Munday elects new officers

The Development Corporation of Munday met in regular session on March 27 at 12:00 noon. Those present were directors Charles Baker, Bob McWhorter, Mark Reed, John Weeks and David Neal. Two guests were present - they were Lenora Hammett from the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and Jay White from the Munday City Council.

Charles Baker called the meeting to order. A financial report was given by Bob McWhorter. There is \$77,158.85 in a money market account and \$4,558.99 in a checking account. Mr. McWhorter motioned that all the money be moved to the money market account. Mr. Weeks seconded and the motion carried.

The next order of business was to elect officers. The meeting was

opened for nominations for president. Charles Baker nominated John Weeks and Bob McWhorter moved that John Weeks be voted president by acclamation. The motion was seconded and passed.

Charles Baker moved that Bob McWhorter be appointed treasurer, Mark Reed be appointed secretary and David Neal be appointed vice-president. This motion was seconded and passed.

Charles Baker then made the motion that Bob McWhorter, Mark Reed and John Weeks be on the signature card at the bank. Motion was seconded and passed.

David Neal was appointed by the new president, John Weeks, to be on the Chamber of Commerce Advisory Committee.

Plans for renovation and clean up in the city were discussed. All

agreed that removing the eyesores on U.S. 277 and FM 222 can help with the recruitment of new businesses and families to Munday. Joint efforts taken on by the City of Munday, the Development Corporation, the Chamber of Commerce and other interested parties can only help our community.

Repairs that need to be and have been made to the building presently occupied by the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation were discussed. Additionally, it was noted that the Foundation would employ approximately forty personnel this year, virtually doubling last year's total. The meeting adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

The foregoing minutes have neither been accepted nor approved by the Development Corporation of Munday.

Judicial District Court  
returns indictments

Dear Editor,

I want to make your readers aware that several organizations are mailing appeals to people in Knox County for contributions to fight cancer. At least one of these organizations deliberately styles itself after the American Cancer Society in an attempt to confuse contributors. This organization may look like the American Cancer Society, but a closer look would show that it spends much less on educational and patient services and much more on fund raising and overhead.

While there are many legitimate and respected organizations raising funds to fight cancer, many are not legitimate. If you have received a direct mail solicitation to fight cancer, you can contact the Better Business Bureau at (703) 276-0100 or the Texas Attorney General's office at (800) 621-0508 to find out if an organization meets the BBB's standards. I am proud to say that the American Cancer Society does meet all of them.

The Knox Unit of the American Cancer Society provides free services to cancer patients, conducts an ongoing support group to cancer patients and their families, offers free educational programs, and raises funds to support our nationally renowned cancer research program. Eighty-three cents of every dollar donated to the American Cancer Society goes to

directly to fund these programs. Only seventeen cents is used for administration and fund raising costs. These are well within the acceptable limits set by the Better Business Bureau and other watchdog organizations.

Please do not be confused by appeals from organizations who may appear to be the American Cancer Society. Look for the red sword in our logo and the specific name: American Cancer Society.

April is crusade month and volunteers for the Knox Unit are now into the annual appeal. Please be generous!

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## DPS kicks off parent-taught driver education program

Parents or guardians who want to teach their children to drive using a state-approved course may pick up request forms at most DPS driver license offices starting Monday, April 7.

Previously, only schools and instructors certified by the Texas Education Agency could provide official driver training courses. The Texas Legislature amended state traffic laws in 1995, however, allowing parents to train their own children. The DPS developed administrative rules and curriculum and materials to implement the new program. Successful completion of the course allows teenagers to obtain licenses at age 16.

Parents must follow procedures and curriculum guidelines set by the DPS.

The first step is obtaining a driver education packet request form at a local driver license office. For your convenience, please call the nearest office ahead of time to confirm request form availability.

Parents must fill out the form and include the address of the driver license office where the student will undergo testing, since a driver education certificate must be mailed to that office in the student's name.

The completed form must then be mailed to DPS headquarters along with a non-refundable \$20 fee for the materials packet. The packet includes instructions, necessary forms, a Texas Drivers Handbook, a model curriculum guide and a resource list for textbooks and other materials. When other course curricula are approved, information about obtaining them also will be included.

Generally, requestors who pay the \$20 fee should receive their instruction packets by mail within three weeks. However, delays may occur during the program's start-up phase. DPS will provide the packets by only and will not sell them over the counter.

The approved curriculum requires at least 32 hours of classroom instruction and 14 hours of in-car instruction. Parents must use state-approved textbooks in addition to materials provided by DPS. The DPS packet includes a list of approved textbooks and sources for obtaining them. Parents should pay close attention to the copyright dates on the textbooks since newer editions haven't been approved for use in Texas. No special classroom or vehicle equipment is required.

At least six hours of classroom work must be completed before students may take the written drivers' test and receive instruction permits, which allow them to drive when accompanied in the front seat by a licensed driver at least 18 years old. After successful completion of all training, students may take the driving portion of the test and become fully licensed at age 16. Parents may choose to waive the driving portion of the licensing test.

Parents who have been convicted of criminally negligent homicide or driving while intoxicated or who are disabled due to mental illness do not qualify for this program. Children can begin the course at age 14 but must not complete the classroom portion and cannot take the written test until they turn 15.

### Comptroller Sharp releases third quarter analysis report

Texas State Comptroller of Public Accounts, John Sharp, has released information of the state sales and use tax during the third quarter of 1996.

The number of reporting outlets for all industries in Knox County was down in 1996 over the third quarter statistics of 1995. In 1996 there were 113 reporting outlets in Knox County and in 1995 there were 126.

Gross Sales in 1996 were also down in Knox County from the third quarter of 1996 over the third quarter of 1995. In 1996 gross sales amounted to \$13,002,145 over the figure of 13,933,713 for 1995.

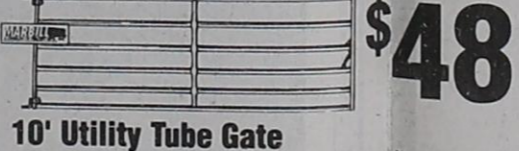

## It's Public Health Week in Texas - invest in your future

Each year in Texas, the majority of deaths result from causes which might have been avoided or at least delayed by lifestyle changes and known precautions. Public health programs are committed to preventing illnesses and injuries. Greater awareness of such programs and their contributions will be the aim of Public Health Week in Texas, coinciding with National Public Health Week, April 7 - 13. The theme of this year's observance is "Public Health - An Investment in Your Future."

According to Dr. Patti J. Patterson, Texas Commissioner of Health, one of the central roles of public health programs is to guide the public toward appropriate lifestyle choices and life-long healthful habits that enhance longer lives and prevent many early deaths.

"In this century, the average American's life expectancy has increased from 45 to 75 years. Only five of those extra years is attributed to curative medicine. The remaining 25 added years is credited to public health programs - services that help the public to reduce or prevent illness and injury. Such services as public sanitation, immunizations, food inspection and passenger protection laws are commonplace today but were almost unknown in the 1800s," Patterson said. "Such prevention is the key to longer life spans in the century to come, and the means by which people's lives will be richer and more productive because of better overall health later in life," Patterson said.

"Unfortunately," she added, "we have a long way to go in eliminating the most frequently occurring causes of death in Texas, especially heart disease and cancer."

The Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Vital Statistics, which interprets each year's death certificates, has reported that in 1995, heart disease and cancer headed the state's list of most frequent causes of death. Of the 137,549 Texas deaths that year, 41,630 or 30 percent were caused by heart disease, while 31,571 or 23 percent were caused by cancer. "Since both heart disease and cancer are linked to tobacco use, we hope that public programs to stop tobacco use may soon help to reduce deaths from these illnesses," Patterson said.

The remaining eight causes of death, their ranking and totals from the TDH "Top 10 Killers" list for

1995 were: (3) stroke, 9,788; (4) accidents, 6,402; (5) chronic obstructive pulmonary disorder, 6,232; (6) diabetes, 4,569; (7) pneumonia and influenza, 3,827; (8) HIV-AIDS, 2,764; (9) suicide, 2,229; and (10) chronic liver disease and cirrhosis, 1,867.

Patterson said that the 1995 list "was typical of most years," with some notable exceptions. For example, homicides fell from the top 10 list, after a 17 percent reduction in homicides from 2,144 in 1994 to 1,781 in 1995. "Of course it is good news that homicides dropped in 1995, but the fact remains that homicides, like most other leading causes of death are nearly always preventable."

The TDH Bureau of Vital Statistics annual report further characterizes the causes of death to Texans in 1995. Some examples are: The majority of deaths among Texans between ages 1 and 44 were from external causes - such as injuries, suicide and homicide - or from HIV infection; More than 38 percent of deaths among children ages 1 through 14 were caused by injuries, while 7.7 percent of that age group died from homicide; accidents, suicide or homicide accounted for about 75 percent of the deaths of Texans ages 15 - 24 and nearly 47 percent of those ages 25 - 34; HIV was the cause of death for 21.8 percent of deceased Texans ages 25 - 34, and for 16.6 percent of those ages 35 - 44; while external causes of death lessened among people ages 45 and older, heart disease and cancer were the causes of 55.5 percent of deaths between ages 45 and 54; more than 70 percent of deaths at age 55 or older were attributed to heart disease, cancer, stroke or diabetes.

# A woman's place is in the home?

A woman's place is in the home...that is, if she's operating a home-based business. The number of women who own and operate a home-based business is nearly 4 million and increasing rapidly. In fact, researchers say home-based businesses is a growth industry to watch.

Regardless of whether you're a woman or a man who operates a business in the home, there are records to be kept and taxes to be paid. And Social Security and Medicare taxes are among those to be paid. The current rate for those taxes is 15.3 percent on self-employment income up to \$65,400. If your net earnings exceed \$65,400, you continue to pay the Medicare portion of the tax, which is 2.9 percent, on the rest of your earnings.

You may not welcome that business expense, especially if you are years away from retirement. But Social Security is a lot more than retirement income. It's important that you realize the day-to-day value of Social Security in your life. The money you pay into Social Security taxes is protecting you and your family from a loss of income if you should become severely disabled and unable to work or if you die before retirement age. At present, more than six million workers and their family members receive monthly disability benefits. Another 7.4 million receive survivors benefits.

Although the 15.3 percent you pay for Social Security and Medicare taxes may sound steep, when

you're self-employed you get two income tax deductions that reduce your tax liability. The deductions are intended to make sure self-employed people are treated in much the same way as employers and employees for Social Security and income tax purposes. First, net earnings from self-employment are reduced by an amount equal to half of the person's total self-employment tax. Second, self-employed persons can deduct half of their self-employment tax on their IRS Form 1040.

If you're operating a home-based business you may have employees. For example, two-thirds of the nearly four million home-based industries owned by women employ an estimated 14 million people. When you have employees, you pay 7.65 percent of their earnings in Social Security and Medicare taxes and withhold their share (also 7.65 percent) and send it to the government. The portion of Social Security and Medicare taxes you pay for your employees is an important part of their employee benefit package. You're helping provide them the day-to-day long-term disability coverage, and survivor insurance protection, as well as contributing to their retirement program.

## Child Abuse and Neglect Facts Sheet - April is Child Abuse Awareness Month

In fiscal year 1996, Texas' child protective services agency received and referred for investigation 99,780 reports of alleged child abuse and neglect.

About 45,000 children were found to be confirmed victims of child abuse and neglect in Texas in fiscal year 1996.

Number of Confirmed Victims by Type of Abuse and Neglect: Physical Abuse - 15,932, Sexual Abuse - 7,873, Emotional Abuse - 3,455, Abandonment - 1,034, Medical Neglect - 2,370, Physical Neglect - 7,770, Neglectful Supervision - 20,361, Refusal to Accept Parental Responsibility - 1,113.

The link between substance abuse and child abuse has strengthened over the year. Parental abuse of alcohol and use of other drugs has been identified as a major factor contributing to child maltreatment and death.

In 1994, state child protective services agencies received an estimated 2 million reports of abuse and neglect involving 2.9 million children.

During the five year period from 1990 to 1994, more than 5,400 children died as a result of abuse and neglect.

In 1994, about 27% of all victims of child maltreatment were 3 years old or younger, and another 20% were between the ages of 4 and 6. About 52% were female; 47% were male.

Reports of abuse come from all sources, but more than half of the reports received in 1994 came from professionals, including educators, law enforcement and justice officials, medical and social service professionals, and child care providers.

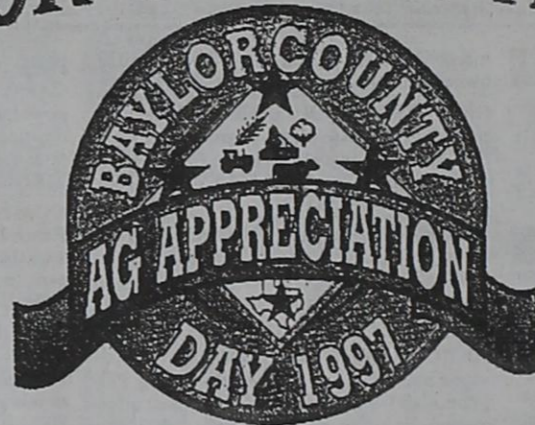
