costs through an arrangement with J. B. Hine of Syracuse, N. Y., a former Houstonian, who owns land adjoining the battleground. Mr. Hine agreed to let the contractor pour the silt dredged from the slip on a 219-acre tract, free of charge. There will be about 250,000 cubic yards of silt, and at five cents a cubic yard, the amount usually charged, this would have amounted to \$12,500 but for the generous agreement given by Mr. Hine.

Pointing out the need for immediately raising the \$40,000 still needed, Mr. Gregory issued an appeal to civic and patriotic organizations, schools, and all others to help raise the money.

### Conservation Costs Offset By Higher Yields Per Acre

"No matter how you figure," says Emmett Partridge, Chairman of the Knox County Agricultural Conservation Committee, "conservation costs something—usually money. And if we let things go we'll pay for our conservation many times over—and we won't get it. The cost will be greatest if the job is neglected for them it will be paid in high priced food of poorer quality and reduced quantity."

"What many of us forget about conservation," says the chairman, "is that it's a national responsibility and that the Nation is one way or another, going to pay for it.

"If we let erosion take our land, we'll soon be paying by having less food and a lower standard of living. And the farmer isn't the only one who will suffer. In fact, the farmer may still be able to produce enough for his own use.

"The longer the Nation waits the more there will be to do and at a considerably higher price. And once the top-soil of a farm gets down into the Gulf of Mexico we won't get it back."

When it comes to ways of getting the job done, the chairman points out, it costs money and time and energy whether it is left solely to the individual farmer, or done through a publicly supported conservation program. Many of the most needed projects require the services of people with special engineering skill. Educational help and the use of costly machinery and equipment also are among the essentials.

"The Agricultural Conservation Program," the chairman explains, "is merely a means whereby the farmer gets some financial and material help for the most needed conservation jobs. Many of the jobs would not be done without that help. The program is a means for speeding up the needed action and for concentrating on practices which must have first attention. Operated through farmer-elected committees it is a thoroughly democratic way of getting a needed job done."

Looking Ahead

WOULD a 3,500 per cent increase in wages or salary interest you? If your income skyrocketed like that, you wouldn't be much worried about the high cost of living, would you? Wait a minute. Are you sure you'd be on easy street? Perhaps you will be surprised to learn that workers in France have had that amount of increase in their money earnings since 1914, and they still lack the necessities of life.

A brick layer in Paris worked 48 hours a week in 1914. He took home 45 francs a week, slightly less than one franc per hour. But today he gets 35 francs per hour. In 1914 he could buy four quarts of milk for his franc or a dozen-and-a-half eggs. But today for an hour's wages he can buy less than three quarts of milk and barely 7 eggs — if he can find them. Both items, plentiful in 1914 are now hard to obtain.

The lesson is this: the average breadwinner cannot hold his own once the inflation spiral gets going. No matter how often wages are increased, he gets farther and farther behind.

## Battleship Texas Headed Home; Gov. Jester To Receive Vessel April 21st

Houston—The gallant old Battleship Texas is finally headed home.

She has waited for more than two years at the Portsmouth Navy yards, Norfolk, Va., for that final sea voyage, and on March 15 Navy tugs were to begin towing her out to sea, down the East Coast, and home to Texas.

The big question now is what will happen to her once she gets to the Lone Star State and starts up the Houston ship channel to the San Jacinto Battlegrounds.

A total of \$40,000 is still needed to cover the costs of berthing the vessel, it has been reported by Lloyd C. Gregory, chairman of the Battleship Texas Commission. Mr. Gregory urges that every Texan join in one final effort to raise the money needed. Contributions are to be sent to Mr. Allen H. King, Treasurer, Battleship Texas Fund, Citizens State Bank, Houston, Texas.

Meanwhile, preparations for receiving the man-of-war are under way. Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz will personally present the ship to Governor Beauford Jester for the state of Texas at San Jacinto, April 21—San Jacinto Day. The presentation will take place at the battleground in a colorful ceremony which will be attended by a host of high naval officials and state and civic leaders.

Lloyd Gregory announced receipt of a telegram from Secretary of the Navy John L. Sullivan advising him that the native Texan strategist of the Pacific Fleet, Admiral Nimitz, will come

to Texas for the occasion.

With him will be Assistant Secretary of the Navy Mark Edwin Andrew, native of Houston, who was a naval captain during World War II, and Adm. Louis E. Denfeld, chief of naval operations.

Mr. Gregory said the presentation would take place shortly before noon San Jacinto Day.

The ship should reach the battlegrounds about April 10. It will be permanently berthed in a slip to be dug near the ship channel in the western section of the battleground, almost directly north of the San Jacinto Inn. Gregory said the commission had been able to save about \$12,000 of the dredging

## Work Is Progressing on \$50,000 Addition To Knox County Hospital

Knox City—The \$50,000 cream-brick addition to the Knox County Hospital, halted by bad weather, is now about 30 percent finished. L. J. Hill, Munday, contractor, said today.

The annex will be 42x122 feet in dimensions, contain 15 rooms and two wards, or a total of 24 beds, and an emergency operating room. It adjoins the two-story main building which contains 30 rooms. Hill said he is now working an average of 12 men daily. Work on the new addition began Jan. 3.

The original two-story brick building was erected in 1926. At that time N. S. Kilgore was county judge; and commissioners were M. G. Nix, D. C. Osborn, A. B. Sims, F. H. Propg.

An addition on the east side erected in 1943-44 contains nine rooms with 27 beds.

Officials said that the \$50,000 for the new annex would be insufficient to equip the rooms. Knox City Study club recently put on a benefit and secured funds. Organizations and private individuals who want to perpetuate their names by helping in furnishing the new addition are urged to confer with officials here, W. M. Griffith, Benjamin, is county judge.

The new building has an operating room. An innovation is that two yards in this structure will be for negroes—one for women and the other for men. When the new annex has been completed there will be rearrangement of some space. A superintendent's office will be installed on the right hand side just within the main building entrance.

Unwilling to be quoted, an attendant declared that the Knox County Hospital was paying its way. This was made with this reservation, "Of course, you know there are times when all county hospital institutions run in the red."

The attendant declared that the hospital was running "pretty full" all the time. And, furthermore, refuting popular conception, the hospital is doing charity work, but this has been rather light in recent years.

The institution has an iron lung.

The personnel of the hospital is: Superintendent, Beauah Sanders; surgical nurse, Mrs. Joe Watkins; registered nurses, Mrs. A. L. Fitzgerald, Miss Charlie Russell, Ruth Whitmore; registered nurse, R. C. Edwards.

Other staff: Paulene Marion, Matie Johnston, Billy Alexander, Mrs. W. C. McNellie, Mrs. S. H. Ward, Blanche Chavis, Bessie Venchert, Mrs. W. L. Woodward, Mrs. Clyde D. Covey, Mrs. Marie Bishop, Willie Jones, the latter the Bookkeeper.

John Bess Cogburn is receptionist; Mrs. Joyce Smith, cook; and kitchen attendants are: Mrs. Matty Cagle and Stella Cagle; John Lewis is janitor.

The hospital treats patients not only from Knox County but many adjoining counties, officials said. "We take many cases from Aspermont and other Stonewall county points," they said.—Abilene Reporter-News.

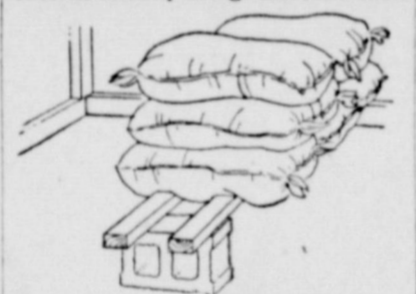

### Exterminating Rats

WITH grain and food conservation a pressing need today, one of the prime considerations of nearly every farmer should be extermination of rats. The annual damage to feed and flocks inflicted by rats amounts to millions of dollars. Not only do rats consume and spoil feed, but they kill chicks, spread diseases and damage buildings.

Number 1 on your program of rat extermination should be cleaning up trash piles and refuse of all kinds, especially in and near farm buildings. Then prepare for the kill by placing unpoisoned bait at locations frequented by rats. Repeat this operation for several nights to coax the rat population out in force. Meat or fish is good bait, being a change of pace from the rats' usual grain diet. After killing the rats into a false sense of security, place poison on the bait. About a week later repeat extermination, using different bait.



Don't overlook the importance of rat-proofing, however. The illustration above shows how grain can be stored on skids and blocks which leave plenty of room underneath for cats or dogs to catch prowling rats.

Another effective control measure is to line the walls and floors of your farm buildings with asbestos cement board, a mineral product which is impervious to rats. This material, which additionally is weatherproof and fireproof, also comes in the forms of siding and roofing.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be, said Dr. Cox, "of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid and poliomyelitis. Good community housekeeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the State."

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filth-borne, and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their spread.

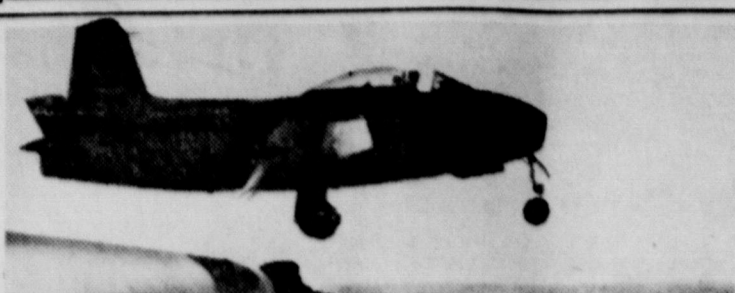

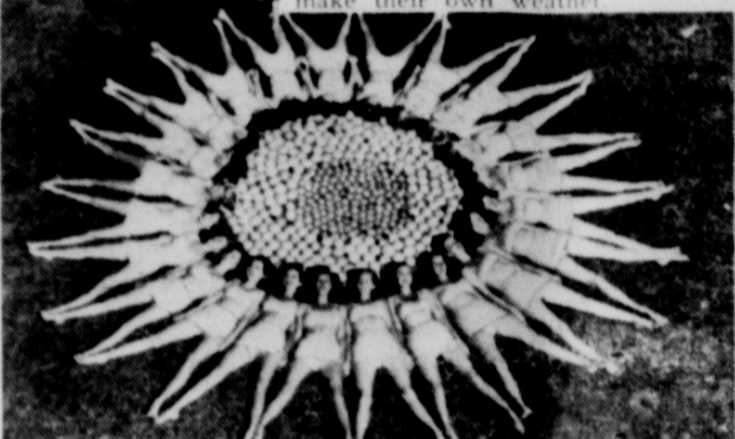

### Mrs. Billy Wayne Maddox Tells Of Establishing Home In Korea

Following is a letter written by Mrs. Polly Maddox to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Chamberlain.

Thursday, March 4

Dear Mother and all,  
Sorry I've waited so long to write. I have no excuse since I have nothing to do except take care of the children, and I don't do that all the time.

We stayed in Seoul (pronounced Sool—rhyme with pool) with Capt. and Mrs. Fendall (the couple who lived in the same house with us when we were in Carlisle, Pa.). We were there from Thurs. (12 Feb.) until Monday (16th) when we flew down to Cheju-Do on an army C-47. It is about a 2 hour trip by air. We did not get to

bring our hold baggage with us, and as yet have not received it. Wayne is going back to Seoul around the 12th to get his flying time and he will check on it then.

We live in a confiscated Japanese house. We have a room for Jimmy and Martha, one for Terry, a bedroom for us, a living room, dining room, kitchen, bath (tub and shower) and a big front and back yard all fenced with a high rock wall. The walls inside the house are all sliding panels, which can be removed very easily to make 2 rooms into 1 big room. One whole side of the living room is sliding glass panels. All the outside windows are sliding glass panels with inside panels of wooden-frame work (it makes small squares about 2'x3') covered with tissue-thin white paper. It's very pretty. The windows are all built like the Americans build window seats with the sliding paper panels on the inside edge. All doors on the cabinets and everything in the house are sliding. The only ones that work on hinges are the 2 back, outside doors.

The front entrance is a small room about 4'x5' with a part of the floor raised for convenience in removing shoes. Then there are sliding panels (paper) that open into another little room about 5' square and there are sliding panels (solid paper-board design) on all the other 3 sides. These lead into 2 of the bedrooms and ones goes into the main hallway in the house. Every room in the house may be reached without going through any other room. Even the closet doors are sliding panels. The outside of the house is stucco with a Japanese-type tile roof. There are no window shades or curtains. The paper panels on the inside of the windows serve as shades and the glass in the panels in the living room is treated so you can't see through it. The wall space on the inside that isn't sliding panels (and it's very little) is plaster (painted pale yellow). The only trim inside the house is polished hardwood panels about 3" wide which run from the ceiling to the floor. The walls are really made of bamboo plastered with mud, but it has the appearance of any plastered wall in the States. Our floors are covered with tatamis (straw mats). They are fitted together to cover the entire floor space, and they fit perfectly. The living room has a regular stateside rug on it. The dining room has a paper floor. It is called the Korean room since it is heated in the same manner that Korean houses are heated. There is a tunnel built under the floor, and on the outside of the dining room there is a place to

build a fire. The heat circulated through the tunnel under the floor and heats it. The fire is built on one side with a flu on the other side. The other heat we have is a kerosene heater for the children's room and a deisel stove for the living room. We have electric lights just like in the States, but we have no electricity during the day because it is used for an industrial plant here on the island. The power plant can't furnish enough electricity for the industry and the houses, too. There are no wall switches—just drops in the middle of the room. Of course we have rigged up extension cords so we can plug in the radio, phonograph, lamps, etc. I wish now I had brought the portable radio because we can't listen to either one of these without electricity. Wayne has a good set rigged with an aerial so we hear programs from all over the world. The other one is a combination radio-phonograph.

The house is furnished with furniture like Americans use. There are some Korean things to use in cooking. For example, the other afternoon, Lt. Merritt's houseboy came over with a big pot he used over a charcoal fire and roasted a duck for us. It was delicious. We have a wood range (just like the old ones at home). Also we have 2 little gasoline stoves if we want to use them, and when I do any cooking, I usually use one of them. I just tell the houseboy to make me a fire, and in no time at all I have a fire. We have a kerosene refrigerator. The kitchen is fairly nice. I have a built-in cabinet and sink with running water. And I can have running hot water all the time if I want it. It has to be heated by lighting the burner under the tank (similar to a water heater at home that isn't automatic). That's the way we get hot water for a shower. Other times the houseboys always have hot water in a kettle for us to use. The bathtub is built in one corner of the bathroom and is heated in the same manner the Korean room is. The tub is a heavy metal and is set in concrete, and built so the fire can be made under it. The water may be kept hot for hours.

We have 2 houseboys—Moon Chung Ni and Ko Hi Sou. They are always called by their last names which are written first. Ko has a Christian name (Elmer) which Father Sweeney gave him, so we call him Elmer. He is the one who speaks English. Moon speaks very little English and sometimes it's

difficult to make him understand what you want him to do. Neither one of them understands anything but pidgin English. They do all the house cleaning, washing, ironing, dish washing, and most of the cooking. There are several American dishes they don't know how to prepare. They take care of Martha, Terry, and Jimmy for me. Elmer makes Jimmy's formula every day. They feed him, change his diaper, do everything for him. I just do whatever I feel like doing. Elmer gets Terry's and Martha's breakfast and Moon takes care of Jimmy every morning. I sleep until I'm ready to get up. Coffee is waiting for me. All I have to do is tell Elmer what I want to eat and he fixes it.

Sometimes I get my own breakfast. Wayne comes home at 12 for lunch, so I usually get his lunch; but I haven't washed a dish since I've been here. The boys do an excellent job of washing and you should see the ironing. Moon ironed one of Martha's little dresses, and it was perfect. They have quarters in back of our house. Their little house is in our back yard. I would never even have to get myself a glass of water if I didn't want to. Anything I want or need to have done (even mending, sewing buttons on, etc.). I just tell one of the houseboys to do it.

I am getting sleepy so I'll close for this time. I will write again soon. We are anxious to know about the household things. Have (Continued on next page)

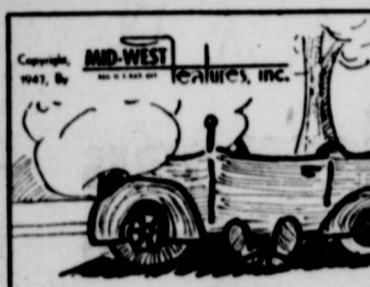

There is only one other little American boy on the island. He's 15 mo. old. Martha is the first

They are so full of curiosity they seem as though it's the first time they have ever seen an American. Sometimes we can hardly get down the street for them.

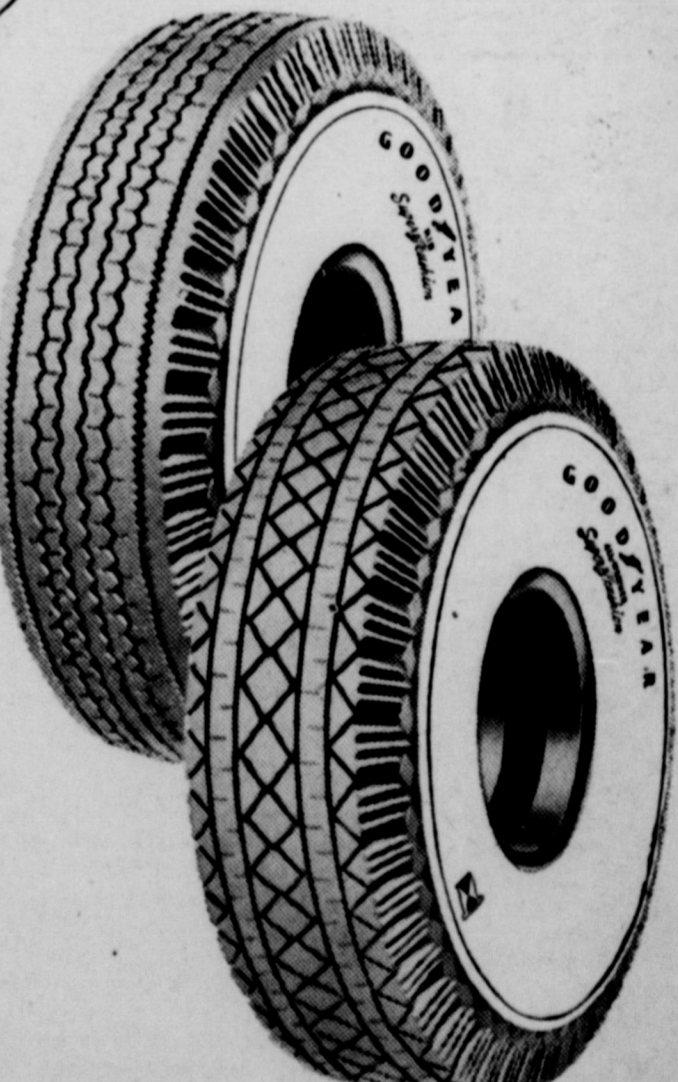
