A great many people undoubtedly believe that any substantial degree of tax reform and tax reduction is impossible at the present time, because of the government's revenue needs.

Well, that simply isn't the case. For instance, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States points out what would happen if the top rate of taxation of individual income were lowered from the existing 91 per cent to 50 per cent. The immediate drop in revenue to the Treasury would be but a billion dollars a year, which is less than where she will visit for a few one-eightieth of the budget.

And that drop, in all probability, would be more than made up in the near future. The billion and family of Ralls, visited redollars thus liberated would go into all manner of investments and purchases. The result would be more jobs, more payrolls, more production—and
