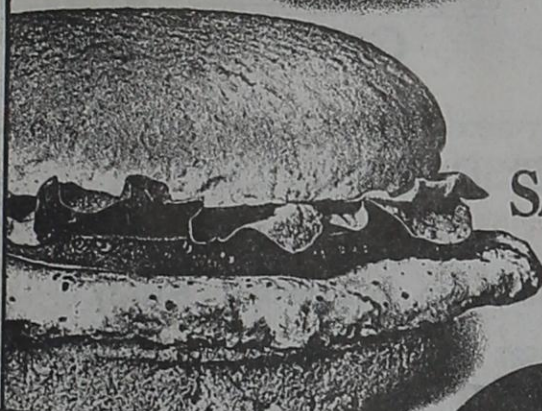

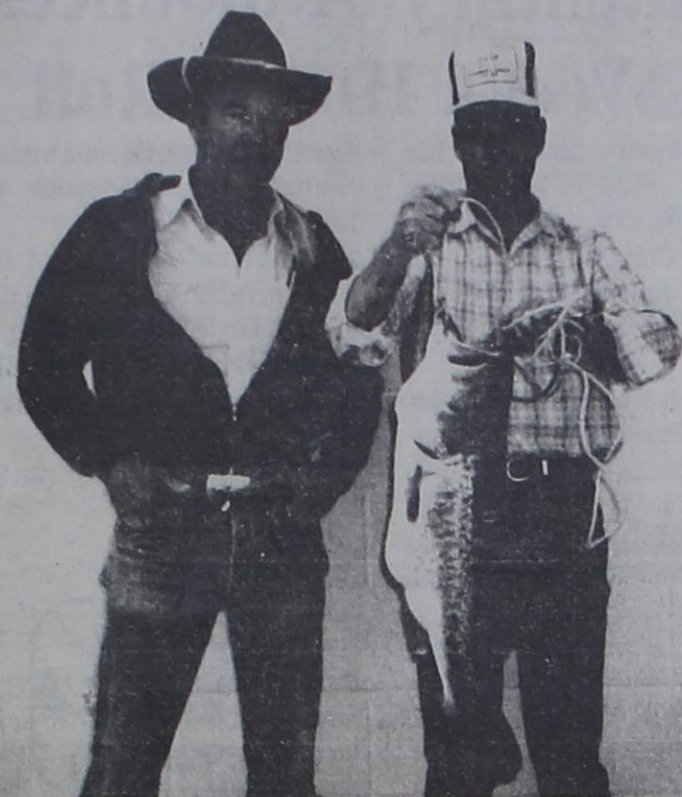

### The Week Of The Young Child

Focusing public attention on the rights and needs of young children is the goal for "The Week of the Young Child", April 5-11. The designate week, originated in 1971 by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, provides for special activities and events which highlight efforts to improve conditions for children.

"Young Children: Their Future in our Hands" is the theme for 1992 and draws attention to society's responsibility in providing the foundation for success in school and in later life. The early childhood years, birth through age eight, is a critical time for learning more about the world, practicing social skills and gaining critical thinking skills and knowledge.

Children need families who have emotional resources and time. Children suffer when parents, teachers and care providers are too tired or too stressed to give them the attention they deserve. Most Texas children live in homes where the primary caregiver also works outside the home.

Children need a society that supports families' childrearing efforts and recognizes that investments in young children and childhood services are more cost effective than remediation or incarceration.

Every individual can make a difference. Here are some steps for starters:

\* Take time to watch, listen and appreciate children in your family and community.

\* Make sure that children have access to and receive the preventive health services so vital to their development.

\* Contribute in some way to the improvement of the quality of early education and care programs.

\* Do what you can to make your community more attuned to children's needs.

\* Examine how policies can support children and families. Make decision makers accountable for their actions.

The future of today's child as tomorrow's adult depends upon each of us.

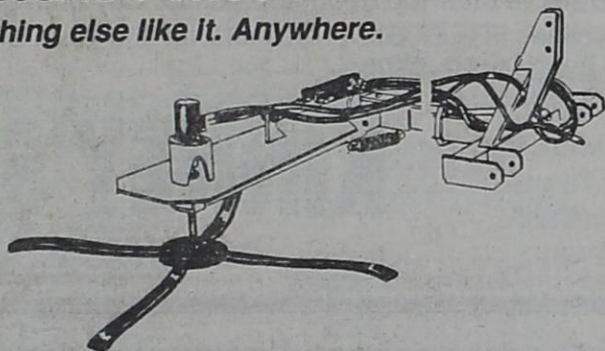
