The Senate Monday completed congressional action on the administration's "ever normal granary" crop control bill after crushing opposition from livestock, poultry and dairy industries. It now goes to





Question: What is the difference between a "scalloped" dish and an

"au gratin" dish? "Au gratin" is a French term meaning "covered with crumbs." These crumbs may be cracker or bread crumbsand grated cheese is often added. However, cheese is not essential to make it an "au gratin" dish. A "scalloped" dish is understood to be fish, meat, vegetable or a combination of these, cut in small pieces and baked with a liquid or sauce, or some substantial material, to give it body. Usually this is a bread crumb mixture. The top of the scalloped dish is usually covered with buttered crumbs. This dish is "done" when the sauce bubbles up through the top crumb mixture. Food combinations of this sort were first baked in scallop shells-that's how they came by their name. You'll find them sometimes called "escalloped" dishes-the word spelled with an "e" before it.

Question: Why does the milk curdle in scalloped potatoes? There are several things that will cause the milk to curdle. Milk that is a little old is a common reason, or too much salt. The most common cause is baking the potatoes in too hot an oven. Too high a temperature will cause the milk to break down and separate. I always scald the milk before pouring it over the raw potatoes (seasoning with salt, pepper and often cheese) in my baking dish, or else make a thin white sauce and use it with potatoes which are partially cooked. Above all, remember to use an oven

that is only moderate (not over 350°).
