Fixing Up the Farm by BURTON WILLIAMS **Estimating Fire Hazards**

ON the average farm, winter means not only cold weather but also increased fire hazards. If you haven't done so already, now s the time to look around and eliminate as many as possible.

Check your stove or furnace set-up in particular. Then, as an added precaution, be prepared to fight any small fires that may break out. Hand extinguishers are for controlling flames that otherwise might spread into disastrous fires. Have several, placed strategically at the more likely danger points.



The above sketch illustrates one ffective way to reduce fire hazards resulting from stoves. The stove can be set on a base consisting of a fireproof material such as asbes-tos cement board. Another piece of the same material can be nailed to the wall directly behind the stove to serve as a shield. Sparks or hot coals cannot burn asbestos cement board because it is made of incombustible minerals.

A wise investment in fire prevention is to enclose the furnace in a separate room with fire-resistant walls. Asbestos cement board, which is easily applied to wood framing, is ideal for this purpose, too. For more complete fire protec-tion, your house and other farm buildings should be covered with a fireproof roofing material. Among those used widely on farms are as-bestos shingles, which are weather-proof as well as fireproof.





The Texas State Heart Association was organized in 1934 and immediately became affiliated with American Heart Association. The Wichita Falls district of the state heart association comprises 15 counties, one of which is Knox county. Texas can be proud of the fact that is was one of the first states to have an organized heart association.

Organizations long have existed to fight tuberculosis and cancer. The war against infantile paralysis was dramatized by Franklin D. Roosevelt. This is universally recognized as a terrifying disease, but rheumatic heart disease causes 500 times as many deaths in infancy and childhood and cripples at least twice as many children as does infantile paralysis. Most astonishing is the apparent inevitability with which these facts have been accepted by so many people. For every death resulting from infantile paralysis \$525 is spent annually in the U. S. on research; for every death from heart disease, only 17 cents. Why, we ask, and are asked, has relatively so little been done to attack the problem of cardiovascular disease? How can we account for the fact that funds for medical research in this field have been so pitifully meager-so insignificant that vitally needed investigations have been delayed or abandoned for lack of support. 
