Candied Fruit Made At Home Is

Perhaps you were like a lot of us, and in spite of your good resolutions, let the holidays arrive and find you unprepared. When you got ready to make the fruit cake you found the ingredients very expensive to buy, and there was no time left in which to make them. Let's start the new year off right-now is the time before you loose the holiday spirit, suggests Eugenia H. Butler, Knox County Home Demonstration Agent. Home candied fruit and fruit peel in your holiday boxes, and will subtract a noticable amount from the cost of your fruit cake.

Thick peel of bright color is especially suited for crystallizing. The method is simple enough, for it is just a matter of cutting the peel into strips about 1/2 inch in width, and boiling in three different waters.

Miss Butler says to grate the peel lightly on an ordinary grater to break the oil cells before cutting. Then for each quart of peel, add 3 pints of cold water and boil 10 minutes. Fresh water is used for each of the 3 boilings to remove the bitter flavor.

Dry the fruit between folds of cloth and cook in boiling syrup until the peel becomes transparent. Make your syrap by boiling together 1½ pounds of sugar and six ounces of water. You can add






