New area code to
begin May 25, 1997

The new area codes for much of the present 817 area code will go in service May 25, 1997, according to GTE.

The Fort Worth metropolitan area will retain the 817 area code. This includes the GTE exchanges of Azle, Grapevine, Keller, Reno and Springtown.

The area north of the Fort Worth metro area, and the remainder of northern part of the present 817 area, including most of Palo Pinto County and the extreme northern part of Stephens County, will be in the 940 area code.

GTE service areas going to the 940 area code will be Argyle, Aspermont, Bartonville, Benjamin, Denton, Haskell, Holliday, Justin, Kamay, Knox City, Megargel, Munday, Pilot Point, Rochester, Rule, Seymour, Throckmorton, Tioga and Weinert.

The area south of the Fort Worth metro area, and the remainder of the southern area of the present 817 area, including the extreme southern part of Palo Pinto County

and most of Stephens County, will be in the new 254 area code.

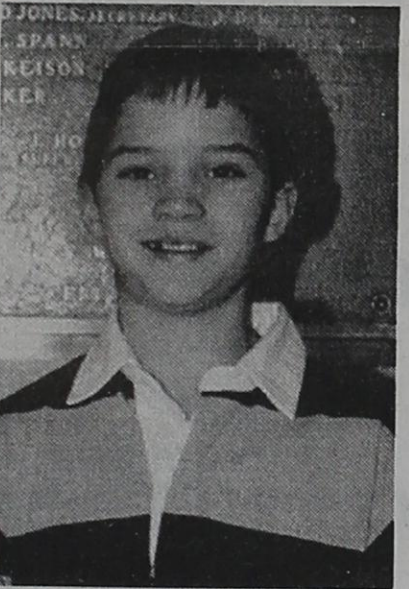
GTE service areas going to the 254 area code are Burlington, Bynum, Chilton, Crawford, Cross Plains, Dawson, Glen Rose, Hubbard, Irene, Lott, Malone, May, Morgan, Mount Cale, Riesel, Rising Star, Rogers, Rosebud, Walnut Springs and Whitney.

The new 940 and 254 area codes will go in service May 25, 1997. A three month permissive dialing period will allow customers to receive calls dialed to their former area code as well as the newly-assigned area code. Beginning August 24, 1997, the new area code must be dialed for the call to complete to the party being called.

Callers dialing the incorrect area code beginning August 24 will receive a recording until September 21 telling them the area code has changed or they cannot complete the call as dialed, or in some cases, they may reach another party who has been assigned the number in the 817 area.

The need for new area codes indicates the continued dynamic economic growth of Texas, as well as growth in telephone services such as wireless, pagers, fax machines and computer lines. The Dallas area opened a new 972 area code to suburban Dallas cities in September, and a new 281 area code began serving the suburban Houston area in November.

In addition to the new codes for 817 customers, two new codes will be added in the 210 area code in the summer of 1997. The San Antonio metro area will retain the 210 area code. The northern section of the present 210 area code will change to a 830 area code while those in the southern part of existing 210 area will change to a 956 area code.

Judge believes controversies can turn government around

Last year's controversies served as a "wake-up" call for Texas' 24 councils of government, said Knox County Judge David Perdue, keynote speaker at the annual Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission legislative luncheon Wednesday.

The fracas over wasteful spending by councils of government will turn the organizations into "model agencies," he contended.

"I think we have met the test," Perdue told a crowd of 200 people, composed mostly of government officials from across the Basin. "We have made a lot of changes, both at the state level and locally, where the were needed where they were needed."

Perdue was referring to hearings last fall before the House Appropriation Oversight Committee in which legislators - after hearing evidence of lack of accountability and wasteful, inappropriate spending - recommended legislation that places planning commissions under closer scrutiny.

The state's councils of government, dubbed COGs, control about \$265 million of state and federal money. The agencies usually oversee grant programs ranging from job training to solid waste, and often perform research for city and county governments.

Texas COGs, including the PBRPC, came under fire last summer after a legislative probe revealed several examples of COG staff and board members using government money for personal entertainment. The investigation also showed that members attended conferences at resorts

where little formal business was done.

The PBRPC amended its travel and expenditure policies in the wake of the ensuing controversy. Because accolades for public officials are few and far between, all governments - including the state's two dozen COGs - must be run like a "glass house with the curtains open" to eliminate the perception that officials are "naturally corrupt," Perdue said.

"Public office holders need to have thick skins," he said. "It's up to us to act in a manner that inspires confidence."

On a more uplifting note, Perdue said the COGs are invaluable to local governments, which often call upon their expertise and lobbying savvy.

Their staff and board members are among the most helpful and most caring people," he said.

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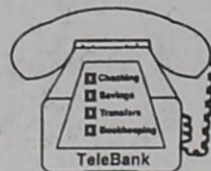

Deadline for submitting 1996 entries will be February 3, 1997, Bullard said. Send all nominations to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, Box 2689, Waco, Texas, 76702-2689.

To qualify for the honor, a candidate must have performed an heroic act of lifesaving within Texas during 1996. Preferably, it should be related to farming and ranching, Bullard said.

The 1996 winner was Ray Robinson of Santo, Texas, who is credited with saving the life of Mark Ivy from a 1,500 pound round bale of hay that rolled from the bucket loader, pinning him on the tractor seat.

A letter of nomination should include a written account of the incident and the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all persons involved. Newspaper clippings and photos should also accompany when available, Bullard said.

Bullard is a field safety representative for the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies' Safety and Underwriting Division.

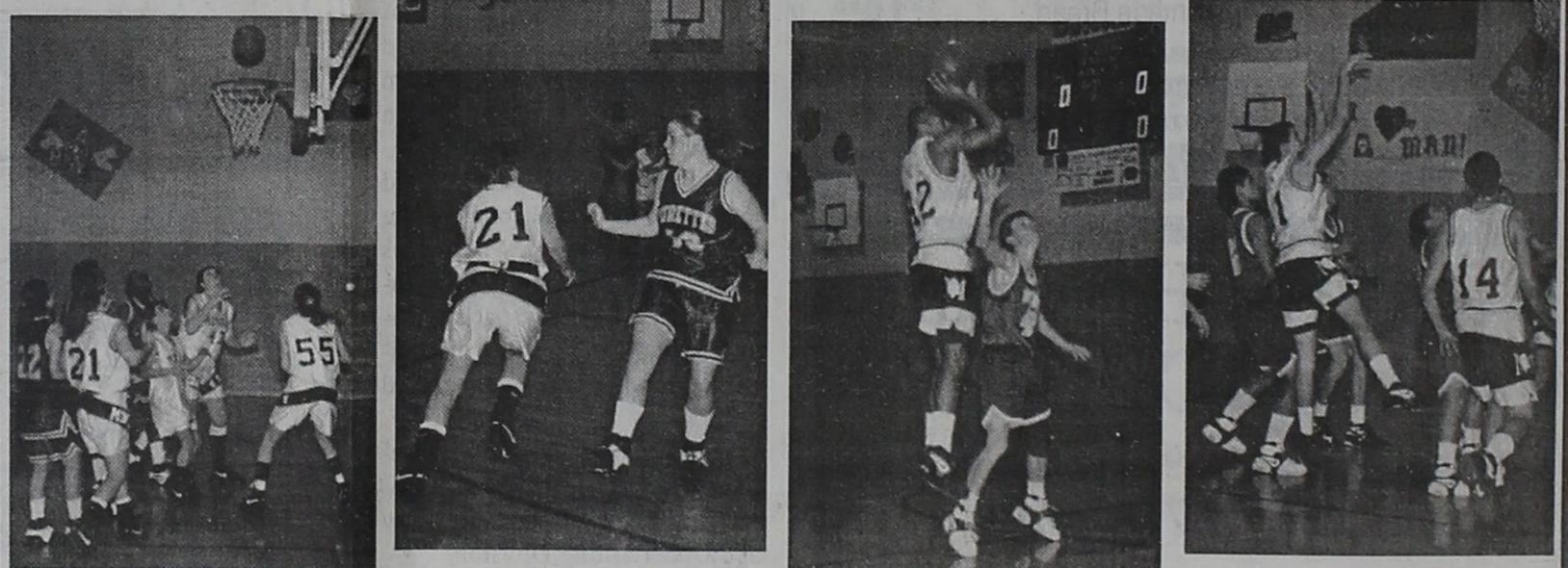
