Local military families exhibit support and concern during Operation Iraqi Freedom

The realities of war and the images spread across newspapers and TV screens throughout the world have a direct impact on many families in the area. A large group of men and women from Munday and Knox County, or those who have ties to the area, are currently serving our country both at home and abroad.

For Gayle Morgan, her daughter Elaina Mathis, and Elaina's young son Cody Reece, the present days are tension filled but those stresses will probably increase dramatically with the deployment of family members to the Persian Gulf area.

First Lieutenant Jayson Morgan is currently assigned to duty at Fort Hood, Texas. He is a Field Artillery Officer and a platoon and battalion leader in the First Cavalry. Morgan, who is 29 years old, has orders to deploy to Central Command of the Area of Responsibility to participate in the war on terrorism. He will be serving somewhere in the Persian Gulf in the near future. Jayson and his wife have one child and one on the way.

His brother, Tony, is a Specialist First Class currently attending Advanced Individual Training at Fort Bragg. He is a member of the Army Reserves. While Morgan is uncertain about his orders once he finishes A.I.T. it is possible that he will be

deployed to the Persian Gulf. Tony is a police officer in Wichita Falls. He and his wife have two children.

For young Cody Reece the future of his father's assignment is uncertain. Sergeant First Class Ronnie Reece serves with the 490th Civil Affairs in Abilene. He has been deployed to Fort Bragg for training and then will travel to the Persian Gulf. There he will be responsible for bringing food, clothing, and medications to refugees and to help them rebuild schools, hospitals, and other destroyed buildings once the actual fighting is over. Reece also served in Bosnia.

While all family members are currently stateside Morgan, Mathis and Reece remain staunchly in support of the troops that are fighting overseas and are filled with pride and gratitude for those individuals.

"I feel that the war with Iraq is justified but I still don't like having my child or anyone else's child in that kind of danger. I know my sons are trained and they have worked hard to learn to protect us and that this is their job," says the mother of the two military members, Gayle Morgan. "I'm immensely proud of both of them and I am equally proud of Cody's dad. They are strong individuals with determination."

For Cody's mother Elaina, one of the hardest things is to help her young son cope. "I try to explain to Cody how and why this is happening and what our goal is. I try to explain that we are a free people but the people in Iraq aren't and that we want to help give them their freedom." Mathis also allows Cody to watch some of the new coverage in an effort to help him understand. "I do try to monitor what he watches and I also try to answer his questions," says Mathis.

Both Morgan and Mathis feel compelled to watch the extensive television news coverage. "I don't want to watch it but I feel like I have to. I find myself watching it a lot," says Morgan.

Morgan also has mixed feelings about the protests that have been staged in the United States. "I can understand how someone can be against the war but I think we ought to support our troops now that we are involved," she says.

The Greenwood family also

proudly supports three family members who serve in the armed forces.

N.C.1 Joel Greenwood, Naval Reserve Recruiter, is presently serving at the naval base in Tucson, Arizona.

Specialist Joseph Greenwood, HHB 214th Field Artillery Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division of the United States Army and LCPL Robert Greenwood, with the 1st Marine Division HMM-161 are both currently serving in Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Joel is the son of Tommy and Joyce Greenwood of Goree while Joseph and Bobby are Joel's sons.

Joey Greenwood states that her most prevalent worry is that her grandsons may be taken as POW's. "When I hear on television that more of our soldiers have been taken prisoner I just watch and wait until I hear more."

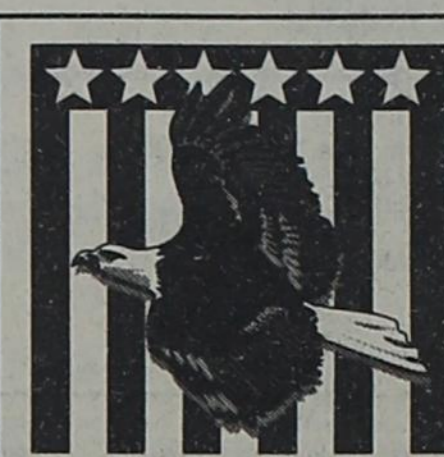
Greenwood and other members of her family are also riveted to their television sets. "We watch the coverage almost constantly," she says. "It give us a sense of being able to know where they are and it helps us feel like we're in touch with what they are going through."

Greenwood also notes that on Monday evening of this week that Joey was able to use a satellite tele-

phone to get in touch with his father in Arizona. He told his father that the citizens there were extremely poverty ridden. He also noted that one youngster had approached his vehicle asking for food. When the young soldier willingly offered him a ration the Iraqi youth tried to offer him the sandals on his feet in return. Joey also explained that the sandstorms in West Texas are simple breezes compared to the storm that has been pounding the gulf region this week.

Greenwood also has mixed feelings about the anti-war protests that are being staged in this country. "Sometimes I resent that I have two kids over there fighting for their rights to carry placards and put down our country. I understand it's their right but I don't appreciate that I have two in harms way who are also protecting them," she says. "I felt like this war was necessary because if we had waited any longer it could have been devastating to our country - I believe that regime would have turned on us."

Can you imagine a world in which there are no cell phones, cable TV, football bowl sponsors or reality shows? You know what? Just a few short years ago we managed just fine getting along without any of them. Remember?

There was actually time to THINK while you were driving to work. There was actually time to PLAN your next phone call. There was actually time to REFLECT on yesterday's happenings. There was actually time to WONDER about what would happen next weekend. There was actually time to CONSIDER how to approach your next client. And you know what? It wasn't all that long ago.

But here we are in the heralded information age. Some actually argue that information equals power. Well, not necessarily. That fact is: everyone receives the same information, so that makes us all even again, doesn't it?

My pet peeve is the cell phone. Okay, I'll admit that I use it too. After all, it's become a necessity, hasn't it? Or has it? Too many are using the contraction even when it's not necessary--like at lunch, or while shopping, or while driving. How in the world did we exist before? Just fine, thank you.

Or how about cable television? Remember when all the TV stations (two or three of them) signed off at midnight--and played the national anthem? Have you watched late night cable TV lately? It's mostly a time filler.

You gotta feel sorry for cable news stations. Can you imagine how difficult it must be to fill 24 hours with news that can be shared in ten minutes? They cram the same old stuff down our throats over and over. And the weather station? Now it's possible to issue the wrong forecasts even more frequently

than before.

Then, there's "reality" shows. Most sane viewers--if they exist--realize that reality shows aren't really REAL. After all, if they were real, there wouldn't be TV cameras all over the place, would there be? They remind me of riots, protest marches and the Today Show--anything for 15 minutes of fame. Just how much information does one need? Not as much as one receives every day--and every night. I believe that information overload is a major contribution to creating stress in our lives.

So when the cable company tells you that 300 channels are absolutely imperative (instead of the mere 80 channels that you now have), give it some real THOUGHT, REFLECTION, WONDER, PLANNING and CONSIDERATION.

Capitol Highlights

More state agencies could end up on chopping block

AUSTIN — With bomb-sniffing dogs and their handlers circling the building and metal detectors inside the main entrances, the business of state government continues inside the Capitol as the 78th Legislature deals with issues of money and law. To cope with the ongoing budget issue, lawmakers are continuing to look at strategies to reshape the state bureaucracy.

Rep. David Swinford, R-Dumas, has said that every state agency needs to be looked at by the Legislature so that members can find and remove overlapping efforts. Several agencies currently expending tax dollars may find themselves eliminated or folded into other agencies by the end of the session on June 2. Swinford's House Bill 2, drafted vaguely so that committee action can sort out a plan, is expected to eventually enable many of the suggestions for improved state government efficiency discussed earlier in the session.

Among those are merging the Texas Railroad Commission into the Public Utility Commission and eliminating the Texas Department of Economic Development. The state's Aircraft Pooling Board also may find itself in a nosedive from which it does not recover. One of the better quotes from last week came from Swinford:

"If you look at all the bills filed every session, you'll find half of them are assigning some little goofy deal for some state agency to carry out. By doing that, these agencies keep picking up duties that have nothing whatsoever to do with their core functions."

One Texas brag we'd never want...

Every Texan knows Texas is a big state, but the non-profit organization Population Research Institute has concluded that the entire world population could be accommodated inside Texas --with plenty of elbow room for everyone. Texas has about 262,000 square miles, and with the world's population at more than 6 billion people, the institute calculated that each resident of the world could still have 1,217 square feet in Texas. A family of five

would get 6,085 square feet.

With demographers estimating that Texas will have nearly 34 million residents (we have 21 million today) by 2030, the institute's figures don't make that projection seem quite as crowded.

TAKS test scores are in...

Whoever reached the conclusion that all the world's population could be squeezed into the Lone Star State had to use math to get there. Making that sort of calculation may not be much beyond the abilities of the average third grader.

The Texas Education Agency has announced preliminary results showing that 89 percent of the third-graders who took their first required knowledge assessment tests earlier this month passed. Called the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills, the test has to be passed before a child can move on to fourth grade. TEA had predicted that 85 percent of the children would pass the English version of the test and that 73 percent would ace the Spanish version. As it was, 82 percent of the children passed the test in Spanish.

One percentage that doesn't seem quite as impressive: To pass the test, students must get 56 percent of the answers right. (Back when dinosaurs roamed the earth and most school administrators were taking tests, a 56 on a test translated into a big, fat, red F.) An effort was made last year to set the passing level at 67 percent, but it didn't get anywhere. The bar is expected to be raised for future tests.

Longtime lawmaker dies...

Rep. Irma Rangel, 71, died of brain cancer in Austin on March 18. The Kingsville lawmaker was the first Mexican-American woman elected to the Texas House of Representatives. The South Texas Democrat had been a member of the House since 1977. Gov. Rick Perry will set a special election date for Rangel's now-vacant District 43, which extends from Kingsville to the Rio Grande.

A prayer for wisdom to be given to the people in charge could work wonders. Requests for the safe deliverance of particular individuals is important. That request can be extended to all participants without violating the privilege. Every prayer request should be based on the understanding that God's will be done. You can ask that the Lord deliver you from the temptation to hate or vilify your enemy. We can be champions of righteousness, and bold enough to ask for lasting peace and security. We can do all of the above, but we have to be willing to ask. Prayers are only effective if prayed. Have you prayed today?

These times call for urgent prayer. **PRAY FOR ANY MILITARY PERSONEL YOU KNOW PERSONALLY:** Every individual serving our country deserves to be reassured of our support and love. The only real influence we can have from far away is through prayer. **PRAY FOR MILITARY PERSONEL WHO ARE OTHERWISE UNKNOWN TO YOU:** It is very important for us to support soldiers, sailors, and marines whether we know them personally or not. Check the local newspaper, or regional papers which will be publishing lists of personnel. **PRAY FOR THE FAMILIES OF THOSE SERVING IN THE MILITARY:** Those who are in the middle of the action may actually feel less anxiety than those left at home who love them. **PRAY FOR THE LEADERS OF ALL GOVERNMENTS INVOLVED:** To influence the decisions of these leaders would otherwise be almost impossible for us, but prayer is powerful. Pray that wisdom and good sense be their guides. **PRAY FOR THE SOLDIERS ON BOTH SIDES:** It is difficult for us to pray for our enemies, but the Lord has commanded us to do so. **PRAY FOR THE FUTURE EVENTS WHICH WILL FOLLOW ACTUAL COMBAT:** Everyone involved in the aftermath of war will need discernment, wisdom, courage, and strength. **PRAY FOR YOURSELF:** All of us will need help coping with the effects of war. Loss, grief, guilt, economic results, and a changed society will affect us all. **PRAY FOR OUR COMMUNITY:** We may not recognize our own needs and the effects that the war will have on us. We sincerely hope that this community will not suffer any more direct losses, but we will all suffer something. Look out for the signs that your neighbor may need some special attention. After all, we do belong to one another. **WHATEVER YOU PRAY FOR, DO NOT FORGET TO PRAY!**

What Do Deflation and Inflation Mean to Investors?

During the course of our lives, we've become accustomed to inflation - a constant trend of rising prices. During some periods, such as the late 1970s, inflation was strong. But for the last several years, inflation has been mild. Now, however, some - but not all - economists think we may be entering a period of deflation, in which supply outstrips demand, causing prices to fall. As an investor, what would this mean to you? Or should the economic environment make any difference in your investment strategy?

There's no simple answer. But keep in mind that things can change. In 2003, inflation is low enough to make people start thinking about deflation. And yet, you're not investing for just this year - you're investing to achieve goals that are 10, 15 or 20 years down the road. During the intervening years, the inflation/deflation situation could change markedly. Nonetheless, you'll want to at least consider the effects of inflation or deflation on potential investments - so keep a few things in mind:

One stocks have significantly outpaced inflation - In looking back over the 75 years from 1926 through 2001, you'll find that stocks were the only financial asset to keep investors significantly ahead of inflation. When inflation is factored in, common stocks brought an annual average return of 7.73 percent, compared to 2.18 percent for long-term government bonds and just 0.71 percent for Treasury bills, according to the investment research firm Ibbotson Associates. While the past performance of all these investments is no guarantee of future results, history suggests that you'll need some exposure to stocks if you're going to preserve your purchasing power.

Cash becomes more valuable during deflationary times - When prices are rising, you can borrow with the knowledge that you'll be paying off your debt in tomorrow's cheaper dollars. On the other hand, if prices are falling, you're better off delaying purchases rather than buying on credit. Quite simply, as prices drop, cash becomes more valuable. So, if inflation remains low, or if we enter a truly deflationary period, your money market accounts take on more value than they would in times of inflation. Keep in mind, though, that you won't want your portfolio to become overly "cash-heavy." You'll still need growth to achieve your financial goals - so, once again, you need to own stocks.

Deflation may affect stocks and bonds differently - If inflation declines significantly, or becomes deflation, interest rates will fall - which means bond prices will rise. Conversely, falling prices of goods and services typically translate into falling profits for businesses - and that's obviously not good for stock prices. Yet, you certainly don't want to overreact by selling off a large percentage of your stocks. Instead, strive to build a diversified portfolio containing stocks and bonds - as well as government securities, CDs and money market accounts.

When you invest, don't forget about the effects of inflation or deflation - but don't get hung up on them, either. The tried-and-true keys to investment success - diversification, quality and value 3/4 will hold up if prices are going up, down or staying the same.

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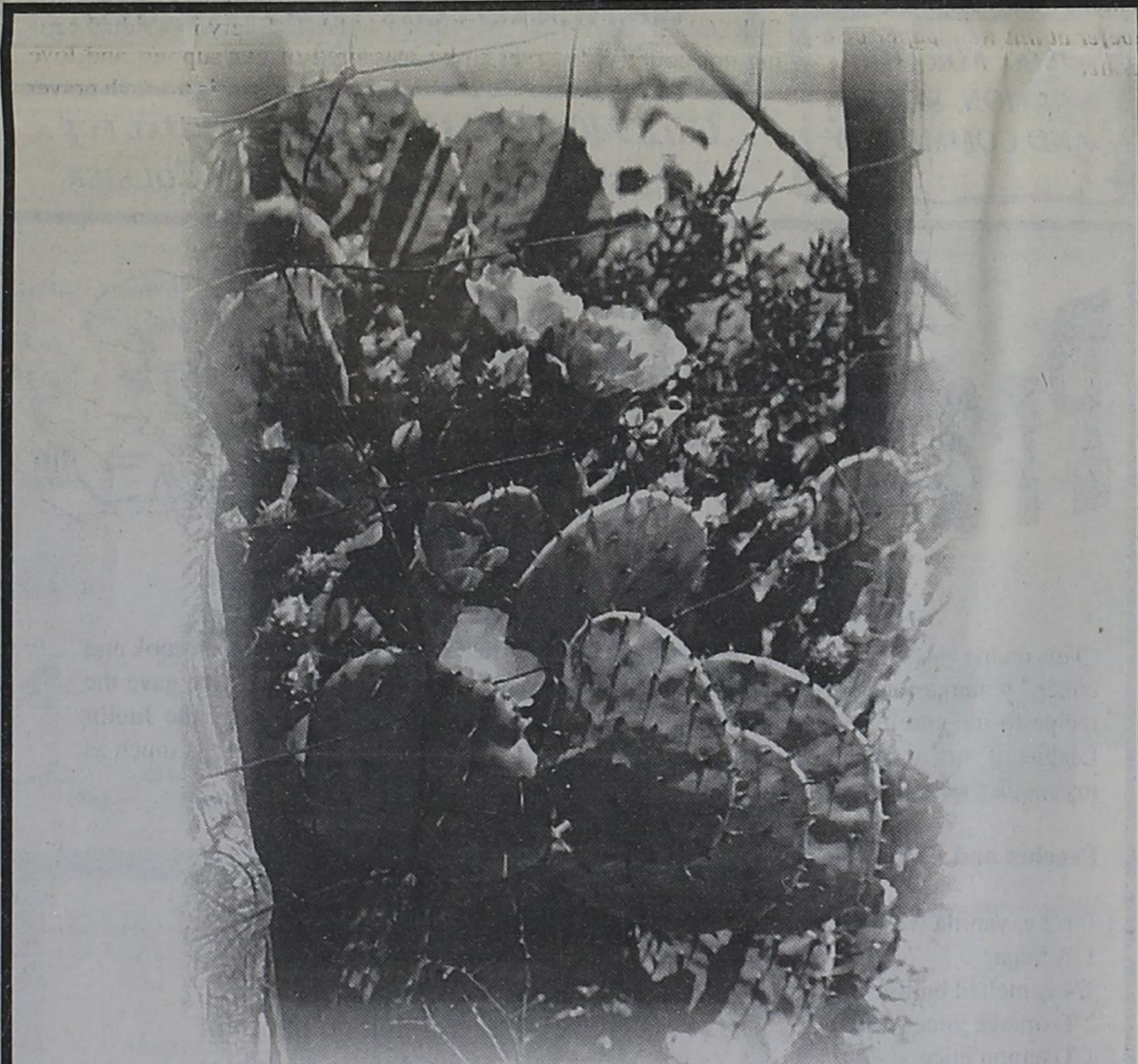

 - 3 peaches, peeled and sliced.



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

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


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Reminisce & Remember

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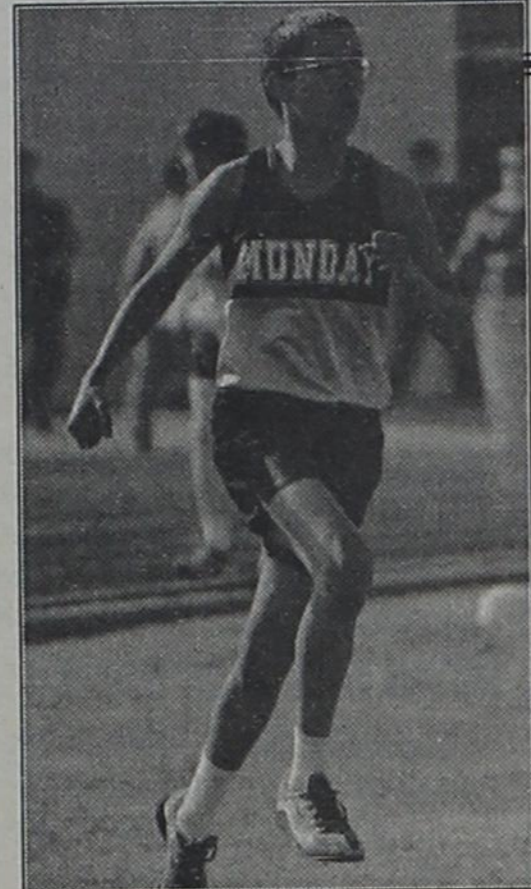

The proposed rates are expected to produce a \$357,845 or a 10.27 percent increase in the Company's annual revenues from residential, commercial and industrial enviros customers in the West Region Distribution System. 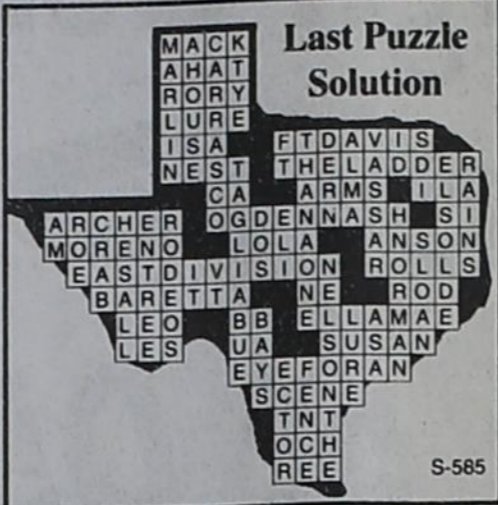

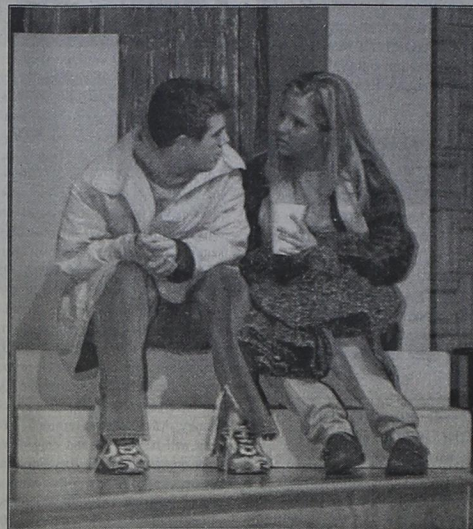
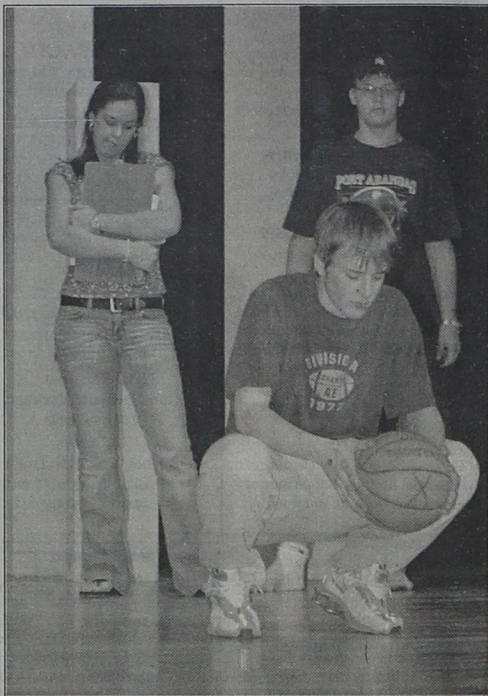
