Munday kept its play off hopes alive by destroying Throckmorton 61 to 0 in district 9A competition last Friday night. The victory puts Munday at 3 wins against 1 loss in their race with the Aspermont Hornets, and sets up a Friday night showdown at Scruggs Field for the district championship. Munday must beat the Hornets by at least 3 points to advance to the play offs.

Munday received the opening kick off and Eric Beaty, filling in at tailback for the injured Brian Urbanczyk, piled up 115 yards rushing, scored two touchdowns, and kicked one extra point in just one quarter of play. Beaty's second touchdown in the first quarter came on a 53 yard gallop to the endzone as he broke tackles and threw off defenders like old overcoats. Urbanczyk, who saw limited action only in the first half due to a thigh bruise, capped the next Mogul drive with a 1 yard run for six. Chance Myers hit Beaty in the endzone for the 2 point PAT and the score climbed to 21 to 0 in the first quarter.

Edward Shields scored on back to back runs of 1 and 11 yards, and had 175 yards of rushing to lead the Moguls as they put up their best numbers of the season. Johnny

Dockins posted 110 yards rushing for the Moguls as Munday put three rushers in triple digits for the first time in a long time. Munday had a total of 35 first downs and the Mogul defense held the Greyhound offense to just 75 yards and 3 first downs. Throckmorton was

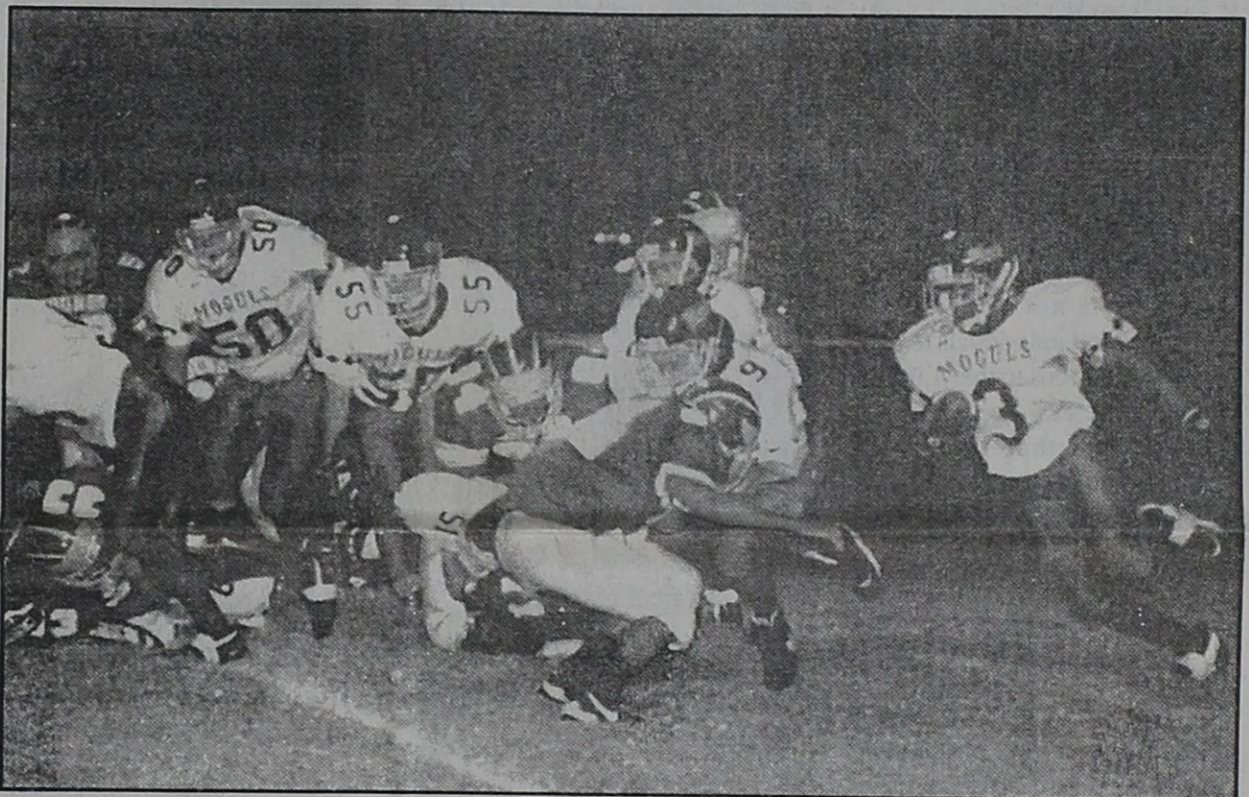
unable to gain even one first down in the second half as the Moguls totally dominated every aspect of the game. Chance Myers rushed for a total of 88 yards and was 6 for 13 passing for 69 yards and no touchdowns. Eric Beaty caught 2 Myers passes for 30 yards, Alan

Albus caught 1 for 14, Justin King had one reception for 12 yards, Chris Bibb caught 1 for 7, and Urbanczyk caught one for 6 yards. Offensively the Moguls put up 644 total yards.

Steve Gunter had words of praise for his team as they bounced back

handily from the disappointing loss to Paducah the prior week. "I was pleased with the way our first team drove the ball down to the endzone and scored. The second team just

The Purple Cloud Band from Munday High School began their preparations twelve weeks ago. Their marching exhibition was entitled "As Long As The Waters Flow" and featured music written by Steve Knight with drills designed by director Rodney Bennett. 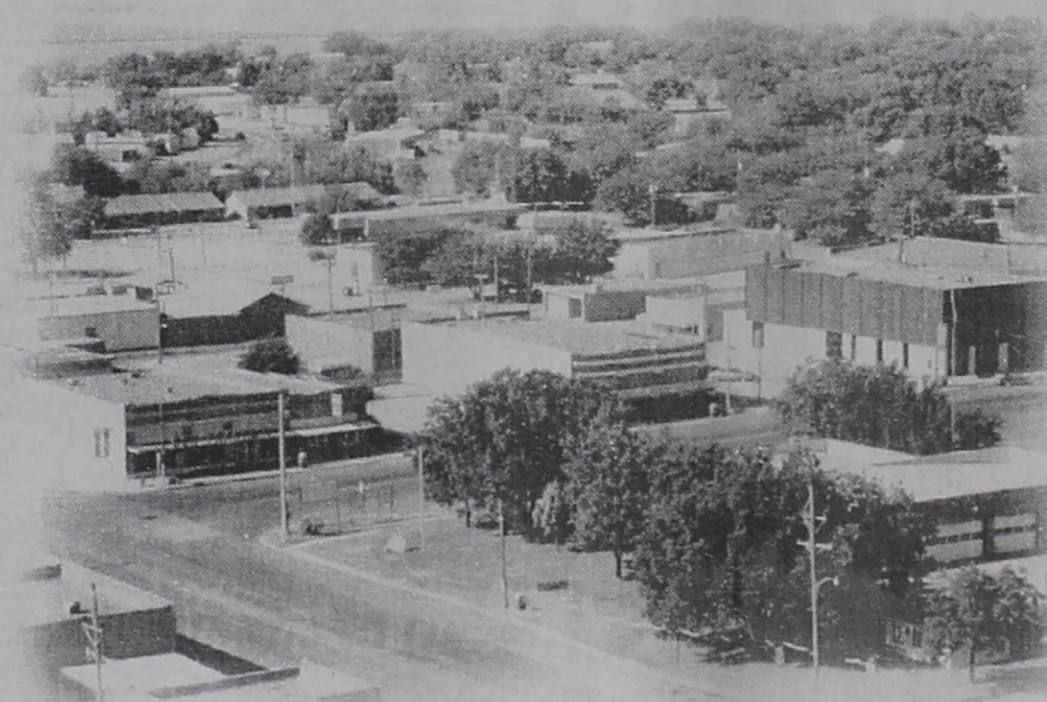

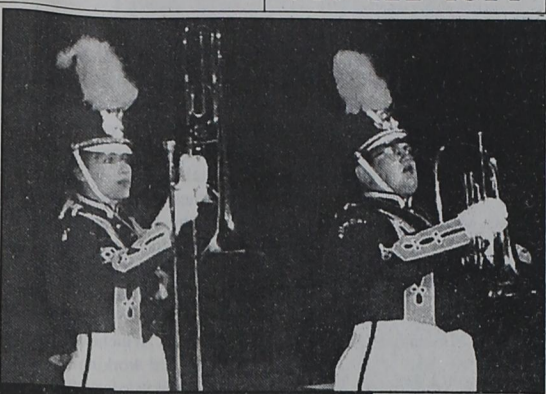

**Knox County Aging Services Receives Grant For Senior Citizens Nutritional Needs**

The Philip Morris Companies in partnership with the National Meals on Wheels Foundation offered a grant to communities that needed help with emergency nutritional needs for the homebound elderly. Penny Winchester and Sheri Baty worked with the Four Winds Resource Conservation and Development Area and the Knox County Aging Services in securing the grant for the distribution of shelf stable meals. Ms. Winchester stated that they started working on the grant in January of 1999. She is delighted to make the meals available to eligible citizens throughout the 851 square miles of Knox County.

The Knox County Aging Services is preparing for severe weather by providing self stable meals for all their home delivery clients. Wednesday, the staff of the central kitchen loaded the vans with hot meals for the day - plus a shelf stable meal to be used in case of inclement weather (such as icy road conditions or extreme cold). A second delivery of a shelf stable meal will be delivered in late December in case of any delivery problems due to Y2K shortages.

The nutrition staff, Jane Gideon, Jan Kilgore, and Sandra Garcia assisted in preparing the meals for delivery. Dorothy Carver and Lisa Rocha loaded the vans and made the actual deliveries to all persons on the home delivery routes.

This shelf stable meal is just one service provided through the Knox

County Aging Center. Area senior citizens are reminded that a warm welcome is extended to all to join the programs provided in Knox County.

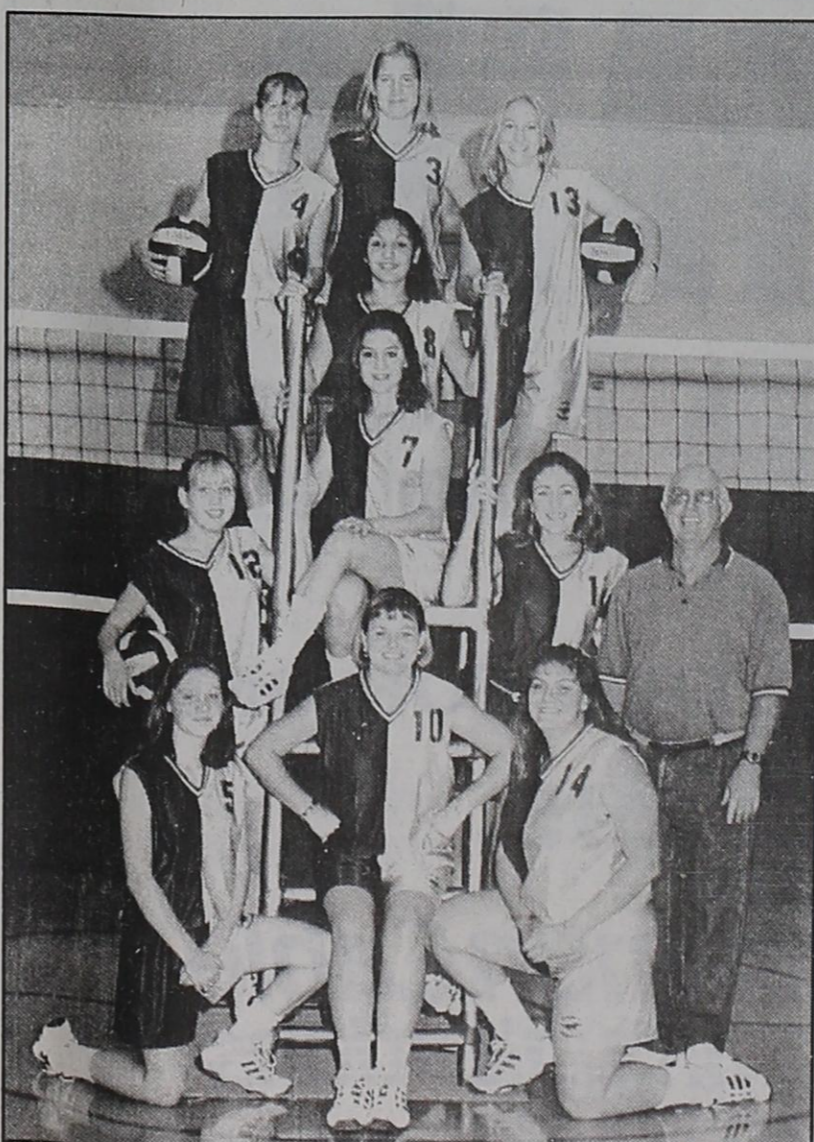

He sees being principal as a lonelier job simply because sometimes you can't please everyone and have to step on a few toes.

Kelly feels that a small percentage of students want to learn and the others just want to do what is necessary to pass.

Mrs. Longan, the Theatre Arts and Spanish teacher, has been teaching at Munday for 26 years. She attended college at MSU, Clarendon, and ACU. She was born in Seymour Hospital on December 22, 1951. She majored in theatre and minored in Spanish. She especially enjoys directing the One Act Play. Mrs. Longan would like to see more opportunities for art education in the future. She is interested in student results with the eight period day as well. She dislikes the standard over-reliance on test results and statistics to evaluate schools. Mrs. Longan believes "excellence breeds excellence" and strong performance in athletics and academics give confidence and challenge to the next students. Mrs. Longan has three daughters, Kacy, Andrea, and Kandis, one son, William, and a husband, Bill. She highly enjoys teaching at Munday High and she hopes to teach here for years to come.

Kendra Jo Williams was born on November 11, 1976 in Pampa, Texas. She went to Panhandle the first six weeks of kindergarten. The rest of her time was spent in Guthrie. With smaller classes, bad behavior diminishes and she finds more of a "want to learn" attitude. Also, having all the latest materials would help to teach easier methods. With all the adversities and controversies involved with being a teacher, Mrs. Bevel sustains a high profile in helping students achieve their most challenging goals.

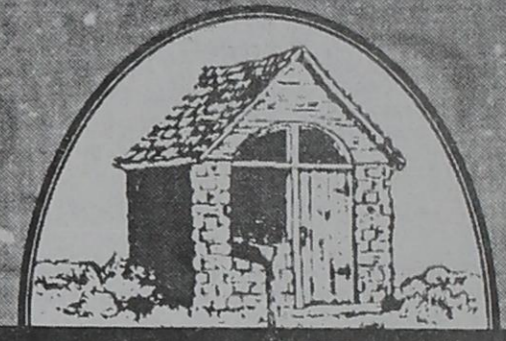

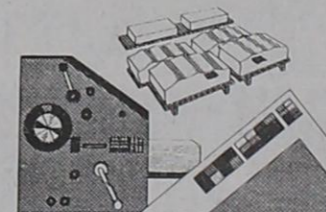

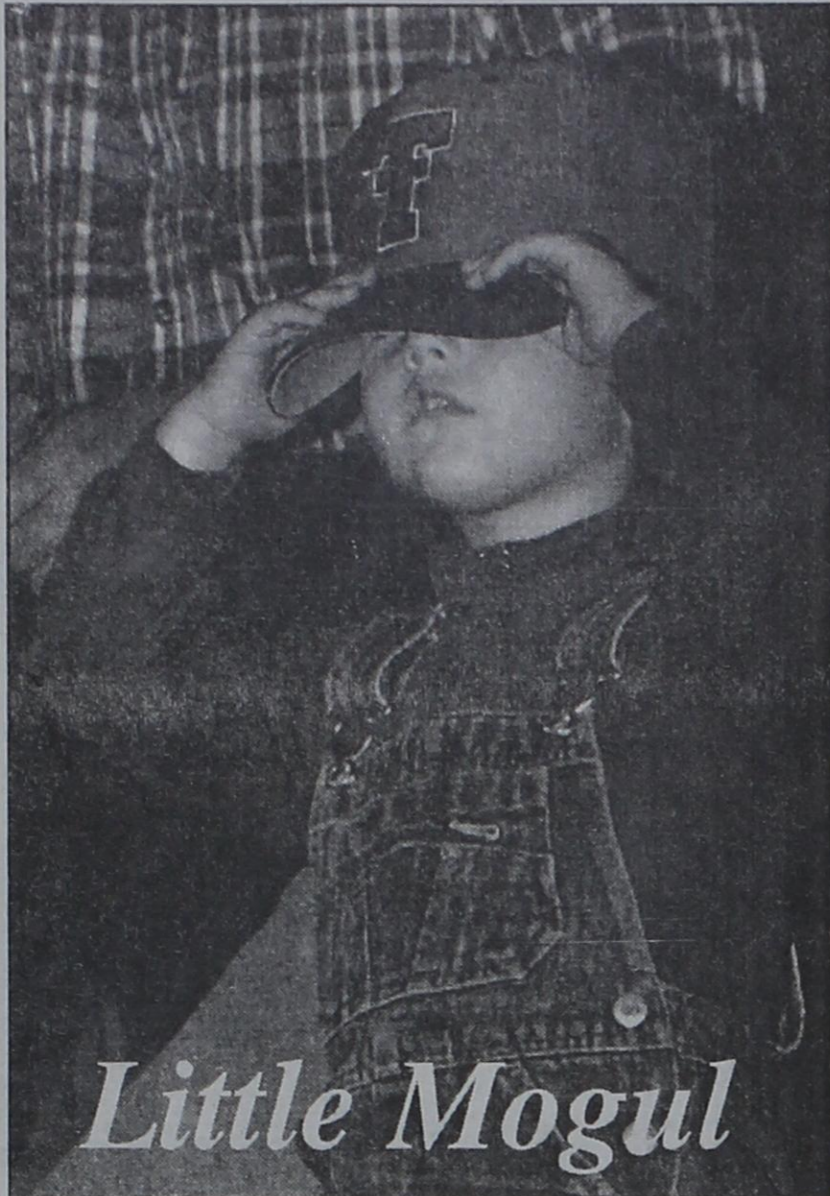
