Since the cards were mailed out, we've heard some pros and cons concerning a bond issue to provide a home for our older citizens. "It is thought," the cards stated in part, "such a home should be built adjoining the present county hospital so that it can be properly supervised by the hospital management and the hospital medical staff."

When the cards started coming back, we understood, the tally was about fifty-fifty, with about an equal number being in favor of the issue as compared to those against it.

More recently, however, there has been quite a bit of talk about constructing such a home in Munday. This had been talked before, but never had gotten beyond the talking stage. Now it seems to be talked more seriously than ever.

The trend of the conversation, we're told, seems to center around erecting such a home, not by a bond issue, but by public subscription. It is believed there are a number of people who would make a sizeable contribution to such a project to be assured that their loved ones would have a decent, well-equipped, adequately supervised place in which to spend their declining years.

We do not necessarily believe the talk was started in order to defeat the county-wide project—but this proposal did awake in some local people to the need of such a home in Munday, and got the idea back into the talking stages again.

There are several schools of thought regarding such a home—that it should be a county project—that we should provide for our older Munday citizens here in Munday—that we do not need such a home at all—probably none of which is without basis.

We don't know what the late tally is on the reply cards which have been returned. We don't think, however, that a bond election will be called upon the basis of these cards—that other steps will need to be taken. The ideas expressed are worthy of your thought and consideration.

Our aged citizens will be taken care of, if our President gets his campaign ideas through—and that will likely be through Social Security.

## 57 Rattlesnakes Killed Recently In Ranch Home Cellar

An old cellar on the Hill Allen Ranch in Throckmorton County, southeast of Munday, proved lucrative hunting recently for those who enjoy killing rattlesnakes. A total of 57 of the poisonous reptiles had been taken from the cellar last week.

Originally discovered by a group of local Boy Scouts who were on an outing at the ranch, the rattle hide-out has attracted others who believe in dead snakes.

The Scouts notified W. R. Moore, Jr., who went to the scene and reportedly "harvested" 24 of the rattlers.

Zane Franklin, whose hobby is killing rattlers, then went to the scene. He removed piece of sheet rock and found the snakes dened there in large numbers. After two "hunting expeditions" to the cellar, Zane reaped a total of 33 rattlers, not counting the very young ones.

## Dollars And Sense

Does your teenager want to open a credit account? You may need to agree on some ground rules and guides before you let him do it.

Get your teenager to work up and keep a budget that lists weekly and monthly income, including allowance and part time earnings. Tighter money management is necessary because of the dangers of credit.

Certain limits will be necessary. Even if store limits are \$50 you may want to cut it back to \$25, or whatever you feel your child can handle.

Be sure your teenager understands that he can't buy more just because he can charge things. Credit should be used primarily as a planning tool to purchase items that can't be postponed and for which the youngster hasn't the cash in hand.

Let your son or daughter know at the outset that the credit account is a privilege that he abuses it will be withdrawn at any time he abuses it.

The parent who spends time advising his teenager may learn a thing about credit.

## Funds Available To Aid Farmers

Additional funds have been made available to help meet the needs of eligible farmers who need operating money to carry out their farming operations, Wilburn A. Satterwhite, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration announced today.

Mr. Satterwhite said that a \$35,000,000 contingency fund provided by the 1961 Agricultural Appropriations Act has just been released to the Farmers Home Administration to meet the growing demand for credit.

This move was taken by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Mr. Satterwhite, said, in an effort to make certain, within the authorities and funds available, that no qualified family-type farmer will be required to give up farming because of his inability to finance his 1961 operations.

Because of high operating costs and unfavorable margins of profits many farmers have exhausted their regular sources of farm operating credit. The amount of operating loans made so far this year by the Farmers Home Administration totals 20 percent higher than last year. The credit Agency's biggest lending season lies just ahead as farmers prepare to start their spring work.

The Farmers Home Administration makes operating loans primarily to help eligible farm families make improved use of their land and labor resources on family-type farms and make needed changes in their farming systems. Most of the changes call for adopting better farming practices and improving the efficiency of their farming operations. Loans may also be made to qualified farmers who carry on smaller than family-type operations.

Operating loans help farmers pay for equipment, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, tractor fuel and other farm and home operating needs including the refinancing of chattel debts. Loans are scheduled for repayment in accordance with the borrower's ability to repay, over periods up to seven years. The interest rate is five percent.

Further information on these loans may be obtained from the County Office of the Farmers Home Administration located at 115 W. McLain Street, Seymour, Texas.

### ROME WENT OUT OF BUSINESS

There is a common wish among people to peer into the future but the future cannot be visualized except through history—which often repeats itself. Due to the wide belief that the federal government should provide an endless list of benefits from welfare to education with centralized Bureaucracy replacing local responsibility it is well to ponder possible results. The fate of the Roman Empire suggests what might happen to the United States.

The Encyclopaedia Britannica says this about the decline and fall of the Roman Empire: "... nothing could compensate for the lack of self-determination, and although during the first century and a half of imperial rule a flourishing local patriotism in some degree filled the place of the wider sentiment, this gradually sank into decay and became a pretext under cover of which the lower classes in the several communities took toll of their wealthier fellow-citizens in the shape of public works, largesses, amusements, etc., until the resources at the disposal of the rich ran dry, the communities themselves in many cases became insolvent . . . the organs of civic life became atrophied, political interest died out and the whole burden of administration, as well as that of defense, fell upon the shoulders of the bureaucracy, which proved unequal to the task . . . The gigantic bureaucracy of the 4th century proved, in spite of its undoubted services, an intolerable weight upon the energies of the empire."

History, let us remember, has a habit of repeating itself.

### RUSSIA'S MERCHANT FLEET

Marine Digest magazine recently carried a brief but highly important news item. It is said that by 1965 Russia's merchant fleet is expected to be twice as big as it was in 1958. Author of this estimate is Bernard M. Kassell, a former U. S. Navy Commander who now specializes in research on Soviet maritime affairs.

The Soviet Union, it is clear, thoroughly appreciates the urgent importance of a great merchant fleet in today's world. Her expansion program is part and parcel of her economic war with the West, and most particularly the United States—a war whose tempo, like the stakes, is ever-increasing. It is ships that make possible trade between nations—with all the political as well as the economic considerations that trade involves.

So far as we are concerned, the significance of all this is clear. We must have a U. S. flag merchant marine that is second to none. And that means that we must both maintain and implement our old-established maritime policy, in which the government works with the shipping lines to expand and to modernize the merchant fleet. It also means that American foreign traders, in their own long-run interest as well as the overriding national interest, should ship their cargoes on our own vessels whenever possible.

### NOT THE CASE

A great many people undoubtedly believe that any substantial degree of tax reform and tax reduction is impossible at the present time, because of the government's revenue needs.

Well, that simply isn't the case. For instance, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States points out what would happen if the top rate of taxation of individual income were lowered from the existing 91 per cent to 50 per cent. The immediate drop in revenue to the Treasury would be but a billion dollars a year, which is less than one-eighth of the budget.

And that drop, in all probability, would be more than made up in the near future. The billion dollars thus liberated would go into all manner of investments and purchases. The result would be more jobs, more payrolls, more production—and more sources of taxation for government.

The Chamber adds that tax brackets far below the top one could be lowered without detriment to the government. The benefits would be felt everywhere and by all of us.

They have the idea that discussions should be closed to the public, that final decisions are what count.

They forget that these same people have more than a right, they have a guarantee in writing known as the Bill of Rights, to know all that is going on and to draw their own conclusions."

## Chips From The Carpenter's Workbench

What is the "church"? A correct understanding of what the Bible teaches concerning this institution sheds a great deal of light on God's plan for redeeming man. Since our Lord "loved the church, and gave himself for it" (Eph. 5:25), and "hath purchased (the church) with his own blood" (Acts 20:28), how can we afford to consider this body lightly. "Christ is the head of the church; and he is the savior of the body." (Eph. 5:23). As Christ was made "head over all things to the church, which is his body" (Eph. 1:22-23) it is evident that the body of which Christ has promised to be the savior is the church. It is for this reason that we contend that one must be a member of the church to be saved as Christ made no promise to save those outside this institution. The church is not our saviour . . . Christ is!

The term "church" is taken

from the Greek word EKKLESIA which simply means the "called-out" or "the assembly." Originally the term EKKLESIA had no particular religious significance. It referred to the assembly of free-citizens called out for the purpose of discussing matters of public interest. Christ attached spiritual import upon the term when he promised to build his EKKLESIA, or church (Matt. 16:18). Briefly then the church is comprised of those that have been "called-out" of the world and into the kingdom which Christ established. "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved" (Acts 2:47). The terms of entrance into this church are simple. "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized; and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls." (Acts 2:41). For the full significance read the entire second chapter of Acts.

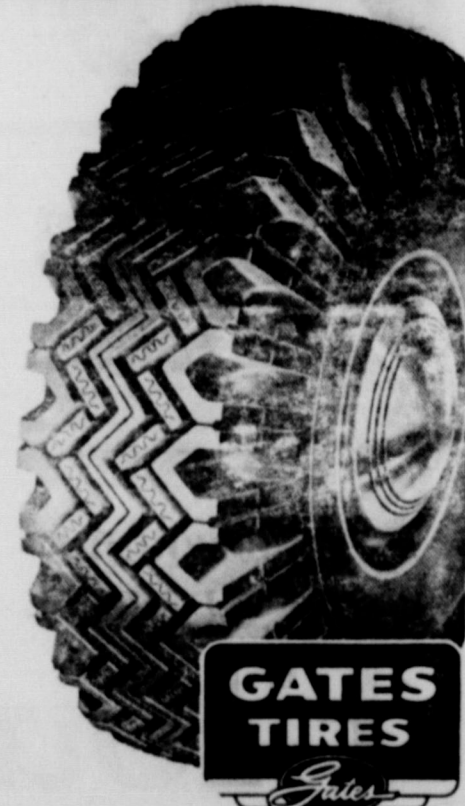

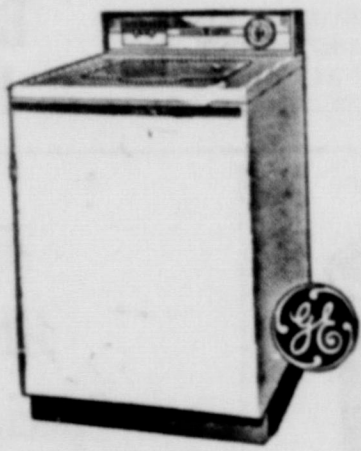

## Knox Prairie Philosopher Takes A Good Look At Weather Forecasting, But Still Relies On His Own Feeling

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek takes a look at weather forecasting this week, we're not sure how much success.



Dear editor:  
As everybody knows, we've had a lot of weather this winter, not only here but all over the country, and I have been thinking lately how lucky weather forecasters are that they aren't elected to office. Be the biggest turn-over in the history of politics.

The trouble with predicting the weather is that the job too frequently is hopeless, like predicting women or a mis-fired satellite in orbit. Weather men, like economists, are a whole lot better at telling you what happened than what's going to. Yesterday's weather is a lot easier to report than tomorrow's.

Don't misunderstand me. I listen to the weather forecast nearly every day, read it when ever I get my hands on a newspaper, and I'll admit these fellows are pretty good at predicting when a cold front is going to hit my Johnson grass farm if somebody way up the county has stuck his head out the window and discovered it and found out how fast it's moving in my direction and wired the news ahead to the nearest weather bureau.

and it's good information to have, I depend on it.

But the weather doesn't always move in a straight line. Sometimes it seems to come from all directions at once, and this is when it rains on a predicted fair day and the sun shines when the forecast called for rain. It accounts for a two-foot snow when a light frost was predicted.

It's at times like this that weather predicting takes on the same impossible job of a public opinion poll. Sometimes a poll is right, sometimes wrong, and a citizen is left with the job of predicting for himself which poll and which forecast is right. **Editor And WTU Co. Get Honor Medals**

West Texas Utilities Company and Jimmie Martin, editor of the Electric Times, employee monthly publication, have been awarded the George Washington Honor Medals, along with 28 other Texans. Winners of the annual Freedoms Foundation awards were announced on February 22 from Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

A total of 773 medals were awarded in 1961 to American citizens, organizations and schools who won prizes for things they said, did and wrote. WTU's two medals were awarded for editorials, feature articles and stories which appeared in the Electric Times during 1960, and were judged as being "an outstanding achievement in helping to bring about a better understanding of the American Way of Life."

Early last November a panel of judges began examining and judging several tons of material which had been submitted and was housed in four wings of the Valley Forge Army Hospital.

This is the second time that the Electric Times has been the recipient of the Freedoms Foundation award. In 1951 the George Washington Honor Award was presented to West Texas Utilities Company and the editor of its magazine.

Cal Young, WTU President, and Martin will receive the awards at a special ceremony, the time and place to be announced later.

Martin, who has served as a WTU industrial editor for the past 15 years, is a member of a pioneer West Texas newspaper family. Before joining WTU, he owned and operated newspapers in Brady, Childress, Snyder and McCamey.
