Hundreds Attend Historical Commissions' Dedication of County Veterans Monument

Some 600 persons were on hand Saturday, November 11, 2000, for the formal dedication of the Knox County Veteran's Memorial.

Cold temperatures and the threat of rain didn't hamper the festivities or the attitude of the appreciative crowd on hand.

Master of Ceremonies for the event was WWII and Korean War Veteran Charles Baker. The U.S. Armed Forces Color Guard from Fort Sill, Oklahoma made the presentation of the Colors and a group of Benjamin Elementary School students led the Pledge of Allegiance. Knox County Judge David Perdue welcomed the crowd to the ceremonies and the Reverend John Gillispie, a WWII Veteran and Knox County Veterans Service Officer, delivered the Invocation. A stirring poem written and read by Korean War Veteran Fred Crenshaw led the way for the featured speaker, Keith Wells, Major USMC Retired. Benjamin native Donnie Roberts inspired the crowd with his rendition of the Lee Greenwood hit "God Bless the U.S.A." and the U.S. Armed Forces, Firing Unit from Fort Sill gave a Gun Salute. A solemn moment for those in attendance was the sounding of "Taps" by a U.S. Armed Forces Bugler who was

followed by the Dedication of the Veterans Memorial speech, given by Chairman of the Veterans Memorial Committee Alice Partridge.

The Munday Mens Quartet concluded the mornings activities with a 4-part acapella version of the National Anthem.

The monument itself list over 2,400 Knox County present and former citizens who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces. More names may still be added for those eligible to be listed. Application forms may be obtained by writing Knox County Veterans Memorial, PO Box 77, Benjamin, Texas 79505.

Following the ceremonies Saturday a hamburger dinner with all the trimmings was enjoyed by many at the Benjamin Memorial Building. The U.S. Post Office and Benjamin also had commemorative stamp cancellations and envelopes available during the day.

The Memorial is located east of the Courthouse and provides a grand tribute to those who have served our country and helped maintain it's freedom. In the words of Master of Ceremonies, Charles Baker, "This was truly a great day in the history of Knox County."

Moguls Finish Season With Big Win Over Aspermont's Hornets

With a brisk north wind blowing cold across the West Texas landscape, diehard Mogul football fans turned out to cheer their Munday Moguls to a 41 to 8 dismantling of the Aspermont Hornets last Friday in Aspermont. In a battle for third place in tough district 6A, Munday's decisive victory gave them a solid and satisfactory close to their 2000 football season.

Aspermont hit a short kick which was alertly snagged by Munday's Mysel Yzaguirre at the Mogul 40 yard line, and the Mogul offense led by Chance Myers and Brandon Urbanczyk, marched 60 yards in 6 plays to take the early lead. A lead they would never relinquish as the 7 and 3 Moguls, intent on enjoying their last game dominated the 1 and 9 Hornets on both sides of the football.

Myers rushed for 103 yards from scrimmage and scored on runs of 2 yards and 7 yards and returned a punt 90 yards for a third touchdown. Urbanczyk rushed for 90 yards and a touchdown and had a

53 yard catch and run for another score. Munday spread the ball around as fans got a good peek at next year's offense as Jeffery Toliver took the helm for a couple of series and Myers ran halfback along with Jeffery Urbanczyk. Edward Shields got in on the scoring for the Moguls on a 16 yard run, and Joe Rivera hit 3 extra points to give the Moguls their 41 to 8 Margin.

The Moguls scored 19 of their total in the first period of play and 15 in the third, shutting out the Hornets until the fourth quarter when Aspermont's Jerrod Meador hit his open receiver, Wedo Lerma, for the score on a 34 yard touch down pass. Aspermont converted on the 2 point PAT, and Munday countered with 7 more to close the scoring for the night.

Defensively, Munday's seniors lead by Eric Hager, Jai Fernandez, Tony Tomlinson, Michael Fernandez, Keith Wilde, Mysel Yzaguirre, Justin Key, Jeremy Lowe, Eddie Cardenas, and Will

Longan had one of their best performances of the year, shutting down the Hornet power I and even registering a safety after Longan's lone punt, a 58 yarder was alertly covered by Eric Hager at the Hornet 1.

It may have been a cold night for high school football, but the Munday Moguls provided the heat and the hope for next year. Coach Matt Denman and his staff, Terry Taylor, Bert Leaverton, Kent Josselet, Ralph Klinkerman, and Pat Potts are to be congratulated for their hard work and efforts week in and week out to prepare our young men and put them in the best possible position to win. All year long the Moguls have shown character and determination as they dealt with adversity and disappointments that would have torn apart a lesser team. Through it all the Moguls have hung tough, and though the records may indicate that Munday finished third in their district in the year 2000, in my book they were number 1.

Capitol Highlights

More than half of Texans turn out for election

AUSTIN - Fifty-one percent of registered voters turned out Nov. 7 to cast ballots in the general election. Nearly 6.4 million Texans voted on election day and another 2.5 million cast ballots during the early voting period.

Terry County had the highest turnout with 76 percent or 6,209 of the 8,123 registered voters casting ballots. Loving County followed with 74 percent or 156 voters out of 211 registered.

The lowest turnout was in Dimmitt County, which trailed the rest of the state but nearly 12 percent. Only 19 percent of that county's 8,311 registered voters voted in the election.

In the presidential election Gov. George W. Bush captured 59 percent of the vote statewide to Vice President Al Gore's 38 percent. Green Party candidate Ralph Nader garnered nearly 2 percent of the Texas vote.

Texans overwhelmingly re-elected Republican U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison. She received 65 percent of the vote to Democratic challenger Gene Kelly's 32 percent.

Democrats came out on top in Texas' 30 congressional district races with all incumbents of both parties winning re-election. Texas has 17 Democrats and 13 Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Republicans retained two of the three seats on the Texas Railroad Commission. Commissioner Charles R. Matthews was re-elected and voters affirmed Gov. Bush appointee Chairman Michael L. Williams, who stepped into the position in December 1998 to fill the unexpired term of Carole Keeton Rylander, who vacated to become comptroller.

The three Republican incumbent Texas Supreme Court Justices Nathan Hecht, Priscilla Owen and Al Gonzales also kept their seats on the nine-member court.

Two Republicans, incumbent David Bradley and newcomer Cynthia A. Thornton, were elected to District 7 and District 10 respectively on the State Board of Education. District 10 Democrat Will Davis did not seek re-election. When the new term begins in January 2001, the board will be controlled by 10 Republicans and five Democrats.

The makeup of the Texas Senate remained the same with all incumbents winning re-election.

In the Texas House of Representatives, Democrats gained one seat, District 11, in which Chuck Hopson beat Paul S. Woodward, and Republicans added District 59, in which Sid Miller beat Democratic incumbent David Lengefeld.

In District 18, which covers part of East Texas, Democratic incumbent Rep. Dan Ellis earned 51 percent of

the vote to barely fend off Republican challenger Ben Bius. The longtime Democratic district became a hotly contested vote in Polk County. Only a week before the election a state judge cleared the way for a group of Recreational Vehicle owners to vote in Polk County. The predominantly Republican RV owners live part of the year near Lake Livingston and claim their vehicles as their primary residences.

State Farm to refund \$3.1 million

State Farm, the nation's largest auto insurance provider, has agreed to refund an estimated \$3.1 million to insured drivers in Texas.

The state sued State Farm alleging the company reduced auto repair claim payments to policyholders for "betterment" of the vehicle. An estimated 30,000 policyholders who had claims dating from Feb. 1, 1996 to present day will receive refunds plus interest as part of the company's settlement with the state. State Farm also will agree to pay \$175,000 in attorney fees to the Attorney General's Office and said it would not raise current insurance rates to offset the refund.

Last February Attorney General John Cornyn sued State Farm and 15 other major insurance companies over betterment practices. So far the state has reached settlements with USAA, GEICO, Safeco and Liberty Mutual.

Other Highlights

- Lotto Texas celebrated its eighth birthday last week. Since the online big-jackpot game began Nov. 7, 1992, players have won \$3.5 billion. Only one \$12.3 million jackpot, drawn Oct. 26, 1994 at Stone Creek Mini Mart in Flower Mound, remains unclaimed.

- The state likely will head to court this week to defend a clean-air proposal designed to reduce emissions at Dallas and Fort Worth area airports. Delta Airlines declined to participate in the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission's plan so officials expected an airline association's lawsuit to be carried out, in spite of commitments from Southwest Airlines, American Airlines and the cities of Dallas and Fort Worth.

- The Texas Department of Transportation says the federal government is shortchanging the state on two key programs designed to improve trade corridors and border transportation infrastructure. TxDOT officials say Texas stands to gain only \$11.3 million, or 49 cents on the dollar, for all discretionary highway funds.

Ask the AG: Texas Internet Bureau: Stopping E-crime

Q: Why isn't there an agency that regulates people who commit fraud through the Internet? Is there some place where I can file a complaint?

A: The Internet offers tremendous freedom and opportunity and has fostered incredible economic growth in Texas. Sadly, some people use it to engage in questionable enterprises.

As Attorney General, I am committed to ensuring that the Internet is a safe place to surf and shop. On September 21, I announced the formation of the Attorney General's Texas Internet Bureau, which will focus on Internet and computer-related crimes. Funded by a grant from the Governor's Criminal Justice Division, the Internet Bureau is staffed by prosecutors and investigators who will assist local law enforcement agencies in fighting computer-related crimes.

The Internet Bureau will accept reports from citizens and investigate cyber crime and cyber scams. Other areas the Internet Bureau will focus on include:

- **Child Pornography:** The Attorney General's office accepts complaints and conducts investigations into online child pornography. Internet Bureau staff will work with local, state, and federal authorities to prosecute crimes involving child pornography.

- **Consumer Fraud:** The Attorney General's office is committed to protecting Texas consumers from deceptive business practices and fraud online and offline. Consumers can file complaints about Internet-related business transactions through our online complaint form in the "Consumer Protection" section of our Web site.

- **Children's Privacy:** A new federal law, the Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA), seeks to protect the privacy of children online. The Internet Bureau will monitor Web sites and take enforcement actions against those that are not in compliance with the Act.

The Attorney General's Web site contains a section specifically related to the Internet Bureau. The section provides information for consumers on various topics. There are tips to help consumers protect themselves when shopping or doing business online. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

There are also tips for parents to help them protect their children while online. The tips include information on COPPA and how to avoid dangers that lurk in cyberspace. There is also a list of tips written for children to make them aware of how to safely navigate the Internet.

Consumers can fill out an online reporting form to report Web sites or e-mails that may contain illegal Internet activity. Examples include child pornography, consumer scams, and privacy concerns.

The section also contains updates on enforcement actions taken by the Internet Bureau against Web sites or companies that have violated the law. In addition, links to other online sources of information and assistance area provided.

Grease a 9 X 16 pan. Roll out the crescent rolls and flatten them in the bottom of the pan. Make 2 inch slits along the edges of the dough with a sharp knife - leave the middle of the dough solid. Prepare meat according to the taco seasoning package. Drain the meat. In a sauce pan, combine refried beans and 1/2 cup salsa. Spread the bean mixture down the middle of your dough. (There will be some left over. It's great with chips.) Spread the meat on top of the beans and cover with the cheese. Take the edges of the dough and criss-cross them over the top. Cook in the oven for 10 - 13 minutes or until golden brown.

"I like to serve this garnished with guacomole and sour cream. Spanish rice and chips and salsa on the side make it a great meal," says Smith. "The meat roll is pretty on a platter on the table - then just slice and serve."

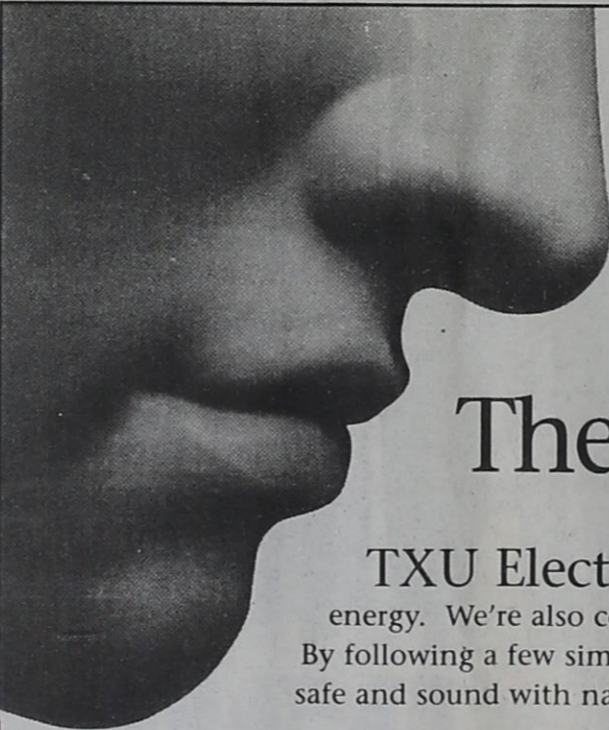

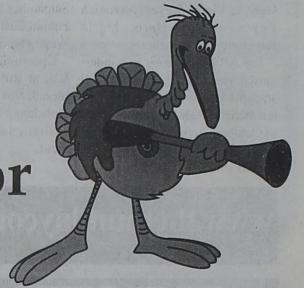

The City of Munday ID # 1380003 water system collected 2 water samples during the month of **OCTOBER 2000**, that contained Coliform bacteria. The City of Munday water system is required to submit a minimum of 3 water samples each month for bacteriological analysis.

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) sets drinking water standards in Texas and has determined that the presence of total coliform is a possible health concern. Total coliform are common in the environment and are generally not harmful themselves. However, the presence of these bacteria in drinking water, generally is a result of a problem with water treatment or the pipes which distribute the water, and indicates that the water may be contaminated with organisms that can cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, and possibly jaundice, and associated headaches and fatigue. These symptoms, however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water, but may also be caused by a number of factors other than your drinking water. The TNRCC has set an enforceable drinking water standard for total coliform to reduce the risk of these adverse health effects. Under this standard, no more than 5.0% of the samples collected during a month can contain these bacteria, except that systems collecting fewer than 40 samples/month that have one total coliform-positive sample per month are not violating the standard. Drinking water which meets this standard is usually not associated with a health risk from disease-causing bacteria and should be considered safe.
