

Charles Giddings In New Guinea Battle; Bombs Jap Convoy

A quiet, even-tempered, good-A quiet, even-tempered, good-natured Munday boy is making Medical Group Japanese efforts to reinforce northeastern New Guinea very costly to the enemy. He is Capt. Charles H. Giddings, Jr., who is pilot on one of America's large flying fortresses.

Capt. Giddings made a heroic record for himself last Friday in the Pacific war zone in thwarting the Japs' seventh attempt to land reinforcements in New Guinea. Two large transports, one hevily loaded with troops, were sunk and 18 Zeros were shot down in the 24 hours of action.

While part of the area served is sparsely populated, having a population of approximately 1,300,000, the system is unusually compact.
