

State Cleanup Week Is Set For April 4 to 10

Austin—Marvin Hall hopes that every Texas housewife will do spring house cleaning.

The State Fire Insurance Commissioner suggests that a good time for this annual job is during Spring Clean-up Week, April 4-10.

Not interested in the back-breaking drudgery of cleaning woodwork and windows, he was most concerned with the cleaning of floors. "Gasoline was not made to clean floors; it was made to run motor cars," Hall stated. "Many housewives are killed each year from using gasoline for cleaning purposes. A commercial cleaner does the job quicker, easier and much safer."

The Commissioner also warned against using gasoline for cleaning spots off winter clothes before they are stored away for the summer. He urged housewives to throw away any containers of gasoline on the premises.

"Oily polishing and cleaning rags should be stored in a tight metal container when they are not in use," Hall recommended. "When all the polishing is completed, these rags should be thrown away or again stored in air-tight non-flammable containers."

If you are planning to have your house painted, Commissioner Hall urges you to be careful with paint rags. Paint-smudged rags should be kept in tight metal containers as they, like oily rags, are subject to self-ignition.

Hall says that if you are also planning to have your house wired, that would be a good time to check your electric wiring.

"When the electric fixtures are taken off, if there is a scorched place underneath, that means there was a small fire which gained no headway and went out quickly," he explained. "In this case the wiring should be checked and repaired immediately."

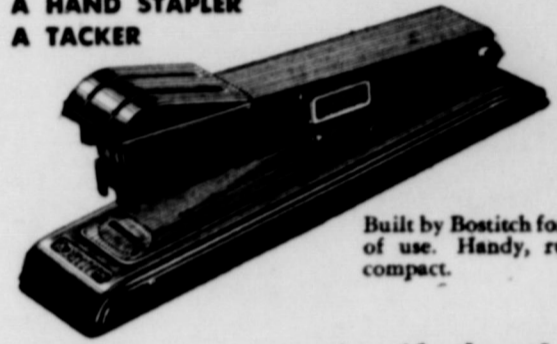

CONSUMPTION OF COTTON AND COTTON LINTERS

Austin—Cotton consumption in Texas rose 2 per cent from January to February, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

However, cotton consumption fell 20 per cent below a year earlier to 13,745 running bales.

Despite a 11 per cent monthly decline, consumption of cotton linters rose 33 per cent over February 1947.

Cotton spinning activity changed slightly from January to February. Although active spindles increased 1 per cent to 229,000, average spindle hours slid 10 per cent from January.

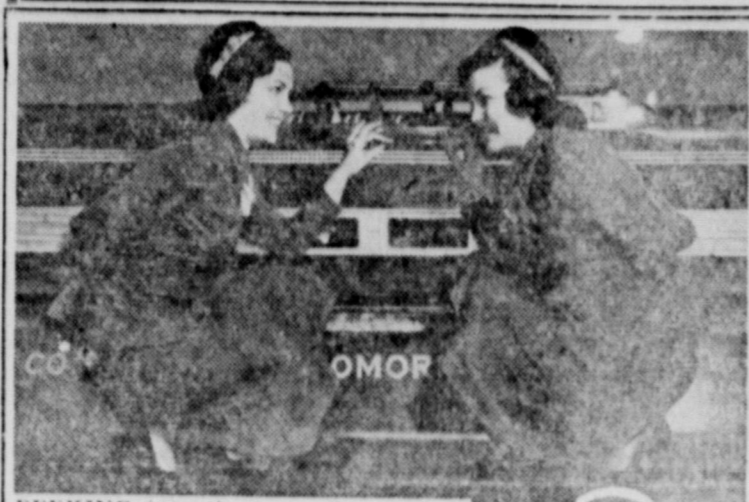

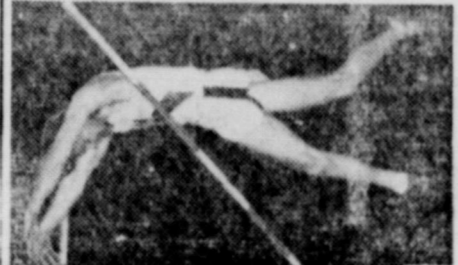

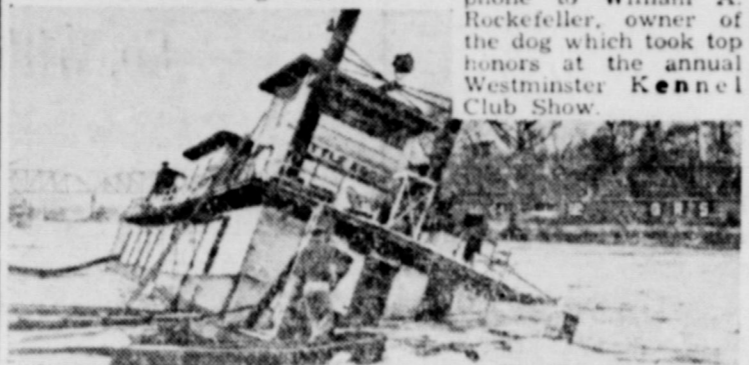

Savings Bond Security Loan Opens April 15

Dallas—A call to the people of Texas to invest in U. S. Savings Bonds as a means of providing for their personal and national security was voiced here Saturday by E. E. Shelton following his appointment as Co-chairman with Mr. Nathan Adams for the Treasury's Security Loan Drive in Texas. He called upon Texans to "get behind this program to strengthen our national economy so that we can cope with whatever eventualities the future may hold."

Mr. Shelton's appointment was announced by Mr. Adams of Dallas, Chairman of the Treasury Department's State Advisory Committee for Texas. Mr. Shelton, president of the Dallas Federal Savings & Loan Association, has just returned from Washington, where he and other financial leaders of the nation conferred with Secretary of the Treasury Snyder on problems involved in the national economy.

"The campaign for the Security Loan will begin on April 15 and continue through June 30," Mr. Shelton said. "Its objectives are to curb and control inflation, to provide the people with a substantial volume of personal savings as a hedge against a possible depression, and to speed our huge war-born national debt among the largest number of people possible. The overall result would be economic Security for the people and for the nation. In these troubled times, economic security might well also mean physical security."

The Security Loan drive will be carried on by volunteers in Texas and throughout the nation, Mr. Shelton said. He urged Texans to volunteer their services to their county chairman during the drive. "This campaign will be on a scale unequalled since the war," our state's communities."

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox
M. D., State Health Officer
of Texas

Austin—"Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the need for reading labels on drugs and medicines before taking them," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "Frequent reports are received of accidents, some of them fatal, affecting people who have formed the hazardous habit of taking medicines without carefully reading the labels."

Equally dangerous is the habit of taking medicine after the directions on the label have become obliterated, which many people do, thinking that they can remember what the bottle contained. Reaching for a bottle and taking medicine in the dark is another dangerous practice. It is important to remember that the law requires labels to be attached to drugs and medicines in order to protect the public.

Dr. Cox urges people to follow the simple rule of reading the la-

bel before using anything from a carton or bottle, either as food or as medicine. In brief, his advice to the public is: "Be sure you know what you are taking, and when in doubt—Don't Take It."

800,000 on November 30, 1947.

The current enrollment is more than four percent higher than the previous peak of 2,674,960 established on April 30, 1947.

November figures represent new peaks under each of the two laws providing education and training for veterans. By the end of the month, 2,546,000 veterans were in training under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill), and 254,000 under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) for disabled veterans.

New high levels were reached during November in all of the major training classifications under both laws with the exception of job training under the GI Bill. This type of training declined for the tenth consecutive month.

Most of the GI Bill trainees were studying in schools, with 1,150,000 enrolled in colleges and universities and 651,500 taking work in other schools below the collegiate level. Institutional on-farm training attracted 199,000 while 545,500 were training on-the-job.

Among the disabled veterans, approximately 86,000 were studying in colleges and universities. Another 35,500 were enrolled for study in other schools. Farm trainees totaled 23,500 and on-the-job trainees, 109,000.

More than \$6 billion had been loaned to veterans under terms of the GI Bill for homes, farms and businesses, according to a Veterans Administration report for the end of October.

The average World War II veteran served in the armed forces for about two and one-half years, the Veterans Administration has estimated.

VA, affect my payments of compensation?

A. Yes. Upon failure to report for examination, without adequate reason, an award of disability compensation is suspended. Where the veteran subsequently reports for physical examination, retroactive payments over the intervening period may be precluded unless the evidence clearly establishes that the disability, in fact, existed to a compensable degree during such period.

Q. Is the amount of my disability compensation in any way affected by the amount of money I earn or receive from other sources?

A. No.

Q. Is the stepchild of a veteran entitled to the same benefits as a natural child?

A. Yes, if the stepchild is or was a member of the veterans household.

Q. If I have entitlement time left after I finish my job-training course, may I enroll in another job-training course or go to school for the remainder of my entitlement?

A. With prior approval from Veterans Administration, you may use any remaining entitlement either for job-training or for educational training.

Postal Receipts Show Decline In Texas In February

Austin—Texas postal receipts declined 8 per cent from January to February, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

However, receipts were 12 per cent above February 1947.

February postal receipts from 59 Texas cities totaled \$2,866,657, as the Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index slipped 2 per cent to 231. (Base: 1935-39—100.)

Texas postal receipts fell 34 per cent from January; Big Spring, 32 per cent; Vernon, 28 per cent; Gladewater, 25 per cent; Lockhart, 25 per cent; and Plainview, 24 per cent.

Counter to the seasonal decline, January-to-February gains were turned in by Longview, 25 per cent; Victoria, 19 per cent; Lamars, 9 per cent; Orange, 7 per cent; and Gainesville, 7 per cent.

Compared with February 1947, changes in postal receipts varied from a 19 per cent decrease in Palestine to a 64 per cent rise in Del Rio.

Success Made In Killing Weeds With New 2,4-D

College Station—Early spring is the season for killing out loco, hoarhound, bull thistle and poisonous bitterweed with 2,4-D, says Robert R. Lancaster, extension pasture specialist of Texas A. and M. College.

Uniform success on these has been reported by county agents over the state the past two years. The most complete kill is made by spraying when the plants are young, tender and growing. 2,4-D under any brand is the same, but its solution may be weak or strong, and the weak solutions need less water than the stronger concentrations. Directions for mixing and using the various brands are different, and may be found on their containers.

2,4-D will kill most any other weeds coming up this season of

the year. It makes a fine weed killer, but Lancaster warns to keep it away from gardens, flowers and ornamental shrubs because it will damage these plants severely, perhaps kill them out entirely.

Another important thing to remember about the use of 2,4-D is that it is a fairly strong spray that "hangs on". Even if a sprayer is washed out after being used, it is possible to kill plants with 2,4-D while spraying insecticides some time later on. So the safest thing to do is have two sprayers one for 2,4-D, and one for insecticides. This way there will be no danger of injuring the plants when switching from 2,4-D to insecticides.

BURN RUBBISH SAFELY

Fire prevention authorities warn that during the spring clean-up session rubbish should not be burned in open piles. Unprotected piles of burning rubbish give off sparks which may set grass, roofs and trees on fire.

To control the flames of burning rubbish, an all-metal rubbish burner should be used. Such containers are made of rust-resistant galvanized steel and are available at stores handling hardware.
