Moguls Manhandle Ira 46 to 31 Advance to Regional Tournament

Munday sets their sights on Ponder in Regional semi final game Friday at 7:00pm

Ralph Klinkerman's Moguls cleared an enormous hurdle Tuesday night on their way to the Regional Tournament this Friday at McMurry by beating Ira 46 to 31 in what was described as "one of the best defensive games we've played all year". Munday played a tight man to man all night and successfully shut down the highly touted inside game of the Ira squad covering the two big posts like sara-wrap on a bologna sandwich.

B. J. Brown had a career effort blocking 7 shots and snagging 8 rebounds against one of the premier posts playing 1A basketball, and the tandem of Brown, Brian Urbanczyk, and Alan Albus kept the Ira inside game guessing all night.

Munday controlled the tip and went to their end of the court converting on a driving Robert Dockins lay up for the first score of the game. Robert followed quickly with back to back threes to give the Moguls an early 8 to 4 lead on his way to hitting 5 out of 7 from three point land and a team high 23 points.

Munday opened the second quarter leading Ira 10 to 7 and found a battling opponent fighting back in to run up a 5 point lead. Jason Key hit a three pointer to cut the Ira lead to 2 and after a see saw battle for dominance, Dockins hit another three pointer to put the Moguls into the locker room leading by the score of 21 to 20.

The big Mogul "D" reared its head in the second half holding Ira to just 5 points in the third as the Munday offense methodically opened up a 32 to 25 lead. Munday continued to wear down the representatives from Ira in the fourth, and with 1:43 left in the game, Eric Beaty hit a three pointer to put Munday up by 13. Beaty left the game with an apparent sprained ankle and Lane Murphy subbed in and was quickly fouled. Murphy calmly hit both of his free throws to give the Moguls their

biggest lead of the night at 15, and the Ira strategy had to change to foul and shoot threes.

Munday continued to dominate at the foul stripe and relentlessly kept the pressure on Ira until the final buzzer signalling the end of the season for Ira, and the start of the run to State for the Mighty Moguls from Munday.

Recapping the scoring statistics, Robert Dockins lead the offensive charge with 23 points, Eric Beaty had 10, B. J. Brown had 3, and Alan Albus, Jason Key, Brian Urbanczyk, and Lane Murphy all had 2 points each in the contest.

Munday meets Ponder at McMurry at 7:00 pm Friday in a re-match of last years contest.

Area Youth Can Make "U-Turn" Their Place

Much activity has occurred over the past two weeks at a vacant business location in downtown Munday. And come Saturday night it is hoped that the youthful sounds of teen's voices and music will fill the establishment as "The U-Turn" opens its doors to area young people.

According to Kacy Longan, director of U-Turn. "This is a place were teens can come and hang out, play games, watch TV, and socialize with their friends. We want them to feel at home here," she explains.

The new teen hang out is a place where anyone 13 and older can come to enjoy themselves and participate in the activities offered, or can just relax. Teens will find video games, a pool table, TV & VCR, movies, music, and food, all of which have been donated by local merchants and citizens.

"We're so excited about this. This is a real alternative for the kids in our area," says Longan, "In the future we hope to offer Christian activities like Bible and purity lessons, Christian drama team activities and we hope to have some outings including trips to Christian concerts or camping."

While Longan has put in many hours over the past two weeks decorating the building, collecting donated furnishings and making plans she will be receiving no salary for her efforts. For Longan this is truly a labor of love and is driven by her strong desire to help the youth of Knox County. "I will be taking no salary and all money collected will go back into U-Turn - either for upkeep of the facilities, to add new programs, literature, or furnishings or to help with an activity." Area churches are also backing the endeavor either by agreeing to help with payment of utilities or rent, or to furnish food and refreshments for the youth. "I'm just really excited to have the help of so many churches and people - two weeks ago this was only a dream - now we're almost ready to open!"

Longan hopes that "U-Turn" will help get the youth excited about Christianity but stresses that the facility is open to all beliefs. "This

is not about denomination but about Jesus," she says.

And for now, U-Turn has only one rule - "Do The Right Things!" U-Turn will open Saturday, March 4 at 8 p.m. and will close at 12 midnight.

Girls may earn individual awards including a patch, "Leap to the Future" mug, cap, T-shirt, stuffed tree frog with his own lily pad, shorts, beach towel, inflatable chair, backpack, large frog pillow as well as camperships or \$200 savings bond.

Your purchase of cookies from a Girl Scout increases self-esteem, helps the girl and troop reach their goals, teaches money management skills and provides additional support to the local Girl Scout Council. NorCenTex Girl Scout Council uses money raised from the cookie sale to provide programs for the girls and adults of the eleven counties served.

Look for the new packaging this year! Samoa lovers will find an extra cookie in their box and Striped Chocolate Chip and Pecan as well as Lemon Drop will have two more cookies per the box. In an effort to eliminate waste, the new packaging removed the larger plastic trays from the package, which eliminated 132,875 of plastic from just the Samoa cookie and will give the customers 22,871,872 more cookies. 188 tons of paper and 62 tons of corrugated cardboard paper will be saved through re-configured packaging.

Beginning arch 3rd you will find Girl Scouts delivering their orders, selling door to door and at many businesses in the City. In addition, you may see large Girl Scout Cookies (girls in cookie costumes) manning the booths. You support

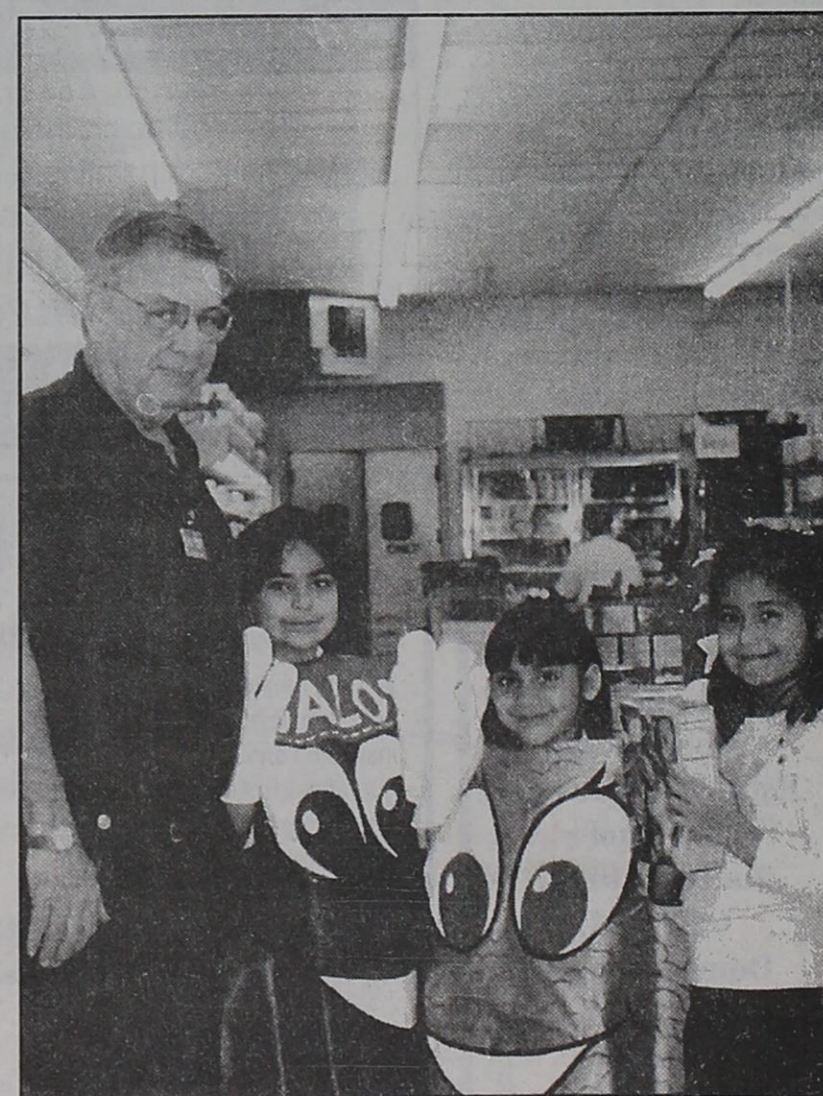

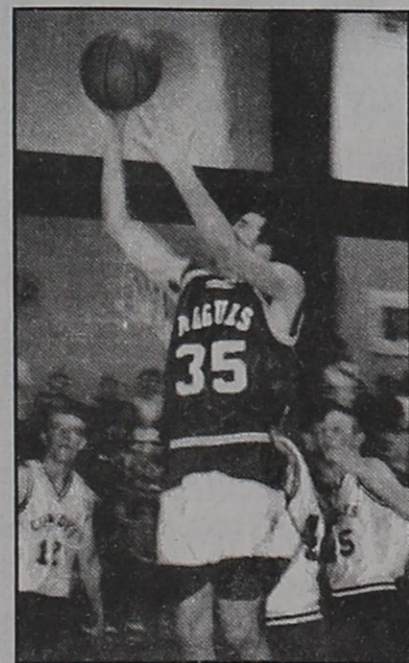

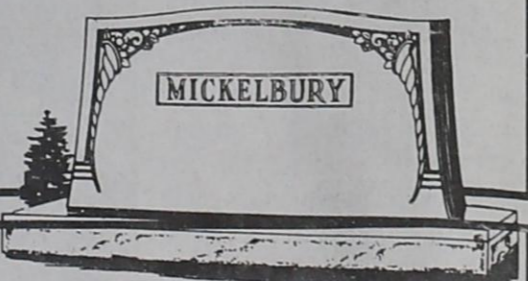

# Knox County Memorial Receives First Donation

The first \$1000 contribution to the Knox County Veterans Memorial was received February 8, 2000. It is the first major financial contribution towards the project's financial goal of \$50,000. All contributions are tax-deductible and go towards the monument's cost and groundwork. Another major contribution came from the commissioner's court which designated a portion of the lot located at the corner of state highway 6 and U.S. Highway 82/ State Highway 114 as the memorial site. Significant progress is being made towards the memorial; however additional financial contributions are needed. are in the planning stages. "The ceremony is gearing up to be a very momentous occasion," according to committee secretary, Sheri Baty. In addition, a dedication ceremony is scheduled for Veterans Day, November 11. The Knox County Veterans Memorial Committee is looking forward to the upcoming events and invites everyone to attend.

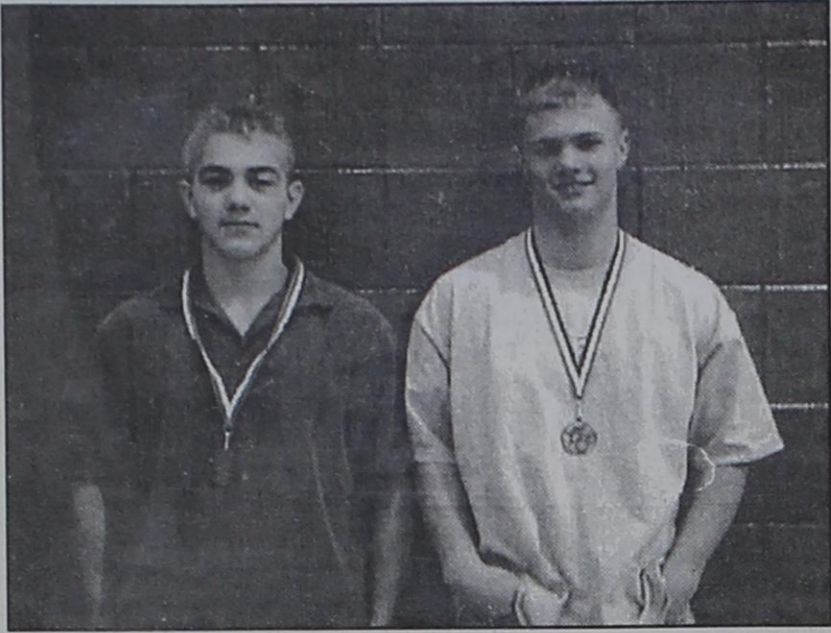

# Minding Your Own Business

with Don Taylor, co-author of Up Against the Wal-Marts

## A Decade Down and a Couple to Go

When I started writing this column 10 years ago, I had no long-term plan for it. I wanted to help small business owners find solutions for problems, but hadn't really thought about where that first column might take me.

I never dreamed that some day I would be writing to more than a million and a half readers in more than 100 newspapers and would squeeze a couple of business books in between. It has been a fast and furious decade, and outside of feeling the pressure of an occasional deadline, I've enjoyed writing the columns.

For those of you who enjoy trivia, here are a few tidbits of useless information. This is column number 522. The word count total stands at 322,832. The columns average about 620 words each. It only takes an average reader three to four minutes to read it. It takes me about eight hours to outline, research, write and edit each column.

The most commonly asked question is, "Where do you come up with the topics you write about?" The answer is, "Various sources." The most common sources include: your letters and suggestions, my clients' problems and successes, business books and articles, my own experiences and my family.

### It begins with an Idea

All columns begin with an idea. I often jot them down and throw them in a file of ideas. I review that file from time-to-time and add thoughts or notes from different sources. Often, I combine three or four ideas that have a central theme into one column.

When I'm ready to write a column, I usually create a rough outline of major points or thoughts to include. I still write every column in long hand. We make changes on the computer, but I prefer to edit hard copy.

I still read every letter you write but have given up trying to answer that volume of mail. I hope you understand.

### Times are Changing

We now distribute the column mostly via e-mail. We still send paper copies to a few newspapers. We now have distribution in all 50 states and 40 countries outside the U.S.

In 1990, when we first began to write, Wal-Mart's effect on small business was the hot media topic. Wal-Mart has since grown to become the world's largest retailer - from \$26 billion in 1990 to \$165 billion this year. Wal-Mart's retail dominance is now back page news.

As we roll through 2000 and beyond, the red-hot business topic is E-commerce. The big question is: "Will E-tailing send retailing high tailing?" The answer is: "Not likely."

Technology is changing the way we think about and do business.

E-commerce is driving government agencies nuts. How can they tax this moving media? It's about as easy as nailing Jello on the wall. However, I'll bet on the government. They will find ways to tax Internet sales and use, and I wouldn't be too surprised to see a property tax assigned to Web sites.

Wall Street had a busy decade, too. The Dow-Jones Industrial Average opened the 1990's at just over the 2,800 mark, and recent closes have been above 11,000. It was a good decade for the U.S. economy.

There have been a few changes at home, too. I'm now married to a Ph.D. No, not a new wife - just a new degree. Sue received her Doctor of Philosophy degree from Texas A&M University last August. Our daughter, Christi, now 23, is working on her first degree. She is nearly there.

Thank you for sharing this decade with us. If you will keep reading, I'll keep writing.

The Knox Co. Retired School Personnel will meet March 28, 2000 in Munday. Mark Logan will present a program on Investment Trust.

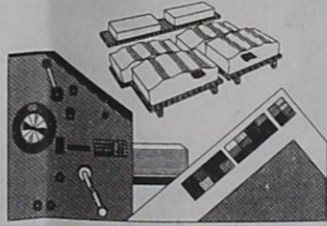

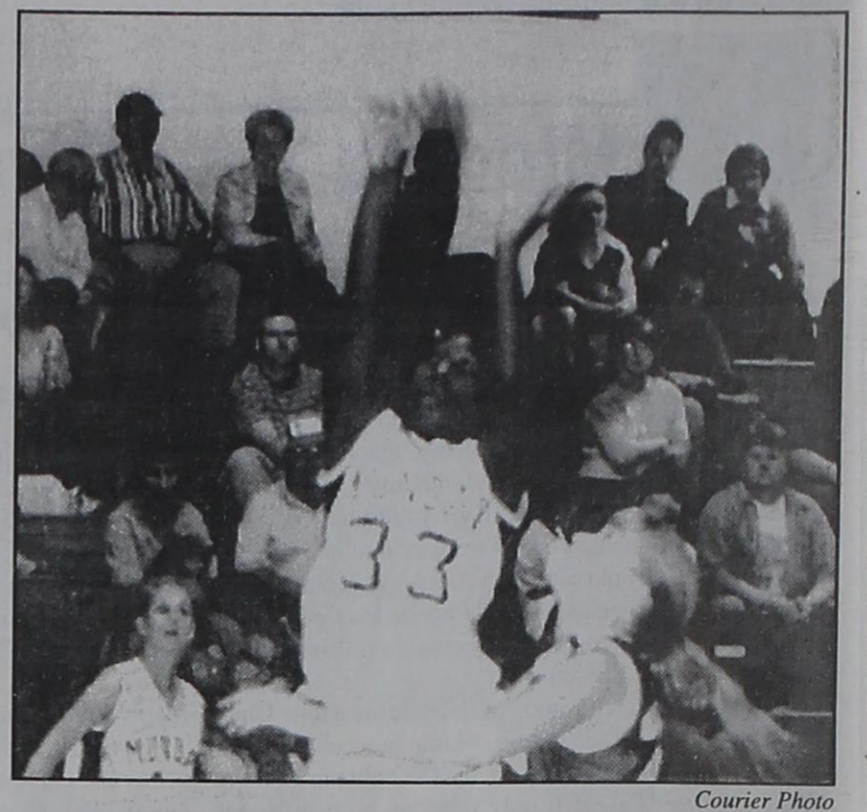
