EDITORIAL

BAIRD LEADS IN PLAN FOR MORE LAKES IN TEXAS

One way - perhaps the most effective way - to solve Texas' long-standing and now serious water-supply problem, would be to make Texas a land of lakes, like Maine or Minnesota.

That achievement is no idle dream, but a definite possibility, as a glance at the map will show. Even towns like Baird can have their individual water supply, as is about to be proven. For all the years since Baird was founded, it has been handicapped by an inadequate supply of water. The cry for the need of water was a regular as the long, dry summer months rolled around, until somebody decided upon a way to remedy the situation. Within only a few more days now, Baird people will see this plan unfold into a reality when the lake water system is completed.

The entire state could follow the plan set forth by Baird to practical advantage and with great success. To obtain all lakes required for its needs, this state has only to build enough reservoir dams where topography indicates that they would impound the most water at lowest

It is true that Baird's dam and pipeline and filteration plant has been costly, but even at this cost, more money has been spent trying to get water from the present water field. Once the lake system is completed, the reservoir will fill up as rapidly as the rains come, and will begin to pay for itself. There is already a good supply of water in the basin, and with a little rainfall, the town will have all it can use for a long time. The lake will supply water for domestic requirements of Baird first, then if there is more water than the town can use, the city might sell water to small industries that would locate here. With an abundance of water numerous small plants are due to rise hereabouts. Irrigated gardens will help to feed a greatly increased population and also support food industries. Watered lawns will help to beautify our homes and make Baird a garden spot where living is at the

As soon as the benefits of our lake begin to show on the town, other towns throughout the state will be using Baird as a pattern for their own development. Baird's plan is one in which all of our citizens may take justifiable pride.





Cut carrots in half lengthwise; arrange on bottom of greased 1½-qt. loaf pan. Mix rice, ½ cup mushroom soup, ½ cup milk, salt, pepper and onion. Press lightly on carrots in pan. Top with mixture of ham, crumbs, catsup, ½ cup milk and mustard. Bake in moderately slow oven (350) 1 hour, or until brown. Remove from oven; loosen sides of loaf with knife. Let stand 10 min. Heat rest of mushroom soup with water until steaming hot. Turn out loaf; serve with the mushroom sauce. Makes 4 servings.
