### **Crop Insurance Deadline Nears for Area Farmers**

Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, Feb. 4, 2000-Ronald L. Berryhill, Diector of the Risk Management Agency's Regional Office in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma reninded farmers that they only have until March 15, 2000, to take idvantage of an estimated 25 perent premium discount on higher evels of crop insurance protec-

"We're trying to make higher evels of protection affordable," aid Berryhill. "Farmers should contact an agent immediately to discuss coverage options on crops nsurable in their county."

In addition to higher levels of overage, the catastrophic level of nsurance protection (CAT) is also available to producers. For only \$60 per crop per county, farmers may obtain a low level of protection. Limited resource farmers may not have to pay the \$60 fee for CAT coverage if they fill out a waiver available from their crop insurance agent.

Farmers who need more information about sales closing dates or their insurance options should contact a crop insurance agent. A listing of crop insurance agents is available at local Farm Service Agency offices or at http:// www.rma.usda.gov/tools/agents/.

We attended memorial services -a tribute to a terrific and valiant After several week ends of fast lady whose struggle with a devastating disease had changed her family's life so quickly. No longer was there a beautiful, nurturing mother, wife, grandmother. However, the memories she left and the lives she touched could fill volumes.

Sunday was a beautiful day. The lingered overhead. Our leisurely breakfast grew into a fast-paced exit from the house to head out to The service that morning was of the kind that made you want to linger. You wanted to stay just a little longer in the Lord's house with your extended church family. It was an emotional morning with celebrations, hugs, praises, tears, sadness, joy and more all rolled to the confines of the sanctuary -it seemed as if most of us wanted things to stay the way they were. We didn't want anything to steal the moment -- we seemed to be trying to avoid the quick changes Putting out of our minds the time that we knew could be waiting outside the building.

When we were all inside the family van my husband voiced the ordinary, "Seat belts, everyone!" around the house. My mom was command and away we rolled. In only an instant we were at the city limits sign and in another quick moment I looked up to cast an eye on a swiftly moving vehicle approaching the stop sign ahead and to the left. It must have only taken a second for us to realize that the other vehicle was not stopping. wanted to get out and enjoy a I knew I was in for a change, so I quickly prayed, "Lord, help us," Saturday afternoon we as my husband yelled, "Work air witnessed another quick change. bags, work!" They did. And in a

split second we all felt the force of the collision. Things can change so quickly. Laughter from the children was silenced. It seemed almost eerie. Then a few sobs broke out and I began to frantically ask about the conditions of my adorable boys and precious granddaughter. My mom was now on the floor of the van between the seats. I could see the children -- all were conscious and in their seats, but Mom hadn't fastened her seat belt. My heart. which was in my throat, began to beat rapidly. Mom had some bad scrapes and cuts and I very muchly feared more damage -- she is

My warm, fuzzy feelings from the morning had quickly turned into panic, fear, anxiety and now, pain. I wanted to get mother off the floor into a padded seat, but a strange and wild pain ran through my left arm every time I moved. My husband had blood on his hand and he couldn't move out of the now tighter constraints of the driver's area. The whole front end of the vehicle appeared to be around his feet. His calm demeanor was ever-present. In his soothing tenor he simply stated, "I can't get my door opened, but I think I'm fine."

The ghostly aura that hung over the accident scene now turned into hectic activity. Paramedics, emergency team members, and concerned friends scared away the spirits that seemed to lurk in the shadows and the faces of people whom I've come to call "friends" over the past several years were

Griffith and his wife of 38 years, Earlene, are members of the First Baptist Church where Dan teaches Sunday school. Earlene is a second grade teacher at Haskell. The Griffiths have three grown children, Kimberly, Danny and Andy, and seven grandchildren.
