## Hearing on Highway Widening To Be Held This Thursday

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will be holding a public hearing on Thursday, June 8, 2000 at 6:30 p.m. at the Perry Patton Community Center 131 West Cisco, Munday, tx. This hearing is being held in regards to the widening of U.S. Highway 277. TxDOT proposes to widen the highway from 2 lane to 4 lanes and it will be divided by a median. This

will require an additional amount of right of way, ranging from 100 ft. to 400 ft. Currently the right of way varies, but is generally 100 feet. There is also a potential of the relocation of 4 businesses and 12 residential homes, as well. TxDOT would like to invite all citizens who are interested to attend this hearing. Comments concerning this project can be pre-

sented at the hearing or in writing to David B. Casteel, P.O. Box 900, Childress, TX 79201, or Gary Mizer, Munday Area engineer, P.O. Box 349, Munday, TX 76371. standouts including Sneezzy Beltran from Abilene High and Zach Hunter from Aspermont was not enough to stop the rough and

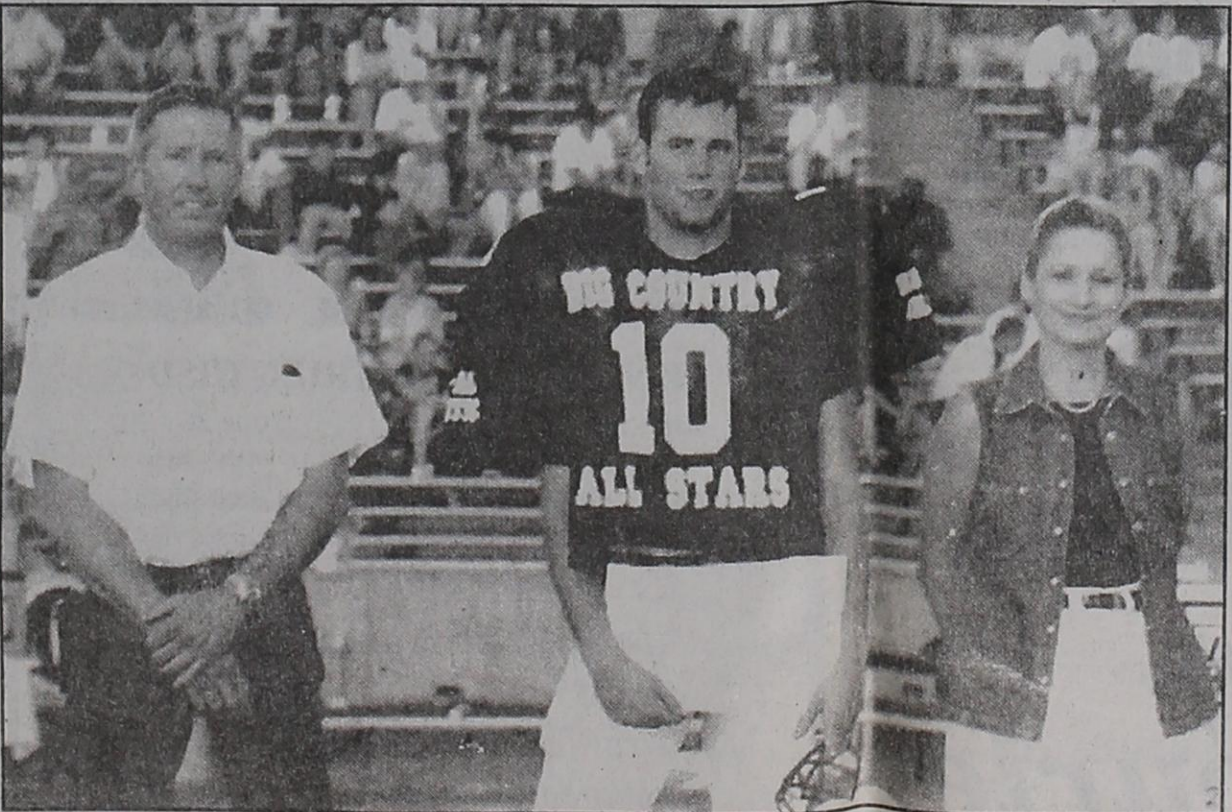
tumble opportunistic South All Stars as they took the inaugural Big Country Classic by the score 21 to 6.

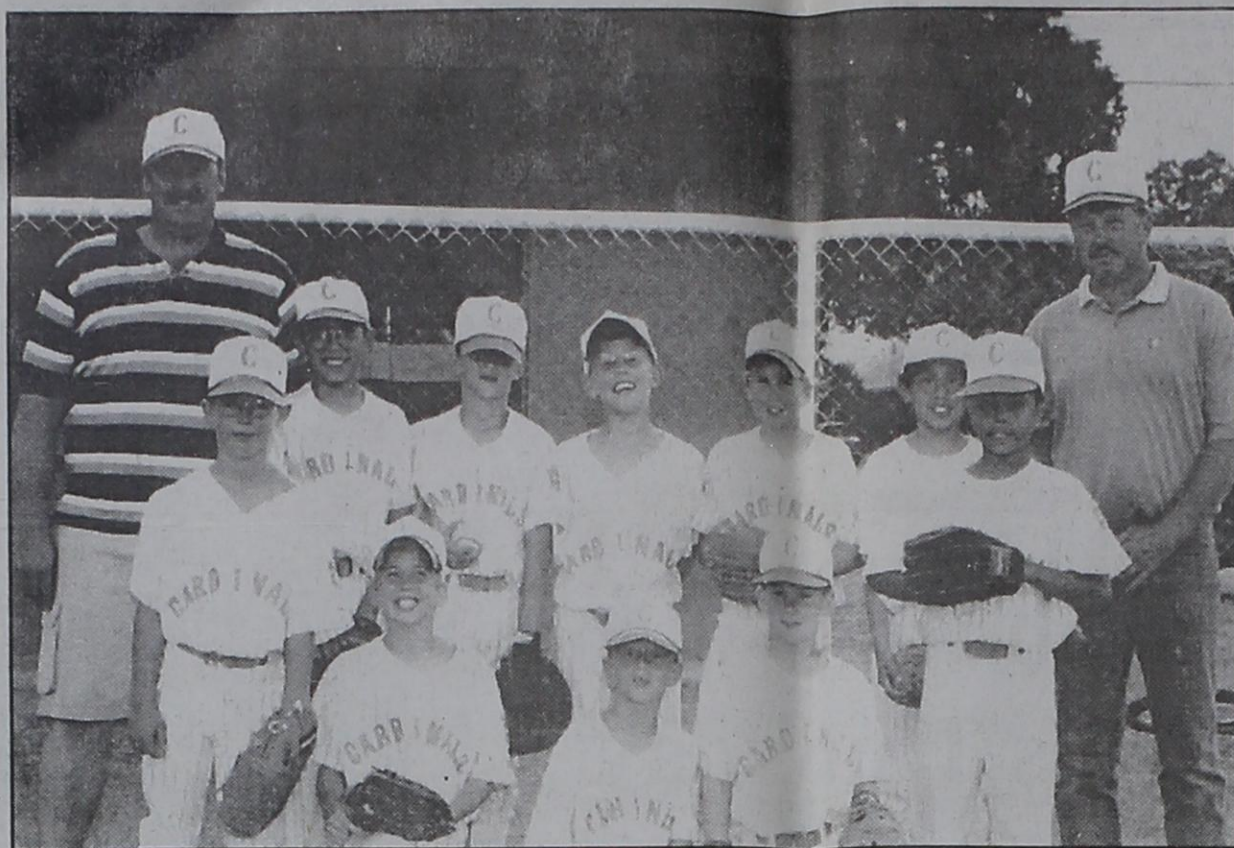

Girls who are interested may pick up a registration form at the U-Turn before the deadline on June 21st.

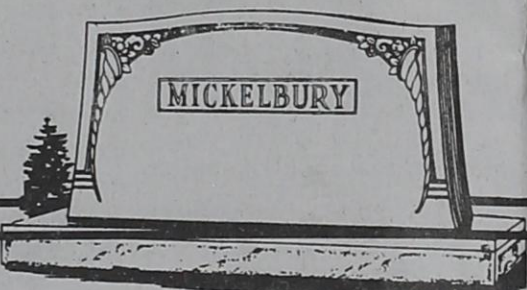

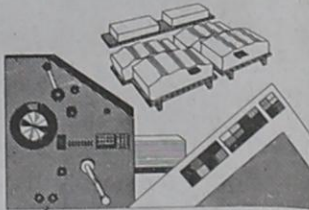

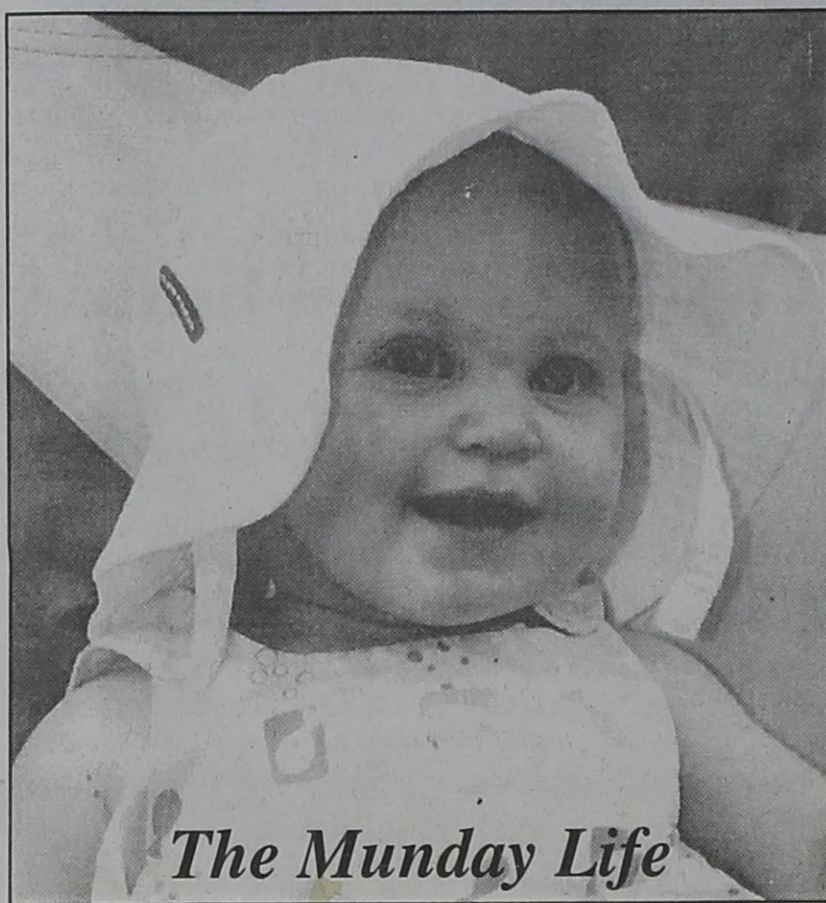

## Helpful Hints For Making Your Garage Sale A Winner

Thinking about having a garage sale to accumulate extra funds? There's still plenty of time to prepare for the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture's City-Wide Garage Sale Day. Saturday, June 10th, should be a great day for bargain hunters in Munday - don't be left out - get your "stuff" ready now!

By listing your garage sale with the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture you can increase your chances of having a successful sale. The Chamber charges a \$5.00 fee to list your sale with the advantages of doing so are many. First, the Chamber advertises City-Wide Garage Sale Day in all the area newspapers. These listings in a large number of bargain hunters that could end up at your sale and add to your "funds." The Chamber relies on entry fees to be able to pay for the advertising advantages and also helps insure that other City-Wide Garage Sale events take place next year. Second, the Chamber hands out detailed lists of all garage sales being staged the day of the event. Shoppers can determine which sales are the most enticing to them and then locate them on the map. By signing up with The Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture you can be certain that your sale will be included on the map handed out to eager shoppers and you can also reap the benefits from the advertising carried out by The Chamber.

Start to organize your sale now by gathering unwanted items. Clean out closets, dressers, garages, and storage buildings. Don't leave anything untouched - some-

times the things that are "hot tickets" are the items that you never expected would sell.

Group the items in categories as you prepare them for the sale. This will help you when you transport them from their stored position to the actual site of the sale. It will also help you visualize what you have to offer and you can then "map" out your sales spot. Clean all items to remove unwanted dirt and grime. The better looking the piece - the faster it will sell. Bundle items as sets: cutlery with napkins, flowerpots with garden tools, a set of beaded fruits in a wire basket. Small items like jewelry or buttons work well in zip lock bags. Test appliances and say on the tag whether they work. Attractive displays will help your cause.

If possible wash and mend clothing. You can then put them on hangers for easier management. A table of small clothing items sometimes works well but dresses, mens shirts, and slacks usually do better hanging up where the shopper can more readily inspect them.

When tagging sale amounts on items you may want to try the adhesive type stickers for glass items, toys, books, and other hard objects. These types of stickers sometimes do not work well on clothing. Stringed tags usually work better for these and can be attached through belt loops, button holes, or around the wire hangers.

A checkout table with newspapers and bags for wrapping, scissors, tape, calculator, pencils, scratch paper, and a cash box needs to be located in an area where shoppers cannot escape. Remember to prime your cash box with approximately \$50 in small bills and coins for making change. Save the tags when you check out a customer so that you can tally your end results. In the case of a multi-family sale try using one color tag for each family or mark the items with a different colored sharpie for each family.

While garage sales require some effort to organize and hold they usually help you clear out unwanted items and can cause you pocketbook to become a little thicker. Proceeds can help make your summer happier or help you purchase something new that you've had your eye on!

Garage sales may also be a great way to get your children involved in cleaning out their closets. By offering them the proceeds on their items they may well depart with that broken action figure that never gets much attention!

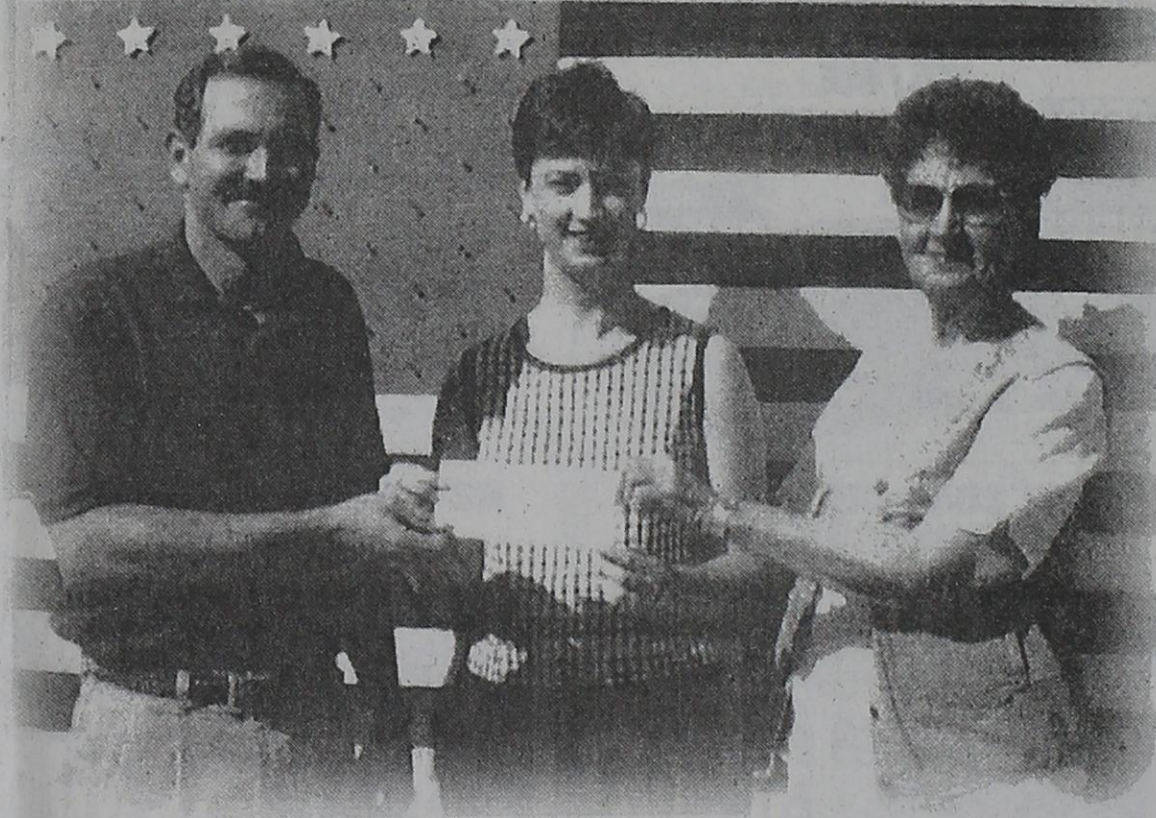




### I Love My Flag and what it Stands For

Every morning from first grade through senior high, my school day began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag. I know it's old fashioned and politically incorrect, but I believe we would have fewer problems in our schools today if more of our educational focus was on the blessings of God and country.

Every teacher I had during my formative years helped me develop a strong national pride. We were taught to honor our flag and to respect it. We were taught its history, its heritage and its meaning. My heart still thrills when I see the stars and stripes unfurled in the breeze.

I like the colors of red, white and blue. It is a beautiful and distinctive flag. I know the price that some Americans paid for my flag, and this week as we celebrate Flag Day, I'll be reminded once again of their sacrifices.

I admit to having some intolerance of those who do not respect our flag. I dislike seeing it burned, worn as a diaper or handled improperly. I am aware that our Supreme Court has decided that desecrating our flag is a freedom that anyone can enjoy, but I have the freedom to disagree with their "wisdom."

What the court actually said was that our flag is just a symbol and all persons can draw from the symbol the meanings they put into it. With that in mind, let me try to tell you just what that red, white and blue symbol means to me.

#### The Symbol of Freedom

My flag stands for freedom. Freedom to do what is right, just and honorable. Freedom to own, to create and free-

dom to benefit. Freedom to go as I will and do as I see fit, so long as what I do does not infringe upon the rights of others.

My flag is a symbol of all those who have the personal courage to stand up for their convictions even when their stand is unpopular. I feel certain that Washington, Adams, Jefferson and Franklin were not popular in England. Yet these men and many others wanted what was the best for colonial America. Recently, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission announced two measures intended to comply with U.S. Environmental Protection Agency demands on air quality. First, the TNRCC selected the federal emissions standard for new cars, trucks, and SUVs instead of the more stringent California standard. Second, the Commission recommended that Austin, San Antonio, and Longview-Tyler-Marshall receive and "unclassifiable" designation under the EPA's 8-hour ozone rules, which have been struck down by the courts. The TNRCC could have recommended that these areas be considered in "non-attainment."

"Many see the TNRCC's choice as the lesser of two evils," said Peggy Venable, Director of Texas Citizens for a Sound Economy. "But, the real question is whether or not these new regulations are needed in the first place. There are some who would like to turn the Texas environmental record into a political football in the 2000 presidential race. And the TNRCC is caught in the middle of this debate. The fact is Texas has done a good job. We should be touting the Texas environmental record."

This month, the EPA released its newest National Air Pollutant emission trends report, which estimates emissions nationwide through 1998. The report shows that while Texas still faces challenges with regard to air quality, there has been a substantial improvement since 1995. In line with the estimates of emissions reduc-

tions in the Emissions Trends Report, additional data from the TNRCC and EPA shows that ozone violation day are down 25 percent statewide since 1995.

According to the estimates in the report, between 1995 and 1998, emissions of Carbon Monoxide in Texas fell by 23 percent, emissions of Nitrogen Oxides fell by 11 percent, emissions of Volatile Organic compounds fell by 51 percent, emissions of Sulfur Dioxide fell by 21 percent, and PM 10 emissions fell by 2.6 percent.

Combined levels of these emissions fell by close to 4 million tons between 1995 and 1998, the largest reduction in the nation. As an overall percentage, these emissions were cut by 22 percent, tied for second best in the county.

"Texas has made some great progress since 1995 when, in the words of the Sierra Club, Gov. Ann Richards left the state a 'mess,'" continued Venable. "There's still room for improvement, obviously. But, the last thing Texans need is politics masquerading as sound environmental policy."

# Bridge Improvement Plan Gets Preliminary Approval

A plan to accelerate improvements to deficient bridges on city streets and county roads across Texas received preliminary approval today from the Texas Transportation Commission.

The plan, along with recent funding increases, is expected to triple the number of deficient bridges that are upgraded each year and provide local communities a way to stretch their limited transportation dollars, according to state transportation officials.

The result, according to state officials, will be improved safety and mobility for motorists by bringing more of the 7,200 deficient bridges on city and county roads up to minimum standard to carry a school bus.

Following a public review and comment period, the bridge plan could get final approval by the commission late this summer.

One aspect of the plan will allow the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to waive the local match for a bridge project on a city street or county road. In return, local officials must commit to roll the saving into improvements to other deficient bridges in the area.

By participating in the program, local governments will be able to increase transportation safety and mobility without incurring additional costs.

Currently, local officials must fund 10 percent of the cost to upgrade a bridge on a city street or county road. The state kicks in another 10 percent and federal funds make up the remaining 80 percent.

In the state's proposed program, local officials will have the option to use their 10 percent match to improve additional deficient bridges of their choice as long as their design has adequate capacity to handle the weight of a school bus. As a result, local funds are stretched and more deficient bridges are improved quicker, ac-

ording to transportation officials.

State transportation officials are taking other steps to speed bridge improvements. They are moving to standardize bridge designs where possible to reduce design time, speed construction and lower costs.

State officials are also considering contracting bridge improvements in groups or clusters, rather than individually, to save time and money.

In another initiative to assist local officials participating in a federal bridge project, the state will base the required local 10 percent share on the cost estimate made as the project is being planned. Currently, TxDOT bases local participation on the actual cost, which can be higher than earlier estimates.

TxDOT is working to place maps on the Internet by the end of the year showing bridge location and weight information. The information is intended to aid school district officials and motor carriers as they plan school bus and commercial truck routes.

Annual funding for the city and

county bridge program has increased for \$26 million in 1997 or more than \$50 million this year. The additional funding in combination with the proposed initiatives should triple the total number of deficient bridges unproved annually to more than 300 bridges on city and county roads statewide, according to state transportation officials.

Texas leads the nation in the number of bridges with 48,500. Two-thirds are on state maintained highways and one-third are on county and city roads.

# Don't Let Alcohol Put A Chill On Your Summer

Don't let alcohol put a chill on your summer, urges the Prevention Resource Center by helping citizens in your area understand a few simple facts about alcohol. The sunshine, warmth and long days of the coming season provide a wealth of opportunities for recreation and relaxation, but, when mixed with alcohol, these activities can turn dangerous and even deadly.

"Alcohol consumption results in a gradual dulling of reactions of the brain and nervous system, turning normal situations into potentially dangerous ones," says Dr. Nicholas A. Pace, M.D., a board member of the National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence, Inc. in New York City. "It causes a loss of inhibitions, which leads to aggressiveness, poor judgment, and reckless movements in the water while boating, swimming and diving. It can cause faulty coordination and disorientation in the water, and impair a person's swallowing and breathing reflexes -- both of which are essential to swimming."

The following statistics underscore the negative consequences of alcohol consumption:

- Drinking may be a factor in 80% of boating fatalities, says the National Transportation Safety Board. According to the National Safety Council, boating accidents are this country's second largest cause of transportation injuries.
- According to Nation Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, alcohol is involved in an estimated 38% of drowning deaths. Data as-

sembled recently for the Surgeon General shows that this number rises to between 40 and 50% for young males.

- 40 - 50% of all diving injury victims consume alcoholic beverages, according to the same report. For heavy drinkers, alcohol consumption during the summer months can contribute to heat prostration. This dehydration also can increase your chances of having a stroke, particularly for individuals with high blood pressure. Hypoglycemia and heart rhythm irregularities are additional dangers of drinking on a hot, sunny day.

With so much fun to be had, why

let alcohol put chill on your summer? People under the age of twenty-one, drivers and people planning water-related recreational activities should stay away from alcohol. Even those who observe the Federal government's recommendations for moderate drinking (two drinks per day for men, one for women) should bear in mind that alcohol may affect them differently during their favorite summertime activity.
