LOOKING TO NEW YEAR

One Last Look At Happenings Of 1986

1986 was a year of celebrations throughout Texas, commemorating our state's 150th birthday of the struggle for freedom. Knox County was one of many to which people came from miles around to watch the official Sesquicentennial wagon train as it made its journey around the state.

And Munday had its own Sesquicentennial events and special project to landscape the City Hall lawn. A Munday man was crowned the county's Sesquicentennial king at a historical pageant in July.

Youths were in the spotlight during the year, as well. Munday High School had another super-successful year, both in sports and academics in addition to drama and band. The persons in Munday who suffered most during 1986 were the farmers, who will doubtless remember the "monsoon season" in a future dry year and wonder why they didn't get out of the business sooner! Oilfield workers fared poorly, also, as many rigs in the area were shut down.

But even with the slumping economy, rising prices and bad news bombarding us from the television each night, Munday residents still found plenty of things to smile about. In this first paper of 1987, we will take a look back at both the bad and the good from the year past.

JANUARY

With a Democratic primary in the offing, political candidates began to throw their names in the hat. Commissioners Lee Patterson and Bobby Roberson filed, as did deputy county treasurer Evelyn Balis and Justice of the Peace John Phillips. The Munday Senior Citizens organization installed its new officers.

Quality Implement lost two of its mainstays, as 30-year service manager Tom Oustad announced his retirement, as did his wife, Ida, a 20-year employee of Quality Implement. Another retiree was long-time Knox County game warden Vic Lowry of Knox City. Mark Tibbets replaced Oustad later in the year, but the county is still officially without a game warden.

In sports, Munday basketball teams began their district action. The Mogul JV won a tournament here and another in Knox City, and the eighth grade Braves won the Munday junior high tourney. The varsity Moguls won all their district games in January, but the girls lost four of the six games they played this month. Munday dominated the Class A all-state football team with Hollis Adams tabbed for both offensive and defensive first team honors. Other first team picks were Dent Offutt, Kregg Sanders and Ronny Lowrance, and Todd Thompson and Tim Collier were named to the second team. Thirteen gymnastic teams competed in the Munday Gymdandeez meet, with the local team coming in fourth.

Kyle McAfee, Chad Bordovsky, Tessa Kiser, Aaron Kiser, Todd Thompson, Bryan Latham, Kent Latham and Angie Partridge all took top honors at the annual junior livestock show held at the Knox City show barn. A total of 47 animals were sold for \$15,000 at the premium sale. The show was sponsored by the Brazos Valley Young Farmers.

Munday firemen sold fire extinguishers in a house-to-house drive, and met with great success, selling

FEBRUARY

Kregg Sanders and Salwa Choucair were named Mr. and Miss Munday High School by their classmates. Other nominees were Neil Waggoner, Mark Brown, Kelly Wren and Ann Kuehler. The Moguls won the district basketball title for the second year, beat Chillicothe for the bi-district crown, then suffered a disappointing loss to Archer City in the area game. The Wildcats went on to represent the region in the state tournament. Goree's Lady Wildcats took the girls' district championship.

Kacy Longan was another repeat winner, taking the conservation district poster contest grand championship for the third time. Runners up were Kevin Myers, Bridgett Beaty and Missy Reneau. Laura Myers was champion in the essay contest. The Munday seventh grade class performed a musical based on the Charlie Brown comic strip.

County Judge David Neal Perdue joined the political calendar, and Wayne Sutton of Vera announced his candidacy for commissioner of Precinct 2. Tom Black and Linnie West were crowned Valentine royalty at the Munday Nursing Center, and Mrs. Everett Barger, longtime postmistress at Goree, retired. Pat Peek, a Goree postal employee, was hired to replace Mrs. Barger.

Munday was placed in a newly realigned football district with teams to the west. Don Haynie was appointed postmaster at Weinert.

MARCH

Six persons filed for election to the Munday ISD board of trustees, and only 46 persons donated blood at the semi-annual Munday bloodmobile. Three Munday basketball players, Laura Myers, Dent Offutt and Kregg Sanders, were named to the All-District first team in basketball, and others on the second team or receiving honorable mention were Ann Kuehler, Tim Collier, Anthony Stinnett, Reggie Tucker, Gwen Stinnett and Eva Escamilla.

Mrs. Imagean Young of Benjamin informed readers that she was running for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 2. Lyndle Reeves, Jan Zeisel and Delores Lambeth were elected to serve as officers of the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and Don Bunton, Perry Kuehler and James Amerson were voted in as directors. David Key and Larry Smith were named directors of the National Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Bryan Latham won several prizes at the Houston Livestock Show, and a number of Munday Gymdandeez qualified for the state meet. Home-making students at Munday High School modeled and entertained an audience with their spring fashion show. Winning awards were Holly Jackson, Lynn Parker, Denise Kuehler, Melanie Little, Jennifer Wren, Nickie Collier, Ann Kuehler, Donna Welch, Lynette Norman and JoAnn Hamilton.

The Moguls hosted their first track meet on the new Phillip McAfee Memorial Track constructed on the school campus. The Moguls won the boys' division of the meet and Paducah took girls' honors. The following week the

Tax Increase Goes Into Effect New Year's Day

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded Texans not to forget the increase in the sales tax rate that begins New Year's Day, January 1, 1987.

"Only the rate has changed. In every case, what is and what is not taxable under current sales tax law remains the same when the new law goes into effect January 1," reminded Bullock.

A special session of the Texas Legislature raised the state's sales tax rate one and one-eighth percent to deal with a shortfall of tax revenue caused by the collapse of oil prices.

The state sales tax rate goes from 4.125 to 5.25 percent.

Comptroller Bullock said that in

many areas of Texas the state rate and local sales taxes, including transit and city sales taxes will put the combined rate to as much as 7.25 percent. In making accounting changes to collect the new tax rate, businesses should have adjusted cash registers and alerted and trained their personnel to collect sales tax at the new local rates.

The new law also raised the motor fuels tax 5 cents -- from 10 cents to 15 cents a gallon.

"My office has contacted taxpayers and sent new rate cards and updated information on these state tax changes," Bullock said.

Hospital Tax Rollback Election Set January 17

Absentee voting for the January 17 property tax rollback election began Monday, December 29, at the Knox County courthouse, and will continue through Tuesday, January 13. Applications for ballots by mail must be received at the county clerk's office no later than January 9.

The special election was set in October after local residents submitted a petition protesting the tax increase set by the Knox County Hospital District board of directors. The increase, from 18 cents to 42 cents per \$100 of property valuation, was necessary as a temporary measure to keep the hospital running until financial problems could be worked out, according to trustees.

After the petition was validated and the election set, the hospital closed in mid-October because

trustees said it could not stay in business without the additional tax revenues. The hospital's financial state was caused by alleged poor management and new Medicare programs which have caused several small-town hospitals to close their doors.

The election deciding whether the hospital district tax will stay at the present 42 cents or be rolled back to the 1985 rate will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, January 17. Polling places will be at the Knox County Aging Services Center in Knox City, at the Munday City Hall, the Gilliland Community Center, the Truscott Community Center, the Ex-Students Memorial Building in Benjamin and the Goree Memorial Building.

Only registered voters are eligible to cast their ballots in the special election.

Clyde Beats Moguls For Tourney Trophy

The Moguls and Mogulettes played in the Clyde tournament the weekend before Christmas, and the local boys lost a two-pointer to Clyde in the finals to settle for the runner-up spot after defeating Eastland and Bangs. The Mogulettes lost to Eastland and Waco Robinson in their two games.

Going back to the middle of the month, Munday teams didn't treat their guests very well on December 16, as both varsity teams and the boys' JV took victories in the first home game for all squads. The Mogulettes beat Albany 33-30 in a close game that was tied at the end of the third quarter. Mindy Myers paced the team with 20 points, and Gwen Stinnett, Angel Dockins and Karen Kuehler assisted with 7, 4 and 2 points, respectively. The Moguls, in their first home appearance, trounced Windthorst 68-32 behind 14-point performances by Anthony Stinnett and Jimmy Sosa. Jay Donoho and David Hertel scored 10 each, John Paul Browning had 8, Kent Sanders 6, Ricky Taylor 4 and Richard Toliver 2, in the win.

In their first game in the Clyde tourney, the Mogulettes fought their way back from a deficit to tie the game at the end of the third quarter, only to slow down in the final period and lose 44-39. Mindy Myers was high point with 13, Gwen Stinnett had 8, Karen Kuehler 6, Angel Dockins 5, Denise Kuehler 4, Esther Escamilla 2 and Nickie Collier 1 point. In their second contest, a poor fourth quarter contributed to a 46-30 loss to Waco Robinson. Scoring for the Mogulettes were Mindy Myers, 13; Gwen Stinnett, 9; Angel Dockins, 4; and Esther Escamilla and Nickie Collier, 2 each.

The Moguls began the tourney with a big 65-39 win over Eastland. Anthony Stinnett poured in 26 points, helped out by Reggie Tucker with 10, Lowell Hutchens, David Hertel and Richard Toliver with 6 each, Jay Donoho and Jimmy Sosa with 4 each, Ricky Taylor with 2 and Kent Sanders with 1. Stinnett scored 17 points in the Moguls' 53-40 win over Bangs the next day. Reggie Tucker added 12, John Paul Browning and Jimmy Sosa had 6, Richard Toliver and David Hertel had 4 and Curtis Taylor scored 2.

In the finals Saturday night, Clyde took a narrow lead at half-time, but lost it by the end of the third quarter. The Bulldogs then outscored Munday by three points in the last period to take a 52-50 tournament win. Tucker paced the Moguls with 17, Stinnett scored 16, Hertel had 7, Sosa 6 and Browning 4 in the team's third loss in eight outings.

The varsity teams will play in a tournament in Olney this weekend, and JV and junior high squads will play Knox City on Monday, January 5, with boys' games to be

played there and girls' contests in Munday. Then the Moguls and Mogulettes will host Benjamin the following night to start the district season. The games will begin at 6 p.m. and Munday fans are urged to fill the gymnasium.

Coach Farmer Comments

We really needed to win a close game like the one with Albany. Everybody played great defense, and we had a better night rebounding than we've had this season. Before the game we talked about how we had to stop their best player, Vickers, to win, and we held her to only 14 points, so we accomplished our goal.

The Eastland game was another one where we just weren't ready to play. We should have won, but we just didn't play up to our capability. Also, we got in foul trouble early and couldn't concentrate on our man-to-man defense.

We had to play a zone defense against Waco Robinson because they were so big. Our tallest player is about 5'7", and they had one girl who was 6'3". Despite our best efforts she scored 24 points, but no other team could stop her either. We

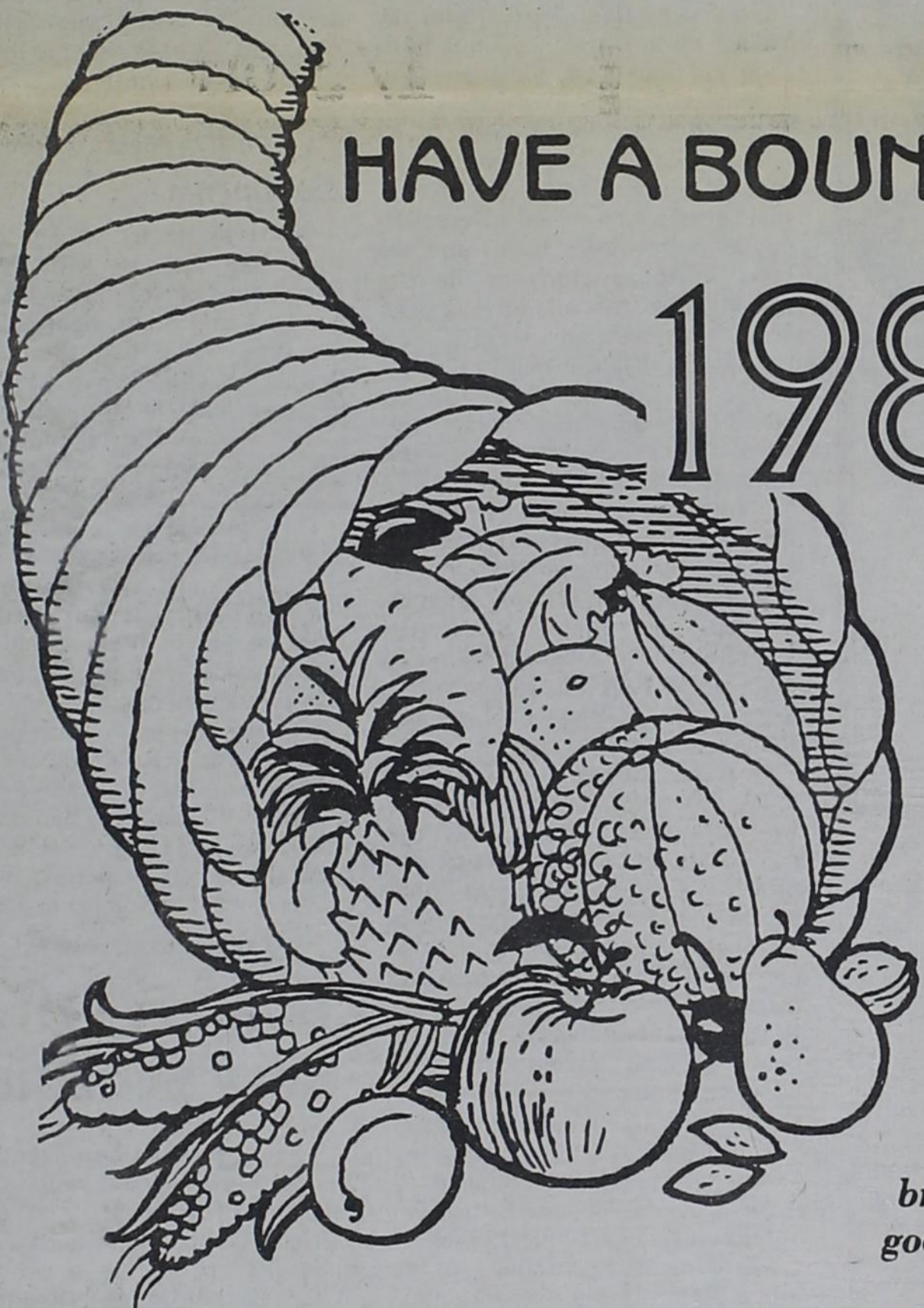

Social Security Recipients To Get Benefit Statements

Every person who received or repaid any Social Security benefits during 1986 will receive a Social Security Benefit Statement, Form SSA-1099, during January 1987, Frances Braden, Social Security Representative in Vernon, Texas, said recently.

The form will show the amount of Social Security benefits the person received as well as the amount of benefits they repaid during 1986. The form should be used just as any other form 1099 received from a financial institution is used when the person completes their Federal income tax return for 1986, Mrs. Braden said.

People who have substantial other income may have to include up to half of their Social Security benefits in their taxable income.

Included with the benefit statement will be IRS Notice 703. This is a worksheet that people can

fill out to see if any of their Social Security benefits may be subject to Federal income tax.

A free publication -- Publication 915 -- contains a detailed explanation of the entries on the benefit statement and explains about taxability of benefits. A free copy is available at any Social Security office or Internal Revenue Service office.

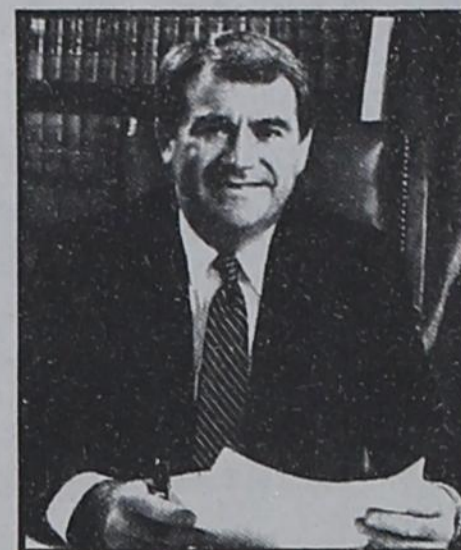

Lotteries Are Illegal In Texas

Although lotteries are legal in some states, they are still illegal in Texas. In addition, it is illegal to send lottery information into the United States from other countries. At least one Canadian organization is sending gambling information into Texas. Those who respond through the mails are also in violation of federal laws, according to postal authorities.

FOREIGN LOTTERIES

The post office is conducting an investigation of the illegal Canadian operation and will attempt to stop any mail going back to the lottery operators. So, if you have tried to enter such a lottery, don't be surprised if your entry is returned to you marked "Return to Sender."

CHARITY

Most people do not realize that lotteries conducted for charitable purposes are also illegal. For example, a local boys club may sell lottery tickets at \$1 each to raise money for football uniforms. The prize may be anything from a color TV. to a home-cooked meal. Or a church group may "accept donations" for chances to win a prize in order to help collect money for refugees or other needy people.

Either way, the law is the same. Persons who set up the lottery and persons who buy lottery tickets are committing criminal acts.

BINGO

In areas where voters have authorized charities to conduct bingo games, those charities licensed by the Comptroller of Public Accounts may conduct such games. There are a number of rules concerning legal bingo, which are set forth in art. 179d TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. If your group is interested in being licensed for bingo, contact the State Comptroller's Office at (512) 475-2386.

If you have received a solicitation for entering a lottery, your best course of action is to throw it away or turn it over to local postal authorities.

After winning the zone and district one-act play competitions, Munday's UIL entry, "The Girl in the Mirror," went on to qualify for the regional contest. Taking all-star honors in the play were Kathy Hunter, Russell Smith, Mark Brown, Alexis Bordovsky, Salwa Choucair, Lowell Hutchens and Kathy Byard. Tessa and Aaron Kiser and Jason and Jenni Bowman placed in the county's stocker-feeder project.

Munday coach Jim Edwards resigned to take a position at Mineral Wells, and after sifting through a pile of applications, school trustees hired Ron Steele of Granham to take over the head coach and athletic director spot. Also hired was a girls' basketball coach, Gina Farmer, who had been employed at Coahoma.

The Mogul track teams remained successful, with the junior varsity winning the JV and Class A division of the Buckaroo Relays at Breckenridge and the varsity coming in fourth in the 2A and 3A bracket. Cold weather prevailed at the district track meet, but Munday ran away with the team trophy. The Mogulettes were fifth in their division. Dedication ceremonies for the track, officially naming it the Phillip McAfee Memorial Track, were held with McAfee's widow and sons present.

Byron Gass and Ronnie Stewart were re-elected to the Munday ISD board of trustees, and Joe Tidwell was elected to a seat on the board. Running unopposed in the city election were Mayor Doris Dickerson, incumbent councilman Richard Albus and newcomer Gene Brown. Munday teacher Debbie Wilson was inducted into the local chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma society.

Local students qualifying for the regional UIL academic meet were Salwa Choucair, Laura Myers, Kathy Hunter, Kelly Wren, Lynette Norman, Howard McPherson, Douglas Schumacher, Jay Donoho and Tony Wilde. Future Homemakers and Future Farmers of America held a joint banquet, at which Doug Tidwell was named Star Greenhand of the year and Annette LeFevre was named Star Chapter Farmer.

Paula Schur won the coveted Citizen of the Year plaque at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet for her many volunteer services to the community. County Judge David N. Perdue spoke at the affair.

MAY

Graduation month saw an unprecedented number of local youths winning various types of awards. Kelly Wren and Salwa Choucair were named valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively at Munday High School, and Jenni Bowman and Mindy Myers were the highest ranking students in the eighth grade class. Salwa participated in the state UIL academic meet, and local elementary and junior high students placed second in the district academic contest. Seniors began to receive college scholarships, and top students in each subject were honored at a high school assembly.

The one-act play was chosen as a state alternate, with acting honors going to Holly Jackson, Russell Smith and Alexis Bordovsky. Nicole Urbanczyk won her age group at a tri-state gymnastics meet, and Munday's junior high girls won a track meet held here. Dent Offutt and Gregg Sanders were invited to play in the Texas High School Coaches Association and Whataburger all-star games.

Bobby Roberson and Wayne Sutton were top vote-getters in the only contested race in the May Democratic primary election. Pitted against Charles Griffith, they gained enough votes to face each other in a June runoff. Kandise Longan was named Little Miss Lake Kemp during Seymour's famous Fish Day celebration, and 50th District Attorney W.H. (Bill) Healy resigned to join an Abilene law firm.

The Moguls won their second regional track title, but the team had some bad luck at the state contest and only won one first place medal. That being for the sprint relay. Finally, 31 eighth graders and 33 seniors received their diplomas at graduation ceremonies, and rainy weather hampered both wheat and potato harvests as the month came to an end.

JUNE

The Sesquicentennial wagon train received a real Texas welcome when it rolled into Knox County on June 1. A large crowd was on hand to welcome the travelers, who spent two nights at the campsite near Benjamin before moving south. The train was made up of about 60 wagons, 450-500 persons and numerous support vehicles, as well as a few horses, lots of mules and a specially trained police dog when it came through the county.

Bobby Roberson was re-elected commissioner of Precinct 2 in a runoff election, defeating his opponent, Wayne Sutton of Vera. Tom Schrandt received Governor Mark White's appointment to the position of district attorney for the 50th Judicial District, replacing Bill Healy. The Munday Volunteer Fire Department purchased a van for use as a rescue unit and equipped it with various emergency and first aid items.

The local cancer crusade netted the American Cancer Society more than \$7,000, and plans were made for an extension to the Corps of Engineers drainage ditch and for paving of various streets in town.

Jae-Jae Reneau was named best intermediate model and won a first place plaque in her age division at the district 4-H fashion show held here. Annette LeFevre was crowned queen of the 1986 Miss Vegetable Festival pageant, with Alicia Cook and Melanie Little picked as runners-up. Little girl winners were Andrea Brown, Tracee Tomlinson, Angela Albus, Krisi Harlan, Amber Reed and Dystanie Williamson.

Lots of other winners were named in various categories as both local and out-of-town visitors flocked around City Hall to see the many different exhibits and judging contests going on during the Vegetable Festival.

JULY

Troy Nuckols and Mary Smith won a tie-breaker to take the championship in the Guys and Dolls golf tournament held at the Lake Creek course. Also in sports, the Munday Little League All-stars were runners-up in the three-team tourney involving Seymour and Knox City. Seymour advanced to the next round in the playoffs.

Karin Schoenfelder, who was an exchange student in the Herb Partridge home in 1961, returned to Munday to renew old acquaintances. The Schoenfelders live in West Berlin, Germany.

Gary Decker was promoted to the central Rolling Plains Production Credit Association office in Stamford and was honored with a going-away party at the Munday office. T.J. Partridge of Munday and Myrtle Lowrey White of Knox City were crowned pioneer king and queen at the county-wide Sesquicentennial celebration in Benjamin. This event also honored Knox County's 100th birthday with a historical presentation and other festivities.

AUGUST

Clint Norman returned to a former place of employment, as he was hired as loan officer at the Rolling Plains PCA, replacing Gary Decker. Similarly, E.B. Hosea, a former longtime superintendent at Goree, stepped back into the school office after the resignation of Jerry Hawthorne.

Football workouts started for the state-ranked Munday Moguls, and teachers began preparing for their coming year, as did some eager and some reluctant students. The summer bloodmobile visit generated little interest, with only 46 pints of blood donated. What did draw some interest on the part of Munday citizens was the street paving project that begun several weeks late and was quickly interrupted by the first of the showers that have plagued area residents since the end of summer.

Countywide, the talk was of a sizable tax increase adopted by the Knox County Hospital District board of directors. The increase, from 18 cents per \$100 valuation to 41 cents, was announced as an effort to keep the hospital afloat until its financial problems could be solved.

SEPTEMBER

After an opening game tie with the Haskell Indians, the Moguls blasted Knox City and Archer City to get fans' hopes high. Early enrollment figures from Munday

schools showed the student population to be down just a little when compared to 1985.

Heavy rains soaked the ground, and area rivers ran high and fast for a couple of days early in the month. Some areas of the county got as much as seven inches during a two-week period. The Brazos Valley Young Farmers elected officers, new cheerleaders and band personnel were announced and Mary Denise Groves was hired as an elementary school aide, replacing Charlotte Jackson.

A new service group called the Sunshine Ladies was formed by Ima Brockett. The women volunteer for a variety of duties at the Munday Nursing Center; chief among them is one-on-one communication with the residents.

The Moguls ended the month with a thrilling upset victory over the Electra Tigers, and other students brought home ribbons from the Haskell County fair. The state fire marshal's office investigated the rubble left from a rent house that exploded and burned one night despite close checks by fire department and police authorities.

OCTOBER

Angie Partridge and Andrea Longan were named Gold Star winners at the annual 4-H achievement program. Eleven 4-H'ers advanced to the district food show after winning the county contest, and the Munday Extension Homemakers Club won a pair of awards at the Homemaker Achievement Day.

Leon Sellers moved to Munday to take over management of the local WTU office, replacing Frank Jackson, who was transferred to San Angelo. Knox County won the Texas Association of Counties employee safety award, and the local United Fund drive got underway with Martha Hunter as campaign chairman. Longtime Chamber of Commerce manager Callie Ann Combs retired due to health reasons.

Rhineland women compiled a cookbook of favorite recipes which was featured at the annual Knights of Columbus sausage dinner and bazaar. The first cotton was ginned, and it looks as if it will be some weeks before that particular harvest is completed.

People in Rhineland and Goree were elated to learn that their communities would receive grants from the Texas Department of Community affairs to be used for a water system and a sewer system, respectively. The county hospital closed its doors October 17 after an election to decide on a roll-back of hospital taxes to their former rate was set.

The Munday band won the district UIL marching contest in horrible weather conditions, and the Moguls lost their first game of the year in a heartbreaker at Seymour. But the team rallied to defeat Rotan and Roscoe in their first two district games.

NOVEMBER

The Purple Cloud band took the first headline in the month, winning the regional marching contest for a berth in the state competition. Several days later, the band narrowly missed being chosen for the state finals when they performed in Austin.

Wins over Aspermont and Roby gave the Moguls their third zone crown, then the team survived a scare from Knox City in the district race and easily defeated Irion County for the bi-district championship. In the meantime, the Mogulettes began their basketball season under a new coach.

Kay Looney of Gilliland was appointed new manager of the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, and she was introduced to local residents at a morning coffee. Amy Parker was crowned both football sweetheart and band queen at the last home football game. James Gass won football hero honors and J.B. Jones was named band king during ceremonies which also honored all senior Moguls and band members.

Nine sophomores were inducted into the National Honor Society at the organization's annual academic banquet. Twenty-seven residents participated in the American Heart

Association turkey walk, and several won turkeys and t-shirts. Over \$1,700 was raised during the fall event.

Rev. David Bellinghausen, O.S.B., a Rhineland native, celebrated a Mass of Thanksgiving at Rhineland with several out-of-town clergymen assisting. Father Bellinghausen's family hosted a dinner for the guests. Bad weather stopped the cotton harvest again, and the street paving project was put on hold until spring.

A Munday man was arrested and jailed on charges of burglary and arson in connection with a house fire and explosion in September.

The month ended in a post-Thanksgiving disappointment, as the Moguls lost in their bid for a second state football crown, bowing 13-0 to Throckmorton in the regional game.

DECEMBER

Ten Moguls made the All-District team, and the Mogulettes won the consolation trophy at the Fantasy of Lights tournament in Wichita Falls. Junior Marie Hernandez was crowned Miss Merry Christmas at the annual holiday pageant. Runners-up were Lynn Parker and Kathy Byard.

Jeanette Zeissel, A.C. Tackitt, Kenneth Whittemore and Robin Bowen were among the Munday winners at the third Knox County pecan show held in Knox City. The Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and local merchants sponsored a special shopping day and Christmas pageant, and Bobby and Ida Jo Owens won the Munday Garden Club's Christmas lighting contest. Other winners were Bucky and Beverly Decker and Sandy and Delores Lambeth.

The Moguls won their first two basketball games, but quickly evened their record with a pair of losses before Christmas. Both the girls' and boys' team won on their home court on December 16. Two Knox County police officers were involved in a shootout with a New Mexico man who was jailed on charges of capital murder. He will also be charged with robbing a Megargel liquor store.

Long time Munday Elementary School principal A.B. Martin announced his retirement, effective in May. Also retiring was county treasurer J.T. Cypert, who was honored at a Christmas luncheon at the courthouse.

And that's it for 1986. It's been a sometimes good, sometimes bad but always memorable year. Now we wipe the slate clean and go on to 1987. Some of the things we expect during the coming year are more bad news from the government, fewer dollars circulating in our area because of slumps in farm and oil-related businesses and higher taxes.

We also expect great things of Knox County youths, who continue to set examples in athletic and musical ability, academics and good sportsmanship and character. And we expect people in this area to rally to help those less fortunate, those in need - because they have always done so. It's not the prettiest place in Texas, nor the best spot for agriculture or industry. But the people make our county what it is - one of the best places anywhere to live, raise a family, make friends, go to school and church and be happy.

And for those fine people in Knox County - and for all our readers everywhere - we wish a happy, healthy and prosperous new year.
