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Chamber Sponsored Event Is Big Weekend Success

The first ever Taste of Munday and Back-to-School Fashion Review, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, proved to be a smashing success this past weekend.

The event, held in the high school gym, drew a crowd of almost 300 local and area residents.

The delicious buffet-style meal was served on tables featuring yellow and white coverings. A backdrop of white lattice draped with swags of sheer peach fabric completed the setting.

The luscious array of dishes featured exotic displays of fresh fruits, including a watermelon boat filled with fruit and a fresh pineapple adorned with hors d'oeuvres. Another artistic treat was a hollowed purple cabbage filled with a delicious dip.

The Chamber supplied plenty of brisket and fried chicken, prepared by Mike Wulf and Collis Michels, to the hungry crowd. Local cooks furnished a wide assortment of vegetables, salads and desserts, to complete the meal.

The Fashion Review, held in conjunction with the buffet, was well-received by those attending. Thirty-five models presented a total of 74

garments from local businesses.

The fashion show featured a back-to-school theme, with antique desks, a red schoolhouse and crosswalk signs decorating the modeling runway.

Lynn Fitzgerald, Chamber manager, deemed the entire event a smashing success. She stated that a cookbook is being compiled featuring the recipes served at the Taste of Munday buffet. Cotton Referendum Set For July 17-26

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service will conduct a cotton referendum July 17-26, in cooperation with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

County ASCS official, John Rector, says ballots and voting instructions have been mailed to all eligible cotton producers and importers of record. Producers who have not received ballots should contact their local ASCS office. Eligible importers who have not received ballots may obtain them from the national ASCS office.

Ballots may be hand-delivered to ASCS polling places, or postmarked and mailed by midnight July 26.

Is Relief In Sight?

School Tax Election Set For August 10

Two elections will be held on August 10 of this year that could bring some tax relief for Texas residents as far as school taxes are concerned.

Recent action by the state legislature created 188 county education districts across the state. The Knox County schools join schools in King, Cottle and Dickens counties to create County Education District #12.

Of the upcoming elections, one is statewide and will be conducted by the county. The other, for the individual county education districts, will be held by local school districts. The statewide election that allows for tax relief is listed as Amendment 1, while the C.E.D. election has three propositions.

The election will allow voters to gain additional homestead exemptions and remove personal property (except manufactured homes and personal property used for the production of income) from the C.E.D. tax rolls. It is important that taxpayers realize that these additional exemptions apply only to the County Education District tax rolls and not to the local school district's tax roll. It is also important that taxpayers realize that this new process does not necessarily mean an increase in school taxes.

According to the local superintendent's office, for tax relief voters should vote yes for Amendment 1 and yes on Propositions 1 and 2, and no on Proposition 3. Amendment 1 must pass statewide before the three propositions can be put into effect.

Church Of Christ To Sponsor Evening Vacation Bible School

"Living For Jesus" is the theme of the upcoming Vacation Bible School scheduled for July 28-31 at the Munday Church of Christ.

The V.B.S. will be an evening school, running Sunday through Wednesday, 7:30-8:30 p.m. According to local Church of Christ minister Larry Fitzgerald, although several churches have experimented with various times and days, this is the first time that a congregation in Munday has had an evening school.

Classes will be available for children ages four years through sixth grade. A special "Ladies Only" class for adults and teenagers will be conducted also.

Everyone is welcome to attend the V.B.S. at the Munday Church of

Christ, regardless of religious affiliation. Children are expected to attend from several area towns, as well as from Munday. There is absolutely no charge for the school and no collections will be taken. The church, located at North Third and West Avenue D, will provide free transportation to anyone living in Munday.

comment on these matters or present a redistricting proposal for consideration may appear and speak at the meeting or present written comment to the County Judge's office by 5:00 p.m., Monday, July 29.

Additional information regarding census data is available at the County Judge's office for inspection during normal business hours. All interested persons are encouraged to attend.

Mobile Eye Clinic To Visit On July 31

The "Vision Van" is coming to Munday!

A mobile eye clinic, the Texoma Eye Care Project, sponsored by the Cataract Center of Lawton, Oklahoma, will be in town Wednesday, July 31, at the Perry Patton Community Center from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. The unit has provided free eye examinations for area residents 55 years old and older since February, according to Dr. Robert Zoellner, the traveling optometrist. He and his staff of two screening specialists have traveled over 12,000 miles since the Vision Van first began making the rounds. The van attempts to visit as many small towns within a 2 1/2-hour radius as possible.

When local patients first enter the van, they will meet Stephanie Baker, a vision screening specialist, who administers the eye chart line examination and checks eye pressure for glaucoma. Dr. Zoellner then conducts a more thorough exam to search for signs of glaucoma, cataracts, retinal disease, external disease of the eyes and lids, diabetic eye disease and dry eye. Patients receive a report at the conclusion of their visit from technician Sue Blackford.

If there is a problem, Dr. Zoellner will make a proper referral to a doctor in the area. Often that may mean referring patients to an eye specialist to prescribe eyeglasses, a service not provided by the Vision Van. The goal of the Texoma Eye Care Project is not to treat eye disease, but to inform patients about available options for better sight.

The Cataract Center of Lawton offers a free shuttle service for seniors throughout Texoma who need a

ride for their follow-up exams. Follow-up exams for those who had initial screening at the Vision Van are also complimentary.

Dr. Zoellner is the grandson of Dr. Robert Hargrave, a Wichita Falls physician for many years. His great-grandfather, Dr. Robert L. Hargrave was a founder of the Hargrave-Walker Hospital, now known as Bethania Regional Health Care Center.

Examination traffic varies from town to town, with as many as 100 people being checked in one day. So, if you're 55 or over, make plans now to be at the Community Center next Wednesday for your free eye exam.

4-H District Record Book Winners Named

Winners in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Rolling Plains - 3 District 4-H Record Judging were selected July 9, when screening groups met at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Vernon, according to Ed Garnett and Elaine Houston, District Extension Directors for the 21 Rolling Plains counties. Blue ribbon winners from Knox County included Tressie Boyd, Intermediate Rabbit, and Amanda Baker and Stefani Stephens, both in Junior Beef.

There were 103 Junior records, 45 Intermediate records and 58 Senior records scored in 27 different subject matter areas. Junior and Intermediate records were placed in blue, red and white groups with no specific winners in first place categories. First place Senior records will be submitted for state judging to compete for educational trips to the National 4-H Congress, as well as other scholarships and awards.

Cancer Detection Unit To Visit August 6

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, the Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa will be at the City Hall in Munday on Tuesday, August 6.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists. By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has

approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

What is a screening mammogram? It is an x-ray of the breast on women who have no symptoms of disease. A screening mammogram utilizes extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers in unsuspecting women.

Typically, the exam takes less than 15 minutes. Technicians suggest that you report approximately five minutes prior to your appointment time for registration. The x-rays will be interpreted by an expert and forwarded to your physician. You will be instructed when to call or see your physician for the results. You or your physician will be mailed a reminder when it is time for further check-ups.

Should you be asked to have further studies done, do not panic. This does not mean you have cancer, it simply means there is an area which needs further study.

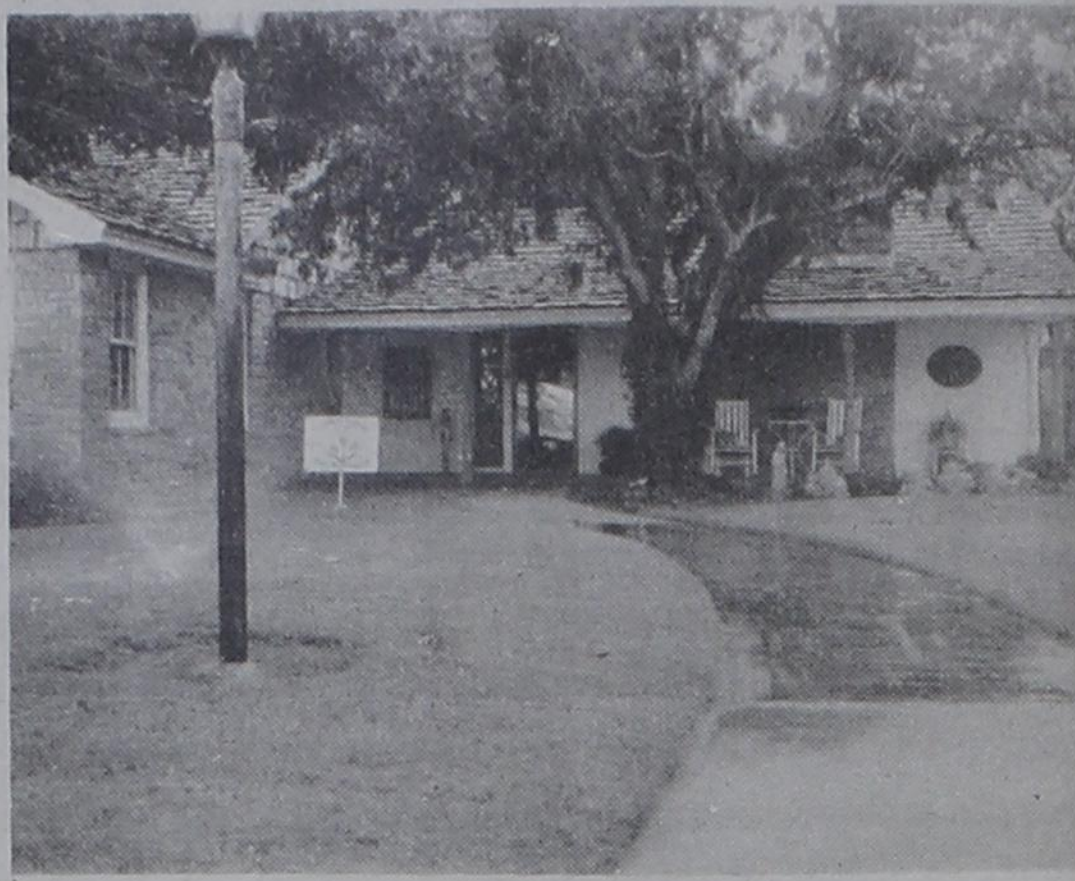

Knox County Hospital Receives Improvements

(Following are the minutes of the regular June meeting of the Knox County Hospital board of directors.)

The Knox County Hospital Board of Directors met in regular session on Thursday, June 20, in the Knox County Hospital dining room. The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p.m. by President W.R. Baker.

Present were: W.R. Baker, president; Stephen Kuehler, administrator; Dolan Moore, Peggy McGaughey, Benny Grill, John B. Martin, Tin Aung, M.D., and Glenda Moore. Absent were: Bernard Brown, Don Buntun and Greg Clonts.

Dr. Aung addressed the board concerning his practice and his goals for the clinic and the hospital. Physician recruitment was discussed. Discussion was held on marketing of specific services offered by Dr. Aung. No visitors were present for public comments.

The board considered the minutes of the regular meeting held on May 16, and the special called meeting on May 21. A motion was made by Peggy McGaughey and seconded by Benny Grill to approve the minutes as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

The financial statement and accounts payable for the month of May, 1991, were reviewed. Specific accounts payable were discussed. The board tabled payment of two bills from Nova Biomedical pending receipt of further information. A motion was made by Benny Grill, and seconded by Dolan Moore, to approve the financial statement for May and accounts payable, with the exception of three invoices. Motion passed unanimously.

Stephen A. Kuehler delivered the administrator's report. He reported on the status of health benefits for employees. Payment for benefits will be addressed in the budget. He reported on progress in hiring of a laboratory technician. The annual Medicare Survey will be held on July 29-30.

The Munday Clinic is in need of a hot water heater, which the board instructed Mr. Kuehler to purchase. Mr. Kuehler reported that the heart monitor had been purchased and installed. The Hospital Auxiliary had

made plans to come to the hospital to see it. He reported on a reception which the Munday Chamber of Commerce had held to introduce Dr. Aung to the community.

The Knox County Hospital Auxiliary, or Pink Ladies, will host a reception for Dr. Aung in Knox City on July 14. Mr. Kuehler reported on a list of accounts to be written off for June. He reported on the status of repairs to the hospital's roof and the status of plumbing and electrical repairs which had been done. The tile is installed in the nurse's station, the carpet is installed on the front steps and the new Emergency Room signs have been installed.

Mr. Kuehler reported that the Texas Department of Health Licensing and Certification Division had investigated two complaints and one inquiry concerning the hospital. They found no conditional deficiencies. The investigation is nearing completion.

Mr. Kuehler reported that per the hospital's Quality Assurance Plan, the administrator must be critiqued yearly. He stated that he would mail the forms for this to the board members. They are to return them as soon as completed. The board considered the analysis presented on the Munday E.M.S. expenses for the year to date. The board received a copy of the audit for the Knox County Appraisal District.

John B. Martin gave a report on the board retreat to be held in Lubbock in July.

After discussion, the board requested that the current system of using purchase orders to purchase supplies be instituted system-wide throughout the hospital.

Stephen Kuehler presented the Quality Assurance Report. He reviewed the minutes of the QA meeting held in June. The board accepted the report. He reported that according to the QA Plan, the board must review and approve the plan each year. He presented a copy to the board. A motion was made by Benny Grill, and seconded by Peggy McGaughey, to acknowledge receipt and review of the plan and approve it. Motion carried unanimously.

Stephen Kuehler presented the medical staff report, which was accepted by the board.

Mr. Kuehler reported on the clinic management. The staff had been given copies of their job descriptions. He reported that the clinic charges had been adjusted to be more competitive.

The board reviewed the depository contract submitted by the First National Bank of Munday. A motion was made by Benny Grill, and seconded by Dolan Moore, to accept the depository contract submitted by the First National Bank of Munday. Motion carried unanimously.

A copy of the proposed amended budget for FYE 9-30-91 was presented to the board. After review, a motion was made by Benny Grill, and seconded by Peggy McGaughey, to amend the budget for the fiscal year ended 9-30-91 as proposed. Motion carried unanimously.

The board reviewed the proposed transfer policy submitted by Mr. Martin. A motion was made by Dolan Moore, and seconded by Benny Grill, to approve the proposed transfer policy. Motion carried unanimously.

The board reviewed the letter of resignation received from Karen Pennington, M.D., Ph.D. A motion was made by Dolan Moore, and seconded by Peggy McGaughey, to accept Dr. Pennington's resignation effective May 30, 1991. Motion carried unanimously.

The board considered the appointment of Tin Aung, M.D., as Chief of Staff. A motion was made by Peggy McGaughey, and seconded by Benny Grill, to appoint Tin Aung, M.D., as Chief of Staff. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Martin questioned the board on the status of his typewriter. Mr. Kuehler was instructed to handle the matter.

A motion was made by Benny Grill, and seconded by Dolan Moore, to adjourn. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 10:15 p.m.

Q: How could the Bible talk about corn being eaten in the Middle East when it wasn't discovered until the 15-16th century? Isn't this an error in the Bible?

A: The Indians of the American continents were harvesting corn at least 2,000 years before the birth of Christ. If the biblical writers had known about this crop before Columbus came to the New World, then that would be additional proof of divine knowledge...not an error. The biblical writers were guided by God in their authorship. However, this knowledge did not extend to corn.

The translators of the KJV (King James Version) used the term "corn" to translate Greek or Hebrew words which really mean "grain". The "corn" of Luke 6:1 was more like a native wheat or maize. It was a common

custom of that time to eat this grain raw or roasted (like a marshmallow). It was also thrashed into flour or meal.

Jesus used this grain in Luke 6:1-5 to teach us that the Sabbath (Saturday) was not made to be a burden to man and that Jesus (Son of Man) was master of the Sabbath. Since Jesus is Lord of the Sabbath, he took the physical sabbath regulations away and instituted a spiritual sabbath (Heaven) in its place (Hebrews 4:8-11; Colossians 2:11-17).

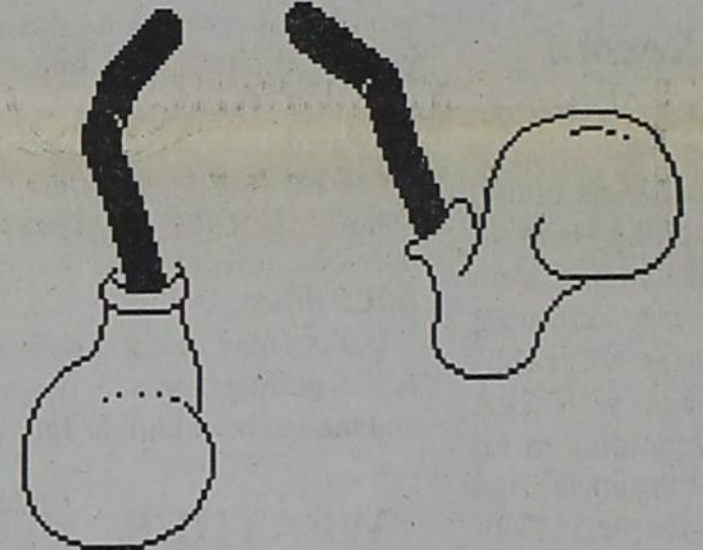

DOES GRILLING POSE A CANCER RISK?

Some studies have suggested there may be a cancer risk related to grilling muscle meats like fish, meat, poultry, game and so forth. As with many things, "moderation" is the watchword. Based on present research findings, eating moderate amounts of grilled foods cooked to a

safe, yet medium temperature does not pose a problem for barbecue lovers. But if you are concerned, you can further lower any risk with these tips from the American Institute for Cancer Research:

- * If you grill more than several times a week, consider precooking (microwaving or parboiling) the meat so it is not on the grill very long.

- * Raise the level of the grill so food is farther from the heat.

- * Remove visible fat to avoid flare-ups.

- * Cook meat until it's done and avoid consuming charred meat.

- * Clean the grill after each use.

TIPS FOR SAFE GRILLING

- * Marinate foods only in the refrigerator. Reserve a portion of the marinade, before raw meat is placed in it, for use later in basting or as a dip for

- * To avoid flare-ups and charred food, remove visible fat from meat.

- * Don't partially cook unless food will go immediately onto the grill.

- * If cooking ahead, cook completely, then cool down fast for reheating later.

- * Cook meat and fish thoroughly to 160° F. For taste, cook poultry to 180° F. Flesh shouldn't be pink and juices should run clear.

- * Serve food from the grill on a clean platter, not one that has raw, possibly contaminated juices on it.

SHELF LIFE FACTS

If stored away from heat and moisture, ground spices have a shelf life of two to three years. This will vary with the individual product. Whole spices have a shelf life of four to five years and seasoning mixes in the foil packages have an average shelf life of two years. These numbers may be higher than some you have seen in print, but have been determined through years of careful evaluation. There is no health hazard from eating spices beyond these dates, only the flavor has been reduced.

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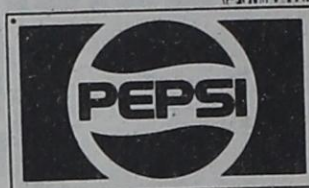

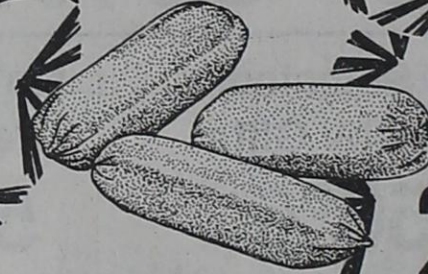

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of nine women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer.

OUTDOOR WORKERS SHOULD PROTECT AGAINST SUN

With summer temperatures heating up, people who work outdoors should take extra precautions to guard against both the heat and the possibility of developing skin cancer.

Ranchers, farmers, construction workers and others who work outdoors should protect their skin from the cumulative effect of the sun's rays on forearms, head and neck.

Workers who are exposed to coal tar, pitch, creosote, arsenic compounds or radium will be at higher risk for developing skin cancer, along with those with lightly pigmented skin.

Residing in the Sun Belt increases the risk of skin cancer, as does increased age.

The majority of the more than 400,000 new cases of skin cancer being diagnosed each year are curable. However, with a few precautions, many cases can be prevented.

The American Cancer Society regularly encourages people to check for skin cancer warning signals: a sore that does not heal or any unusual skin condition, especially a change in the size and color of a mole or other darkly pigmented growth or spot.

There is no admission charge and everyone is welcome. Proceeds of the concession stand will go to offset the expenses of the Community Center.

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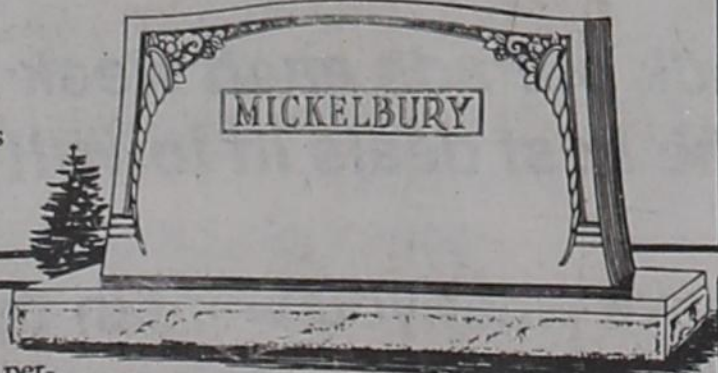

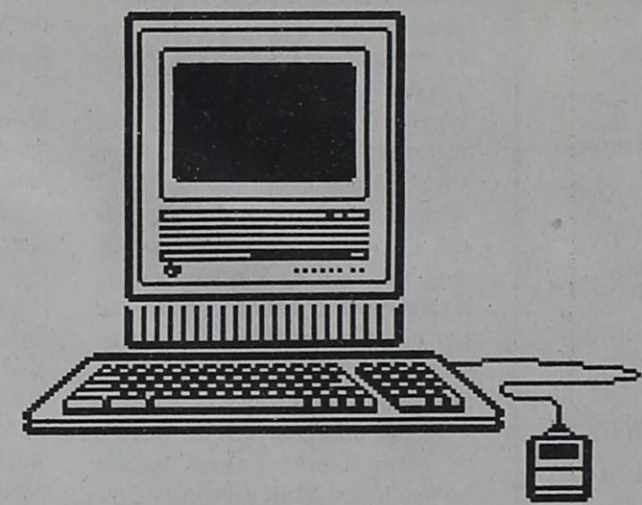

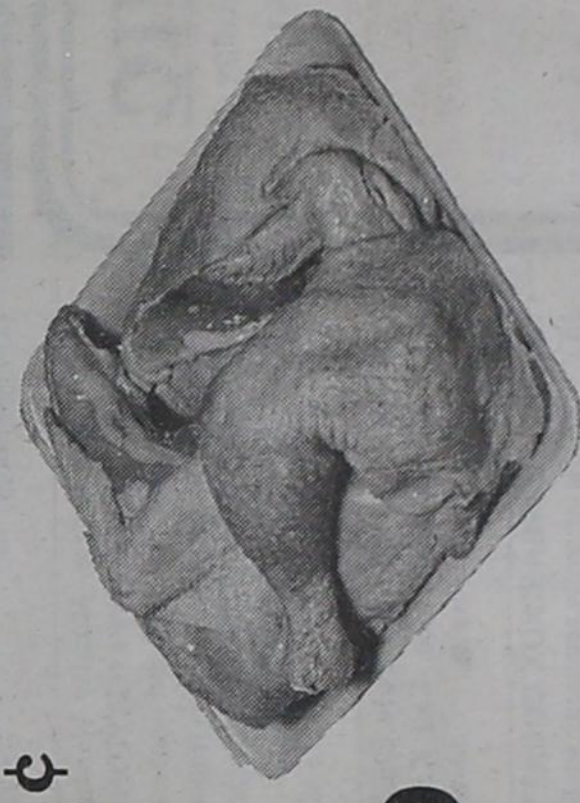
