WARM WEATHER FIRE HAZARDS

Fire loss in this country is naturally at its peak during the winter, when heating plants are being used to the limit. But the approach of the warm season brings special and very dangerous hazards.

Many homes and businesses have been destroyed because the grass wasn't cut on adjoining vacant property and caught fire. Every community should have a suitable law in this regard and enforce it strictly and impartially.

Carelessness in burning rubbish during dry days takes its share of the toll. Such fires should never be left unattended. And some means of controlling or quenching them if they threaten to get out of hand should be immediately available.

Spring and summer will witness a tremendous increase in tourist travel through the rural and timbered country. Millions of acres of splendid timber have gone up in smoke, leaving nothing but an ugly, scarred landscape as a memorial, because people have thrown burning matches and cigarettes from cars, and because campers haven't made absolutely sure that their fires were out before moving on. These crimes of carelessness are covered in the law-but police and forest service officials can't be everywhere. Fire prevention, in all its many phases, is up to the individual.



State Cleanup Week Is Set For April 4 to 10

Austin-Marvin Hall hopes that every Texas housewife will do spring house cleaning.

The State Fire Insurance Commissioner suggests that a good time for this annual job is during Spring Clean-up Week, April 4-10. Not interested in the backbreaking drugery of cleaning

woodwork and windows, he was most concerned with the cleaning of floors. "Gasoline was not made to clean floors; it was made to run motor cars," Hall stated. "Many housewives are killed each year from using gasoline for cleaning purposes. A commercial cleaner does the job quicker, easier and much safer."

The Commissioner also warned against using gasoline for cleaning spots off winter clothes before they are stored away for the summer. He urged housewives to throw away any containers of gasoline on the premise.

"Oily polishing and cleaning rags should be stored in a tight metal container when they are not in use," Hall recommended. "When all the polishing is completed, these rags should be thrown away or again stored in air-tight non-inflammable containers.'

If you are planning to have your house painted, Commissioner Hall urges you to be careful with paint rags. Paint-smuged rags should be kept in tight metal containers as they, like oily rags, are subject to self-ignition.

Hall says that if you are also planning to have your house paper- ing should be checked and repaired ed, that would be a good time to immediately. check your electric wining.


