From 1½ acres sown to sudan grass he gathered in two cuttings 2,.00 pounds of seed. And from 26 acres irrigated he has gathered 15 bales of cotton.

Waldrip plans to put in some irrigated cotton next year where he had grown feed this year. He had 25 acres that he irrigates with water from a 55-foot well, through a four-inch pipe.

His pumping cost is about nine cents an hour. "I use about 1% gallons of butane an hour," he said

He says considerable irrigations has been practiced in the area between Knox City and Weinert during the year. Most of the wells from which the wat-COLLEGE STATION-Johnny er is taken are connected with an 8-inch pipe.

He uses a sprinkler system for a small tract near his house. And he reports it has done good work and made fine plants.

Waldrip said that engineers had made a survey of the particular area and had concluded that the terrain is underlaid with a hardpan that holds the water from the rains, but that there is also a strong vein of water-a veritable subterranean streamwhich has not appreciably lower-

Whether a farm showed a net loss or gain during the year is determined by the figure derived on tax schedule 1040F, page one, line 10.

"The computation and claiming of a farm loss is not as easy as it first appears," says the specialist. "Farmers desiring to claim deficits should consult a competent accountant or a representative of the Internal Revenue Service."

Bates explains farmers should claim the refund when submitting this year's tax return, using form 843. Otherwise, they lose the period when income was subpected to tax.
