

# 59th Legislature 'Most Productive,' Sums Up County's New State Representative

Take it all - in - all and that 59th legislature did a "pretty damn good job."

Bailey county's new state representative came to Muleshoe last week and made a report on the 59th. He agrees with Gov. John Connally that the legislature was "the most productive in Texas history."

State Representative Jesse T. George, Morton, made one of his first appearances in Muleshoe since the legislative redistricting plan approved recently by the legislature. He spoke before the Muleshoe Lions club.

"I think it was generally conceded that we faced a greater and more varied assortment of problems than any legislature in recent times," said the representative, "and the produc-

tion was made that we couldn't accomplish everything that needed to be accomplished without one or more special sessions. Well, we did."

"We were challenged to provide more effective coordination and financing for higher education. This was part of our quest for excellence and eminence in our colleges and universities."

George said the legislature was also challenged "to provide salary raises for public teachers, and there were conflicting plans which did not make our problem easy."

Another challenge which the recent legislature faced was "making drastic changes in the care of the mentally ill and mentally retarded, and to provide an effective program for

eradication of tuberculosis."

He said the legislature was fortunate in having a substantial surplus in the general revenue fund, but added, "almost every agency and service of the state government was requesting more money to provide more services to more people."

As a result of all this, George said, "we faced the biggest budget in Texas history - more than \$3.5 billion for the next biennium."

The legislator said the volume of bills was "seven heavier than that handled by the 58th legislature which had set a record two years ago."

"In the house," George summed up, "a total of 1187 bills was introduced, and of these, 491 were passed. In the senate 587 bills were introduced and

271 passed for a total passed by both bodies of 762."

The young Morton legislator said 132 constitutional amendments were proposed. Of this number, 27 were passed and will be submitted during the next two years' for the voters' approval or rejection.

He said the redistricting which must take place as a result of the supreme court ruling of "one man, one vote" was completed before the court's deadline - Aug. 2.

He outlined several of the 27 proposed constitutional amendments.

One would extend the term for all state officers to four years but would not limit the number of terms an officer could hold. That matter will be voted on Nov. 2.

Still another amendment which comes up for vote: action Nov. 8, next year, would set up a state-wide system of retirement, disability and death compensation benefits for officers and employees of counties.

On Sept. 7 this year, the voters are to decide whether to accept a 39 - member senate, and on Nov. 8, will decide on the proposal to extend the term of state representatives to four years.

Also on Nov. 2, voters will act on the proposal to increase the salary of the lieutenant governor and speaker of the house. Still another amendment facing voters Nov. 2, if approved, would authorize loans to students in schools of higher education. This proposal is

similar to the National Defense Education act, George explained.

Next year an amendment is to be accepted or rejected which would repeal poll tax as a requisite for voting.

Still another proposal would require that all land designated for agricultural use shall be assessed only as such. He said many farmers favor this provision, believing it would aid rural areas.

"In the matter of taxes," the legislator told the Lions, "the biggest change came in the boosted cigarette tax. We raised this three cents to the package - from 8 cents to 11 cents. It is estimated that this feature alone will add \$73 million to the state treasury."

He said still another tax

change would limit the period for collecting inheritance tax to 15 months after death "and this should add an additional \$6 million to the state coffers."

He concluded: "Looking back at the legislative session just ended, I believe it was one of the busiest sessions ever held. We passed laws ranging from regulation of the length of terms to statewide water development."

George's district now contains Bailey county. Previously he had only four counties in his district.

The new re - districting bill makes many changes in territories. "For example, Congressman George Mahon now has Midland county in his district, and Congressman (See LEGISLATURE, Page 8)

DeShazo Elementary School is biting the dust these days. Modernity has caught up with the old red brick school, and a sprawling snazzy new structure has laid the DeShazo complex on the shelf of antiquity.

Workmen this past week began ripping the lid off the west unit of DeShazo, and soon the building which served many a Muleshoe kid during his ABC years in the '20's, will be only a memory.

Novian Brick Co. of Altus, Okla., this past week began the dusty job of ripping out DeShazo's innards.

You can buy the brick in about 10 days, with all the 41 - year - old mortar scraped off. Bill Novian says the brick will be for sale, and he might even be willing to deal you just a brick or two to put on the mantle and point to as coming from the school where Junior (who turned 25 last week) went to school back in the Roaring '20's. Anyway, it's an idea.

Novian and his crew \$3855 to raze the two buildings, and he also gets the brick. Of course he also must destroy the foundation and level the ground, eliminating all trace of the two old schoolhouses.

Only the gymnasium will be left, and it's due for extensive remodeling later this year.

Wrecking crews are finding evidences of many improvements and additions made during the 41 - year - history of the house. Except for the walls, it was strictly a wood structure, even the superstructure is made of wood, and the original wiring was of the old-fashioned porcelain knobs and

## New Pay Scale To Boost Local Teachers' Salaries By \$60,000

Muleshoe school teachers will get \$60,000 more salary during the next school year than they received in the 1964 - 65 term, thanks to the new pay schedule.

All figures are tentative, says Superintendent Neal Dillman who is up to his ears in figures these days, trying to apply the new pay schedule to the system's 103 professional people.

"We can't know the exact total salary increase until we have completed hiring all the teachers we will need," Dillman explained. "Since experience and education figure into the cost set - up. However, since we have only three teachers left to hire, the \$60,000 figure is fairly accurate to use as a general figure."

Professional people (teachers and administrators) in the system last year drew \$553,300 in salaries, Dillman figures the payroll will climb to \$614,700 during the next school year.

Muleshoe schools were paying more than the state scale previously, and it will continue to allow teachers a better pay scale than the state provides in many instances.

"For example," says Dillman, "we are raising every teacher \$250 a year, regardless of the increase voted by the reg. legislature. That's more of

an increase than the state allowed for some teachers, especially beginners. We do this as an incentive for teachers to remain with our staff."

Last year a beginning teacher with only a bachelor's degree received \$4514 for nine months' work. Under the 1965 - 66 scale, such a teacher will receive a total of \$4739.

At the top of the scale is the experienced teacher with a master's degree. A teacher who has been in the business for 16 years, for example, and holds a master's degree will get a boost of \$963 for the year, bringing her salary from \$5738 to \$6701.

Others with master's degrees will receive from \$250 (for the teacher without experience) up to a maximum of \$6768.

Beyond 16 years' experience, however, the salary remains practically unchanged even if the experience mounts to 30 years.

Because of the extra hours which they put in, specialty teachers such as coaches, band directors and choir directors receive boosts beyond the regular classroom schedule.

Muleshoe has only one teacher who can qualify for the near-maximum pay. Dillman said Friday after checking through his records. "We have one teacher with a master's degree who has been in the profession for 16 years. Under the plan, she will receive \$963 more money in 1965 - 66 than previously. This will bring her salary up to \$6532 as compared with \$5569 last year," the superintendent explained.

The new pay scale offered considerable financial incentive to secure a master's degree. For example, the teacher with 16 years' experience but with only a bachelor's degree will draw a top of \$5738 as compared with the \$6532 figure for a teacher with a master's degree and with the same experience record.

## Bird Business Booming Here; Outlook Bright

Thirty - five years ago, Muleshoe raised mules (and some horses).

But today it's birds — parakeets.

Last Sunday's issue of The Journal contained an account of C. F. Garth's bird plant on West Third. Garth told how he got into the business and now is finding the vividly - feathered little creatures profitable and interesting.

His neighbor, Mrs. Jay Brantley, also is in the business in a smaller way.

But now it develops that H. H. Snow, 308 W. 29th is also in the biggest business in an even bigger way. He has 2000 birds, and a neighbor is building a similar plant. Snow, who houses his birds in 10 by 16 - foot pens, is planning to help his neighbor put in a 2000 bird plant in September.

Those places — two librarians and an auto mechanics instructor — are the only places open at this time, but Superintendent Neal Dillman said Friday that there are always last - minute resignations and shifts.

The librarians, one for an elementary school and the other for junior high, must have degrees in library science or have had 12 hours of library science courses in college. In the latter case, the librarian must attend summer school for two years to continue studies in library science.

The auto mechanics' teacher does not have to have a degree, but he must attend two special summer courses at the University of Texas to learn teaching methods, the superintendent said.

All kitchen equipment and furniture have been taken from the old cafeteria and from the old home-making room.

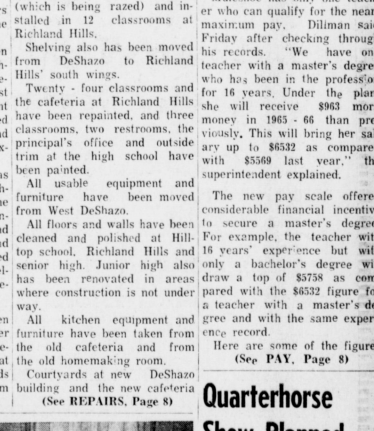
Quartermaster Show Planned

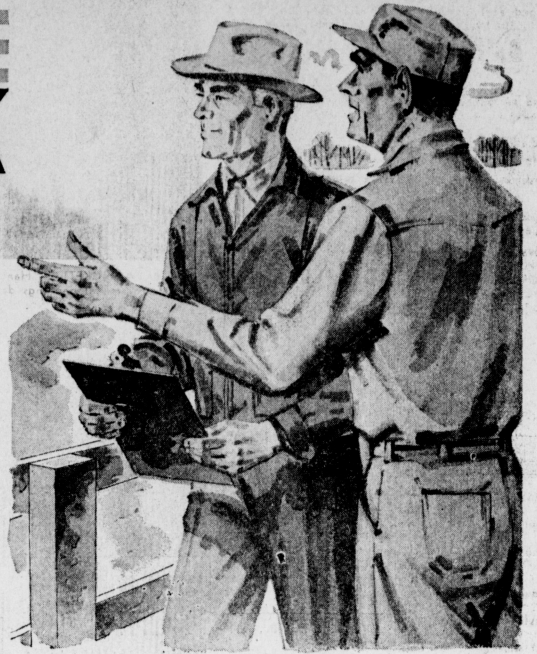

## Wirtz Requests 'Full Support' Of Labor Bills

Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz this past week called for the full support of legislation to eliminate the inequities which agricultural workers presently endure.

In testimony before the Subcommittee on Migratory Labor, Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare, Secretary Wirtz said that "constructive legislation is now demanded, as a part of the war on poverty," to meet these inequities.

He presented the general picture of the farm situation, as follows: "There are approximately 1,800,000 people who are hired for 25 days or more a year to do agricultural work."  
"About 360,000 (or 20 percent) of this total number are 'migrant laborers' — in the sense that they move, during the year, from one crop area to another."

earnings from non-farm work are included. These figures do not include the furnishing of room, board, etc.

"Total annual earnings of migrant farm workers who work 25 or more days on the farms during the year average (1951) \$877 — for an average of 109 days worked."

"There are about 10,000,000 farms in the United States. One percent of them (100,000) account for 51 percent of total farm wages paid."

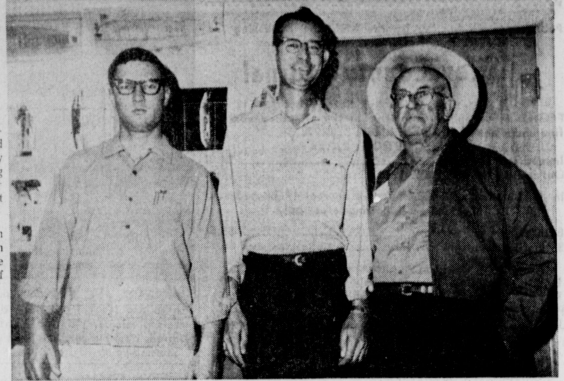

(Continued From Page One) Dillman pointed out:

"A teacher with bachelor's degree and for the first five years' experience will receive only \$250 a year more. However the pay ranges from \$4514 for the beginner up to \$5060 for the teacher with five years' experience already having been taken into account.

"But beyond the fifth year, the teacher with only a bachelor's degree will see a considerable increase in his pay. Under the new plan, a teacher with bachelor's degree and 12 years'

experience will receive \$5758, \$629 more per year than the same teacher received last year."

The same ceiling is reached in the case of a master's degree holder. After the 18th year, the teacher reaches to the top, \$6788 on through the 30th year.

The new pay schedule applies only to "professional people" as Dillman calls classroom. Nevertheless, at a board meeting this past week, it was decided to boost bus drivers' pay by \$5 per month.

Altogether the schools have a total personnel of 155 persons.

"One of the nice things about the pay raise," Dillman declared, "is the fact that the school tax rate will not be increased, even though the local district assumes some of the cost of the raises.

"We will be able to hold our tax scale at \$1.85 per hundred dollars' valuation.

Dillman says the final increase cannot be determined until the entire teaching staff is complete. "We might hire a teacher with a master's degree and several years' experience or we might hire one with only a bachelor's degree and no experience. Naturally this
