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MR. MAY EXPLAINS

In another column of this issue the Times appears a letter from Mr. Chester L. May, vice president of the Stamford and Western Gas company, relative to the company's application now pending before the city council here for permission to put a new scale of rates into effect for domestic gas.

The letter is interesting and informative. The Times is glad to give it space with the recommendation to the citizens of Munday and others interested elsewhere that it be read carefully.

Our own conviction remains unchanged that the proposed new scale of rates would mean higher bills for the great majority of users, and particularly for those least able to pay. We still are convinced that there is entirely too much spread between the cost of gas at the well and the cost delivered to the consumer.

However, we know that the members of the city council are devoting much time and care to a study of the company's petition. We are satisfied further that whatever decision they reach will be in the belief that it is to the best interest of the citizenship of Munday.

Munday Officers Join Search For Forger Suspects

Search for persons responsible for the cashing in Haskell, Stamford and Seymour of a number of forged checks drawn against the Western Produce Company shifted to Munday early in the week after at least four of the instruments had been cashed in Seymour within the space of less than an hour, according to reports to Walter Trammell, city marshal here, and Grady Blake, constable.

Collie Jeter, chief of police at Seymour, was in Munday to obtain the assistance of local officers in seeking the suspects after men who had cashed at least four of the checks in Seymour had given the names of a number of residents here as references.

Search here for the suspects was unsuccessful. One man residing near Goree, questioned because of a similarity of names, was cleared of any connection with the checks after brief investigation.

Several days ago, officers here were advised, a number of blank checks disappeared from the produce company office at Haskell. Those checks, presumably, have been used by the forgers as some were cashed soon after at Stamford, officers were told.

The forged checks which have appeared thus far have been in odd-cents amounts, have been in sums in the neighborhood of \$10, and the individuals presenting them invariably have posed as being close acquaintances of individuals prominent in the particular community where the checks appear to have been issued.

Methods of the forgers, it was added, have been to work rapidly in whatever community is selected for their operations, and to cash several checks at various business establishments within a short space of time before taking their departure. About \$50 was obtained in Seymour.

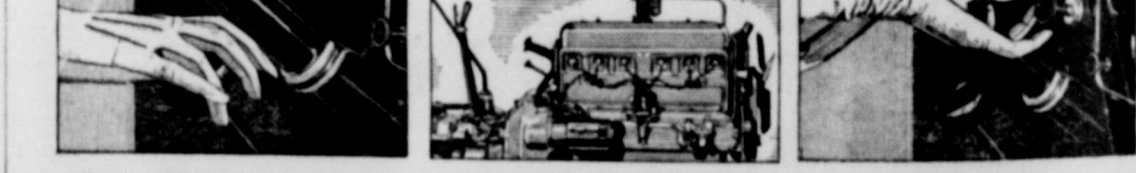

Wanting to make over her living room in 1930 but lacking the funds, Mrs. W. C. Rogers of Barr R Home Demonstration Club in Howard county, improved her poultry house and poultry rations instead, doubled the flock production, and sold the eggs at \$1.00 per dozen in the form of angel food cakes and chess pies. In the spring of 1931 she took \$103 made in this way to work a miracle in the living room of the old farm place. This in brief is the story of the woman who won first in

the county and third in the district in the 1931 Texas Improved Living Room Contest. "It takes the whites of 11 eggs to make one angel food cake," says Mr. Rogers. "I sold 100 to people in Big Spring for \$1 apiece but have since lowered the price and sold 67 of them for 75 cents. I combine the yolks with sugar, butter and cream to make chess pies that sell for 35 cents. Orders are taken on one Saturday and delivered the next, but since the

Home Demonstration Club Market opened I have sold my surplus there." In her living room she laid a new floor, laid e-e rock walls which she papered, put in a new glass door, re-finished the piano and living room set, had a writing desk made at the planing mill, and bought a library table. The piano is considered by Mrs. Lucille Allgood, home demonstration agent, to be one of the finest examples of re-finished furniture anywhere.

Postal Receipts Take Sharp Drop During Last Year

Receipts at the Munday post office showed a drop of \$1,695 during 1931 as compared with 1930, according to the annual report completed during the week of J. B. Reneau, postmaster.

Receipts during the last year totaled \$6,601.10 as compared with \$8,296 during the previous year, Mr. Reneau said.

Although the drop is not out of proportion to those reported in other communities of the section, it will be sufficient to cause the Munday postoffice to drop from a second to a third class rating, it was explained. That it was added, means that for the next fiscal year beginning on July 1, 1932, the allowance for employed help will be reduced from \$5,000 per year to \$1,400.

Receipts during the first half of 1931 were slightly above average. Those for the third period, however, fell so far short that the increase during the holiday period was sufficient to keep the office in the second class classification.

The receipts by quarters of the year were reported by Mr. Reneau as being: first, \$1,776.86; second, \$1,678.24; third, \$1,263.70; fourth, \$1,882.30.

proximately thirty-three and one-third per cent on practically all their heating gas. This will also have the effect of making a smaller variation between the summer and winter bills and will eventuate in more satisfaction with our service among our customers.

"The territory served by Stamford and Western Gas Company has not developed as we had hoped and we have but approximately fifty per cent of the customers that we had expected to serve by this time. In reality, we have lost several hundred consumers since the property was a purchase about eight months ago. We cannot continue to do business on the scale under which we are now operating and we feel that we have the right to expect the cooperation of our customers at this time, particularly when we are asking to place in effect not a higher rate but a change in the schedule that will be a much better rate for general application than the one now in effect, and one which we hope will add to our revenue by increasing the volume of gas sales.

"It might interest you to know that thirteen per cent of the bills rendered during the past year were for one thousand cubic feet of gas or less. Twenty-five per cent of the bills rendered during the entire year were for amounts in excess of eight thousand cubic feet, representing fifty-three per cent of the total gas sold. Since in no instance could a consumer pay more than seventy-five cents over the present rate and the amount saved in any one month could be many times that, it is obvious that the savings during the winter will more than offset the increase on the bills of most of the customers during the summer months.

"You make the statement in your editorial that rates should be reduced since the price of every other commodity has come down. This argument is fallacious, for the reason that we do not deal in cotton, oil, cattle, wheat, and other basic commodities. We buy but three things, gas, labor, and money. The price of gas in this instance is fixed by a long term contract. Since our wage scale was comparable with the 1921 level, the period of the former depression, we have not felt justified in reducing salaries. Money has not only increased in cost but it is harder to get at present than at any time during the past five or six years. Utility rates cannot fluctuate upward with the price of commodities, for the reason that they are regulated and allowed only a reasonable re-

turn, regardless of the condition of business. Our service must constantly be dependable and continuous; and if we only followed the downward trend in prices, we should simply go broke. Many commodities have not reduced in price, as can easily be proven by asking your corner druggist and other business men what they purchase at a lower cost. Advertising rates and other service costs have not been reduced generally. Taxes have been materially increased this year to the extent that they are becoming almost an unbearable burden.

"The City Officials at Stamford, which as you know is the largest town in the Stamford and Western group, unhesitatingly passed the new schedule after they had made an analysis and proven to their satisfaction that it was a much better rate for the town as a whole, and after we had explained to them our reasons for needing the change in the schedule.

"I am informing you of the above facts for the reason that I feel that the matter has not been presented fairly through your paper to the citizens of Munday, and I am certain that it was due to a misunderstanding on your part of some of the matters involved. We feel that we are to be commended rather than censured for trying to work out of this situation in a manner that will be helpful rather than harmful to the majority of our customers and that we are entitled to the quick and ready cooperation and assistance of our customers and your Official Governing Body.

"If it is necessary for us to enter into litigation in the immediate future for increased rates rather than a change in rates, we want the responsibility paid to others than ourselves.

"We shall be very grateful for your thoughtful consideration of the above facts in regard to protecting our service and trust you will see fit to give this information equal publicity to that already published.

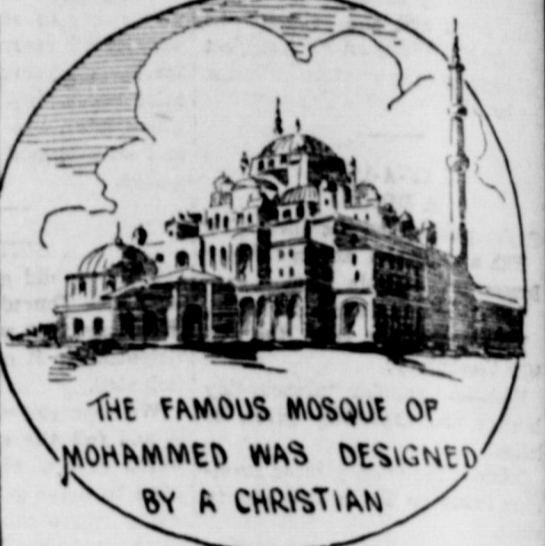

Flocks Continue Mainstay of Farms of State

College Station, Jan. 8.—Farm flocks of poultry will continue through 1932 to be one of the mainstays of Texas farm wives who are forever having to keep up a steady small flow of cash to pay for groceries, medicine, cloth and incidentals. At least this is what home demonstration authorities in the Extension Service at Texas A. and M. College think. They base the prediction on the basis of returns coming in from home demonstration agents in all parts of Texas showing that the demonstration farm flocks made money last year, and that most farm women working to improve poultry returns are optimistic.

Surprising reports are coming from a number of counties like Haskell showing that the demonstration flocks actually made more money in 1931 than in 1930. With prices ranging from 7 to 22 cents per dozen the demonstrators averaged 6 cents per dozen profit. The profit per hen increased 17 cents over the previous year. Miss Eileen Partlow, home demonstration agent, explains the result by pointing out that low prices forced owners to use home-grown feed, mix their own mash, feed more skim milk and manage very carefully to increase flock production.

An average profit of 50 cents per day was made in 1931 by Mrs. Edgar Zuehl of Guadalupe county from a flock that averaged 181 eggs per bird. She culled her flock down from 605 hens at the first of the year to have 160 when the poultry year ended October 31st. She has found that old hens do not pay and in her report to Miss Blanche Bair Home agent, states that she has 200 vigorous young pullets ready for 1932.
