During the past several months children at Munday's First United Methodist Church have been involved in some unique fund raising activities.

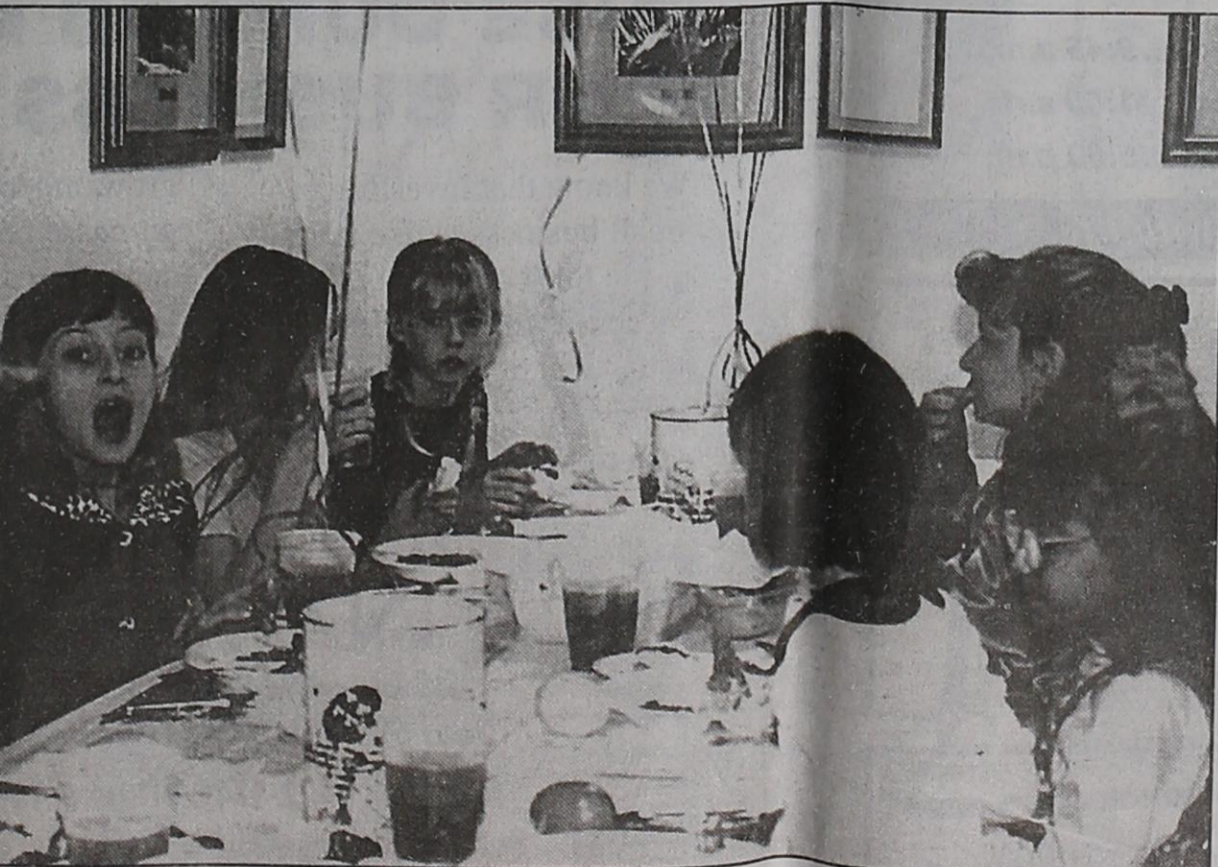
Under the leadership of their pastor, Mr. Bruce Parks, the children are learning the

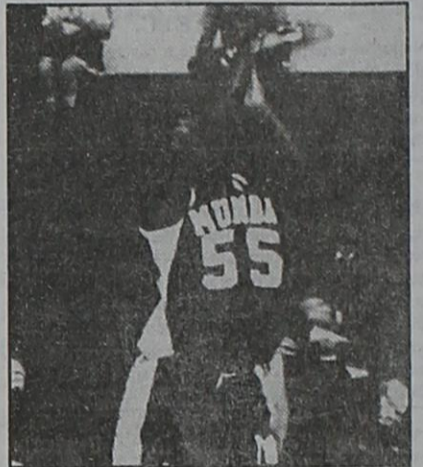
Munday Basketball Stand Outs Rake Up Honors

State Issues Report on Human Services

The state spent a total of \$2,638,999 last year for major welfare programs in Knox County, according to Barbara Evans, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$403,842 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) totaled \$80,462. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of potential clients and non-clients and issues the Lone Star Card.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of TANF to families where needy

Oldest Knox County Resident, Joseph Decker III, Dies at Age 106

The oldest Knox County resident has passed away at the age of 106. Joseph Decker III died Sunday, March 28, 1999 at a Wichita Falls Nursing Center where he had been residing for the past several years.

Mr. Decker was born in Manor, Texas on December 17, 1892 and had moved to Knox County in 1899.

He had married Clothilda Mary Hannig on November 21, 1922 in Rhineland, Texas. Mrs. Decker preceded her husband in death on June 7, 1982.

Mr. Decker was a veteran of World War I. He was a charter member of the Rhineland Chapter of The Knights of Columbus Council #1766 which formed in 1915. He had received his 75 year pin from the organization in 1990. Mr. Decker was a member of Saint Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland.

During his lifetime Mr. Decker had been a farmer and a bee keeper. He raised sheep and also Blue Andelosion chickens which won awards in area shows.

At the age of 102 Mr. Decker

was honored by being the Grand Marshal in the Centennial of Rhineland in 1995.

Survivors include three daughters, Mary Ann Morath of Wichita Falls, Texas, Dorothy Herring of Rhineland, Texas and Lillian Pennartz of Decatur, Texas; one sister, Rose Birkenfeld of Nazareth, Texas; one brother, Frank Decker of Albuquerque, New Mexico; 23 grandchildren; 38 great grandchildren; 7 great great grandchildren.

Rosary services for Joseph Decker, III were observed on Tuesday at 7:00 p.m. at McCauley-Smith Funeral Home in Munday with Mass observed on Wednesday, March 31, 1999 at 11:00 a.m. at Saint Joseph's Catholic Church in Rhineland. 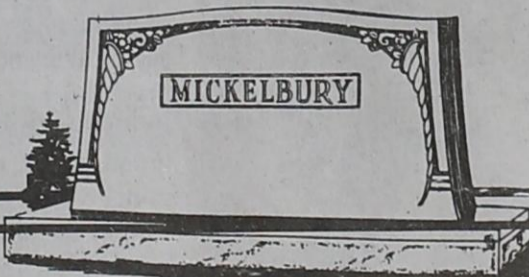
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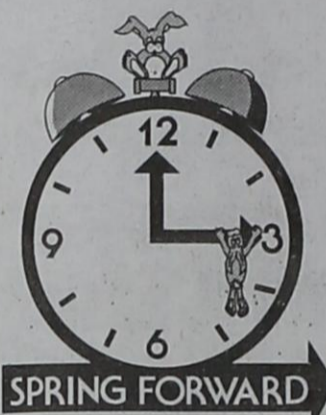

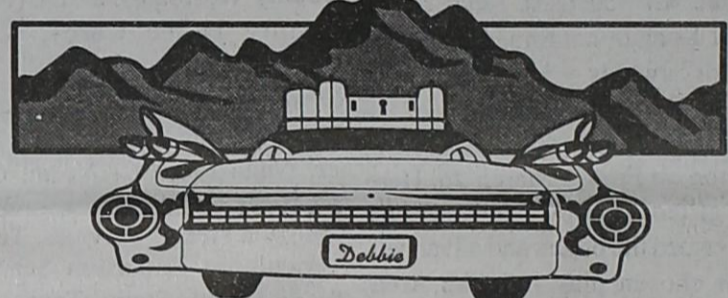

Immunization Clinic Slated For This Thursday, April 1

The Texas Department of Health will be conducting an Immunization Clinic at the Perry Patton Community Center in Munday on Thursday, April 1 from 10:00 - 11:30 p.m. and 1:00 - 3:00 a.m.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations. The Hepatitis B immunization was required for kindergarten entry in the fall of 1998. This immunization series consists of three injections taking a minimum of six months to complete. The Hepatitis B immunization is also available for any child at risk or any child whose parents wish them to have for protection or prevention. The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine has arrived at the office and is now being given to 12 month olds through 15 year olds. If you are interested in more information on the varicella, please call the office. Please bring immunization records and social security numbers with you to the clinic. A parent, adult family member or legal guardian must accompany a minor.

Also, last Tuesday in the Knox County District Court, Rohn Kingston, 27, of Abilene, plead guilty to the felony offense of Injury to a Child and according to a plea bargain agreement, he was given a five-year probated sentence by District Judge David Hajek.

Large crowd attends March 23 Parenting Fair

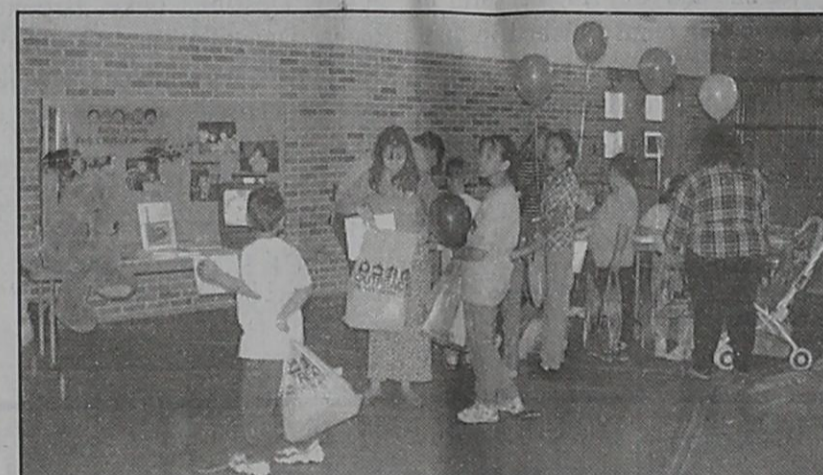

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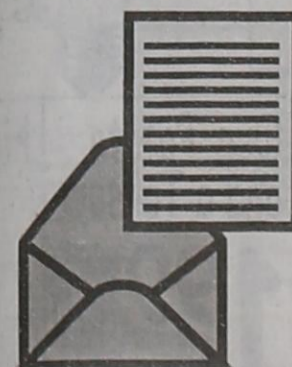
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Volunteers Gearing Up for Cancer Socieity Drive

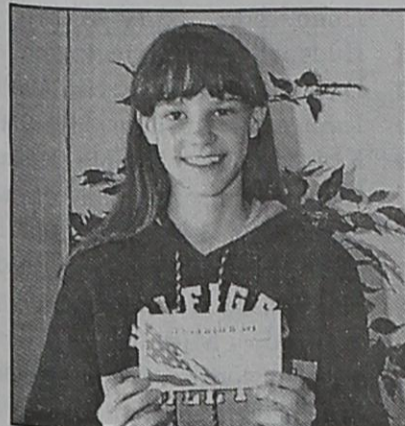
read, "Wouldn't you hate to start life out as a punching bag?"

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Knox County Now On Quarantine List for Africanized Honey Bees

Knox County has been added to the state quarantine restricting the movement of commercial bee operations following the detection of Africanized honey bees here.

The addition of Knox County makes 110 counties in Texas now quarantined for Africanized honey bees, according to Paul Jackson, Chief Inspector for the Texas Apiary Inspection Service, a unit of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Jackson said this is the time of year that honey bees are active and more likely to be seen. Two counties in Texas were quarantined earlier this month and rainfall around the state will promote flower blooming which leads to increased bee activity. Some areas of the state remain critically dry, however.

A wild colony of bees was found in a building on land about 8 miles northeast of Knox City. Jackson said no one was stung by the bees.

Bees were collected and sent to Texas A & M's Honey Bee Identification Lab where they were confirmed as Africanized.

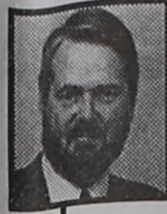
State bee inspectors continue to monitor a series of bee traplines that extend across the state from Louisiana to New Mexico. The Africanized bee was first detected entering the United States near Brownsville in October 1990. Since then, the bee has spread through much of the state, along a line roughly from south of Houston to south of Lubbock to El Paso. Africanized honey bees also have been found in Arizona, California and New Mexico.

The quarantine allows beekeepers to move bee hives within but not out of the zone in an effort to prevent assisting the spread. Africanized honey bees look just like regular domestic honey bees but are more defensive in protecting their hives.

Minding Your Own Business

At the Front of the Pack: The Art of Leadership

If you think you're a born leader, but have no followers, you may just be taking a walk.

- a paraphrased proverb

Many people talk about leadership; few really know what it is. Many set out to become great leaders, but few accomplish the task.

For those of you who would like to develop your leadership skills, I offer these words of wisdom. I gleaned them from some great resources, which I list at the end of this column.

Leadership Characteristics

• **Leaders Are Laborers Worthy of Their Hire.** A leader is one who "shows the way," "marks the course for others" and "guides by example." Leaders can expect no more effort from their followers than they put forth personally. Leaders love to labor and they love their labor.

• **Leaders Are Earnest.** The word earnest means to be "serious and intense," "zealous and sincere" and "focused on the most important matters." One of the great characteristics of leadership may be the ability to discern what is important that needs attention, and what is trivial that can be ignored.

• **Leaders Maintain Positive Attitudes.** As I grow older, I become more convinced that maintaining a positive attitude is critical to personal success. I am also convinced that it is easy to maintain a good attitude simply by following the advice found in Philippians 4:8.

• **Leaders Are Diligent.** The word diligent describes those who are "hardworking," those who work with "careful, steady effort" and those who are "dependable and steadfast." Great leaders from history have demanded diligence from those around them. They got it because they set the example with their own diligence.

• **Leaders Are Filled With Enthusiasm.** W. Clement Stone described enthusiasm as "inspiration to action." Leaders are inspired to act. And they inspire action in others. When people are filled with excitement they talk. When they are filled with enthusiasm they act. Actions have always spoken louder than words and produced more results.

• **Leaders are Responsible.** I've noticed that difficult tasks tend to move toward those who are willing to do them. Personal growth comes from exercising your will to accomplish, and accepting the responsibility for getting it done. Harry Truman had a sign on his desk that read, "The buck stops here."

• **Leaders are Self-confident.** I believe there is a direct link between confidence and capacity. As you grow in the assurance of your abilities you acquire the capacity to achieve more. More than 2,000 years ago, Publius Vergilius Maro - the Roman poet better known as Virgil - wrote: "They can do all because they think they can."

• **Leaders are Humble.** All great leaders give credit to others. Alexander Pope wrote "Who builds a church to God and not to fame, will never mark the marble with his name." I might add that the more you blow your own whistle the more likely you are to run out of steam.

• **Leaders have Integrity.** To me integrity is "the quality of sound moral principles," "dealing with honesty and sincerity" and "avoiding spin, lies, and strategic omissions." Remember this: Truth is eternal, lies are temporary. A friend in the insurance business says that honesty is the only policy, but there aren't nearly enough policyholders.

• **Leaders Prioritize Their Lives.** Leaders work on the most important tasks first. Their lives are structured around their most important priorities. Matthew 6:33 offers great advice in the area. When your priorities are right, living is great.

The following books provide many great leadership examples and further direction: "The Bible," "Developing the Leader Within You" by John C. Maxwell and "The Book of Leadership Wisdom," by various business leaders.

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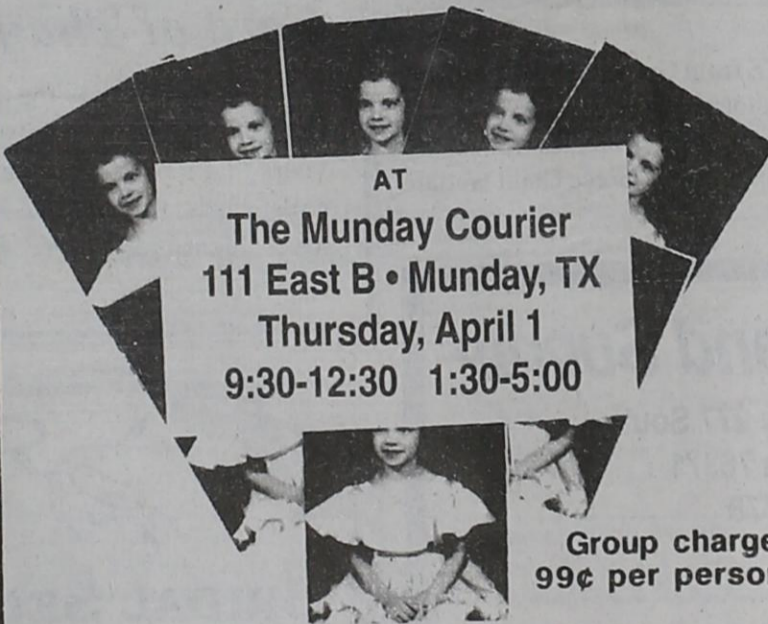

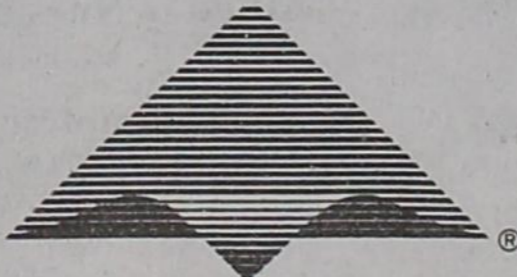
