Munday beats Roby 28-7; Face Windthorst for Bi-District Playoff

The Munday Moguls defeated the Roby Lions 28 to 7 this past Friday night to end the regular season with a 6-1 record in District and 7-3 overall.

The Lions scored first and their only touchdown of the game on the opening possession. Roby's drive started from their own 39 yard line. The Lions moved the ball down field on 9 plays and scored on a 13 yard pass from quarterback Jeremy Griffith to Adam Torres. With 7:59 in the first Roby had their only lead 7 to 0.

The Moguls came back scoring on their next three possessions of the game. After starting from the Munday 37, the Moguls moved down to the Lion 2 in 7 plays. Roberto Nunez scored on first and goal with 5:01 on the clock. Jason Key added the PAT and the score was back even.

Munday shut down the Lion offense after the kick topped off by a behind the scrimmage tackle by Joey Valencia and Ray Bradley. After receiving the punt, the Moguls took over at the 19. Nunez went 20 yards to the 39. Jonathan Reagins took the handoff on the next play 61 yards for the score. Key's extra point put Munday on top 14 to 7 with 1:47 left in the first.

The Moguls stopped the Lions for another 3 plays and a punt. Roberto Nunez returned the punt 31 yards to Roby's 34. Munday moved the ball down to the 1 yard line on 7 plays. Reagins scored with 9:13 left in the secon quarter. Jason Key kicked the PAT.

Mid-way through the second Roby began a drive from their own 40. After making a first down and moving across mid-field, the Moguls forced a fumble. Wesley Spells was there and picked up the ball and ran 57 yards to score. With the extra point the Moguls were on top 28 to 7.

Cotton farmers bringing in good yields to area gins

If the weather continues to hold area farmers could be in good shape as they bring in the cotton harvest for 1997.

Ginning began at Goree Producers Cooperative Gin on October 6 with Charlie Pribyla bringing in the first bale. For his efforts he received \$50.00 and free ginning on that start up bale of cotton. Goree Gin has finished approximately 2000 bales and, "the area crop is looking pretty good," said a gin spokesperson.

The Rhineland Cooperative Gin also began ginning on October 6 with Buford Berryhill bringing in

the first bale. The facility in Rhineland has ginned approximately 3600 bales thus far and plan to be ginning through the end of the year. "Dryland cotton is looking a little better than irrigated cotton. The yield depends on how hard the field was hit by bugs and worms," explained a spokesperson from the Rhineland Gin.

The ginning season started up on October 8 at Knox Prairie Cooperative in Munday with W. R. Moore bringing in the first bale. Knox Prairie has ginned approximately 1860 bales at press time with "cotton coming in a pretty steady stream," according to a gin spokesperson.

Gramm urges support for Highway 277 expansion

Supporters of the proposed expansion of U.S. Highway 277 between Wichita Falls and Abilene got a boost today from U.S. Senator Phil Gramm of Texas.

In a letter to Texas Transportation Commission Chairman David Laney, Gramm urged the Texas Department of Transportation to give high consideration to the proposal to upgrade U.S. 277 to an uninterrupted, four-lane divided

highway.

"The citizens of Wichita Falls, Abilene, and indeed throughout the Big Country, will benefit greatly from improved transportation mobility along the U.S. 277 corridor," Gramm said.

"Futhermore, by connecting Interstate Highway 20 in Abilene to Interstate Highway 44 in Wichita Falls, the upgrade of this corridor will provide economical alternatives for the massive volume of trade-related truck traffic that traverses our state along I-20, ultimately destined or markets in the Midwest, Northeast and Canada," the senator added.

A delegation from Wichita Falls,

Abilene and surrounding communities will travel to Austin on November 20 to present their proposal to the Texas Transportation Commission.

Studies show that, outside of I-35, the I-20 route from the west coast carries approximately 1 million NAFTA-related trucks per year, Gramm said.

The project would expand U.S. Highway 277 to a four-lane divided highway from Interstate 20 in Abilene through Wichita Falls and onto Interstate 44. The proposal has already gained the support of the entire Oklahoma congressional delegation, Gramm noted.

Theives rob two city businesses - suspects still at large

The usual quiet of early Saturday mornings in Munday was shattered this past week-end as thieves broke into two area businesses. The break-ins were discovered as employees returned to work on Saturday morning after leaving their places of employment as usual on Friday evening.

Farmer's Grain/Munday Cotton Company was hit by the unknown assailants.

"They broke out two windows and tried to pry out a third window. The windows were broken in an effort to reach inside and unlock them. The damage was sustained to the west side of the building," said Farmer's Grain manager Sonny Moore.

Once inside the burglars ransacked through desks and finally gained entrance to the "Safe Room" by smashing at the door and handle with a chisel or hammer. The "Safe Room is encompassed in concrete."

"They took about \$300 but didn't take any merchandise or supplies," said Moore. A brand new color monitor for a computer system was still in the box untouched.

"Of course we're cooperating fully with the police in hopes of finding the thieves. We would definitely prosecute. The leads indicate the prime suspects are from out of town and we don't want anyone driving through Munday and thinking we're easy."

Osborne's was also hit on Friday night or early Saturday morning.

The robbers gained entrance into the hardware store by breaking out a window in the back of the building.

Legislators, reporters view boll weevil damage

Legislators, news reporters and area cotton growers got a close-up look at damage the boll weevil is inflicting upon the cotton crop on the Texas High Plains during a four-county tour (October 27) led by State Senator Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock).

"This is a major problem and we have to find a program to effectively eliminate it," said Duncan as the group of about 30 studied the insect and its damage at fields in Dawson, Terry, Lubbock and Crosby counties.

During the 75th legislative session, Duncan sponsored Senate Bill 1814, which corrected previous constitutional problems with the statewide boll weevil eradication program. The bill also established the framework for a growers' program to eradicate the boll weevil, the most economically damaging pest on the South Plains.

Legislators joining Duncan on the tour were Senator Tom Haywood (R-Wichita Falls), and Representative Delwin Jones (R-Lubbock), Carl Isett (R-Lubbock) and Gary Walker (R-Plains).

This summer, growers voted down a 19-county eradication program to combat the weevil in an area with more than 3 million acres planted to cotton each year. As a result, each farmer in those counties is on his own to battle the pest. Scientists say a strong, unified,

multi-county attack is needed.

At the fields on the tour, the group heard from the growers, county Extension Service agricultural agents and integrated pest management (IPM) agents, and scientists and educators with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension SERVICE.

Growers and agents reported having to spray fields from four to 12 times in efforts to control the weevil this season, but many areas still suffered sizeable yield losses from the insect.

In Lubbock County, veteran grower Steve Jones said he had sprayed his field nine times, adding more than \$60 an acre to his production costs. "Even with our spraying program, we've lost as much as percent of our crop" to the weevil, he said.

"We're selling cotton today at our gin at 62 cents a pound," Jones said. So losing a fourth of a field that should yield over 600 pounds an acre - a loss of some 150 pounds of lint - means a loss of more the \$90 profit an acre, added to the additional control costs.

In Terry County, grower Tony Dill said six spray trips across his cotton "cost \$30 to \$40 an acre. And I still lost at least 100 to 125 pounds (of lint) an acre. That's \$50 to \$75 an acre in yield loss."

"The Texas High Plains was basically weevil free prior to the latest invasion which started in 1991," said Dr. James Leser, Extension Service cotton entomologist.

"That Southern Rolling Plains zone was less than 300,000 acres," Representative Walker noted. He said High Plains growers need to come up with a plan that will be effective and acceptable. "In the legislature we compromise a lot. You growers may have to compromise to get a program that works for you. I'd encourage you to do that."

"This problem is too big to ignore," Duncan said. "Its an important economic problem for the state of Texas, not just our region. We've got to pull together to achieve what they did in the Southern Rolling Plains."

"We're asking growers to look at a program for the future as an investment, rather than just as a cost. Like buying a cotton stripper; there's a cost up front, but it's going to pay dividends."

Fifth graders learn about plant propagation from extension agent

The fifth grade class at the O'Brien Middle School are currently conducting experiments with plant propagation. Under the supervision of Sandy Chappell and Michelle Hedgecoke, these youth propagated rose plants as well as several different types of house plants.

This project is a small part of a curriculum enrichment program entitled "Plant Pals" developed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The "Plant Pals" program was developed in order to assist teachers with plant related science projects in the classroom.

Paul Weiser, County Extension Agent-Agriculture, Knox County, helped in coordinating this plant propagation program. On October 1, the fifth graders planted the cuttings. These youth alternate the responsibility of caring for these new plants.

Several different experiments are being conducted with these plant cuttings. Most of the plants were planted in their own personal greenhouse. These greenhouses

were constructed from clear plastic 20 ounce soft drink bottles. Some of these plants are being rooted in potting soil while others are being kept in water.

Every day the youth check the plants for disease and insect problems. They must also water each plant as needed to avoid any drought stress problems. The youth also add fertilizer once a week to assure proper plant nutrition. This is very important in young root development.

The fifth grade class in the 1996-97 school year conducted a similar program. They used only rose cuttings and did not place them in a personal greenhouse. These changes were added in hopes of a higher success rate.

Master Marketer Program will be offered by Extension Service

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is looking for a few good agricultural marketers who are interested in sharpening their marketing skills to an even higher level and helping their neighbors do the same. The Extension Service will be offering a series of intensive, in-depth marketing training sessions designed to enable the participants to develop a marketing plan, evaluate all their marketing alternatives, and gain all the skills necessary to execute their marketing plan.

The Master Marketer Program applies the successful master volunteer concept to agricultural marketing in combination with another successful educational tool - marketing clubs. Many marketing clubs in Texas have provided a practical, hands-on setting for many farmers to learn marketing skills. Though many clubs have succeeded, many others lacked what has been determined to be the key ingredient for success - a capable producer to be the leader. The best clubs have been those with good leadership. This program is designed to take interested, capable leaders and improve their marketing skills and confidence to a level where they can provide the leadership for a successful marketing club.

The Master Marketer Program participants will receive a training in a series of four 2-day sessions, taught by 13 outstanding speakers from six states. Each participant must agree to share what he or she has learned by assisting the county agent in starting and leading a marketing club. The first two-day session will be held January 6 - 7, 1998 with the other three being held every two weeks thereafter (January 20 - 21, February 3 - 4, and February 17 - 18).

The Master Marketer Program will be providing a select group of farmers and ranchers the marketing education and training that will pay dividends that can directly improve their bottom line. These same producers will share this knowledge with other producers as they interact with them in a marketing club. As these master marketers pass on part of their new found skills, the investment in training by the Agricultural Extension Service and the other supporters of the program will be effectively spread to a much larger group. The goals of the program are to in about 60 area producers to a higher level than any previous programs have done and lay the ground for the formation of at least one marketing club in one county in the Rolling Plains area.

The registration fee of \$250 per person covers only a small portion of the total cost of the program. The course offers a wide range of topics aimed at enhancing marketing skills. Many of the topics will be approached from a real world standpoint using numerous case study examples and simulated problems. Most of the cost of the in-depth program is being paid by several sponsoring commodity groups and are agri-businesses.

The flexibility that is part of the new farm bill will bring with it a new level of price volatility and

will necessitate a renewed emphasis on marketing skills. Producers who understand market forces and alternative marketing techniques will have a clear advantage in the future.

The first ever Master Marketer Program was started in Amarillo in 1996. Since then, two additional programs have been held in Lubbock and Wharton. This year, the 1998 version will be held here at the Texas A & M Research and Extension Center, south of Vernon. The primary focus for this program will be cattle, wheat, and feedgrains. A second 1998 program to be held in Waco will focus on cotton, feedgrains, and cattle.

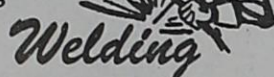

Gypsum blocks can help with soil moisture management

To get the most from your irrigated wheat consider scheduling your irrigations this year using gypsum blocks.

Gypsum blocks are cast gypsum around a pair of stainless steel electrodes. Six foot wire leads are attached to the electrodes. The blocks are buried in the soil at 6, 12, 24, and 36 inch depths.

Soil moisture is measured by attaching a special meter to the wire leads of the gypsum block. A small electrical current is sent from this meter to the block.

The electrical resistance measured by the meter varies with the amount of moisture in the soil and the gypsum block. A gypsum block reading of 95 to 100 indicates the soil is wet while a meter reading of 70 shows about fifty percent available moisture. Irrigations should be conducted before the meter reading is below 50% available moisture.

By knowing the amount of

moisture in the soil profile, excessive irrigations can be avoided saving time, money and reducing the potential of leaching nutrients out of the root zone of the plant.

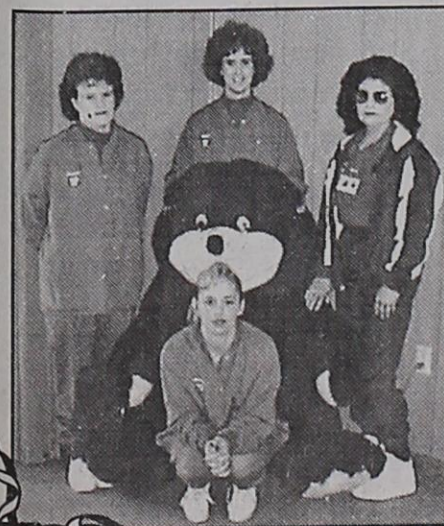

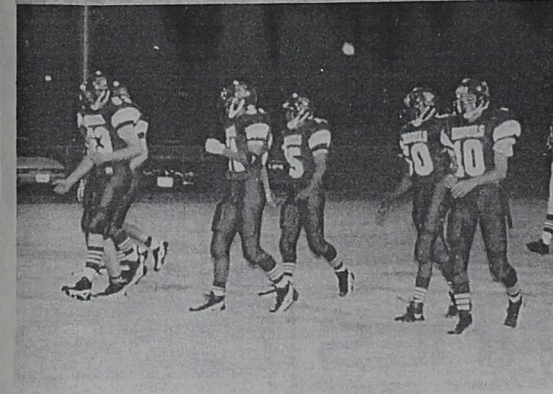
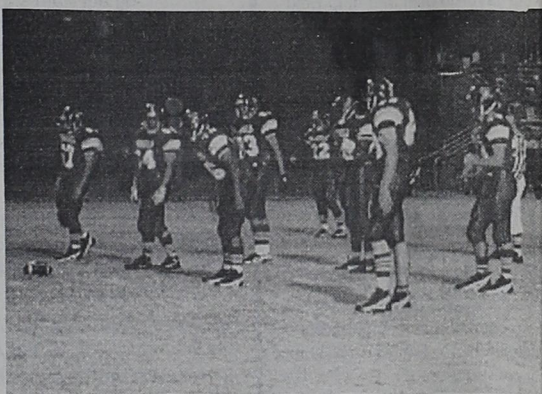
