

PECAN CULTURE AND HARVESTING

College Station - Texas pecan trees, now literally drooping under one of the best nut crops in many years, should be safeguarded against damage during harvesting, says J. F. Rosborough, horticultur ist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Limbs and twigs threshed excessively with heavy

poles will suffer damage. But if the nuts simply are knocked off with an ordinary cane pole no ill effects will result, he says.

Pecans may be eaten as soon as harvested if the weather is dry, but Rosborough believes they will shell out and taste better 30 to 60 days afterward. If there is a large crop to store the nuts will dry quickly if housed in a well-ventilatday exhibit at Benjamin on Friday, ed place. But they will become too warm and mold if the storage space is damp and poorly ventilated.
