The bale was ginned by the local Farmers Union Cooperative Gin, and was grown by Joe Jenkins, farms in Haskell County, between Weinert and Rochester.

Out of 1980 pounds of snapped cotton, Mr. Jenkins received a 510pound bale. The cotton was purchased by Oates Golden, local cotton buyer, at 22 1/2 cents per pound. Following the usual custom, this first bale was ginned free of charge.
