judging to begin immediately. An attractive, colorful, and well groomed yard will be selected by anonymous judges each week. A sign will be placed in each selected yard and a photo will be taken for use in the Munday Courier.

The attractive planters that decorate the downtown area will be maintained by volunteers from the committee who will water and attend to the planters that have not been "adopted" by other caring residents.

Future plans also include exploring the possibilities of constructing a welcome sign to greet visitors who arrive to our city from the east side, via Highway 277. Money was previously donated by the Homecoming Committee that may be utilized in this endeavor.

One of the most immediate projects is the annual Pansy Sale. Orders are now being taken for these beautiful fall additions to your garden. The deadline for orders is June 28. The biggest project that the Beautification Committee will be tackling is the restoration of the facade

on the old Roy Theatre in downtown Munday. The city has agreed to remove rubble and building materials from the inside of the decaying building and the chamber will work to improve the exterior. Plans include a new paint job

complete with old movie posters or paintings of posters reminiscent of movies which were shown during the theatre's hey-day. Volunteers from the committee will furnish labor and man-power for the on-going project.

Grants help begin building program at Munday ISD

Construction should be in full swing at both campuses of the Munday ISD. Preliminary work has started with removal of the covered walkway between the high school and the present band hall. Removal of existing concrete and site preparation should begin this week.

These projects are the final stages of a process that began in November, 1995 when the Munday ISD applied for and received a grant from the state of \$425,000 for the construction of facilities. This grant will cover the majority of the cost of the projects. The remainder of the money will come from the fund balance of the district. This project was begun before the new appraisal values were sent out and have no effect on the appraised value of your property.

The Munday ISD as well as the other taxing entities have no control over the values set by the

County Appraisal District. These values are set according to guidelines set by the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division. The value must be set within three percent of the state values as determined by the Comptroller's Property Tax Division. If they do not fall within this range the school district must use the state's values to determine its effective tax rate. This resulted in the school district receiving less state aid.

What can the school district do? There is an appeal process much the same as you have to appeal the values set. In the school district's case we must appeal to the State Property Tax Division. The Munday ISD, as well as the other school district in Knox county, did that this year and were successful in having the state's values lowered. County tax payers appeal to the County Appraisal District.

Mattie Ann Waggoner, 60 years of age, died in Hendrick Medical Center, on Wednesday, June 5, after bravely battling cancer since August of last year.

Mrs. Waggoner was born January 28, 1936 in Santa Anna, Texas and was the daughter of Robert and Inez Vinson. She and her husband, Marion, moved to Munday after purchasing the Munday Courier in 1973. Prior to that Marion had been employed by the Abilene Reporter News and Mattie "had stayed home to raise babies," states Marion. When the family moved to Munday their children were still young. Randy was ten, Paula was six, Neil was four, and Michael was two. All four went on to become graduates of Munday High School.

It was only after all of Mattie's children were of older school age that she took on book-keeping duties at the Munday Courier. She then became a familiar face to the many customers that she waited on at the family business.

Aaron Edgar, who established The Courier in 1971 and from

whom the Waggoner's purchased the newspaper, made an introduction of the family to all the Courier readers' in 1973 by stating "We feel the new owners will serve the people of this area long and well, and we solicit for them the same type of loyalty and support you have given us."

His statement held true as Mattie helped serve the community and her husband's business for twenty-three years, all the while raising an active family of four children.

Mattie was diagnosed with cancer in August of 1995 and since that time had been in and out of Hendrick Medical Center. While she battled with her illness she never complained and never lost the gleam in her eyes when she talked about her family. Even within the last several weeks she made an attempt to help with the paperwork and book-keeping operations involved in the newspaper business. She was a wonderful example of courage and family unity and will be missed by her family, her friends, and the many Munday Courier customers.

Services for Mattie Ann Waggoner were held on Friday, June 7, at the First Baptist Church with the Reverend John Hall officiating and Doctor H.B. Graves assisting. Internment was in Johnson Memorial Cemetery.

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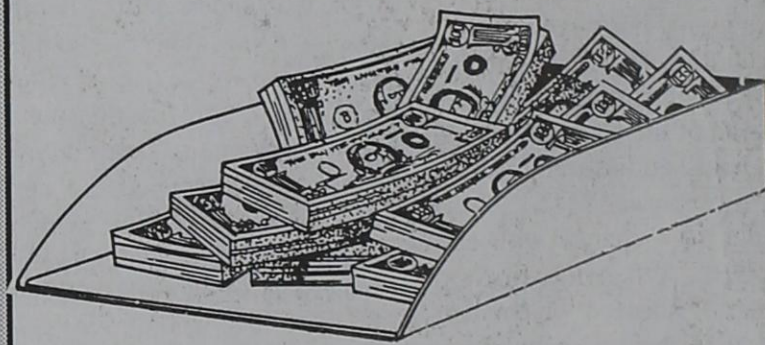
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The Difference Between Men and Women

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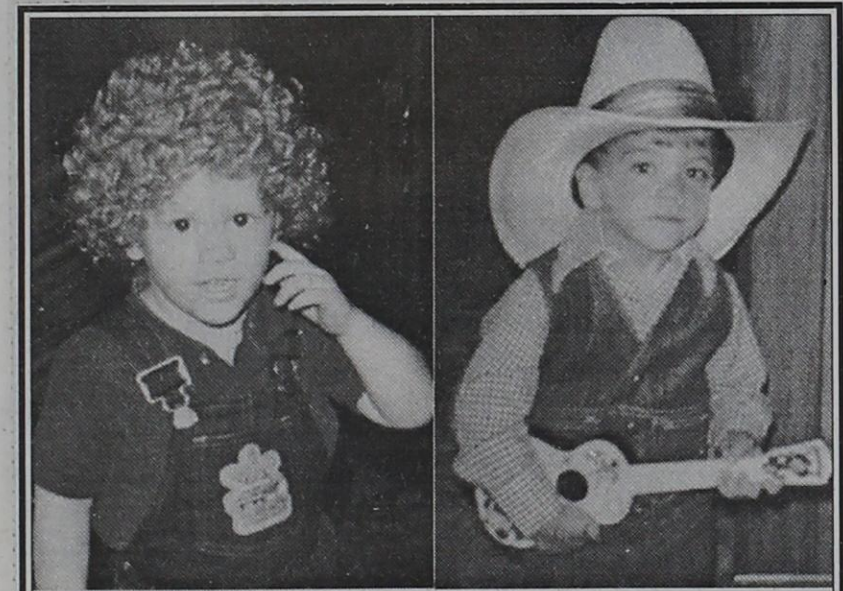

Young children need supervision during summer

Summertime is challenging for working parents, especially those with pre-teens and young teens.

"Children ages 11 to 14 are too old to willingly go to a baby-sitter but too young to be on their own," said Dr. Lou Ann Todd Mock, a psychologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

When work obligations make it hard to supervise young teens, Mock suggests thinking creatively. The key is figuring out how to provide some sort of supervision without making it look like baby-sitting.

Mock suggests looking for organized programs, like science, art or sports camps, that address a child's areas of interest.

"Helping your child find his talent and develop it can make for easier summers," Mock said. "The kids who get in the most trouble are the one's who have no interests and too much time on their hands."

Other activities that provide supervision include: Helping a relative or neighbor care for younger children; working or volunteering as an assistant at church or day care programs; visiting grandparents,

aunts or uncles.

"It may be impossible to get the whole summer covered, but children can have activities that take up blocks of time during vacation," Mock said.

Parents should be prepared to let their child have some input in the summer decision-making process.

"At this age, parents can't just tell a child what they want them to do and expect it to happen," Mock said. "Be ready to negotiate and talk about the different possibilities."

When a child must stay at home, Mock encourages parents to arrange some type of calling system. She also recommends dropping by the house occasionally and having a neighbor keep an eye on the house

if possible. One battle not worth fighting is summer bedtimes.

"There is nothing wrong with sleeping late and staying up late. Kids need time to be kids," she said. "The problem arises when children don't get back on a routine before school starts."

Summer chores and responsibilities can help keep a child from getting too far away from the structure of school.

"The best way to survive the summer is to base decisions on your child's capacity to handle responsibility and freedom," Mock said.

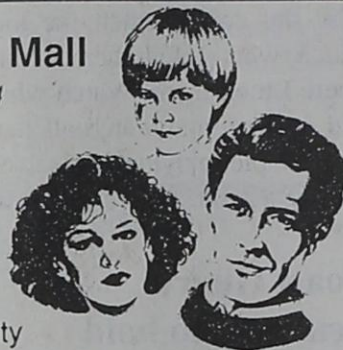

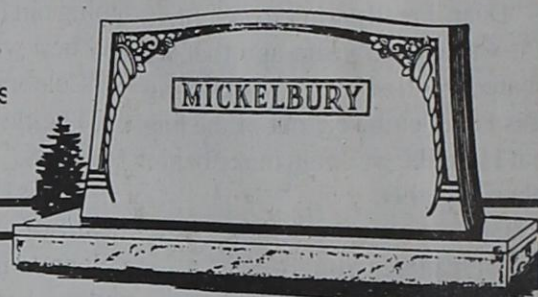
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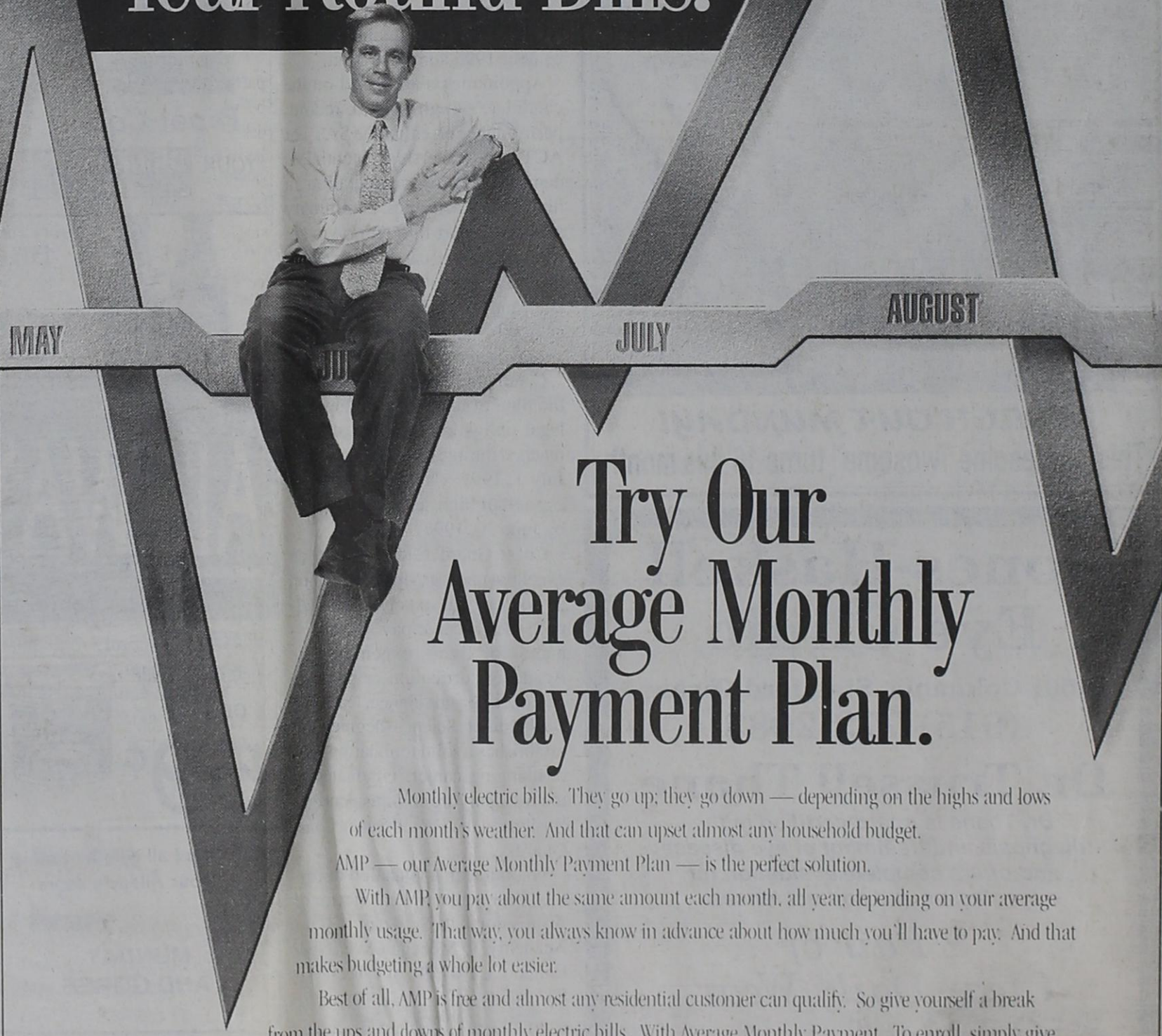

Knox Kounty Konnections by Jane Rowan Knox County Extension Agent

"Please pass the love, unity, and spaghetti." An unlikely request? Perhaps but in truth, that's what you give your child with nutrients - she's also getting a hefty dose of emotional, intellectual, and spiritual nourishment. As you serve the peas and butter the bread, you convey your values and establish traditions.

Yet, some experts worry that the family meal is headed for extinction. During the past 10 - 30 years, a degeneration of the family structure has taken place and families now eat fewer meals together.

Child experts and nutrition specialists are concerned that families are losing the unity that traditional meals once provided. Although recent surveys show a decline in the number of meals families eat together, the good news is that most American families still break bread together often.

A survey by Rice-A-Roni indicated that, on average, Americans eat with their families five nights each week, and 40 percent spend every night dining together. But other polls show a more alarming trend. Out of 1,000 people interviewed in the Los Angeles area, one in three households did not eat regularly as a family.

Many families continue to maintain the tradition of shared meals, but the trend is shifting.

It is believed that eating with the family helps foster a child's development. A child's development is spurred by a positive mealtime atmosphere, traditions shaped through shared meals that offer young children a sense of security.

Children learn to communicate effectively in a non-threatening environment by sharing the day's events, expressing feelings and listening to one another.
