Main Points Of Cattle Subsidy

Knox County farmers and stockmen have shown considerable interest in cattle subsidy where payments of 50 cents per hundred on good choice beef cattle will be made by the Commodity Credit Corporation. Following are the main points to remember about the cattle sub-

(1) You can get your payments through your county AAA committee. On submission of proper evidence, the committee will give you a sight draft good at any bank for the amount of the subsidy.

(2) But you must certify that you owned the cattle at least 30

(3) You must submit sales tickets or certification of sale from the slaughterer showing the weight and price of cattle sold. (4) You must sell either to an

OPA-licensed slaughterer or to a buyer who agrees to sell within less than 30 days.

(5) You can collect subsidy only on good and choice grade cattle. This means they must weigh at least 800 pounds and bring the OPA stabilization price (\$14.25, Cnicago basis) in your territory.

(6) If you've lost sales tickets since the program went into effect (May 19), you can apply to the packer for new evidence or certification of sale and still collect the subsidy due. Your local committee will have details.



How To Make Invert Sugar A Florida experiment station scients recommends making invert sugar to make it go farther. To do this, mix 2 cups of sugar and 1 cup water. Add 1/4 teaspoon of tartaric acid (which you can get at any drug store.) Cover this sugar, water and tartaric acid mixture and simmer gently for 30 minutes. Allow it to cool. Then you have invert sugar syrup. Each cup is about 18/4 times as sweet as the same weight in plain syrup. It is also good in sweetening fruits, cereals, ice cream, and beverages.

Freezing The above information applies to freezing as well as to canning. Honey does not freeze as solidly and it thaws more quickly than sugar syrup or corn syrup. Therefore, it is not as satisfactory for

Drying Dry such fruits as peaches, apricots, apples, pears, and figs. It takes less sugar when cooking dried fruits than it does for canning or freezing. Drying also gives variety. Directors for drying are given in Bulletin C-170 "Drying Foods at Home."

Preserves and Jellies Fill your canning budget first. If you have enough sugar left, make a few preserves or jams. Jellies take more sugar and yield less food value than any other method of preserving fruit.





However, the federal government has no right to force Texas to abolish its poll tax or to otherwise interfere with state control of elections. The Vito Marcontio-sponsored anti-poll tax bill is a vicious attempt at meddling with state's rights.



Keep Roofs Repaired

NO PART of a farm structure is more important than the roof. It is sound business practice to keep it water-tight at all times. Leaking roofs may destroy a year's harvest, or be a contributing factor to spontaneously ignited fires which may destroy stock, equipment and buildings as well as crops.

Small defects can be easily repaired if done properly. Periodic inspection will disclose these flaws and are well worth the effort. In

and are well worth the effort. In making these inspections, however, always play safe. Use a ladder or chicken-ladder firmly secured over the ridge, for both personal safety and protection to the roofing material. An easily built chicken ladder is shown below.



When the time comes that a roof should be replaced, it is advisable to use a fireproof material, such as asbestos cement shingles. Roof communicated fires account for a high percentage of all farm fire



These servicemen should apply to their Local War Price and Rationing Boards and present both their temporary duty orders and the mileage rationing record (OPA R-534) for the car





"Self-Cooling" Water Pit AN AMPLE supply of water is important as feed for profitable livestock enterprises. Here is a simple "self-heating and cooling" water container for hogs and

except when an animal is drinking. When an animal is thirsty, it lifts the hinged cover with its nose. When it has finished, the animal steps back and the cover comes

down.

The temperature of the water is controlled by the temperature of the earth, which does not fluctuate like the temperature of the air. In winter the ground keeps the water from freezing; in summer it keeps the water cool.

The pit may be any convenient size, with the covers small enough so that there is no danger of young animals falling or being pushed in. The recommended depth is from 15 to 20 feet, with the greater depth favored for cold climates.




