## OVER HUNDRED DROWN.

Dreadful Disaster Occurred In Pacific Ocean.

### SCHOONER SINKS STEAMER

Columbia, Bound From San Francisco to Portland, Cut In Two by the San Pedro and Goes Down With All but About Eighty Persons.

San Francisco, July 23.—The steamer Columbia, bound from this port to Portland, collided with the schooner San Pedro off Shelter Cove, Medecino county. There was a heavy bay at the time, and the San Pedro, which was heavily loaded with lumber struck the Columbia on her low with such terrible force that she was cut down to the water and sank in about five minutes. About 100 people went down with the Columbia, and the rest, numbering about eighty, were saved by clinging on to the San Pedro, from which vessel they were rescued some hours later by the steamer Roanoke. Captain P. A. Doran of the Columbia went down with his vessel. The San Pedro was picked up by the steamer George W. Elder and towed to Eureka.

The Columbia was an iron screw steamer of 2,722 tons register. She was built in 1880 by J. Roach & Son at Chester, Pa., and owned by the San Francisco and Portland Steamship company. She was 308.4 feet long, 38.5 beam and 23.2 draught.

The San Pedro was a wooden steamer of 456 tons register, built in 1889 at Aberdeen, Wash. She was 163.1 feet long, 34 feet beam and 12.2 feet draught.

At noon Monday it was reported that 150 went down with the Columbia.

The collision occurred at midnight when all on board, save the lookout and officer on the bridge, were asleep in their berth. The Columbia was steaming north at an easy rate, having left here at noon Saturday. Suddenly out of the fog loomed the dark hulk of the San Pedro, southbound, which evidently was out of her course. Whistles were blown and frantic efforts made by helmsman of each vessel to avert a collision, but to no avail. The San Pedro struck the Columbia in her port bow, causing a hole in her side through which the water rushed in a great volume. Alarms were sounded throughout the passengership, and the terrified passengers scrambled from staterooms in an effort to escape from the doomed vessel, but the time was too short to put on life savers. The life raft was launched with a number of passengers on board, but only a few of the entire number on board were saved.

The steamer Roanoke, carrying a number of the dead and some of the rescued passengers reached here at 6:15 Monday morning, bringing the first news of the disaster. The dead were conveyed to the morgue.

Shelter Cove, where the awful collision occurred, is 179 miles up the coast. A number of survivors on the life-raft are being towed to this port by the Daisy Mitchell.

During the earthquake and fire the Columbia was lying at the dry dock of the Union Iron works and the shock loosened some of her blocks, with the result the vessel capsized, but she was entirely refitted, and when she left on her last trip she carried a full list of passengers.

The San Pedro, commanded by Captain Hansen, was recently sold to the Eastern and Western Lumber company.

The steamer Roanoke spoke the steamer George W. Elder and the latter had on board eighty-eight passengers and crew from the Columbia, taken off the steamer San Pedro. The San Pedro was damaged considerably forward. Her main mast is gone and foremast sprung, her cargo gone and she is in a waterlogged condition.

The Roanoke picked up a body supposed to be Edward Butler and brought it to this city.

According to J. G. Flynn, a passenger on the Columbia, every woman on board was lost.

### OFFICER SHOT TO DEATH.

John Morrison Loses His Life at Hands of Unknown Parties.

Holdenville, I. T., July 20.—John Morrison, marshal of Sasakawa, twelve miles south of here in the Seminole nation, was shot and killed. Morrison, who was also United States posseman, together with two other officers, and gone into the swamps of Little river to serve a warrant. As they were riding down the road Morrison saw three negroes at a distance and decided they were whisky peddlers. He rushed upon them with the command to halt, but instead they filled him with bullets and fled.

### COWHIDE HESTER.

Wife Witnessed the Deed and Fell to the Ground Unconscious.

Hopkinsville, Ky., July 19.—Masked night riders visited the home of Nathan Hester, a prominent Trigg county farmer, and severely whipped him with a cowhide in the presence of his wife. Hester is a member of the

Roanoke Growers' Association, but last year sold his crop independently. Mrs. Hester attempted to go to her husband's assistance, but fell to the ground unconscious and was revived with difficulty.

### Overcome in Well.

Jasper, Tex., July 20.—While digging a well Bob Limbrick was overcome by gas and died.

### Burglars at Boswell.

Boswell, I. T., July 20.—Twelve residences were burglarized here. At each place from \$1 to \$50 was secured.

### MAN AND BOY KILLED.

Hit by Train and Bodies Were Badly Mutilated.

Longview, Tex., July 20.—A man and boy were killed by a tie train on the Texas and Gulf railway about six miles south of here. The man was about thirty years old and the boy about eleven. They had been at Gilmer trying to secure employment in a mill and were walking to Beckville, seven miles distant, where they lived. Both bodies were badly mutilated.

### Dead Brothers Identified.

Longview, Tex., July 23.—The brothers killed by a tie train have been identified by their stepbrothers, Mr. Ray of Gilmer. The oldest, twenty years old, was named Andrew Jackson Davis, and the other, sixteen, James Davts.

### SIX SHOTS FIRED.

Three Bullets Hit Mark, but No Serious Wounds.

Beaumont, July 20.—Mrs. Romie Mulholland, about twenty-five years of age, is charged with shooting Mike Abbott, aged about fifty years, the proprietor of the Santa Fe hotel, where Mrs. Holland resided. Six shots were fired. Abbott was shot three times. The wounds are not dangerous.

Besides the young woman, who was arrested by the police and turned over to the county, a young man employed as night clerk at the hotel and a young woman who resides there were also arrested.

### DIVINE DIES.

Mother Was Sister of the Late L. Q. C. Lamar.

San Antonio, July 20.—Rev. Lucius McGehee, one of the oldest Methodist ministers in Texas, died at his home here at the age of seventy-eight. He was born in Alabama, and was a member of the famous Lamar family, L. Q. C. Lamar being his mother's brother.

### Liquor Seized at Sherman.

Sherman, July 23.—Under the search and seizure act several deputy sheriffs, armed with a warrant, entered two buildings and seized considerable liquor. One building is headquarters of the Century club, chartered by the state. At this place 50 bottles of beer, 70 quarts of whisky, 2 two-gallon, 7 one-gallon jugs containing liquor and 70 bottles of wine were confiscated.

### BEGGS BURNS.

Town in the Cherokee Nation Is Almost Wiped Out.

Muskogee, July 20.—The town of Beggs, east of this city, in the Cherokee nation, was almost wiped from the map by a fire, resulting in an estimated loss of \$10,000, with practically no insurance. The postoffice was burned down, but most of the mail and stamps saved.

### Suddenly Expires.

Fort Worth, July 23.—Charles R. Reynolds, district manager of the Fort Worth Life Insurance company, dropped dead in the office of Cope, Rhodes & Hackett while conversing with Mr. Hackett.

### Will Test Law.

Dallas, July 23.—Maurice E. Locke, attorney for the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, says the latter will not cease business in Texas, but will test the validity of the Robertson act.

### Protest Filed.

Austin, July 20.—A protest against the proposed round bale reduction sought by President Calvin of the Farmers' Union was filed with the rail road commission by the Farmers' Union of Lamar county.

### Indian Woman Drowns Herself.

Sugler, I. T., July 19.—Annie Malone, an Indian woman, drowned herself in the North Fork of Canadian river. This is said to be the second full blood Indian to suicide in twenty years.

### Waco Man Falls Dead.

Waco, July 20.—While R. T. H. Chambers, a retired lumber dealer, was conversing with his family he fell dead.

### Crowing Canine.

Stidman, I. T., July 22.—Bill Pullen, who lives two miles from here, has a shepherd dog that crows. When a rooster crows the dog does likewise.

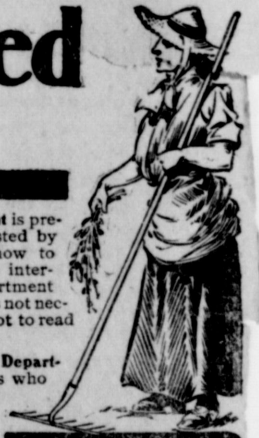

The howl of the enemies of Senator Bailey has about as much effect upon his character as the waves of the ocean upon the rock of Gibraltar. Their wails sounds like those of a lost soul everytime he makes a speech.—Merkel Mail.

Bailey's enemies have not injured his character, but seem to have destroyed his "law practice" for the oil and lumber trusts, at any rate we hear of no fifteen thousand and two hundred thousand fees being paid him this year, yet in the debate with Crane he said that he was going to practice law the balance of the year after congress adjourned. Bailey's time appears to be taken up with denouncing his enemies and making them wail like lost souls every time he orates.

The Albany News, one of the best country papers in West Texas says Albany is so divided by warring factions that the town cannot turn a wheel. Any town is unfortunate when its people become divided. Progress is impossible under such conditions and decay is the inevitable result. There are some symptoms of division and strife in Baird, but we hope, as heretofore, the conservative sensible men on both sides will stop before the breach widens as to endanger the welfare of the town. These things have come before and passed away without any particular injury to the town, but we will have to be careful lest we become hopelessly divided as the News says he people of its town have become.

Don't say we can't do this or we can't do that, "can't never built a town or anything else in the world. It takes work to build up towns, secure and hold trade, to do these things we have to cut out any little petty feelings we may have against some one, or any opinion we may have in regard to prohibition or some other confounded theory that may divide us. Let each one have his own opinion and vote as he pleases and talk as he pleases, but on one point let us all make it our creed to talk Baird for Baird, and we will succeed in spite of all obstacles thrown in the way by outsiders. A united people are always successful in commercial enterprises without hardly a single recorded instance to the contrary.

There was some opposition shown at the Commercial Club meeting Monday night to affiliating with other West Texas Clubs. The idea was that some towns were only wanted to play second fiddle to some other town to help pay expenses, etc. without any real benefit. THE STAR had some suspicion of that at the start, but is now convinced that the real object is to benefit the entire west by uniting all Commercial Clubs in this section and make a long, strong pull for all the counties and towns in this section. Each club will, in addition to helping in this united effort, look after their own towns and trade territory. The way we see it now Baird simply cannot afford to hold aloof from other West Texas Clubs if we want to secure our share of the immigration coming to West Texas.

Some of the state local option committee have boldly declared for state wide prohibition. THE STAR predicted two years ago they would do this as soon as they believed themselves strong enough to carry the State. An effort may be made to have the next legislature submit a constitutional amendment, because while here and there a county like Collin may show gain in prohibition sentiment the signs are abundant elsewhere that it is losing ground. If the prohibition leaders are as wise as we believe them to be they will masquerade no longer as local optionists, but come out for state prohibition and force matters, as any delay now lessens their chances. If the next legislature is not asked to submit a constitutional amendment it will be because the pros are afraid of the issue.

One amendment providing for a home indigent widows of Confederate soldiers should be adopted. No people in any country or any time made more sacrifices for the Lost Cause than the heroic woman of the South. In most instances they suffered more than their husbands in the army, and Texas ought not to forget them in their old age.

Just look at the new houses the very prospect of prohibition has caused to be built in Baird, says a pro; but a telescope could not locate that twenty thousand dollar school voted by the people. Is prohibition or the saloon responsible for this "hiatus?"

**LOCAL OPTION SO-CALLED.**

It begins to look as if the people are tiring of the ultras in Prohibition leadership. The people are beginning to see the folly of using large county majorities for prohibition in an attempt to coerce towns into the new measure wherein a large majority do not believe it will be a wise expedient. Many do not consider this fair because it is not "local" option. Many others who would be willing to coerce such towns into prohibition if it could be enforced, are now against the expedient because experiments have conclusively proven that it can not be enforced, and hence is expensive folly.

That "majorities" should rule is a great Democratic principle and the local option contests have conclusively proven that the people are as jealous of this right in temperance expedients as upon other questions. People in favor of local option proper—rule by majorities—should insist upon controlling the campaigns. They should not permit themselves to be led into any county race the sole purpose of which is to coerce some big town into local prohibition when it is a fact well known to everybody that a large majority of the town are opposed to the experiment. It makes no difference how ardent a prohibitionist one may be, if he believes in real local option—real rule by majorities—he can not favor this form of coercion. On the contrary, however ardent an anti-prohibitionist one may be, if he be in favor of majority rule, and a town, by a majority, votes local prohibition, he must accept it as a just verdict and co-operate for its enforcement. Where the people are guided by this rule—ignoring ultras on both sides—the local option law can be made a success, and they are finding it out. Hence, it has come to pass that local option elections, the sole purpose of which is to coerce large anti-majorities into prohibition are not often succeeding nowadays, and there is very strong argument why they should not.

The greatest infirmity in the local option campaigns is the character of leaders—especially on the prohibition side. They are abusive, arrogant, and so bigoted that they can not concede honesty to any person who takes issue with them. Note elsewhere, for instance, the tone and text of resolutions adopted by the executive committee of the Local Option Association the other day in Dallas.

They, for instance, insist that violation of the local option law be made a felony. This is the same spirit that burned heretics and witches. Carried to its last analysis, their theory would justify sending boys to the pen who "play marbles for keeps." Such people do not admit that crime can have degrees.

At last this committee, although they have previously denied it, come squarely out for State prohibition, and we may look for that sort of contest before long. Yet these men know that the local option law was a compromise among anti and pro-Democrats. When State prohibition was defeated, the party conceded the local option expedient to the large number of Democrats who voted for prohibition, thinking this would put an end to the strife.

Texas Farmer would advise all good people to "let well enough alone," stand by "local" option proper, quit adopting subterfuges to coerce majorities, and thus make prohibition the only sort of success it can be. Any other program makes it an expensive farce.—Texas Farmer.

## ITALIAN.

### Murder in the First Degree Is Verdict Returned.

### GET LIFE IMPRISONMENT.

As Under Louisiana Law by Exemplary Conduct They Can Be Released After Fifteen Years Considerable Indignation Has Resulted.

Hahnville, La., July 19.—The jury in the Lamana murder case adjudged Ignaccio Campisciano, Mrs. Campisciano, Tony Costa and Frank Dendus guilty without capital punishment. The verdict carries life imprisonment, but for good behavior can be released, under the Louisiana law, at the expiration of fifteen years.

The verdict was returned just before dark Thursday after the jury had been out forty-five minutes, and at the close of a four days' trial full of excitement.

Absolute silence greeted the foreman's announcement. The spectators listened quietly while the jury declared that their verdict was unanimous, and the court adjourned an hour afterward.

It was reported that preparations for a lynching were under way. A physician of local prominence gave out a statement declaring that "the good people of St. Charles repudiate the verdict," and calling it a "prostitution of justice." The lynching report spread as far as New Orleans, and the local officials were apprehensive that a party might be made up in that city to aid in such an attempt. The distance between here and that city is about twenty miles.

Only three of the prisoners were mentioned in these rumors of violence, the name of Mrs. Campisciano being omitted. The verdict was generally satisfactory in her case. The others were the woman's husband and Collagero Gendusa and Tony Costa.

The prisoners were returned to the St. Charles parish jail, an isolated structure standing in the fields a quarter of a mile away from many habitation except the sheriff's house and the court house. It was deemed unwise to take the prisoners back to New Orleans by train, since the railroad would have to take them through the country on the west bank of the river, and opposite the city. The sheriff, who has the prisoners in charge, has repeatedly declared that he can prevent lynchings of these Italians in his parish, and he is looked upon as capable of defending the men in almost any emergency.

In the four days' trial the State did not succeed in proving that any of the accused committed the actual murder. It was testified that Campisciano and his wife shielded the kidnapers from capture, even throwing a party of police off the trail when they were within a short distance of the boy's hiding place about an hour before his murder. Testifying in his own defense Thursday Campisciano did not deny this, but claimed that he had been forced by threats of death to act as he did. Collagero Cenousa and Costa, according to witnesses, was the actual kidnaper who stole the boy and gave him to the kidnapers. Costa denied this while testifying in his own defense Thursday.

Campisciano testified that the actual murderers were Angelo, Incarnaterra, Tony Gendusa, Stefano Monfre and Chico Lechesl. These four have not been captured.

Campisciano also implicated in the plot Leonardo Gebbia and Neofina, his sister, both of whom will be tried next week.

### LARGE TRANSACTION.

#### Winfield Scott of Fort Worth Effects Big Deal.

Fort Worth, July 19.—Winfield Scott has transferred to Harry A. Chatham of Chicago and C. H. Bencini of Brownwood, Tex., his oil mills and gins located at Brownwood, Dublin, Hico, Stephenville and Coleman. The consideration was \$600,000 cash in hand.

### NEGRO SECRETARY.

#### Much Ill Feeling Engendered Among the Young Republicans.

Guthrie, July 20.—A Frantz Republican club was organized here with Frank Greer, president; Mayor Cash Barnes, vice president; U. C. Guss, treasurer; F. C. Anderson, secretary, and James Mahon, assistant secretary. Much ill feeling was engendered among the young Republicans, especially, by making Anderson, a negro, secretary. Young Republicans are refusing to sign the roster unless it be made a lily white organization.

### FOUR-STORY HOTEL.

#### Winfield Scott Will Erect One at Once at Fort Worth.

Fort Worth, July 19.—At a cost of \$140,000 Winfield Scott will erect opposite the Texas and Pacific passenger station a four-story brick structure, to be known as the Terminal ho-

### To Meet at Tulsa.

Oklahoma City, July 20.—J. L. Hamon, chairman of the Republican state central committee, has issued a call for a state convention to meet at Tulsa Aug. 1 with 1,537 delegates in attendance.

### MISHAPS OCCUR.

#### Several Casualties, One of Them Very Grave.

Camp Mabry, Tex., July 23.—Two serious accidents occurred. Private Frank DeWitt of Troop B, First Texas, from Amarillo, while riding an uncontrollable horse in an attempt to break the animal was dashed under a tree and struck a severe blow by a hanging limb, which caused him to be thrown to the ground, fracturing the spinal column in the upper third section. Dr. Hamilton of the troop did everything possible for the boy and he was hurried to the train and taken to Seton Infirmary, where an operation was performed.

While watering the horses Corporal Lyons of the First United States Cavalry was dangerously injured by his horse falling on him. Lyons' head and back received severe wounds, but nothing serious is expected, although the accident would have been fatal to a man with less physique.

In moving a tent floor a negro had his foot crushed and amputation may be necessary.

### MISS ROBINSON ARRESTED.

#### Charged With the Murder Four Weeks Ago of Arthur Hodges.

Fort Worth, July 23.—On ground by indictment Deputy Sheriff Evert arrested Miss Gussie Robinson. She is charged with the murder of Arthur Hodges. It will be remembered that shortly after midnight on a Sunday morning about four weeks ago Hodges and Miss Robinson were sitting on the tracks of the International and Great Northern railroad, about 300 yards south of the East Terrell avenue crossing, when Hodges died as the result of a pistol wound in the head. Miss Robinson, with a severe wound in the arm, went to a telephone and reported the murder to the police department.

Miss Robinson was taken to jail in a buggy. After the tragedy she had an attack of fever and a nervous break down.

### "MACK'S IDEAL."

#### Yearling Male Poland-China Hog That is a Large One.

Decatur, Tex., July 23.—G. F. McCracken will go to the Texas State fair this fall with a yearling male Poland-China which he thinks will outclass anything pitted against him.

"Mack's Ideal" is a pig, weighing now about 200 pounds, and has been carefully groomed, since his birth last October, for the big occasion at Dallas this fall. His sire was Star of Texas, the yearling boar that took sweepstakes at the fair in 1905. Mr. McCracken thinks he will easily win with Mack's Ideal in October.

### HEIFER GIVES MILK.

#### Calflless, Yet She Yields Gallon and a Half Per Day.

Marlin, Tex., July 23.—R. S. McCoy has a heifer eighteen months old. The animal has never had a calf, yet she is milked daily, a gallon and a half of the lactical fluid be obtained, from which three-fourths of a pound of butter per day is churned.

### FOURTEEN DROWN.

#### Sailboat Capsized and but One of Its Occupants Escaped.

Copenhagen, July 18.—Fourteen persons are reported to have drowned off Marstrand, Sweden, by the capsizing of a sailboat. Only one of the party was saved.

### Immaculates Sue Immaculates.

Austin, July 23.—Suit for the trespass to try title and for damages has been filed in the district court by the Independent Order of Immaculates of Texas against the Independent Order of Immaculates of Texas. The suit asks for the recovery of certain described real estate, \$186 in money, all documents, rolls, paraphernalia, secret work, etc., of the lodge. Damages are also prayed for.

### Infant Dies on Train.

Sherman, July 20.—The infant son of Rev. M. C. Curkin, pastor of the Baptist church at Honey Grove, died on Houston and Texas Central passenger train No. 5 between Dallas and Sherman after a brief illness. The parents were on their way home from Marlin.

### Considerate Clergyman.

Braddock, Pa., July 23.—Owing to the excessive heat prevailing, the pastor of one of the most fashionable churches here has advised the lady

members of the congregation to attend church without hats and for the men to leave their coats at home.

### Burned in Royse City.

Royse City, Tex., July 23.—Fire, believed to have been started by burglars, started in the grocery of Jeff Miller & Co., and extended to the drug store of Houser & Johnson. Both buildings and contents were destroyed. The losses are over \$8,000.

### Holland McTyliere Succides.

Nashville, July 20.—With a self-inflicted bullet wound in his head, Holland McTyliere, son of the late Southern Methodist Bishop McTyliere, was found dead in bed by his wife.

### Fatal Fall.

Naples, Tex., July 23.—Cal Wright, ex-deputy sheriff, fell from a scaffold at the Sullivan Sanford hardwood mill and sustained injuries from which he died.

### Neblett Resigns.

Corsicana, Tex., July 23.—Representative R. V. Neblett of Navarro county has forwarded his resignation to Governor Campbell.

### PLEASANTS PROMOTED.

#### Becomes Chief Justice and S. A. Mc Means His Successor.

Austin, July 20.—Justice R. A. Pleasants of Cuero was named by Governor Campbell to be chief justice of the Galveston court of civil appeals, vice Chief Justice W. H. Gill, resigned. Judge S. A. McMeans of Palestine, a former law partner of the governor, was named to fill the vacancy caused by the promotion of Associate Justice Pleasants.

### LAREDO DRY SUNDAY.

#### For First Time in Its History No Liquor Sold on Sabbath.

Laredo, Tex., July 22.—For the first time in the history of Laredo, which was founded in 1757, not a drink of any kind of spirituous liquor could be bought in the city Sunday, as every saloon was closed up hard and fast.

One result has been that a close estimate places the amount spent by the people across the Rio Grande in Nuevo Laredo at not less than \$300.

### "Nothing Doing" at Brownsville.

Brownsville, Tex., July 22.—For the first time in many years no liquor was sold here Sunday.

### TRAIN HITS CARRIAGE.

#### Prominent Dallas County Man Killed and Girl's Skull Crushed.

Lancaster, Tex., July 22.—The horse of J. R. Lavender, an aged resident of this place, became frightened in front of a Katy train. The train dashed into the carriage. Mr. Lavender was killed. Ethel Fondren, one of the four little girls in the vehicle, had her skull crushed. Ruby, her sister, and the other two, named McCallum, escaped serious injuries. The horse was killed. The carriage was dragged some distance.

### COURT OFFICIALS NAMED.

#### S. P. Wilson of Cherokee County Appointed Chief Justice.

Austin, July 22.—Governor Campbell has appointed the judges of the Sixth court of civil appeals, located at Texarkana. They are as follows: Samuel P. Wilson of Cherokee county, chief justice; Richard B. Levy, Jr., of Gregg county and William F. Hodges of Lamar county, associate justices. To fill Judge Levy's place as judge of the Fourth district court the governor has appointed William C. Buford of Rusk.

### DUG BODY OUT.

#### Head Brakeman Gillis Mashed to Death in Railway Wreck.

Austin, July 22.—Four miles south of here twenty-one cars of an International and Great Northern railway freight train were thrown in a ditch. Frank Gillis of San Antonio, head brakeman, was thrown off the top of a car. Gillis' body was found under a rail. A boxcar was on top of the rail. His body had to be dug out. The track was torn up for forty yards.

### Credited on New Licenses.

Fort Worth, July 23.—At a meeting of the county commissioners' court a resolution was adopted directing that liquor license fees represented by unexpired portions of cancelled licenses be credited on new license issued to Tarrant county saloonkeepers.

### Hams Stolen.

Paris, July 19.—Swartzchild & Sulzberger's office was robbed, \$50 worth of hams being stolen.
