Odd Bits Salvaged
At Random

With the coming of spring, we all have some pet peeves that we want to get aired out.

The Krumbler has been requested to help get some of them aired out, since it looks like spring is coming and going without a general clean-up campaign, and it behooves all of us to do, or not to do, those little things to make our neighbors and friends happier.

Anyway, our neighbors, the city council, the fireboys and perhaps others wouldn't get so irked at us if we'd observe the following:

1. Keep our chickens penned up with the coming of spring and gardening time. We've observed the approach of 9 springtimes in Munday, and we think we've had requests from someone, either citizens or city officials, to make the above request with each spring.

Other towns are gathered in the same manner. We might try the deal which the Wichita Falls paper quoted from the Nocona paper last Monday:

A man put in his garden, grains of corn to which slips of paper were attached by a thread. When the chickens returned home with the paper dangling from their bills, the owner would remove them, and found written on one side: "My owner is going to get me killed if he doesn't keep me at home."

2. Keep our cans and non-burnable things separated from our burnable trash when we dump them in alleys or incinerators.

The practice of dumping everything together brings a howl from lots of folks—with employees who haul off our trash, when they do—our firemen who keep check on fire hazards, and others.

Tin cans and stuff that won't burn soon fill up our containers for burning trash. Then papers and things are dumped on top of that accumulation. Along comes a high April wind and scatters papers and trash all over the town.

So people get irked about it, and rightly so. Separate containers should be made available, and then a more prompt visitation by the city truck to take things to the dump ground would help a lot.

3. Burn all your papers and trash in the mornings, particularly in the business section of town.

Smoldering fires in late afternoon and after dark bring a quick howl from members of our fire department, who are always on the lookout for fire hazards.

There's a city ordinance which requires burning in mornings and prohibits it after noon, so they say . . . but we don't pay much more attention to it than to the one that requires the driver of a car to bring his vehicle to a complete stop if he meets a horse-drawn vehicle and this driver's team becomes scared at the gas-bug.

We generally burn trash when we get good and ready, or when our clean-up boy appears to do the work.

But this is one of our worst fire hazards, our firemen state. A few sparks from a smoldering fire, which we left when we close our business for the night, can bring unhappiness to the town.

Maybe the wind is in the right direction to blow the sparks away from town at the time you start the fire. But we've known the wind to change directions during the night.

And there's when the trouble brews. We're all at home, and there's no one to watch the fire which we left burning. It could be the cause of a disastrous fire some night.

4. Don't burn our trash too close to buildings, either our own or our neighbors. And if the wind is high keep a close vigil over the

Derrick Moved, Smith Well To Be Completed

British American's No. 1 A. A. Smith well looks like a sort of desolate place, since removal of the drilling rig this week, but there's still activity going on out there.

Cable tools, or what some call "a spudder" has been moved in and work is under way in completing the Smith well. A bailer was being used Wednesday to bail out the well, and workmen experienced difficulty in getting the bailer down past 200 feet and were talking of using other methods.

The plan is to "shoot" the well again, put her on a swab and see what sort of oil well we have.

The drilling rig has been moved to the C. P. Baker place, south-east of the Smith location, and erection of the derrick was almost complete Wednesday.

The new test is being drilled by Thomas D. Humphrey of Dallas. Spudding in and beginning of operation is expected Friday.

FOR THE CONSUMER

It is probable that never in its long history has American retailing given so much thought, and devoted so much hard work, to the problems of the consumer.

It is doing this for various reasons, most of them obvious. First of all, protection of the purchasing power of the masses of consumers is vital to its existence. Secondly, retailing is always on the firing line in the debate over inflation. And, thirdly, the American economy is dependent on preserving our unique system of mass production and mass distribution—the system which has given us more goods and better goods, for a smaller part of our earnings, than any other people enjoy.

Retailing's contribution to the fight against inflation has been partly obscured by the fact that prices remain high. This does not mean that fight has been a failure. In the opinion of those who have studied the situation, prices would be substantially higher than they are now had retailing done nothing and simply passed the boosts along to the consumer. Instead, by shaving profits, by increasing efficiency, by keeping a tight rein on inventories, and by other economies, retailing has saved the people of America enormous sums of money.

"Resist further price increases to the limit" is the policy retailing is following now. It may or may not be successful—most of the basic factors that control the price level are beyond its reach. But, regardless of the future trend, it will work with every weapon in its armory to save the consumer dollar from more depreciation.

NO PLACE FOR EDDIE

The Evening Banner, of Greenville, Texas, recently told, in an editorial, the sad story of Eddie, an inefficient and discourteous clerk in a store. One day a customer noticed that Eddie wasn't present and asked about him. "He's just not working here any more," the proprietor said. "Got anybody in mind for the vacancy?" the customer responded. "Nope," said the proprietor. "Eddie didn't leave no vacancy."

As the Banner added, "There's no place for the Eddies because the days of competition have returned and customers want to be waited upon . . . they want to see clerks take an interest in their requests, give them courteous, attentive service and try to make them feel at home. That's just human nature."

During the war, many a store had to employ poor and disinterested help, because nothing better could be had. But we're getting back to normal now, and we're seeing again that retailing is a career, that it calls for very special talents and mental attitudes and capabilities, and that it isn't a job that anyone can do. Many of the larger stores carry on highly developed training programs for their employes, and these are of service to small stores as well, by raising the standards of retail service in general.

The customer is entitled to interested and intelligent service, whether he's after a pound of hamburger or a complete spring outfit, and retailing is giving it to him. That small percentage of stores which takes no interest in this basic form of public relations won't be in business long. And, like Eddie, they'll leave no vacancy.

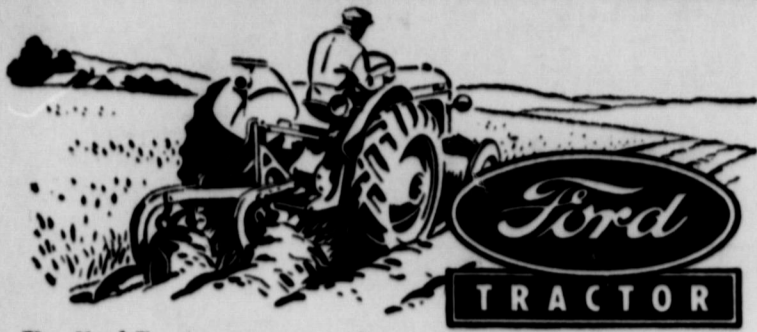

Dear editor:

Due to a high wind out here the other day which blew all kinds of newspapers on to my farm along with a few pieces of sheet iron, corn shucks, barrel staves, chickens feathers, etc., I

been doin' lots of readin' lately, thought not much cleanin' up as I figured the same wind that brought all this junk to my farm also took a lot of stuff off at the same time, leaving things about like they was to start with, which is the way they suit me, and it seems to me the newspapers is back in a rut again.

One of the papers that turned up out here must have come off of somebody's pantry shelf or off some country newspaper editor's desk, as it was dated 1941, but I was two thirds through it before I discovered it wasn't no current paper, which I caught by remembering one of the comic strips. Wasn't no different though from last week's Wichita daily. Trouble in Europe . . . prices goin' up . . . Congress de-

batin a loan to defend democracy . . . war loomin' up . . . people arguin' over the draft . . . new weapons of destruction being planned . . . I tell you, people can talk about sot-

ry farmers gettin' in a rut, but if the world ain't in a rut, I don't know one when I see it, which I ought to as I been in one myself all my life.

Ordinarily, you could count on at least twenty years between wars, and things used to get normal of a year or two at least before they started bein' affected by war talk, but here we got war talk startin' up again even before the formal peace treaties is signed for the last one.

Shrubs Injured By Freeze Should Be Pruned Now

Early flowering shrubs which were injured recently by the late freeze should get their annual pruning at this time, says Miss Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A and M College.

If the roses, jasmine and other shrubs injured by the frost March 10 and 11 have not been pruned back yet, take comfort in knowing that the injury has not been increased through neglect. Most injury in Texas takes two forms: killing of the outer twigs and frost cracks along the larger limbs and sprouts.

Twig injury is easily removed on roses, other shrubs and trees. By this time it is easy to decide how far back the twig needs to be cut in order to remove the dead part. Choose a healthy bud and make a slanting cut about one-half inch above the bud. It is important that the cut be made in the right place. If the cut is made too far above the bud, a dead stub will be left. This may cause a dead streak or "black heart." On the other hand, if the cut is made too close to the bud, it will die.

Most of the time it is hard to see frost cracks, especially when they are on the lower branches of a shrub. These cracks or ruptures, which may be one inch to one foot in length, run in the same general direction as the limb. Usually it is best to cut off the entire limb if the frost cracks are especially large. However, if the cracks are small and few, the limb may wall-over this injury on the limbs and sprouts remain unthrifty and unattractive for years.

Sometimes the frost cracks are not discovered until summertime, when the plant is examined to find out why it has an unhealthy appearance. It is pretty late to do much about it then, so remove the damaged parts now for a vigorous tree or shrub this summer. Here is a point to remember: It is better to remove a great deal than too little on such shrubs as spirea, jasmine, vitex, oleander, geranium, poinsettia and craple myrtle, says Miss Hatfield.

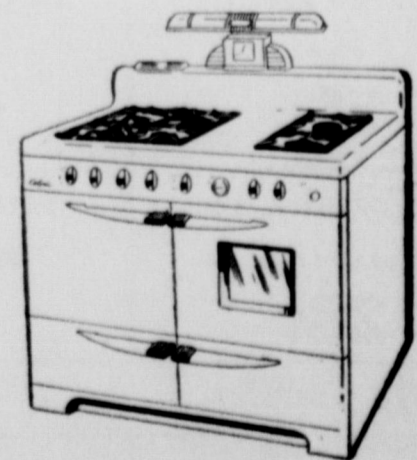

Q. I have a discharge from the draft of World War I. May I consider myself a veteran?
A. For the purposes of laws administered by Veterans Administration in order to be classified as a veteran, you must have had active military service during a time of war. A discharged draftee is not considered to have had such service.
Q. What proof is required to obtain death compensation or pension for an illegitimate child?
A. Acknowledgement in writing, signed by the veteran, or evidence showing he has been judicially ordered or decreed to contribute to the child's support or has been, prior to his death, judicially decreed to be the father of such child, or evidence satisfactory to the Administrator of Veterans Affairs that the veteran is the father of such child.
Q. May I receive death benefits for my husband and my son?
A. Yes, if both were veterans and you are otherwise eligible.
Q. Is it necessary that a child in custody of the widow, file a separate claim for compensation?
A. No.

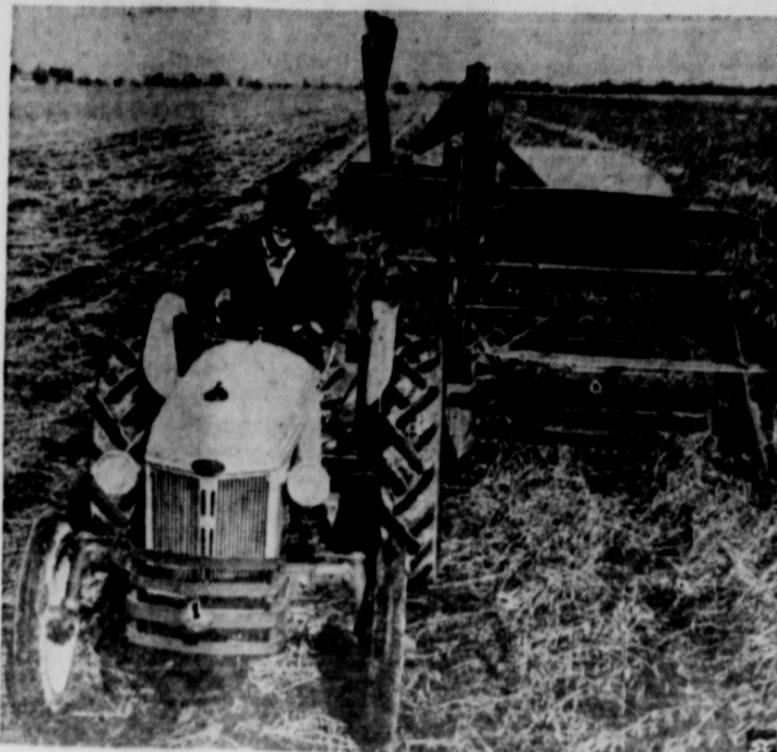

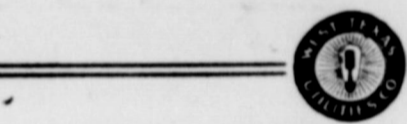

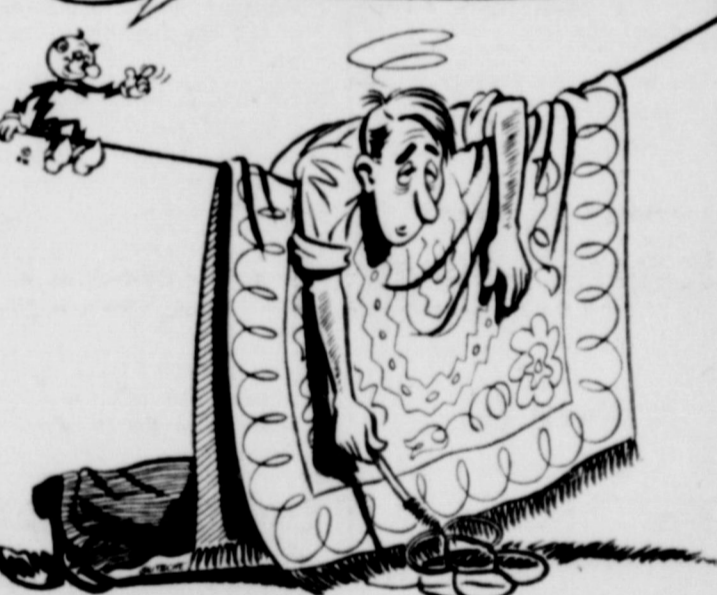

Johnson Says Steps Taken To Prevent War

Washington—Congressman Lyndon Johnson said today the President's order halting the reckless sale of usable defense plants was "our first victory in the home front battle to prevent World War Three."

He asked support of Texans in winning these other goals:

1. Fast Congressional approval of expanding our air forces.
2. Immediate enactment of selective service and universal military training.

"I know that Texans," Johnson said, "are far ahead of the nation in awareness of the international tension. The people originated my campaign to call a halt to the senseless demobilization of our war plants while we talked of mobilizing our men."

The President issued his stop-order last week after a sharp exchange of letters with Cong. Johnson and a visit to the White House by the tenth district congressman. On his visit, Johnson

gave the president a list of vital plants which had been sold off without a clause in the contract, allowing the government to recapture them in case of an emergency. Within 24 hours, the stop-order was issued.

"It's late, but better late than never," Johnson commented on the Presidential order.

"Now it's time to move along. Two times, in two crises, we tried to keep out of war by lowering our guard—by unpreparedness, by trying to sit it out, by following the advice of those who thought things would cool off. Those experiments cost many lives and many dollars.

"Sitting on my hands would be more pleasant and much easier than leading the campaign for the draft and UMT. But I believe preparedness will prevent another war; and I believe another war will destroy our form of government and possibly our civilization. And I believe the people of Texas agree with me in a program of action.

"These hours are critical. I think no other question is important alongside the question of preventing another war."

The city people should be just as concerned about the soil erosion problem as the food-growing farmers. Whether you eat to live or live to eat, everybody eats.

COTTONSEED PRODUCTION

Austin — February cottonseed receipts at Texas mills fell 73 per cent from January to February. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Compared to February 1947, cottonseed receipts rose 28 per cent. The Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index of cottonseed crushed gained 10 per cent to 118 per cent of the prewar level.

February crushings, 124,467 tons, were 16 per cent below January, and stocks on hand February 29, totaled 257,006 tons, or 30 per cent below January 31.

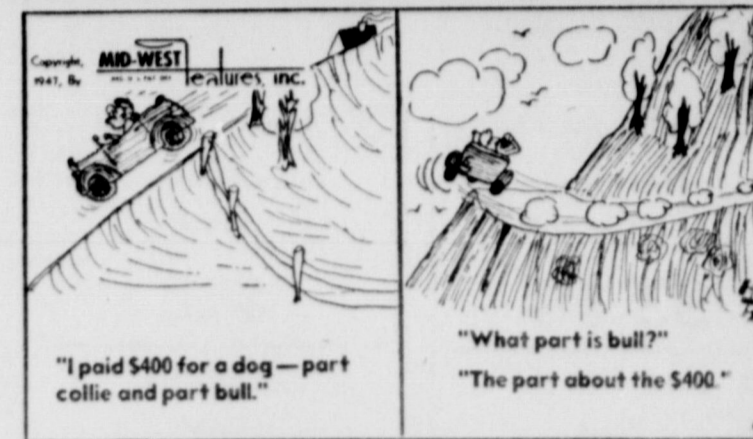

Bigger And Better Santa Rosa Round Up Opens At Vernon Tuesday, May 4th

"Bigger and Better" is again E. Paul Waggoner's promise for the Santa Rosa Roundup, and the 1948 edition, to be staged May 4-9 at the Santa Rosa Rodeo grounds near Vernon, will be an impressive fulfillment of that pledge.

While it is still three weeks before the first chute gate slams open and the first "plumb mean" bronc comes sun-fishing out into the arena to launch the third year of Vernon's spectacular rodeo, the office of John Biggs, the big show's manager, is already tightening its cinches for the big opening day.

Yes, it'll be bigger and better in many ways this year. Take that from Mr. Biggs. The prizes will be bigger attracting the nation's best rodeo talent. They will total \$5,750, plus entry fees.

The bucking broncs will be tougher and meaner—and there will be more of them.

There will be more clowns—and they will be funnier.

More wild steers and mad bulls will come roaring out of the chutes; and the trick and fancy riders will be more numerous and their stunts more breath-taking.

In addition to all this, the first American Quarter Horse Association Show will be staged here as part of the great spectacle, bringing some of the nation's finest horses to Vernon. One of the big hangers from Victory Field has been moved to Santa Rosa to house this added attraction, and there will be facilities for 150 fine horses.

First move to improve the Santa Rosa Roundup—and make it bigger and better than last year—was to roof the grandstand so that the spectators can shout themselves hoarse in dry comfort, rain or shine.

The Roundup has a new producer this year, the Beutler Brothers of Oklahoma. Ramrodding the show will be Lynn Beutler, one of the famous Elk City, Oklahoma, brothers who own the greatest aggregation of rodeo stock in the business.

Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

Austin—It is a tragedy that Texas parents continue to allow their babies to suffer and die from that painful and killing disease diphtheria. This is the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says "It is up to the parents. If they protect their children with immunization, they need not have diphtheria."

Dr. Cox said it is amazing that this disease should be allowed to take its toll of young lives when it can be entirely stamped out by proper immunization. Yet in the past week, 53 cases were reported in this state.

"Babies should be immunized by the age of eight or nine months," Dr. Cox advised. Authorities on the care of infants recommend a first dose by the age of eight or nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose is usually given later."

To maintain complete immunity, Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing dose of toxoid is advised when a child is old enough to enter school if a Schick test reveals the need of one. Children who have never been immunized certainly should be protected without any further delay, the State Health Officer declared, and added that it is the responsibility of the parents to save the lives of their children.

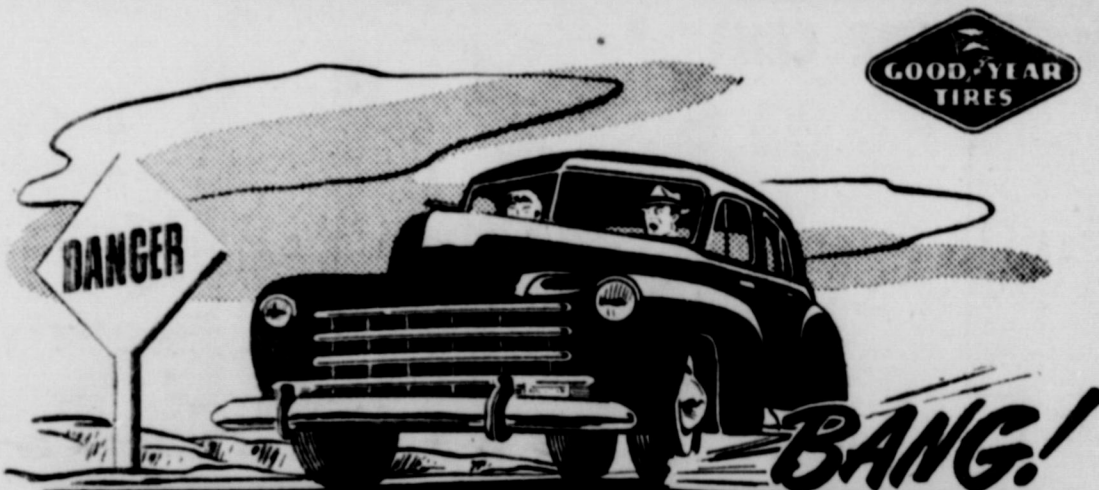

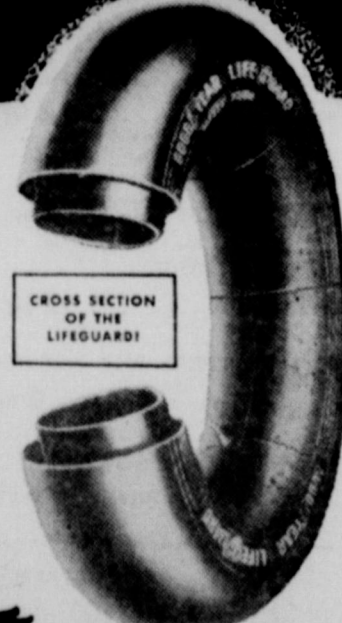
