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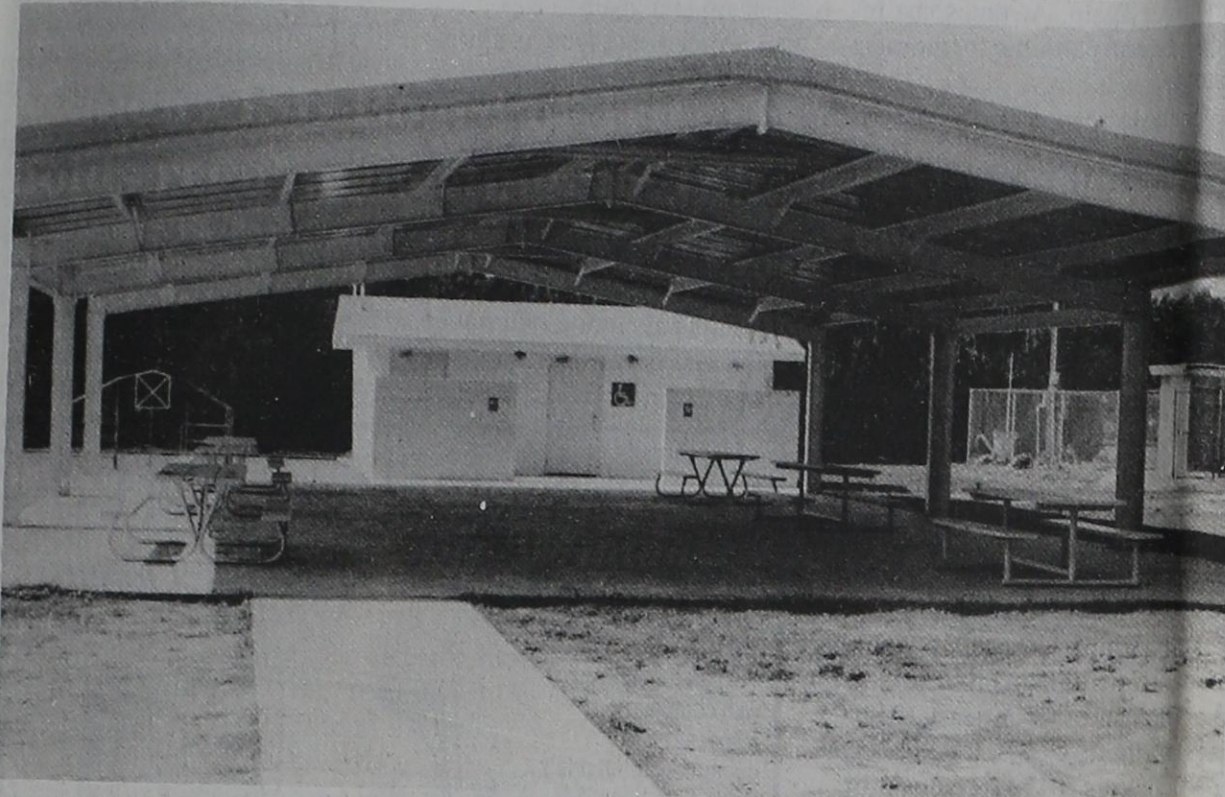

Munday ISD Board of Trustees holds regular meeting for June

The Munday ISD Board of Trustees met in regular session on Thursday, June 8, 1995 at 8:00 p.m. in the Administration Building. Following roll call, approval of previous minutes, and payment of the bills, the first item on the agenda was a meeting with representatives from DSA Inc.

This firm is a company that specializes in construction management. They made a presentation about their company and the services they offer a school district. The district is considering future building plans and needs the best ways to provide for those needs. The next item was a call for bank depository bids. The district must have a depository for their funds for each biennium of state funding. This depository must be selected in July.

Also discussed was the new state salary schedule for teachers and the effect of this on Munday ISD. Also approved was a new salary schedule for teachers aides employed by the Munday schools.

In personnel matters, the resignation of Leona Partridge was accepted. Mrs. Partridge served the students of the Munday schools for forty-two years. She had a total of forty-five years service as a teacher. Christy Shahan was hired

as a teacher at Munday Elementary. She will serve as the Title 1 teacher at the elementary school. The next regular school board meeting will be on July 13.

Chamber kicking off "Munday Blooms" project

The Munday Chamber of Commerce is once again sponsoring the "Munday Blooms!" project as they did last year. The project uses pansies to add color to businesses and homes in Munday.

The pansy blooms through April, and is a good flower for the area. Delivery date will be late October.

The flats will be available in many colors, including mixed, yellow with blotch, white with blotch, and purple with blotch. Dillon Greenhouse will grow the flowers. Kerri Urbanczyk, pansy sale chairman, encourages everyone to decorate their homes and business planters with these beautiful winter flowers.

All orders must be in by July 7. Payment needs to be made when ordering the pansies. An order form can be found in an ad elsewhere in this week's Courier.

Munday City Park improvements nearing completion

Wheat 95% harvested from area

Approximately 760,000 bushels of wheat (over 45 million pounds) has been harvested through Farmer's Grain Co-op here in Munday. Report is, as of Monday, June 19, 95 percent of the local

grain is harvested and the price per bushel was \$3.78.

Wheat has been shipped two different ways this year from Farmer's Grain, by truck and by train. Over 300 trucks have shipped out and

approximately 95 rail cars. Before the rain and hail, the wheat was graded number 1. After the bad weather, the average load was graded number 3, mainly due to sprout damage.

Senate Bill 1 to overhaul school's operations and governance

The new education code has been signed into effect by Governor Bush in the form of Senate Bill 1. This bill overhauls many of the rules that schools must go by in operation and governance of public schools. This new code has implications for teachers, administrators, board members, and students.

Changes include new duties for the Education Commissioner, superintendents, school board members, and principals. Two items will affect the financing of public education. These are new state minimum salary schedules and funding for facilities.

One of the first effects that students and teachers will notice is that the number of instructional days has been set at 180 days. This will be an increase of five days for Munday students over last year. A new calendar has not been approved but will probably require starting school on August 15 to complete the school year before Memorial Day in May, 1996.

Teachers will also get a pay raise over the next two years on the state minimum salary schedule. Starting salary will be increased from the present \$17,000 to \$20,000 over the next two years. The maximum state salary for teachers with 20 or more years experience will increase from \$28,400 to \$35,590 over the two year period. Individual steps with the salary schedule vary depending on years of experience. The salary increases will be funded by state funding instead of an increase in local funds according to the new law. Also included in the bill are provisions that would provide state money for building projects at the local level. Approximately \$170 million has been set aside for this provision. To be eligible a district must have a wealth per student below \$276,000 and an effective tax rate of at least \$1.30 or an effective debt tax rate of at least \$.20 in order to qualify. The maximum amount available a district over a two year period would be the greater of \$266 per student (ADA) or \$500,000. Districts with fewer than 1900 students are also eligible for supplemental assistance. According to statistics from the Equity Center, Munday ISD would be eligible for funds under this provision of up to \$425,000. Final rules and application processes have not been completed nor has a schedule for application.

City Council meets May 9 in Regular Session

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met May 9, 1995 in Regular Session at the City Hall at 7 p.m.

Members present: Mayor Richard Albus and Aldermen Danny Owens, Sherri Morren, Winters Matthews and Gary Tidwell.

Mayor Albus called the meeting to order at 7:09 p.m. and ordered the reading of previous minutes. Minutes of the April 11 regular meeting were read. Motion by Owens and seconded by Tidwell to approve minutes as read. Motion carried.

The results of the 1995 City Election were accepted on a motion by Tidwell and a second by Owens. Motion carried.

The Wastewater Treatment Plant Bids were reviewed. Mayor Albus called a special meeting for May 17 with the City Engineer and Contractor to further discuss the issue.

The appointment to the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority Board was discussed. Mayor Albus appointed Lee Bruce to serve a two year term until May 1997.

Street Seal Coat bids were reviewed. Two bids were received. Coltharp Construction Co. of Seymour bid \$22,669.03 and Lipham Construction of Aspermont bid \$23,019.32. Motion by Tidwell and seconded by Morren to accept the bid of Coltharp Construction with the deletion of South 11th and Cisco Street from 7th to 9th. Motion carried.

Employee reports were given. No action was needed.

Financial reports were reviewed. Motion by Owens and seconded by Tidwell to approve the monthly financial reports. Motion carried.

Motion to adjourn at 8:34 p.m. by Matthews and seconded by Owens. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned.

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met May 17, 1995 in Special Session at the City Hall at 6 p.m.

Mayor Pro-Tem Tidwell called the meeting to order at 6:14 p.m. and ordered to forego the reading of previous minutes.

City Engineer Ken Martin and Contractor Ron Carroll met with the Council to provide information on the Wastewater Treatment Plant project. The Council had several questions pertaining to this project. No action was taken. Motion to adjourn at 7:08 by Owens and seconded by Morren. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned.

To be eligible for this honor a student must maintain at least a 3.5 GPA and take at least 12 semester hours.

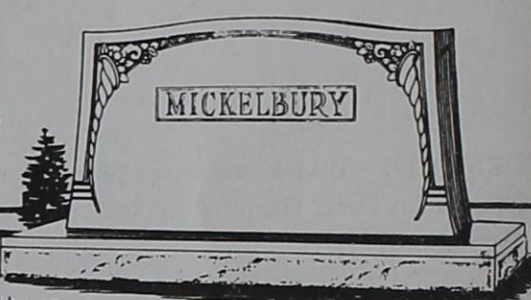

Three ways to increase your Social Security benefit

You may not want to know how to build a better mousetrap - but how about three ways to increase your Social Security benefit? They're foolproof and guaranteed. Here's one way. If you begin receiving benefits before you're 65, we'll reduce your check by five-ninths of one percent for each month you are under age 65. However - and here's your cue - when you turn 65, we refigure your benefit to give back the five-ninths of one percent for each month you didn't receive a check. This feature

is important if you're still working and have some months in which you don't receive a check because your earnings exceed the annual earnings limit. (The 1995 limit for someone under age 65 is \$8,160). As an example, let's say you started receiving Social Security when you turned 62. We reduced your benefits by 20 percent (36 months times five-ninths of one percent equals 20 percent). A year later you returned to work for awhile and earned so much money that you didn't receive a Social Security check for nine months. When you reach 65, we will refigure your benefit, increasing it by five percent - five-ninths of one percent for each of the nine months

you didn't get a check. From then on, your reduction will be 15 percent instead of 20 percent. Here's another way to increase your benefit. If you continue working after you start getting benefits and your annual earnings are higher than the lowest of the years we used to compute your benefit, we'll refigure your benefit each year. We add in the higher year of earnings to see whether it will increase your benefit.

The third way to get a higher Social Security benefit is to delay

your retirement beyond age 65 - up to age 70. The percentage of increase depends on what year you were born and is based on a graduated scale. For example, if you were born and in 1938, you receive a 6.5 percent increase for each year beyond your full retirement age that you delay signing up for Social Security. And if you're at the top of the graduated scale because you were born in 1943 or later, your benefit will be increased by eight percent for each year you delay retirement.

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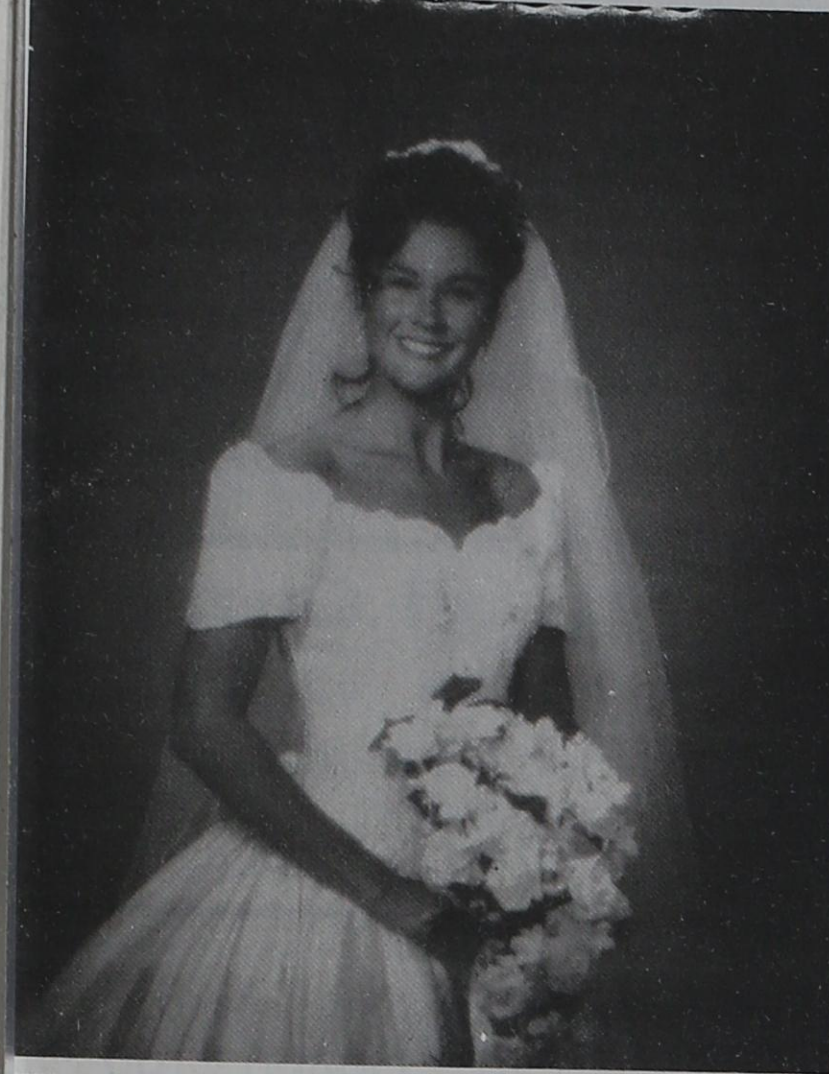

From A Carpenter's Son

I watch too much TV., have a short temper and I am absent-minded much of the time. I am quick to complain and don't always listen intently when other people are talking to me. I took a career aptitude test a year ago and it said that I had very few qualities for effective leadership; not a very encouraging report when one is in the ministry.

Why on earth am I telling you all these things? I'm telling you these things because of Paul and what he wrote to the church in Corinth in his second letter to them. He wrote that he had asked the Lord to remove his "thorn in the flesh" and the Lord had refused saying:

"My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in your weakness!"

Now am not saying that I don't work to control my temper or overcome my leadership inadequacies, but I am saying that I see them in a different light. I know that instead of complaining about my faults or being depressed by them, I should offer them up to God, for Him to do with or use as He sees fit. I should constantly strive to bring them captive to Christ. And I should expect Him to move through my weaknesses in mighty ways. I say all

this to you to destroy two myths. The first is that preachers are somehow different from everyone else. As ministers we should be held to a higher standard because of the people who look to us as examples of Christianity, but we carry the same doubts, fears, and failings as everyone else as we try to meet these higher standards.

The second myth is related to the first: that because of some doubt or fear or weakness or failing you cannot be used to serve the Lord, even as a minister. The truth is that God has always chosen the weak, the unpopular, the lame, the sick, the poor, the demon-possessed and the uneducated to serve in His kingdom. It is precisely those of you are quickest to admit those shortcomings and recognize your need for God's grace in those areas of your life who are most useful to Him and suited for the work.

Join hands with the shepherd boy, the runaway, the former prostitute, the fisherman, the short little tax collector, the wild man with locust and honey in his beard and the poor carpenter's son from Nazareth. Come and join the work in His kingdom.

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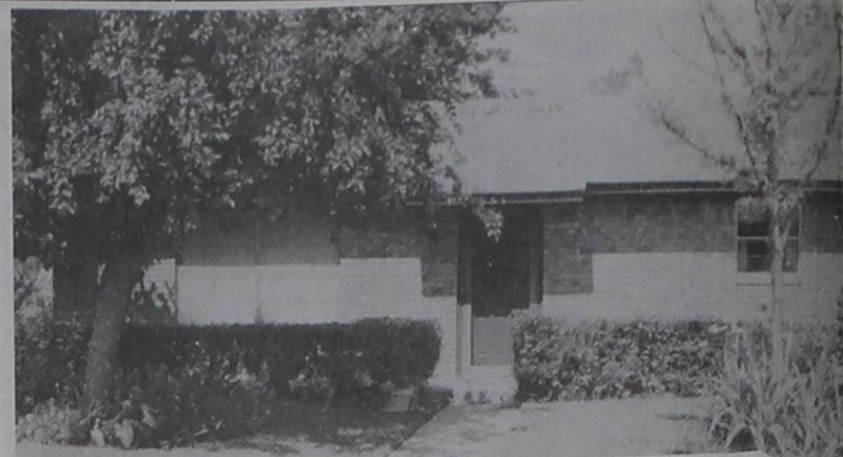
Edmund Casillas dies in Wichita Falls hospital

Municipal bonds for safety

"Better safe than sorry."
Most of us associate that phrase with childhood, and we remember hearing it from our mother. She usually said it right before she did something we didn't want her to do -- like putting a hat on our head in 60-degree weather, or making us swallow something horrible like cod liver oil. Those who grow up to be investors, however, learn to see that phrase in a new light. For them, safety is a positive thing, an important feature in their investments.

Many investors seeking safety have found that municipal bonds, or "munis", answer their needs. Munis are among the safest investments available, usually considered to be second only to U. S. government bonds when it comes to payment of interest and principal. Their income is free of federal taxes, which adds to their attraction. Munis are issued by state, city and county governments as well as government agencies, school districts and housing authorities, to finance public projects such as roads, schools, hospitals and utilities. Many municipal bonds are backed by the full taxing power of their issuer.

As with any investment, however, there are a few "safety rules" when investing in munis:

- *Make sure the bond you were sold is the same bond described in your official confirmation.
- *Pay particular attention to the name and description of the issuer, the interest rate and the date of maturity. Mistakes happen, and you want to be sure this is the bond that you agreed to buy.

*If your bond is registered, make certain the registration is in the name or names you requested.

*If safety is a major concern, you might consider insured munis. These bonds are not only backed by the credit worthiness of the issuer, but they're also insured as to the timely payment of principal and interest.

Municipal bonds can be insured by several major insurance groups. The largest and most widely used are American Municipal Bond Assurance Corp. (AMBAC), Municipal Bond Insurance Association (MBIA) and Financial Guaranty Insurance Corporation (FGIC). All three are similar in structure and protection, and any bond insured by them is automatically rated "AAA" -- the highest bond rating available -- by Moody's and Standard & Poor's.

Although insurance doesn't remove market risk, it does cover all principal and interest obligations of the bonds. That means that if any individually insured bond or any bond within an insured unit trust becomes unable to pay interest or return principal, the insuring group would meet those obligations. However, in return for this added safety, insured bonds often pay lower interest than similar-quality uninsured bonds.

Municipal bonds are excellent investments that can provide years of tax-free income. But be sure to seek the help of a trusted financial professional and don't forget to do your homework. As mother always said, "Better safe than sorry."

Out of the frying pan and into the fire

Know the rules of fire prevention

According to the National Fire Protection Association, more than 100,000 fires start each year in U.S. kitchens alone. Most could have been prevented if the basics of fire safety had been followed.

Keep the following fire safety tips in mind while in the kitchen:

- *Do not use the range for warming or heating the room.
- *Do not wear loose or hanging garments when using the range. They could ignite if brushed against a hot surface unit.

- *Use only dry potholders. Moist or damp potholders on hot surfaces could result in burns from steam. Do not let a potholder touch hot heating elements. Do not use a towel or bulky cloth for a potholder - it could catch on fire.
- *Do not heat unopened containers. They could explode and cause burns and injuries.

- *Do not line cook-top reflector bowls with aluminum foil or other liners. Improper installment of these liners could result in a risk of electric shock or fire.
- *Select a pan with a flat bottom that is about the same size as the surface unit. If the pan is smaller than the surface unit, some of the heating element will be exposed and could ignite clothing or potholders.

- *Turn pan handles inward, but not over other surface units. This will help reduce the chance of burns, igniting of flammable materials and spills due to bumping of the pan.

*Grease is highly flammable. Do not allow it to collect around the cooktop or in vents. Wipe spillovers immediately.

*Never leave surface units unattended at high heat settings. A greasy boil over could quickly ignite into a fire.

Problem Solving
Have you had difficulty trying to solve a problem lately? If you've tried everything else, try standing up. Researchers at the University of California say you can improve your chances of solving the problem by 20 percent if you're standing instead of sitting.

Reason: Standing boosts your heart rate by about 10 beats a minute. And the increase in blood flow stimulates your brain.
