



Cotton Crop May **Be Lowest In Years**

The Department of Agriculture predicated early this week that this year's domestic cotton harvest may be the smallest in 75 years. The world-wide production, according to the department, is expected to reach 39,300,000 bales, consolations. just slightly above the 1954-55 record of 39,100.000.

The report said that in 1955 the J. S. cotton crop was 14,700,000 bales, while in 1956 acreage will be restricted to 17,400,000 acres, or 700,000 acressies than the 1955 total for all types.
