All Voters Must Submit Written Application For 1970 Registration

BAIRD -- The 1969 Tax Statements have been placed in the mail this week, according to Albert Lovell, Tax Assessor-Collector of Callahan County. Payments can be made between Oct. 1, 1969 and January 31, 1970.

October 1 also marked the beginning of the 1970 Voter Registrations and application blanks for this are printed on the reverse side of each 1969 tax statement. Additional application forms may be obtained at the Tax Assessor-Collector's office, banks or at other places to be designated later.

Every applicant for registration in the 1970 voting year must submit a written application. (A former exemption from registration for persons over 60 years old who did not live in a city of 10,000 or more inhabitants is no longer in effect).

Applications to vote must show the following information:

1. The applicant's name, sex and post office address (or if living in an incorporated city or town, his street address).
2. A statement of the applicant's age. If the applicant has not attained the minimum age for voting, (21 years), the application shall show his date of birth by month, day and year.
3. A statement that the applicant has resided in the state more than one year, in the county more than six months, and in the city or town more than six months immediately preceding the date of application; or if not a resident for such length of time, a statement of the date on which he became a resident of the state, county, or city, as the case may be.
4. A statement that the applicant is a citizen of the United States.
5. If the application is made by an agent, a statement of the agent's relationship to the applicant. No person other than the husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter of a person is entitled to act as agent for applicant. However, none of the above may act unless he is a qualified elector of the county.

The Bulldogs drew first blood in the second quarter on a 62 yard pass and run play from John Hoffman to split-end Terry Rosinbaum. Hoffman then passed to Jimmy Richards for the extra points. Winters came back quickly with a 80 yard kick-off return and two points to knot the score 8-8. After an exchange of punts Winters fullback Arlon Barnes broke off left tackle for a 54 yard touchdown to give the Blizzards a 14-8 halftime edge.

Clyde came back quickly in the 3rd quarter with Hoffman throwing 24 yards to Rosinbaum to tie the game 14-14.

In the Bulldogs next series Engate Hawk slipped off left tackle for 48 yards to the Winters 10. Hoffman hit Tim Copeland with a pass to the 5 yard line.

On the next play Hawk blasted the middle for the touch-

down and the Bulldogs led 20-14.

Winters tried to throw the ball on their next series and Bulldog halfback Joe Stovall intercepted and carried it back 43 yards for Clyde's 4th touchdown and a 26-14 win.

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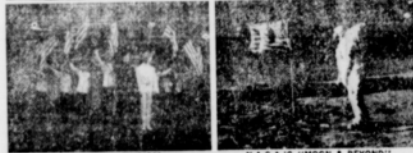
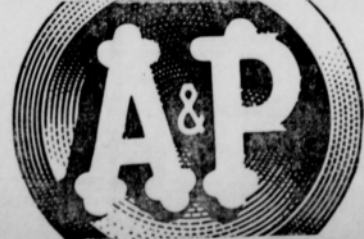
