A fairly fast, fairly large but rangy group of boys will take to the field next Friday night at Dimmitt when Muleshoe Mules blast off their 1966 season.

The "fairly" is supplied by Head Coach Willie McAlpin who summed up his 1966 edition in these terms. The Dimmitt game is a non-conference affair; Dimmitt is a member of the 3-AA conference. The Mules are in AAA.

The coach ran through his roster for the Journal this week and came up with something like:

Well, to begin with, he's got a couple of QB's who have sprained ankles. However, he believes Johnny Embry and Andy Stovall, the two lads with ailing ankles will be able to play by Friday night.

Then, in backfield, halfback potentials are Bobby Julian, a junior, and Ransom Jones, a senior. Or take fullback: Looking good for that position are Mickle Wilson, a senior, and Roger Swint, a sophomore. Wilson, incidentally, is back on the team; he last played in 1962. For center -- well, it's either Terry Kendall, a senior, or Davis Alsop, also a senior.

And backing up Julian and Jones, it might be mentioned, are Ramon Gozaales, a senior, and Johnny St. Clair, a sophomore.

For guard potentials, the coaches have such good material as Bruce Purdy, a senior, Mike Rajana, a junior, Dean Siebert, a senior, and Dean Black, a junior. At the moment, however, Siebert has the chickenpox.

Among those who are vying for tackle positions are Stan Solomon, a junior, Ronnie Kell, a senior or Steven Oliver, a senior.

At end positions, starters may be Paul Swint or Billie Darnell, a senior.

The coach says that defensively Muleshoe looks pretty good. He pointed to such stalwarts as Jerry Lumpkin and Phillip Barron, both juniors.

So, the Rev. J. Frank Peery, chairman of the board of trustees of the library and other members of the board solicited an appeal Saturday for additional gifts.

One-thousand letters were the first of the week to area families asking them to make memorial donations. Checks should be made payable to the Library Memorial Fund, and mailed to J. Frank Peery, P.O. Box 505, Muleshoe.

"Of course," said the Rev. Mr. Peery, in discussing the drive, "the letters can't go to everybody in the county; there are more families than that.

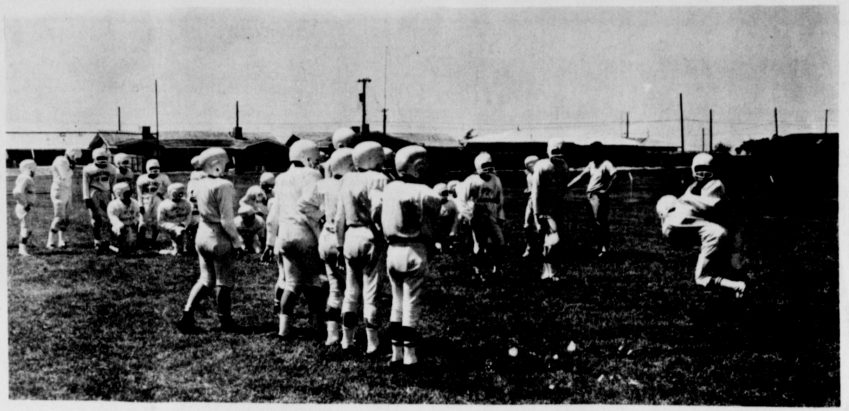

Problems Plague Cities

 Officials from major Texas cities, beset with money problems, are calling on the Legislature to allow municipalities a 50-50 split in any new broad-based state taxes enacted next year.
 Gov. John Connally pledged to recommend "very substantial new sources of revenue" for the cities after a group of metropolitan area mayors conferred with him.
 Question as to whether the kind of revenue-sharing plan advocated by the mayors is permissible under the state constitution will be briefed by the Texas Legislative Council, at the request of House Speaker Ben Barnes.
 Cities petitioned for a 50 per cent refund of any increase in the state sales tax or an equivalent amount of any new-

broan-base tax, with the state doing the collecting and apportioning half of new funds where paid.
 While agreeing to ask the Legislature for financial relief for the cities, Connally declined to spell out the precise form and amount he will seek. He did promise there will be "no strings attached" to his recommendation.
 Connally also reported an agreement for regular conferences between the mayors and top state officials.
 What will happen to the cities' request for financial assistance in a legislative session where a state tax bill of more than \$200,000,000 is regarded as a certainty remains to be seen.
 Some legal authorities do not believe a straight refund is possible without a constitution-

al amendment, although the Legislature could authorize the cities to levy their own sales tax with the state serving as collector.
FUTURE PARKS — State parks and Wildlife Commission next month will officially review proposals to purchase more than 100,000 acres of land by the year 2000.
 Preference reportedly would be shown to parks connected with water recreation, those near big city areas, and sites of statewide significance, including historic sites.
 Gov. John Connally has given his strong backing to a massive parks-acquisition program. At one time, he indicated he was thinking in terms of recommending a \$25-\$50,000,000 expenditure.

 mobile Library. The two have worked closely together and on Jan. 1, 1967, the two libraries will be wedded. The two will combine to work as a unit for better library service to Muleshoe and the 4 county areas now being served.
 "From August 1964, to the present date, over 800 new volumes and reference sets have been placed in the library through the Memorial Book Fund. These living memorials have been a rich blessing to children, young people, and adults who read each day. The Library Board of Trustees is indeed grateful for this living project. By careful selection, and by seeking known discounts privileges, the \$1828.64 (memorial gifts) has made possible the books mentioned above.
 "This fund has been the main

source of the book supply. At this point we have no budget fund for the new books. So, now we face the truth. Only \$50.21 balance remains in the Memorial Book account. New books and reference material must be placed on the library shelves month after month. The Library Board of Trustees believes that you might be interested in making a contribution of not less than one dollar and not more than five dollars. (TAX DEDUCTABLE) so that our library may continue to grow and be strong in this day of "educational explosion."
 "A bankdraft and a return stamped envelope are enclosed for your convenience. If you would make this as a memorial gift, please fill out the following blank and return with your gift. A memorial bookplate will be placed in the book purchased."
 The letter also provided spaces for names of donors, name of person in whose name the gift was made, the type of book wanted, etc.

'Future' Crops To Get Emphasis At Field Day

LUSBOCK—The annual Field Day at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, located just north of here, has been set for 1 p.m. Tuesday Sept. 20, according to Charles Fisher, research superintendent.
 Projects tentatively scheduled to receive major emphasis at the field day include crop varieties of the future, conservation of water, chemical and cultural weed control and weather studies.
 The South Plains Research and Extension Center is one of the largest experiment stations in the Texas A&M University system, Fisher said.
 Visitors at the event will have a chance to see experimental stormproof cotton varieties with longer and stronger fiber and better spinning performance, Fisher said. Improved sorghums will also be on display.

The researchers also plan to stress some of their "Water stretch" experiments. This work features planting and irrigation schemes designed for maximum flexibility to make efficient use of both rainfall and irrigation.

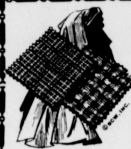

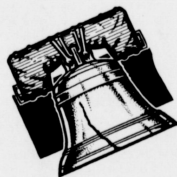

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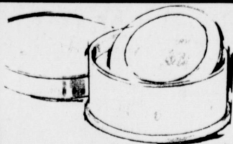
