

## Car Accidents Claim Two Lives Monday

### Funeral For O. W. Lee, Mrs. Tonn, Held On Wednesday

Tragedy and death, which cast a pall of sadness over the entire community, struck twice last Monday night in the family of Oliver Lee of Munday.

Mr. Lee, one of the county's beloved pioneers, died Monday night at about 7:30 o'clock shortly after he was struck by a car at a street intersection three blocks west of the main business district of Munday.

Mr. Lee was crossing the street and apparently stepped in front of the car driven by Bobby Cyfert of Munday. He was rushed to a local physician's office, where he died soon after arrival. In an investigation which followed, Cyfert was held blameless in the accident. Mr. Lee suffered a broken arm, breaks in both legs and numerous cuts and bruises.

Shortly after being notified of their father's death, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Lee and Mrs. Gene Tonn of Haskell left Fort Worth for Munday. The Lee car and one driven by David O. Andrews, 52, of Fort Worth collided about three miles north of Lake Worth, and Mrs. Tonn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Lee, was killed in the accident. Both Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Lee were injured and are receiving treatment at a Fort Worth hospital.

A third car in which Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Davis of Lubbock were enroute to Fort Worth crashed into the two cars, and both occupants were injured. They received hospital treatment.

Andrews was arrested after receiving hospital treatment and was charged with murder in Justice Court at Fort Worth in the death of Mrs. Tonn. He was accused in the murder complaint of driving while under the influence of liquor and causing Mrs. Tonn's death through "mistake and accident." Bond was set at \$5,000.

Oliver W. Lee was one of the country's true pioneers who spent nearly a half-century in furthering the advancement of Knox County through public and private efforts. He was born in Jackson County, Tenn., on January 9, 1867, and died at the age of 79 years, 1 month, and 5 days.

He was married to Irene Belle Smith in Tennessee on November 11, 1896. She had been in Texas several years with her family, but returned to Tennessee for her marriage.

To this union, four children were born: Irene Scythe Lee (Mrs. Eugene Tonn of Haskell) who was born October 4, 1897, and died at (Continued on Page 8)

### State's Youths Offered Awards

National Junior Vegetable Growers Open Sixth Contest With \$6,000 In Scholarships

Texas town and country boys and girls are entering competition for college scholarships in a nationwide contest of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association, Chesley Hines, Mississippi State College extension horticultural specialist, announces.

Outlining the sixth annual vegetable production and marketing project in which awards of \$6,000 have been made available by A & P Food Stores, Hines said:

"Working with the soil is an education in itself, and the contest is designed to give awards as an incentive to efficient gardening and marketing. Size of project is not a factor, since contestants are scored on efficiency, improvements in methods, leadership in community and school activities, and scores attained in a study course."

Scholarship to be awarded in 1946 include \$500 to the national champion, a \$200 scholarship for each of the four regional winners, \$100 checks to 33 sectional winners and the remainder of the award money in lesser awards within each state. The contest opens to all boys and girls between 12 and 21 years of age.

### Doctors Oppose Social Medicine

Fort Worth.—More than 100,000 poll taxes have been paid this year at the direct solicitation of the physicians of Texas by citizens opposed to socialized medicine and who also favor a constructive medical and public health program in the Texas legislature, so Dr. Holman Taylor, secretary of the State Medical Association of Texas stated today.

"The State Medical Association made a strong appeal to its 6,000 members and the members of its Women's Auxiliary to see that all people opposed to the Federal legislation which would destroy the private practice of medicine qualified as voters," Dr. Taylor says. "The results were most encouraging for we estimate that more than 100,000 voters qualified with the definite purpose of opposing unfriendly and destructive legislation both State and national. The physicians of Texas and their friends are going to take a hand in next summer's elections. They will support Congressmen in every district who are opposed to socialized medicine and will favor legislators who believe in constructive public health measures."

## Many Expected For Calf Show

Plans are virtually completed for the 12 annual 4H Club Calf Show, which will be held in Munday next Saturday. Munday merchants are welcoming club boys, their parents and friends here for the day, and are planning an interesting program for the event.

Some 18 calves will be shown this year in two divisions, the senior and junior divisions, with two top prizes of \$10 offered in each division. Prizes will graduate downward, but each boy showing a calf in the show is assured of a \$5.00 prize. Grand champion calf will be awarded \$15.00; while a \$10.00 prize goes to reserve champion. A total of \$155.00 in prizes will be awarded.

The Broach building, recently opened by Fred Broach, Jr., under the firm name of Broach Motor and Equipment, will be used for the show. Calves will be on exhibit in the portion of the building formerly occupied by Massey Motor Service, while the larger building will be used to serve the noon-day dinner.

A delicious ranch style dinner, consisting of fried Steak, ranch style beans, onions, pickles and other edibles will be served to the club boys, their parents and all visitors. Admission to the dinner will be by ticket only, but there will be no charges. Various members of the Chamber of Commerce will have tickets to distribute to the visitors.

The calves will be shown for judging purposes on the lot just west of the Farm Machinery Co. Judge of the show will be Mr. J. A. Seefeld, district extension agent of Texas A. and M. College. Competition will be stiff, as the ten best calves will be sent to the district show in Wichita Falls.

Eight of the club calves shown here will be offered for sale at public auction after the show. Should a purchased wish his calf placed in the local locker plant, special arrangements are being offered by Mr. John Taylor, manager, for processing the meat. The animals can be taken care of immediately after purchase, it was stated.

A feature of the show will be a livestock judging contest between the 4-H and F. F. F. boys of Knox and adjoining counties.

The Munday school band, under the direction of H. A. Owens, will be featured for about 30 minutes, beginning at about 11:30 o'clock.

The show is expected to attract many visitors from this section of the state, and those in charge are expecting to make this the greatest calf show ever held in the county.

Awarding of prizes will be by the Munday Chamber of Commerce.

## NATIONAL BOY SCOUT WEEK

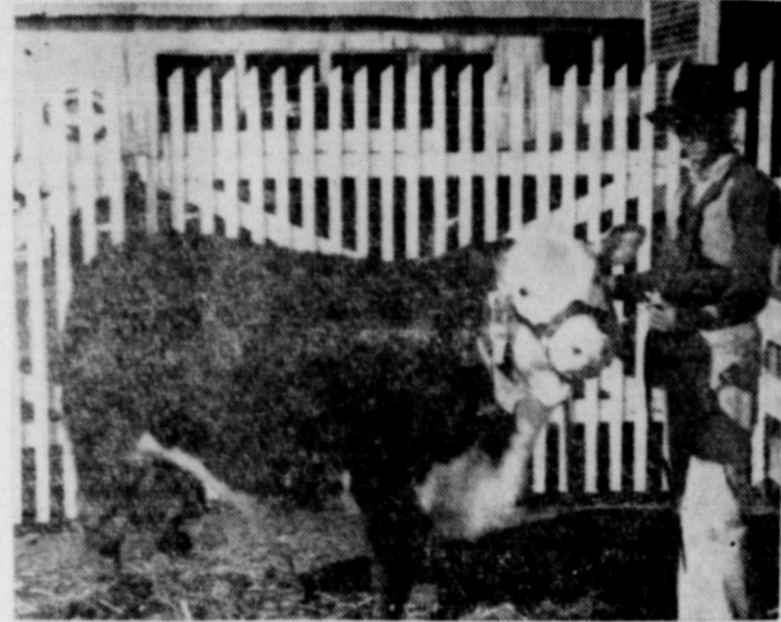

AN ORDINANCE requiring all persons, firms, or corporations who may install or equip any residence, business house, or apartment house or other building within the corporate limits of the CITY OF MUNDAY, Texas with any installation or equipment to use as fuel any form of manufactured or liquefied petroleum gases or butane gases, to use in such installation only standard grades of pipe, appliances, and equipment; requiring any system, appliances, or storage tanks used for any form of manufactured or liquefied petroleum gases or butane gases to bear the label of approval and/or listing of the Underwriters' Laboratories; prohibiting the storage of liquefied petroleum gas or butane gas containers inside any building; defining the term "Standard Grade"; requiring that all such equipment be installed or repaired in a workmanlike manner to comply with all laws or regulation; prohibiting the use of any equipment which uses liquefied gas or butane gas within the fire limits of the City of Munday, Texas; requiring the inspection and approval of any equipment before being placed in operation by the City Inspector, and providing for an inspection fee of ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) for each piece of equipment so inspected; requiring all tank trucks and tank trailers used in the transportation of liquefied petroleum gases or butane gases to be constructed and operated so as to comply with the regulation for design, construction, and operation of same as approved by the National Board of Fire Underwriters and the National Fire Protection Association; requiring that such tank trucks and tank trailers shall be kept in good condition at all times; providing for the immediate repair of any defect in such automobile equipment, and subjecting such tank trucks and tank trailers to special inspection at all times; prohibiting storage and parking of tank trucks and tank trailers on streets, and inside any building in FIRE LIMITS of the City of Munday, Texas; requiring the use of malodorant in liquefied petroleum or butane gas sold within the City of Munday, Texas; prohibiting the construction of and maintenance of Bulk Storage Stations for any form of manufactured and/or liquefied petroleum gases or butane gases within 800 feet of any private residence, business house, apartment house or any other building within the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas, and all such equipment for construction of Bulk Storage Tanks shall be of a standard grade and bear the label of approval and/or listing of the Underwriters' Laboratories; requiring that the construction of Bulk Storage Stations for manufactured liquefied petroleum gases or butane gases be done in a manner as approved by the National Fire Protection Association; and said Bulk Storage Stations for manufactured liquefied petroleum gases or butane gases must be approved, and in-

pected by the City Inspector of the City of Munday, Texas, and inspection fee of ONE DOLLAR (\$1.00) for each piece of installation equipment to cover the cost of inspection. Providing a penalty for the violation of any provision of this ordinance, and providing that if any part of this ordinance shall be construed to be invalid such invalidity shall not affect the remainder of this ordinance and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MUNDAY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That all persons, firms or corporations who may from and after the effective date of this ordinance, install or equip any residence, business house, or apartment house, or any other building located and situated within the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas with any installation or equipment designed to use as fuel any form of manufactured and/or liquefied gases or butane gases shall use in any such installation (whether for domestic or industrial use) only standard grade of pipe and/or piping, and all appliances used in connection with such installation shall be a standard grade and type of equipment. Any system which uses any form of manufactured and/or liquefied gases or butane gases must bear the label of approval and/or listing of the Underwriters' Laboratories. The storage of any liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases in any container, either above ground or underneath any building in the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas.

SECTION 2. The term "STANDARD GRADE" as used herein shall mean that grade of article which is accepted by the dealers in such equipment and recognized as complying with all fire regulations.

SECTION 3. Any such equipment as provided for shall be installed and/or repaired in a workmanlike manner which shall comply with all laws and/or regulations of the City of Munday, Texas, and the regulation of the National Board of Fire Underwriters and the National Fire Protection Association; and no equipment using liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases shall be permitted within the fire limits as defined by ordinance of the City of Munday, Texas.

SECTION 4. When any such equipment is installed as herein provided, same shall not be placed in operation or used by any person unless and until said installation has been approved, as complying with this ordinance by the City Inspector of the City of Munday, Texas.

SECTION 5. Any person, firm or corporation installing any such equipment as herein provided shall secure the approval of a complying with the requirements of this ordinance by the City Inspector of the City of Munday, Texas, as herein provided for, and shall, upon requesting such inspection for approval, pay and inspection fee of \$1.00 for each piece of equipment, to cover cost of inspection.

SECTION 6. All tank trucks and tank trailers used for the transportation of liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases within the City of Munday, Texas shall be so constructed as to comply with the regulations for the design, construction and/or operation of automobile tank trucks and tank trailers for the transportation of liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases as approved by the National Board of Fire Underwriters and the National Fire Protection Association. Any person, firm or corporation who shall operate or cause to be operated any tank truck and/or tank trailer used for the purpose of transporting liquefied gas and/or butane gas with the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas, shall keep such equipment in good condition at all times, and upon the development of any defect that would create a hazard to person or property, said tank truck or tank trailer shall be removed from the streets of the City of Munday, Texas until such defects have been repaired, or faulty equipment replaced and any such tank trucks and tank trailers shall be subject to inspection by the proper authorities at any time. No tank truck and/or tank trailer or bottled gas shall be parked, stored and/or operated upon any street within the fire limits except trucks in transit may use the designated highway enroute; nor shall they be stored inside and/or outside of any building within the fire limits as defined by ordinance of the City of Munday, Texas.

SECTION 7. All liquefied petroleum gas and/or butane gas sold within the City of Munday, Texas shall be treated with a malodorant in such quantities as required by the State LAW to create an odor easily detected in case of leaks in piping and/or equipment.

SECTION 8. That all persons, firms and/or corporations are prohibited from the construction of and maintenance of BULK STORAGE STATIONS for any form of manufactured and/or liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases within 800 feet of any private residence, business house, apartment house, and/or any other building located within the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas. Any person, firm and/or corporation who shall construct or maintain any Bulk Storage Station as permitted under this ordinance, for liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases, shall use in any such installation only standard grade of storage tanks, pipes and fittings, all appliances used in connection with any such installation and all such equipment for such bulk storage tanks for storage of liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases must bear the label of approval and/or listing of the Underwriters Laboratories and as approved by the National Fire Protection Association, and the said installation must be approved by the City Inspector of the City of Munday, Texas and pay an inspection fee of \$1.00 for each piece of installation equipment, to cover the cost of inspection.

SECTION 9. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction for the violation thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Two-Hundred and No/100 Dollars (\$200.00); and each day of use and/or operation of any equipment without having first secured the approval of the City Inspector of the City of Munday, Texas shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 10. In the event any section or part of section or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the valid portions hereof, which shall be enforceable regardless of such holding.

SECTION 11. The fact that there does not now exist any rule or ordinance regulating and controlling the installation or use of manufactured or liquefied petroleum gases and/or butane gases within the corporate limits of the City of Munday, Texas, which said gases are highly volatile and inflammable and if not properly controlled and regulated constitutes a dangerous and hazardous condition affecting life and property, creates an emergency and imperative necessity for the immediate preservation of the public welfare and safety, which necessitates the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read on three separate days before final passage thereof, and that no ordinance shall become effective before expiration of ten days from the date of its final passage; wherefore such rules are hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be effective from and after its final passage, and it is so ordained.

## County's Club Boys Are Consistent Winners In Wichita Falls District Show

It takes but a glance at the records of County Agent R. O. Dunkle, to see that the 4-H Club boys from Knox County are stiff competition each year at the district 4-H Calf Show in Wichita Falls.

They have been consistent winners during the 12 years that they have shown calves in Knox County and in the district show. Mr. Dunkle's records, however, cover the period in which he served as county agent, which are for the past four years.

During this time, the boys have shown several individual winners and have carried off a number of group prizes.

The Knox County boys have won first place in a group of five calves for seven consecutive years, until 1945, when they were edged out, Dunkle's records show. During the showing, they have won four grand championships and one reserve championship since 1937. This has been in competition with 16 other counties over the area.

The 31 club boys who have participated in the 4-H Club show at Wichita Falls during the past four years have won \$716,000 in premiums and have sold 33,280 pounds of baby beef for a total of \$7,488.00.

This project which the boys have carried on for the past twelve years has proven to be a profitable one, to the boys and to the county in that Knox has gained much favorable publicity through the various shows. It is fitting that merchants and business men of the county encourage them in their work of carrying on these important projects, and of training themselves for future citizenship.

The 4-H Club calf show is held each year in Knox County, and during this time Knox City and Munday have alternated in "playing hosts" to the club boys, their parents, and friends for the annual show.

## Rhineland Farmer Making Practice of Soil Conservation

E. N. Montandon of the East Rhineland Conservation Group, cooperating with the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District is making progress in applying a complete coordinated conservation program on his farm. His agreement was approved by District Supervisors in October 1944 and since then he has been carrying out the plan worked out jointly by the Soil Conservation technicians and Mr. Montandon.

Mr. Montandon has completed all the terraces on his farm. The terrace system will serve for two purposes, control erosion and water conservation. He believes that every man is entitled to all the water that falls on his farm and has made the necessary steps toward this goal. On land that needs terracing, it has been found that this is one of first conservation practices that should be installed.

Last fall he planted 20 acres of Austrian Winter Peas as soil improving and winter cover crops. At present the peas have a very good root growth and considerable foliage growth can be expected as the weather becomes warmer. The peas are offering some grazing for his livestock. The peas were inoculated with artificial bacteria before planting. Since Austrian Winter Peas are legumes, it has been the ability to take nitrogen from aid add to the soil. From now on this farmer plans to plant some soil improving crop on his land every year.

Mr. Montandon is interested in planting additional pasturage for his livestock and plans to plant 25 acres of Weeping Love Grass this spring.

Besides carrying out the above conservation practices, he stubbled mulched 25 acres of crop land this year. Stubble mulching is plowing

the soil in such a manner that as much stubble and crop residue will be left on or near the surface of the ground as possible.

The above conservation practices will not only help conserve the soil but will improve it as the years go by.

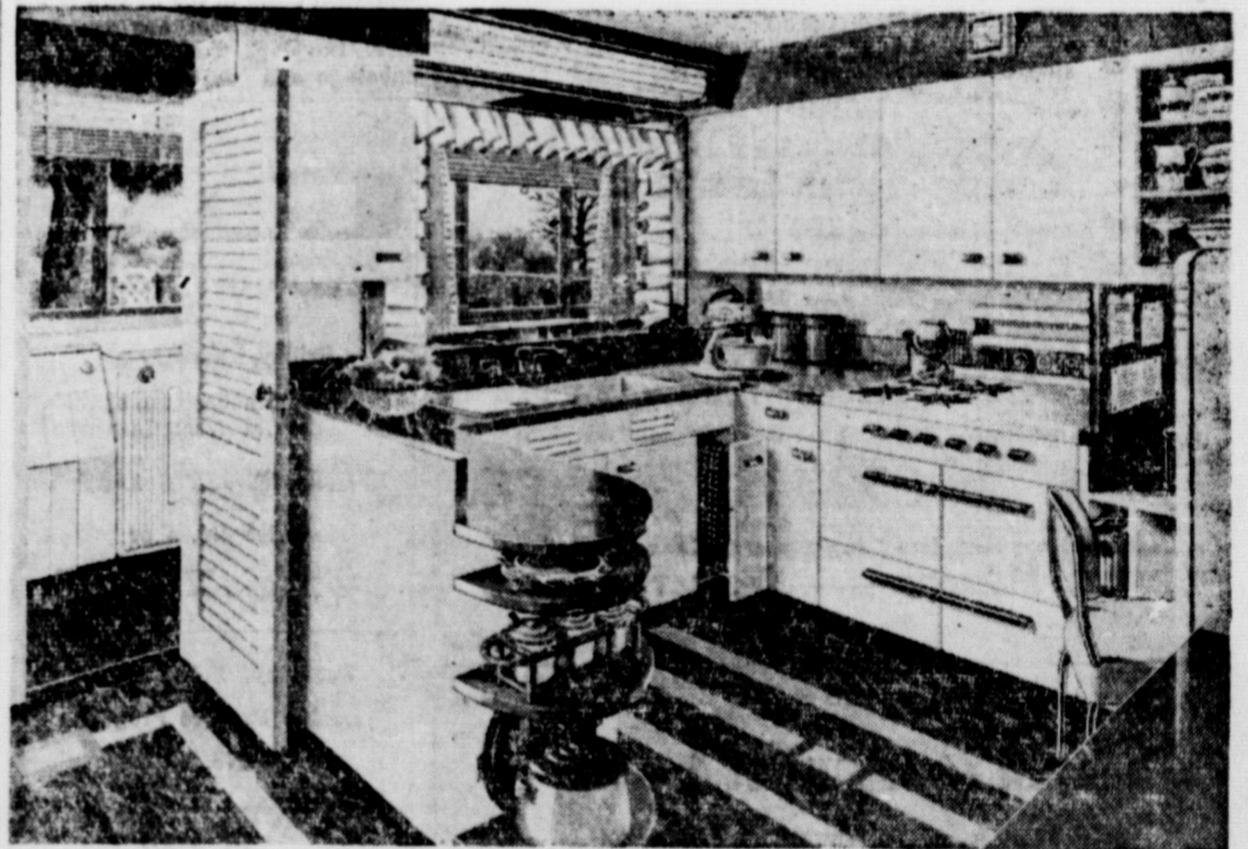

### Washington News Letter

By Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D. C., Feb. 8.—I have just returned from a little surprise birthday party given for Congressman J. J. Mansfield of Texas, affectionately called "Judge" Mansfield. The Judge has represented the 9th District of Texas for 15 consecutive terms, or 30 years. Before coming to Congress he was a county attorney and then a county judge. He has served in public office continuously for about 60 years, and is now 85 years of age. He is one of the most highly respected, best loved Members of Congress.

After coming to Congress he suffered and accident and has been in a wheel chair for many years. His memory and mind have not been impaired by age, and he is one of the most mentally alert and active men whom I have seen in my pleasure to know. He has served longer as Chairman of the House Committee on Rivers and Harbors than any person in the history of the nation. He perhaps knows more about the rivers and harbors of America than any living man. His home town is Columbus, Texas.

I dropped into the house cafeteria with friends this morning for a cup of coffee. The girl at the coffee urns remarked that in the previous two hours she had served more than 66 gallons of this favorite beverage. It appears that Capitol Hill employees really go in for coffee drinking.

In the House Committee on Immigration this week I made a motion to take up my bill, H. R. 3663, to restrict immigration. The motion carried by a vote of 9 to 7. Hearings will start within two weeks. The bill will deny admission to this country to all persons who bore arms against us during World War II, all members of the Fascist and Nazi parties, the Gestapo, Storm Troopers, and auxiliary organizations, and will reduce immigration by 50 per cent for a period of ten years.

About one-third of the people in this country are either foreign-born or one or more of their parents were born abroad. Many of these are among our best citizens. However, it seems to me we should restrict immigration until our so-called "melting pot" has melted and until we have clearly assimilated all those who have arrived in recent years.

It might be interesting to note that the Commissioner of Immigration is an Italian by the name of Ugo Carusi. The Chairman of the House Committee on Immigration is Mr. John Lesski of Michigan, who is Polish.

Persons returning from inspection trips in the Pacific war theaters unanimously agree that Manila, once one of the most beautiful cities in the Orient, is the most devastated of any war-torn city. The Japs did a good job of sabotage and destruction before

leaving Manila. Buildings constructed of mortar and steel were dynamited and the job of clearing these sites for new construction is a tremendous one. Our High Commissioner to the Philippines, Paul V. McNutt, just back with plans for assistance for the Filipinos. Not only did the Japs devastate their cities, but most of their livestock was killed and their tools and equipment stolen or destroyed. Their plight is indeed serious. We are to give them complete independence on July 4 of this year. Measures are now under consideration to extend them certain economic advantages in order to aid their rehabilitation. We will retain military and naval bases in the Islands.
