The new year brings changes at Osbornes in Munday. Dub Moon, manager of the local store since 1967, has decided it's time to call it quits.

"I wanted to retire while I'm still healthy and can enjoy my retirement, not wait until I had to. I'm going to relax and enjoy myself for a while, not have to be anywhere at a certain time. Jodie is going to continue working, so I'm going to become not 'Mr. Mom', but 'Mr. Housewife' I guess. I'll be doing honey do jobs as other retired men say," Dub said with a smile.

In the latter part of 1964, Dub helped refurbish the old Ford house belonging to J.E. Reeves, where the Osborne store would be located. The doors opened in February of '65, and Dub became manager two years later.

"I've seen a lot of changes during the years. We started out with what looked like an adding machine with a drawer, and you had to pull a handle to ring up the sale. Now we have computers, scanning... quite a change," Dub said.

The store was made a little larger in the '70s when they leased the pool hall located next door, and knocked the solid wall out to make more room. "That's the only time we expanded. It has stayed the same size from then on," he laughed.

"The customers have stayed the same. I've enjoyed working with the company and all the employees, but the main thing I've enjoyed is the customers," he said. "I've made a lot of friends."

Dub has not only been a boss, but a husband and father to two of his employees. Jodie, his wife, has worked by his side for approximately twenty years, and his daughter, Kimi, has spent many

years there as well. "Dub has been great all through the years as my manager, friend and husband," his wife said, as her eyes filled with tears. "We've seen lots of changes through the years." It was unanimous among his employees that they "enjoyed working for him and he will be greatly missed at the store."

Christine Meers has worked full time for approximately 19 years, and she feels "there will never be anyone else like him."

"He's been a joy to work with," Andy Duffie stated. "He's everything you could want in a person, he's a true gentleman. I've been his supervisor for 12 years, and we hit it off from the very beginning. I wish him the best."

WILMA HOGAN

First Republican Candidate In Knox County History

Wilma Hogan, small business owner from Munday, has announced her candidacy for State Representative of District 70. This seat is currently held by David Counts of Knox City. The 54 year old Hogan has been married to husband Wendell "Bud" Hogan for 31 years and has two grown daughters and five grandchildren.

"I have been interested in politics since I cast my first vote for John F. Kennedy in 1960," said Mrs. Hogan. Although once a Democrat, she stated that in her opinion the Democratic party's liberal platform had deserted the mainstream conservatives in her area. "District 70 deserves a truly conservative representative and I want the opportunity to be that representative." Hogan added that Mr. Counts was given a 5% rating last year by the Free Market PAC, a conservative group that tracks legislation. "5% doesn't sound conservative to me," Hogan said.

Hogan has been involved in the political realm for years and has campaigned for many candidates and causes but this is her first attempt at candidacy. She stresses that citizens should become actively involved in the political process by voting, staying informed of the issues, and communicating with those who represent them in state and national government.

It was in her job with the Plainview school district that Hogan said she first discovered the government waste of tax dollars. During the seven years she worked with Federal programs assisting in writing applications for Federal funds, she realized how much money could be saved. Then after becoming a small business and

property owner, Hogan said she saw her taxes begin to rapidly escalate. She said she felt it was time that the average American tax payer had a say in how the government was spending their money.

Mrs. Hogan believes in less government, not more. "The state budget has grown from \$46 billion to \$70 billion in only three years. Texas is going to end up in the same mess as Washington if we do not begin to control spending." She said that local control of schools, cities and counties is what Texans need. "Austin politicians have lost touch with their constituents." Mrs. Hogan also supports term limits and stated that "professional politicians have forgotten the voters at home they were elected to represent."

Two Plead Guilty In District Court

Ms. Collier was placed on probation for 10 years and was ordered to pay restitution in the amount of \$10,000.00, plus court cost.

Munday ISD Receives An Energy Management Assistance Grant

The Munday ISD has been notified that it will receive a grant of \$24,222 for completion of eligible energy efficiency projects. These funds must be spent on specific energy projects in six specific areas. Energy project grants may be spent on energy efficient lighting, energy efficient heating, ventilating, and air conditioning projects, energy management control systems, building shell improvements, energy efficient equipment for new facilities, or an energy manager.

Money for this grant is from a settlement fund to repay oil over charges. Eligibility was deter-

mined by property wealth per student during the 1992-93 school year. Starting with the least wealthy district so defined, grant amounts were calculated based on audited 1991-92 per student utility costs and 1992-93 average daily attendance.

In order to receive this grant application must be completed and submitted before March 22, 1994. The school district must have an energy engineer help plan and submit the grant application. Districts must also send a representative to meetings that are scheduled across the state to help districts complete the grant application.

Joe and Claudia were in Lubbock to see Doug and Lianne receive their degrees.



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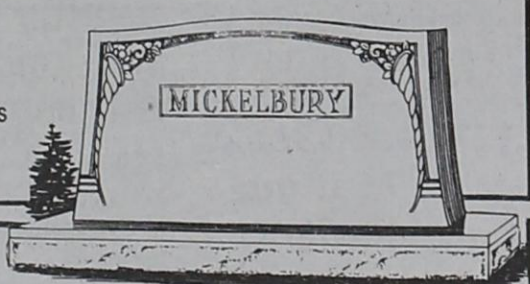

To remind our readers of some local events that made the headlines last year, we have capsuled some of them for you. Following are a few of the highlights of 1993:

JANUARY

Skylark Bus Line was discontinued as of January 1. The bus service also served Stamford, Rule, Rochester, Knox City and Seymour. The reason was the steep terminal fee to Greyhound Bus Lines for use of the Abilene terminal.

A petition was circulating around the county requesting an election for dissolution of the Knox County Hospital District.

Junior Masias and David Tidwell were chosen Class A All-Area and All-District picks by Bill Hart, senior staff writer at Abilene Reporter News.

The new addition to the high school building was completed. A new staff room, science room, four classrooms and a storage room were added.

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Why Buy American?

These days, most opinions voiced on the subject of Buy American tend to fall into one of two categories: On the extreme right is the person who waves the American flag and shouts things like, "Remember Pearl Harbor." That's the person who insists that it's unpatriotic to buy imported goods, no matter what.

At the opposite end of the spectrum is the chap who says, "Nobody can tell me how to spend my money. This is a free country. I'll buy what I want. I couldn't care less where it comes from."

Both of those viewpoints are rooted in ignorance of the subject, and both are dangerous. Dangerous because such extremist thinking repels thoughtful, middle-of-the-road Americans, the very people who are needed the most in the task of turning America away from its current path down the road to economic self-destruction.

It is critically important for Americans to understand that the United States is actively engaged in a titanic struggle, a contest that will eventually determine whether or not our country will survive in the form that we know it today. Our children and their children are going to be profoundly affected by how we handle this crisis.

The struggle I refer to is an economic contest. Not a war of violence, not a war of hatred, not a war of emotion; but a war nevertheless. An economic war which, in the end, will produce but one winner and one loser. The consequences of being the loser will be far worse than most Americans would care to imagine.

Before you decide where you stand on the Buy American issue, consider these two essential elements:

First, the trade deficit. When the value of the goods we buy from other countries is greater than the value of the goods we sell to other

countries, we have a trade deficit. But understanding what a trade deficit IS is far less important than understanding what a trade deficit DOES.

When a trade deficit is allowed to grow to gigantic proportions and allowed to persist over an extended period of time, (ours has done both) American's wealth is systematically transferred to other countries, thus increasing the wealth of our trading partners and raising their standard of living while decreasing our wealth and lowering our standard of living. That is precisely what is happening in this country right now.

For over a decade, our trade deficit has averaged more than \$100 billion annually—a figure so huge that the human mind cannot even comprehend it. By any standard, it is a figure large enough to have destroyed several million American jobs. It is, in fact, the largest non-military transfer of wealth in the history of the world.

It is vitally important for all of us to understand that those lost jobs we've been reading about really are LOST jobs. General Motors, General Electric, IBM, and on and on. These are not layoffs. They are jobs lost to America forever unless we do something to turn ourselves around.

The second element of understanding is called the manufacturing base. Five-hundred years of history has taught us that economic domination of the world is attained through control of the currently leading manufacturing industries. Spain learned this simple lesson and used it to rule the world for several hundred years, until the 18th century when England learned the secret. England toppled Spain and became the mightiest economic power on earth when it developed superior manufacturing capabilities and learned the

importance of using those capabilities to control foreign trade.

In the late 19th century, the United States, with its incredibly rich natural resources, learned the secret and refined it quickly to topple England and become the strongest economic power the world had ever known.

But that was then and this is now.

Subscribing to the 200 year-old myth of Free Trade, our government leaders have opened up United States markets to all comers with the naive expectation that all the diverse nations of the world with their spectacularly differing laws, cultures, relationships, and interpretations of morality would respond in kind. As history has so clearly taught us, they did nothing of the sort. Instead, some other countries have set about to do precisely what we invited them to do: weaken and then take over our essential, most rewarding manufacturing industries.

Because of the naivete of our government leaders and the ignorance of the average American on the subtleties of foreign trade, we are now even further down the road to economic self-destruction. The same mistakes that we made during the devastating loss of our consumer electronics industry are again being made as foreign sights are set on our automobile, machine tool, and other critical industries.

Unfortunately, many Americans still cling to the perception that American workers and American factories are no longer turning out high quality products. That simply is not true. Many of the same American-made products that shoppers in this country consistently pass up are prized throughout the rest of the world as the best available.

resentful" (1 Corinthians 13:5, RSV).

Once your friend has truly experienced God's love and starts returning that love to others, she will learn to forgive them.

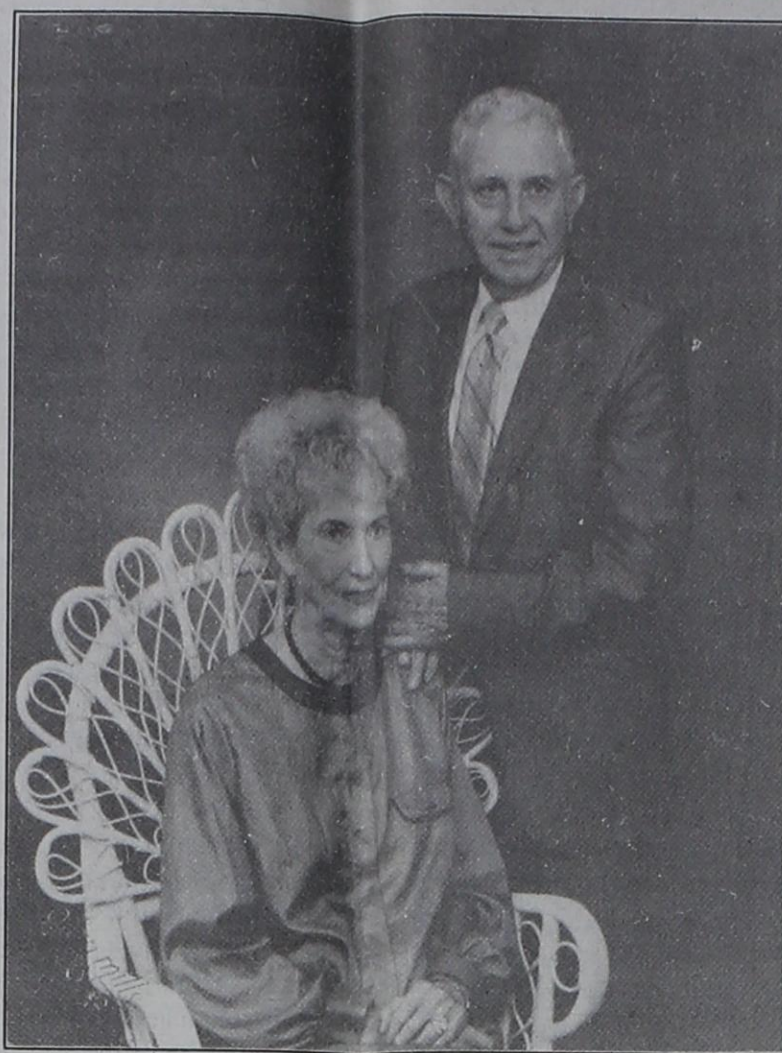
Russell Assists In Locating Jail Escapee
