Local youth wrestles a winner at Houston Rodeo

Strength and determination paid off for Ray Bradley, an FFA student from Munday, as he successfully maneuvered one of 14 strong-willed calves into the winner's circle during the calf scramble at the February 26 performance of the 1996 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Ray, a Student at Munday High School, received a \$1,000 calf purchase certificate donated by Hills Science Diet. This certificate will be used to purchase a registered beef or dairy heifer.

During the year that follows, Ray will groom and feed the animal, maintain extensive financial records and submit monthly reports to the Houston Show officials and to his sponsor on the heifer project. In addition, each winner will be required to create a detailed scrapbook highlighting the progress of the heifer during the year and write a 500-word essay about the experience.

New law effects patient privacy policies at Knox County Hospital

"In recognition of and respect for patients' rights, Knox County Hospital District has adhered to establish policies and mechanisms to safeguard patients' confidential healthcare information," according to Stephen Kuehler, Knox County Hospital District administrator. A recent Texas law clarifies that confidential healthcare information may be released only upon written authorization of the patient or his/her legal representative or if a specific legal exception is met.

Senator Frank Madla (D-San Antonio) was the author of the legislation which establishes parameters for all Texas hospitals to follow when releasing patient healthcare information. Senate Bill 667, passed in May by the Texas Legislature, defines patients' rights concerning release of their healthcare information, including assuring patients access to their own medical records. "The law requires hospitals to obtain the written authorization of a patient or a legal representative to release information relating to the patient's medical history, treatment, diagnosis or prognosis," Kuehler said.

"The patient's decision will affect how visitors, deliveries, telephone calls and request for information from family, friends and others are handled," Kuehler continued. The law allows unauthorized disclosure of healthcare information to specified people or entities, such as to those caring for the patient, to third-party payers for purposes of hospital reimbursement to governmental agencies as authorized by law and to a court, upon court order or court subpoena.

As long standing advocate for patient's rights, Knox County Hospital District has readily enacted the new state requirements. "We are always eager to find new and innovative ways to give our patients the utmost power in making decision about their healthcare," Kuehler said. "The new changes will have a noticeable effect at the hospital," Kuehler continued. "The hospital will be able to acknowledge an adult patient's presence, unless otherwise requested by the patient, but will only be able to provide a one-word condition or

status report, without prior patient consent. Ultimately the patient has the decision, in most instances, as to what information, if any, will be disclosed and to whom the disclosure is made," Kuehler said.

Under the new law, all patient information, including that related to public figures and those involved in matters of public record, is treated equally. "The hospital will continue to withhold all information regarding incidence such as rape, sexual abuse, child or elderly abuse, chemical dependency, attempted suicide, and any information with regard to inmates in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice or those in protective custody," Kuehler continued.

"Knox County Hospital District recognizes its responsibility to keep the citizens of Knox County informed of hospital activities. However, protecting a patient's privacy and maintaining confidentiality of healthcare information is of paramount importance," Kuehler concluded.

Local pastor meets his football hero

Anyone who knows Jeff Christian, pastor of Munday's Church of Christ, knows that his favorite subject to talk about is Jesus Christ and Jeff knows that one day he will meet him face to face. His second favorite subject is Daryl Johnston and this past Thursday night the young man of God spent an entire evening in the midst of his personal football hero.

Jeff grew up in Dallas and, as he puts it, he just couldn't help but be a Cowboys fan. He spent many a game day in front of the tube with his dad, both cheering on the hometown professionals. Jeff says, "I was even a big Cowboys fan way before Johnston came to the team. I even routed for them the year they were 1 and 15." But ever since the Cowboys acquired Daryl "the Moose" Johnston, Jeff has been partial to him and has stood in awe of his blocking abilities and his humble approach to what publicity he has received.

And it was publicity that touched off all the events that led to Jeff's getting to meet "the Moose" in person.

In the fall, after the team from Texas Stadium completed their negotiations with Deion Sanders, it seemed to Jeff that Deion, and other Dallas superstars like Emmitt Smith and Michael Irvin, were getting all the media attention and that no one was paying kudos to the more un-sung hero's like Johnston. But there sat Jeff, watching the team in action and still supporting Johnston with comments like "Yea, Emmitt made the run but Daryl did the blocking."

After one particular game, Jeff just couldn't get all the hoop-la about Sanders out of his head and was still silently debating the issues in the middle of the night when he was supposed to be sleep-

ing - even counting the days toward the Super Bowl was not helping him snooze! Finally Jeff decided to get up, write a letter to the Dallas Morning News, and just get things off his chest. Much to his surprise the Dallas Morning News published his editorial and that was the first step towards his meeting Johnston.

Just a few weeks ago Jeff learned that Johnston was to be in Abilene for a fund-raiser for Abilene Christian Schools and Jeff really, really wanted to go. He looked into purchasing tickets for himself and wife, Jennifer, but, like most fund-raisers, the tickets were sky high and Jeff felt like his budget just wouldn't allow such an extravagance, even for this worthy project.

Those of us who live in Munday know that the grapevine is small here but sometimes it can tell tales to far off friends in Abilene and that is how Gaston Welborn, Chairman of Abilene Christian Schools, found out about Jeff's infatuation with Johnston and he even heard about his letter in the Dallas Morning News. Gaston called Jeff and requested that he fax him a copy of the editorial, which Jeff did, and then he graciously invited the Christians to be guests at the dinner that would feature Johnston as a speaker.

On Thursday, February 28, an excited Jeff and Jennifer took off for the dinner and much to their surprise they were seated up front, next to Daryl Johnston's table. Jeff was a little taken aback by Johnston's presence but that didn't keep him from speaking with him and even joking around with the star. Jeff noticed that the tea cups were made by Syracuse China Company and he suggested to Johnston that they must have been placed there as a tribute to his alma mater - Syracuse University.

Dinner got underway and the Master of Ceremonies took his spot on stage to introduce Daryl but, as a means to this introduction, he began reading the letter that Jeff had mailed to the Dallas Morning News. Jeff states that he was extremely shocked since he didn't have any idea that this would happen and he was even more elated when Daryl Johnston got up on stage and personally thanked Jeff in public, telling him that he appreciated people who respected his work. He remarked that many people think he only works on game days and takes it easy the rest of the time, comparing it to Jeff's pastoral duties and how some people think that preachers work only on Sunday's.

The entire evening was a night that Jeff Christian will never for-

get. He says that the thing that impressed him the most was what a "real" person Daryl Johnston was and he didn't behave like a famous super star but was a down to earth, just-like-me-and-you, kind of guy.

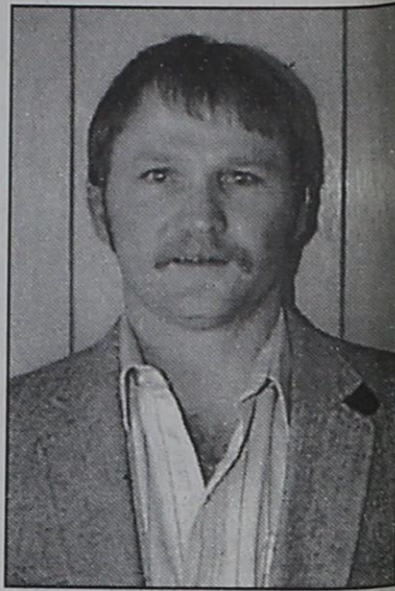
Mr. and Mrs. Fetsch have 21 grandchildren; six great-grandchildren and are expecting three more great-grandchildren.

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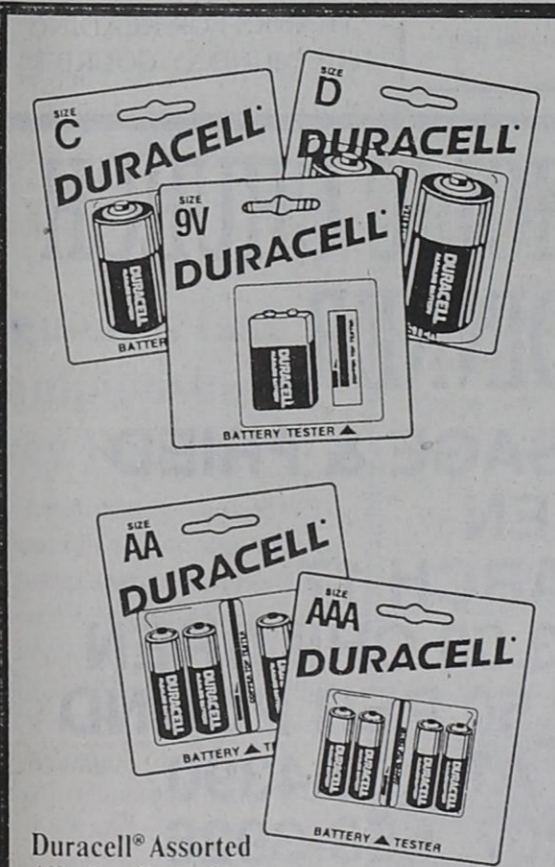
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METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

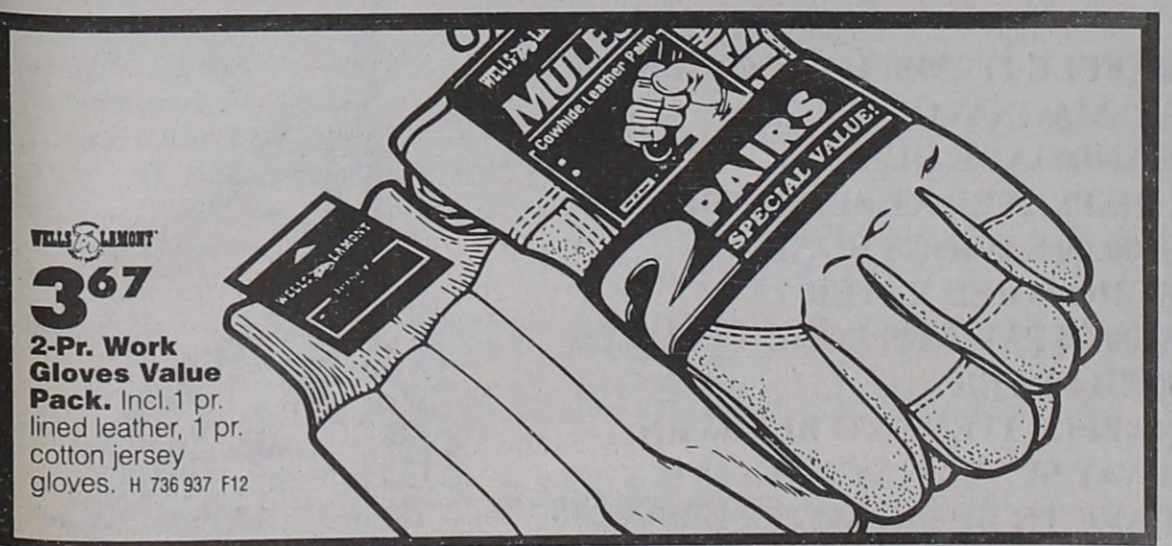
Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

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Will you be a No-Show this year?

 You get your ticket weeks in advance. Your seats are never as close as where you really wanted, but that makes little difference. After all, your ticket not only means you see the action, it guarantees you're part of it. Then you notice some prime seats where no one will sit. Who gets a ticket to a big event and then opts not to use it? In attendance-keeping, they are known as the "no-shows." People who buy tickets and then for some reason don't attend. No-shows, can prevent an event from touting itself as an official sellout. For that reason, you'll hear boos, hisses, and catcalls when the number of no-shows is announced at some sporting events.

In many respects, Texas elections vary little from this scenario. You get your voter registration card (your ticket) weeks in advance. Most of us are never as close to the political action as we'd like, but on election day that makes little difference. Our vote makes each and every one of us a vital part of the action.

And like any big event, organizers always hope for a 100 percent turnout (a "sellout," if you will) on election day. However over the years, the political arena has been anything but full. Empty seats are easy to find.

So where are the "Boos" for the no-shows on election day?

Let's face it, Booming the election day no-shows is no longer fashionable. Yes, it's certainly chic to

complain about "the system," but taking an active role in changing it? That's for the other guy to worry about. The right to vote, once a patriotic duty, has become as important to some people as a weekend chore that never seems to get done. "Yeah, yeah. I'll do it — if I get around to it."

With 1996 being a Presidential election year, that fact alone should be enough to spark voter interest across our state. And considering Texans will also have the final word on one U.S. Senate seat, all 30 Congressional seats, all 150 seats in the Texas House and approximately half the seats in the Texas Senate, you can understand why 1996 is viewed as a significant election year — and why voter participation is as important as ever.

However if a 20-year trend holds, more than a quarter of the registered voters in Texas will opt to sit out this Presidential election year. In hard numbers, that's more than two million people. Since 1976, voter turnout in the November General Election has surpassed the 70 percent mark only once. As Secretary of State, that's a trend of voter apathy that disturbs me.

Upon being appointed by Governor George W. Bush, my goal has been to continue the strong legacy of my immediate predecessors in the area of voter registration. Secretaries of State including Jack Raines, George Bayoud, John Hannah, and Ron Kirk have all worked to assure every Texan eligible to vote gets the chance to register to vote.

Passage of the National Voter Registration Act has made registration a relatively simple process. More than nine million Texans will be registered to vote this election year, representing approximately 70 percent of the eligible voting population. With registration made easy, the challenge is now on assuring those registered to vote will show up at the polls.

The answer to voter apathy has proven elusive. Feelings of isolation from government, negative campaigns, the overwhelming number of elections have all contributed to the problem. All have added to the perception, "What does it matter?"

If you are concerned about how state and federal government utilize your tax dollars, your vote is crucial. If you consider jobs and the economic future of our children a priority, your vote is significant. In 1996, as in every election, your vote still matters.

Democrat or Republican, Libertarian or Independent: your political affiliation is not the issue. What matters is that you let your voice be heard on election day. The sounds that resonate from the ballot box are ones that cannot be ignored in Washington, in Austin, in county courthouses or in city halls.

Your voter registration card is your ticket. The political arena has plenty of seats. With so much riding on the outcomes in 1996, it's time we start booing the election day no-shows again.

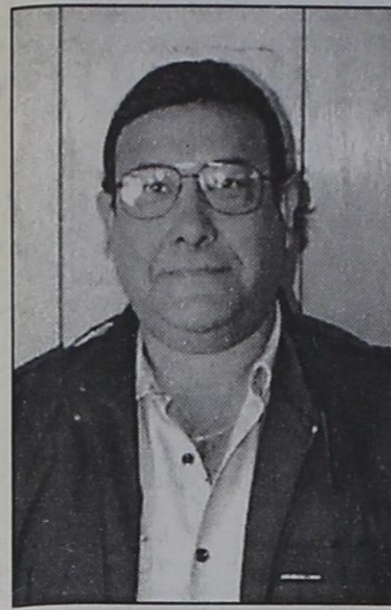

I pray for an apology to every one who has lost loved ones.

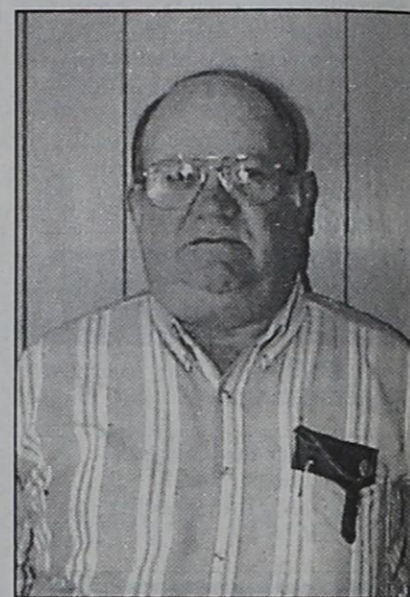

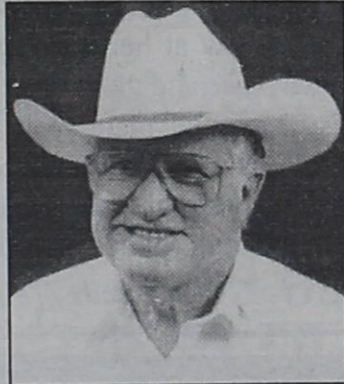
