Johnny Andrade campaigns for Knox County Sheriff

My name is Johnny M. Andrade, and I am currently your Chief Deputy of the Knox County Sheriff's Department. I am running for the position for Sheriff of Knox County, so let me tell you a little bit about myself. I was born in Houston, Texas, on April 5, 1959, moving to Knox County when I was less than a year old. I went to Munday Elementary, Junior High and graduated from Munday High School in 1978. I attended South Plains Junior College in Levelland, Texas, which began my interest in my Law Enforcement career. I began as a Reserve Peace Officer in Munday in 1985, after receiving my Reserve Peace Officer's license, staying as a reserve until 1992. In 1987 I earned my Basic Jailers License in 1988. I worked with the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville and Snyder, Texas from 1988-1992. I have been with the Knox County Sheriff's Department since March 1992.

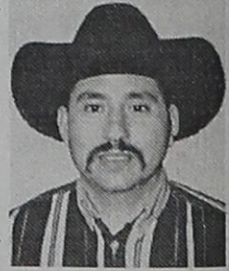
I have seen a lot of changes having worked with three Sheriffs, My

commitment and determination have remained the same through all of them.

I was Interim Sheriff from August 1, 1997 until October 15, 1997, working alone, but always with the help and support of the local Law Enforcement Agencies. This relationship is very important to me as I feel that the cooperation between the different local Law Enforcement Agencies is vital to our survival. This is a large County with relatively few officers.

My training and education has not stopped after I received my licenses. I continued my education through Wichita Falls Colleges, Abilene Colleges, Texas Department of Public Safety, Lubbock Colleges, Texas Municipal League, West Central Texas Council of Governments, North Central Texas

Idaho woman pulls into Munday during Christian journey

In 1984 Finisia Medrano left her native northern Idaho and began a remarkable journey. A journey that has taken her across the country several times and has introduced her to millions of curiosity seekers, friends and persons who share her deep religious beliefs.

Ms. Medrano's journey is unique and a one-of-a-kind trip. She doesn't travel by the swiftness of airplanes, the comfort of her own car, or even by the economic means of a bus line. She travels via a horse drawn covered wagon.

The wagon was designed and made partially by Ms. Medrano and also by the help of some friends and acquaintances in the state of Alabama. It has rubber, inflated tires and the inside of the vehicle sports a wood-burning stove, a propane cook stove, batteries that supply electricity for lights and fencing for her horses, and also solar power.

This is not only a journey for Ms. Medrano but a way of life and the wagon is her home. Her expenses are few but the need to support herself is done by creating and selling large and intricate beaded works of art. The artwork is all of Indian and Southwest design and she sells her items to large galleries. Time spent off the road in the evenings is spent working on the beaded items.

Typical days will find Ms. Medrano traveling approximately twenty miles and camping along the highways and biways in the evening hours. Several hours per day are spent caring for her animals. During her free time in Munday she had several different horse shoes to repair and refit.

Travel companions include two dogs and four horses. The oldest of the ponies, Shortcake - who is thirteen years old, has traveled approximately 38,000 miles and has been across the country several times.

Ms. Medrano has a favorite saying, "For a hen that makes no eggs, it doesn't make sense to scratch up a nest everyday and waste the efforts of a perfectly good roaster." Ms. Medrano is also quick to point out, "When I gave my life to Christ I decided to serve only him."

After traveling through Munday and spending one evening in the community, Ms. Medrano traveled on to Seymour. She had been invited there by some fellow Christians who were anxious to share some bible study time with Ms. Medrano. "I'm quite excited about the possibility of always sharing Christ with anyone that I meet along the way - that's my sole purpose in this journey through life," she said.

Regional, South Plains Association of Government, Abilene and Wichita Falls Police Department. I have received training in Investigations, Basic Telecommunications, Texas Crime Information Center (TCIC), National Crime Information Center (NCIC), Family Violence Prevention, Child Abuse Prevention, Management, Supervision, Standardized Field Sobriety Testing, Hazardous Material (Haz-Mat), Cultural Diversity, and Special Investigations, just to name a few. I've also received training on the duties that the Sheriff's Department perform every day, such as proper and legal procedures on serving civil papers, and criminal warrants, courtroom procedures on being a bailiff in County and District Courts, and safe and proper procedures for transporting prisoners. 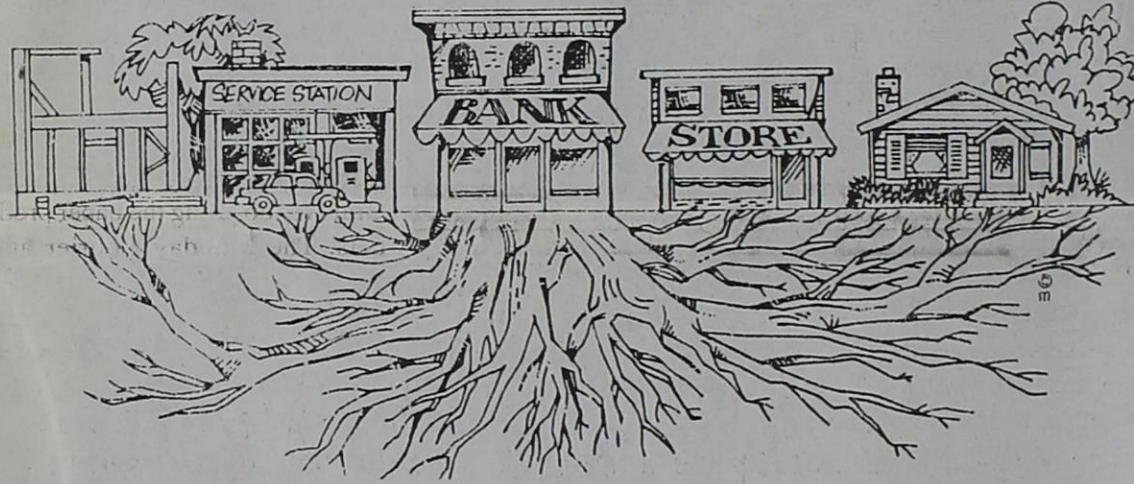

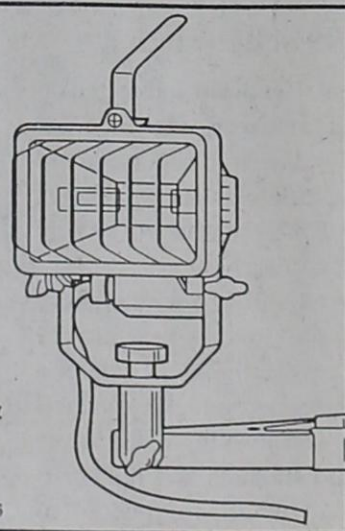

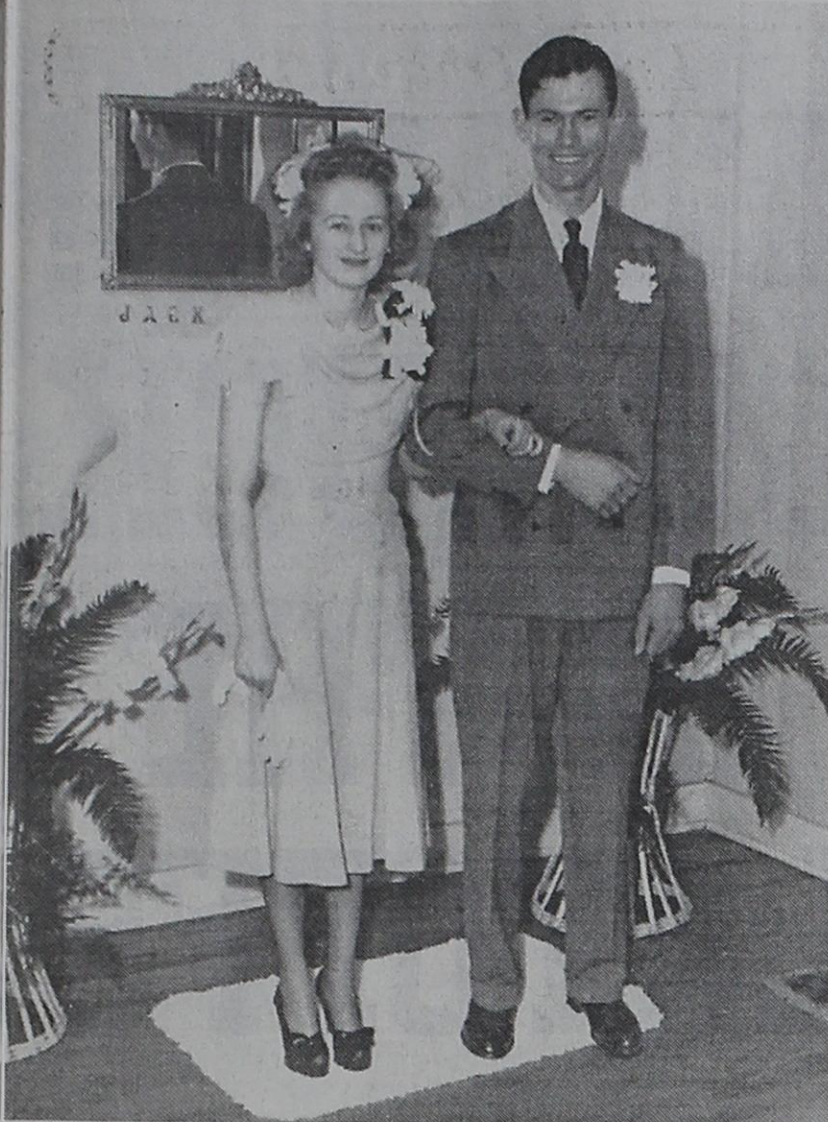

Retired workers can earn more in 1998

Social Security beneficiaries who will be working during 1998 should note that they can earn more money and still receive their full benefit amount. Beneficiaries between the ages of 65 and 69 can earn up to \$14,500 a year (up from \$13,500 in 1997) before benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$3 in excess earnings. Beneficiaries under age 65 can earn up to \$9,120 a year (up from \$8,640 in 1997) before benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$2 in excess earnings. The earnings limits do not apply to working beneficiaries age 70 and older.

The program and reception were held at the LBJ Auditorium in Austin on January 23 honoring farms and ranches of Texas that have been in constant production for one family for at least 100 years.

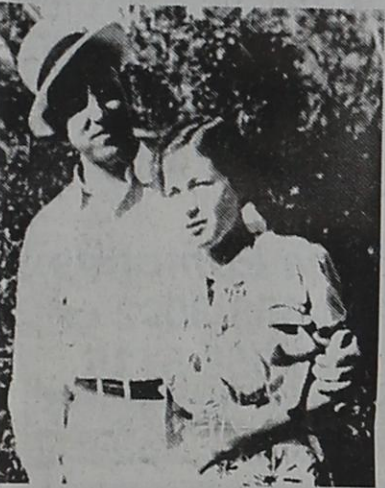

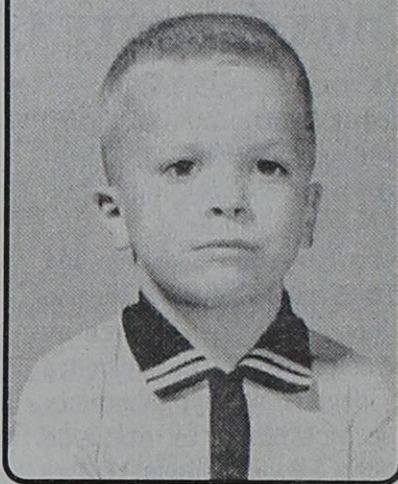

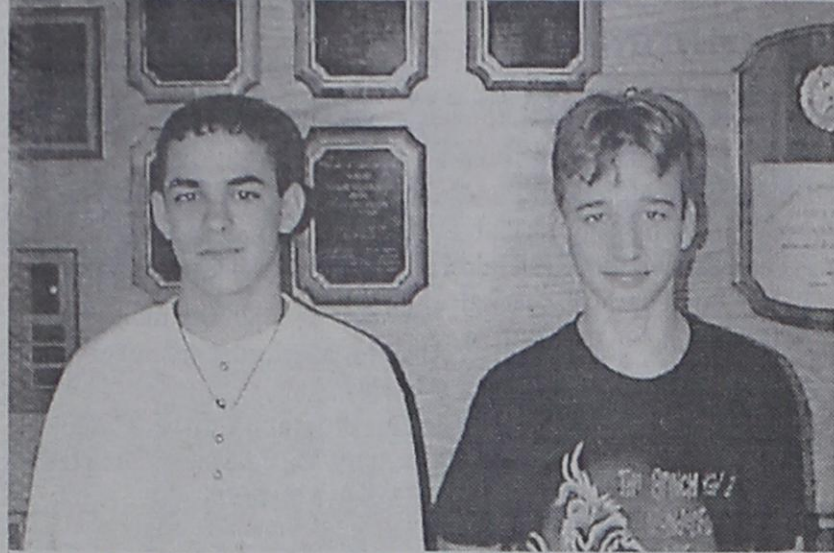

Food safety training available to food service managers

Local food establishments have a chance to show their customers that they really do come first by attending a food safety training seminar beginning March 19.

The Food Protection Management Training Program is an effort of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the National Restaurant Association, Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association and the Texas Department of Health. The program seeks to better educate food handlers to reduce the risk of foodborne illness.

Food managers who participate in the 15 hour course will receive in-depth training in all areas of food safety. The course will cover the latest information in food safety including: personal hygiene; how to use food thermometers and keep temperature logs; how to store food safely; how to prepare, serve and hold food safely; and methods of cleaning and sanitizing.

Food service establishments that participate in this program will receive numerous benefits. Good food safety practices provide a proactive defense against costs (legal fees, insurance, lost wages, medical claims) of a foodborne illness outbreak. Food service operations can increase the quality of their food and improve profitability by reducing waste with safe food storage and transportation. Also, those establishments under the Texas Department of Health's jurisdiction will receive a 10 percent reduction in license fees annually while the certification is in effect.

Many public health jurisdictions in urban areas of Texas already require training. This training and certification is designed for man-

agers of any establishment in Texas involved in preparing or serving food to customers including restaurants, cafeterias, hospitals, nursing homes, school lunch programs, day care facilities, grocery stores, convenience stores and mobile vendors.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 24 to 81 million people get sick and more than 10,000 related deaths occur due to food poisoning in the United States each year.

Those who complete the 15 hour course and obtain a satisfactory score on the course exam will receive certification from the National Restaurant Association. They also will qualify to join the Industry Council on Food Safety and to receive a decal to display in their window, which lets customers know the managers are certified in food safety.

The bonus of the Food Protection Management Training Program is that it is a train-the-trainer course. Managers who complete the program are urged to teach food safety to their employees.

We have been educating consumers for years on food safety at home. Customers are improving

their food safety habits. Now, it's time to lend a hand to those food businesses who feed us when we are away from home.

Training materials for the course are provided by the SERVSAFE Program from the Educational Foundation of the National Restaurant Association. The fifteen hour course is tentatively planned to be taught in three separate

Thursday evening sessions on March 19, March 26, and April 2. The first session will be held at the Haskell County Extension office beginning at 5:00 p.m.

Cost of the training is \$99. Registration forms have been mailed to most food service establishments in Knox County. If you are interested and did not receive a registration form, contact the Knox County Extension Office at 454-2651. Deadline for registering is Monday, March 2, 1998.
