

One of them doubled his production in eight years, in addition to carrying on a fouryear grass improvement that will soon provide feed for 10 to 15 times as many cattle as could be supported before. Another brought 3200 acres of badly overgrazed range land back into full production through proper grass management and other conservation techniques. Still others have done as well. 



The moth is less than an inch long, brown in color, and shyhiding from the light of day un der stone or brush and flying in the late evening. It can make long distance flights of hundreds of miles, at an altitude of 2,000 or 3,000 feet-for example, from the Laguna district of Mexico to as far away as Arizona, New Mexico, and the Plains of Texas, which is rather a respectable erformance.

There little moths live only two or three weeks. But as many as five or six generations appear in one season. That means if every egg laid by one adult female moth should develop into an adult moth, in five generations one moth would have produced more than 10 billion hungry Pink Bollowrs.

Multiply that by millions of moths on thousands of acres of cotton, and we get a rough idea of what we're up against. (To be continued)
