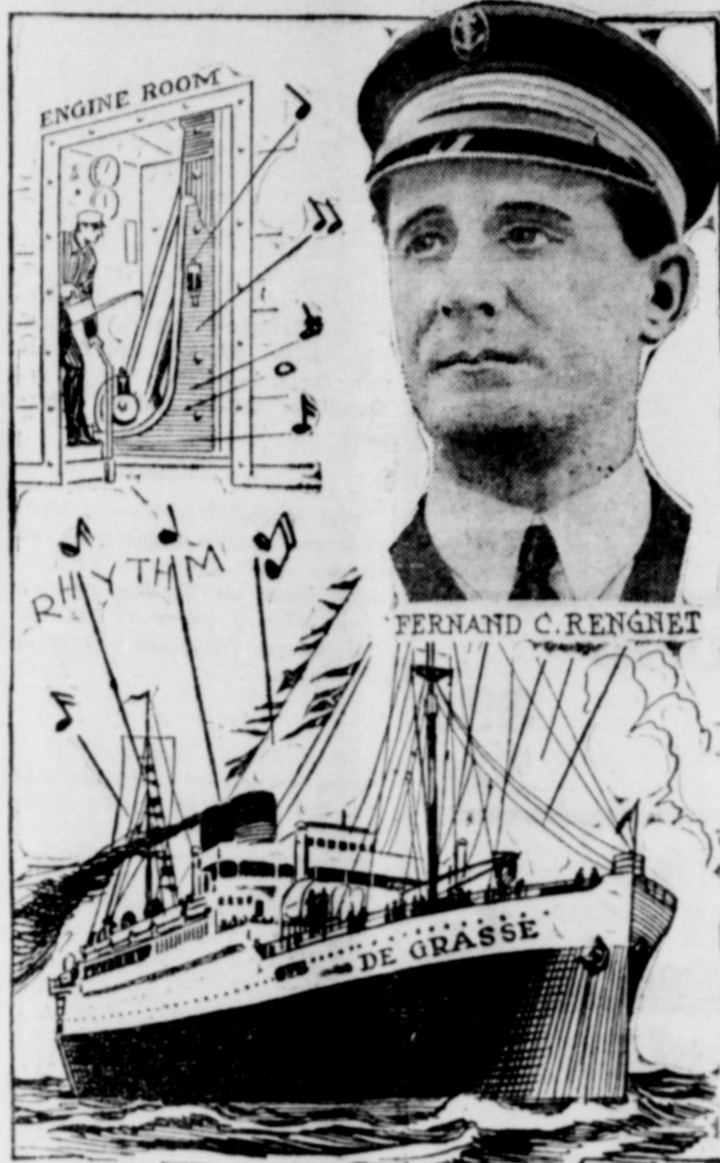

Engines, Modern Music Are Rhythmically Akin



So Says French Line Official Who Has Studied Subject

New York City.—Modern American music is what it is because we are a mechanical nation, and our composers translate into our folk-songs the rhythms they hear in the engine-throbbing veins of industrial America. "I've watched one of my assistants dance a perfect Charleston to the rhythm of the ship's engine," says Fernand C. Rengnet, Chief Engineer of the S. S. De Grasse, palatial ocean liner of the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, and author of the above statement. "The reciprocating engine has given way to the gear-turbine type with its high pitched siren sound and you'll find this same siren note in the latest jazz music."

sliding scale, increasing as the quantity increases.

Hon. James E. Ferguson has a plan for curbing the overproduction in oil, cotton and other commodities, and his plan sounds better than any that we have heard proposed, which is a tax based on a

practical stage of confiscation by State tax.

Applying the same principal to cotton, and using the family as a unit, he would place a tax of 10 cents per bale on the first ten bales produced by a family, a slightly larger tax on the next ten bales, and so on until all over 50 bales produced by any one family would be taxed \$10.00 per bale.

Such a tax would necessitate the blocking up of many large farms into smaller ones, thus providing homes for many that cannot find

homes under our present system.

Mr. Ferguson's plan as outlined in a recent issue of the Forum might solve the perplexing problem that both the oil man and the cotton farmer are facing, due to overproduction.
