Seymour Aquifer offer
Free Water Testing

About 95% of this country's rural residents use ground water to supply their drinking water and homestead needs. Wells should be designed to provide clean water. If improperly constructed or maintained, however, they can allow bacteria, pesticides, fertilizer or oil products to contaminate ground water. These contaminants can put family and animal health at risk.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Natural Resources Conservation Service will be sponsoring free water tests for bacteria at the Seymour Aquifer Project in Haskell.

The water samples will be taken the week of March 10-14, 1997. Seymour Aquifer employees will come to your home to take the sample to reduce the chance of cross contamination of the water sample.

TAAS tests

Annual administration of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) will be given at Benjamin School during the last week of February. The annual testing is given in public schools throughout Texas as a measure of student progress in the academic areas of Writing, Mathematics, and Reading.

The Writing test will be given on Tuesday, February 25 to students in grades 4 and 8 and Exit Level. Exit Level is for students in grade 10 plus those in grades 11 and 12 who have not passed the Exit Level test previously.

The Math test will be given on Wednesday, February 26 and the Reading test on Thursday, February 27. These tests will be for Exit Level students only. Exit Level students must pass each of the three TAAS tests, as well as pass the required number of high school credits, before they can receive a high school diploma.

Noncitizens to receive notice of SSI changes

Noncitizens who are receiving Supplementary Security Income (SSI) payments will receive notices in February or March explaining how they will be affected by a new law that changed the way Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits are paid to noncitizens. SSI benefits to some noncitizens will end in August or September of this year.

Under the new law, only those citizens, U.S. nationals, and noncitizens in the following categories may receive SSI: Refugees, people granted asylum, and aliens whose deportation has been withheld (subject to five year eligibility limit); certain active duty military personnel and honorably discharged veterans of the U. S. Armed Forces. Spouses and unmarried dependent children of military personnel or veterans who may also qualify; noncitizens who have been lawfully admitted for permanent residence and have a total of 40 quarters of work.

If you are receiving SSI and have since become a U.S. citizen, or you think you meet one of the exceptions in the law stated above, you should contact your local Social Security office.

You must bring your original naturalization certificate as proof of your citizenship or other proof of your legal alien status. Social Security will not accept photocopies.

SSI payments are made to people 65 or over, or disabled or blind and who have little income and few assets. If you would like more information, call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213.

Business owners must render property by April 14 by state law

(AUSTIN)—In accordance with state law, Texas businesses must render their property with county appraisal districts by April 14. To render is to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1997.

"While state law requires business owners and operators to render, any property owner—including home owners, farmers and ranchers—may also list their property with county appraisal districts," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

"Property owners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers," Sharp noted. "They are ensuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notices of any actions that property or tax bills."

If the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect or old address, the property owner is responsible for paying the taxes, plus late payment penalties, Sharp added.

State law requires anyone who owns or manages income producing personal property on January 1 to render with the local appraisal district. An exception is a business that receives the freeport exemption for managing cotton stored in a warehouse.

"For example, businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report," Sharp said. "Appraisal dis-

tricts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render his or her property, the chief appraiser estimates the value."

Sharp also announced that property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills. Property owners may file the decreased value report about their property's condition on January 1, 1997.

Property owners may ask the chief appraiser for additional time through April 30 - if the owners can demonstrate good cause. The chief appraiser must grant owners of property regulated by the Public Utility Commission or the Railroad Commission an extension to April 30 to file the reports and may extend the deadline another 15 days if the owners request it in writing and show good cause.

On the renditions, property owners can record their opinions of their property's value. By stating their opinion, property owners make sure that the appraisal dis-

trict sends them a notice before placing a higher value on their property. This notice allows property owners the time to gather information to protest the appraisal if they believe the appraisal district's value is too high.

If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal district office. Taxpayers may contact the county appraisal district office for the rendition forms, or they may call the Comptroller's property tax hotline at 1-800-252-9121.

"On A Wizer Note"

I always hear how agriculture is the backbone of this great nation we live in. This is very true in Knox County. One of the largest areas of agriculture is beef cattle. This comes as both stocker cattle and cow/calf.

Recently some cow/calf producers mentioned to me how certain breeds of cattle have really made a big change in their calf crop. Some have noticed how a "new" breed has increased their milking ability in their replacement cows while others are noticing better calf growth by using bulls of certain breeds.

One of the professor's that taught an animal science class at Texas A&M always discussed how breeds have been changing so much. He has begun to notice that here are more differences within one breed of cattle that there is between two breeds.

For a long time now, many ranchers have used artificial insemination as a method to had select the type of bulls to be used on individual cows. By doing this a cow that produces a light muscled calf can have a heavier calf by proper bull selection without buying that one bull for one cow.

COBA/Select Sires Company has been in the artificial insemination business for many years. They are now introducing a new service. Their personnel will counsel with interested cattle ranchers to identify production variables that could be changed for more profitable cattle production. This company will synchronize estrous,

provide management advice and semen from appropriate bulls, and use contact technicians to artificially inseminate the herd. Cost for this service will vary depending on the price of the semen.

If you are interested in learning how to artificially inseminate cattle there will be a school in Stephenville on April 15-17 and one in Wichita Falls July 15-19. These schools teach artificial insemination and pregnancy determination. Cost is \$250 for artificial insemination and \$350 for pregnancy determination (\$500 for both).

Individuals interested in attending one of these schools may receive more information through the Knox County Extension office in the courthouse in Benjamin (817/454-2651).

Going to the Mat for a Balanced Budget Amendment

As this is being written, the U.S. Senate is engaged in an historic debate over a Balanced Budget Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. It is unfolding as one of the most suspenseful, most defining moments of our times.

Will Congress deliver a Balanced Budget Amendment as the American people have demanded? Will we win this struggle we have undertaken on behalf of generations to come?

I and many of my colleagues have been fighting for this amendment through more than one Congress. This time we are determined to go to the political mat to make balancing the federal budget a reality.

Meanwhile we continue to spend, to live beyond our means, to accumulate debt at a breath-taking rate. For more than 50 years Congress has been afflicted with a near-fatal case of "other people's money" syndrome — it's always easier to spend other people's money than your own. Unfortunately, "other people" is us.

Because I have seen how hard it has been for Congress and the President to agree on how to achieve this balanced budget, I want to prohibit future Congresses from ever

mortgaging the future of our children.

A Constitutional amendment is the only way to force the federal government to balance the budget each and every year. That there is such serious, organized opposition to the amendment is a sure indicator we are debating a measure which threatens the status quo.

Some argue that the Balanced Budget Amendment will tie the government's hands (which many Americans have come to believe wouldn't be a bad idea at all). Other opponents of the Balanced Budget Amendment wonder, "What if there's a war or an emergency?" Here is the short answer to such a Chicken Little argument: The amendment incorporates a safety valve — to be triggered in times of national danger or dire emergency. Congress can enact an unbalanced budget with a three-fifths vote. In times of war, only a majority is required.

Nor does the Balanced Budget Amendment threaten the nation's retirement security. The real threat to retirement security for all Americans is our mounting debt. If we continue on this course, awash in red ink, we risk not being able to meet our obligations in the future or taxing our people at an 80 percent rate in the future.

What have we to offer instead?

* Lower interest rates that encourage private investment. In the absence of federal budget deficits, real, non-residential investment could jump by 4 percent or more.

* Robust economic growth. By 2005, inflation-adjusted Gross Domestic Product would increase by \$170 billion. This translates to about \$1,000 additional disposable income per household at today's prices!

In plain terms, a balanced budget would mean lower interest rates, cheaper mortgages for home buyers and lower car payments. With our budget in balance, working Americans will have an easier time sending their kids to school or buying their first home.

A balanced budget doesn't just mean a better future for our kids — it also will put more money in the pockets of working Americans today. This is what is at stake.

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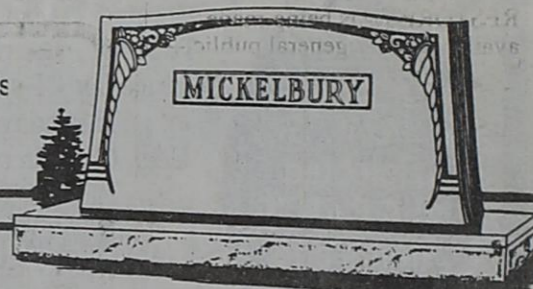

Taxpayer numbers for noncitizens replace social security numbers

The Social Security Administration will no longer assign nonwork Social Security numbers to aliens who request them for income tax purposes (including bank accounts and monetary transaction purposes) according to Patty Brandt, Resident Representative of the Vernon Social Security office. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) is now assigning individual taxpayer numbers to noncitizens who need an identification number for tax purposes, but otherwise do not meet requirements for a Social Security number.
As of July 1, 1996, IRS has been assigning individual taxpayer identification numbers for tax purposes to noncitizens who otherwise do not meet the Social Security Administration's requirements for assigning Social Security numbers. These include: U.S. taxpayers required to file a U.S. tax return. Dependents of U.S. taxpayers and who are in the U.S. without work authorization. Dependents of U.S. taxpayers ad who are outside the U.S. without work authorization, including those who are residents of Canada, Mexico, Japan, or South Korea. Spouses of U.S. taxpayers and who are inside the U.S. without work authorization. Spouses of U.S. taxpayers and who are outside the U.S. without authorization who elect to file a joint U.S. tax return.

Lions Eye Bank of Texas seeking donors

A shrinking donor pool is delaying some sight-restoring operations, according to the Lions Eye Bank of Texas at Baylor College of Medicine.

"Increased governmental regulation and testing have reduced the supply of donor tissue," said Mary Beth Danneffel, executive director of the Lions Eye Bank of Texas at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Cornea donations are needed now more than ever."

The cornea is the clear outer surface of the eye and is similar to the crystal of a watch. If the crystal becomes scratched or fuzzy, the face of the watch becomes difficult to see. Replace the crystal, and the face of the watch is seen clearly, much like sight-restoring transplantation surgery.

"The goal of corneal transplantation is to improve vision," said Dr. Dan Jones, chairman of the Department of Ophthalmology at

Baylor and acting medical director of the Lions Eye Bank of Texas. "Donations of eye tissue allow for vision-saving operations to be performed."

More donors are always needed, said Danneffel.

"Donor designation is easy," she said. "Get the facts, indicate your decision on a driver's license and/or donor card, and share the decision with your family."

Informing loved ones about the process is a very important step, because it makes it less emotionally difficult to deal with during the unexpected and tragic circumstances of sudden death.

The Lions Eye Bank of Texas retrieved more than 3,000 donor eyes and corneas in 1996, with more than half of those used for transplantation. Many of the remainder were used in research. The Eye Bank serves the Texas Gulf Coast and distributes eye tis-

sue primarily to surgeons of patients residing in Texas.

During "National Eye Donor Awareness Month" in March, tours of the Lions Eye Bank of Texas will be offered. Speakers are also available to address school and civic groups.

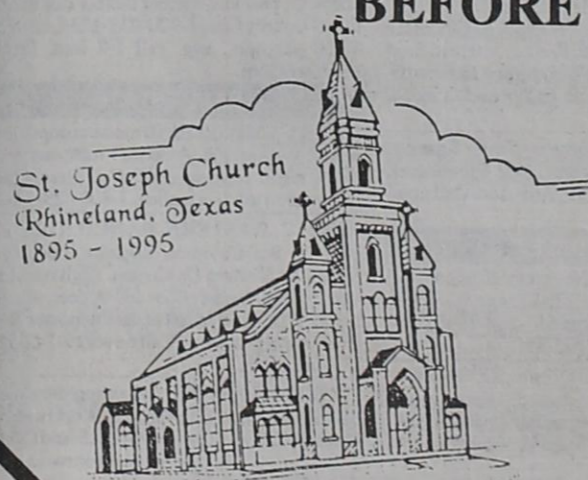
