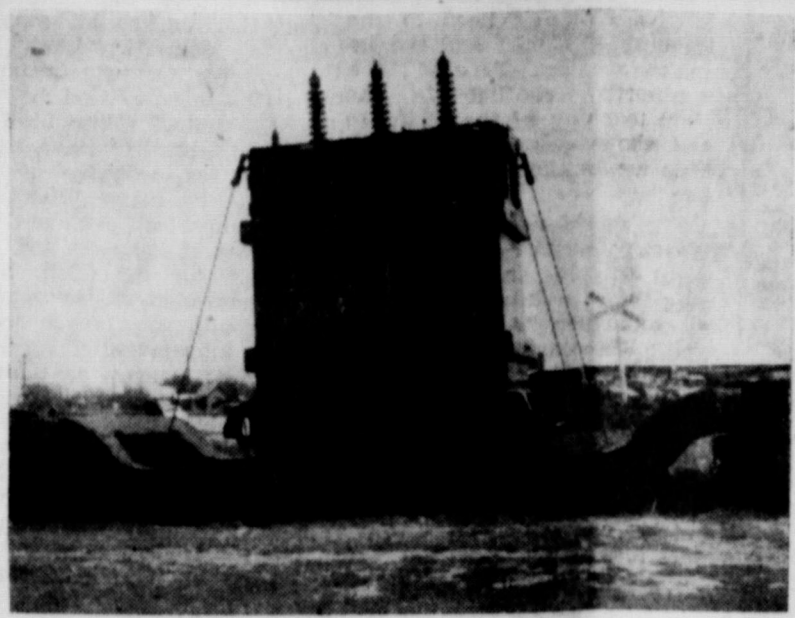
The girls met separately and a report on the council meeting was given by Sharyn Burgess. Miss Kinsey gave a demonstration on giving a party and on party refreshments.

Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

Suspension Fence
Jack Idol, manager of the League Ranch, has started construction of a suspension fence on the ranch. There will be several miles of this type fence on the ranch. The fence was first viewed by Idol last January on the feeding tour that Knox County beef cattle producers took. The fence was seen on the Texas Experimental Ranch between Throckmorton and Seymour. And fence on the ranch and the estimated cost of the fence on the League Ranch are fairly close in that they both will save about 40% of the cost of the materials and that about 25% on the labor bill. The basic idea of the fence is that wooden posts are spaced about 100 feet apart and that 7 twisted wire stays are used between the posts. Both ranches are using a 4 wire fence. The fence is best suited for level strips of ground; however, where the ground is uneven, the posts can be placed closer together as needed. Many of the farmers and ranchers that have seen the fence, say that they believe the fence to be practical and built

Transported on the underslung car, it left Sharon, Pa., April 3 and was just 10 days enroute. Special permits and special handling, due to excessive weight, were required for travel over these railroads: The Erie Railway, M. K. & T., and Burlington.

The transformer will be installed in the new substation to be erected by W. T. U. just northeast of Munday.

Four Injured In March Accidents

The Highway Patrol investigated 3 rural accidents in Knox County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for two persons injured and a property damage of \$2,650.

This brings the total for 1961 in this county to none killed, four injured, and a property

damage of \$3,540.

"Knowing and obeying traffic laws is a must in traffic safety," the sergeant added. "If all motorists would obey traffic laws, our accidents and fatalities would decrease sharply."

"For instance, the driver of a vehicle about to enter or cross a highway from a private road or driveway shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles approaching on said highway. The driver can safely perform this maneuver by waiting until he can enter the roadway without interfering with other vehicles and accelerating immediately to the normal safe driving speed and blend with the flow of traffic in the area," the sergeant explained.

Individuals Pay For Bus Trip

The rumor was circulated last week that local taxpayers of the North Central Texas Water Authority paid for the chartered bus that went to Austin last week.

This is entirely false and without foundation, according to L. B. Patterson, member of the water authority who was instrumental in marking up the busload of people. Cost of the bus was paid by a number of businessmen and private citizens of Munday—and not by tax money of the authority.

"If anyone is in doubt about the matter," Mr. Patterson said, "they may come by water authority office in Munday and see the list of those who contributed."

The bus carried some 30 people of Munday to Austin to protect HB 116 effecting the Miller Creek reservoir.

Training Institute Held In Haskell

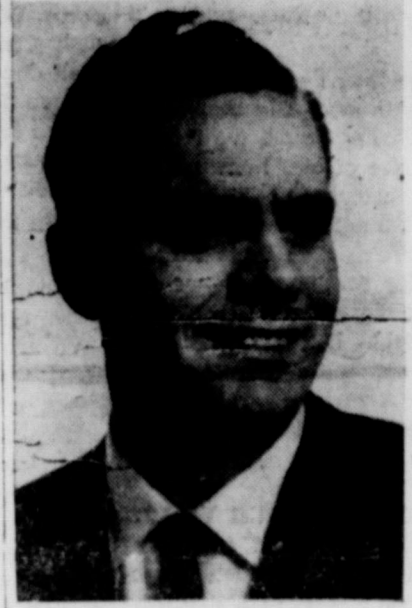
A Vacation Church School training institute was held on Tuesday, April 18, at the First Methodist Church in Haskell.

WHO HAS TO HUSTLE?

According to some American spokesmen, we're going to have to hustle mighty hard if we're to prevent the Soviet economy from overtaking and passing us. And, according to some Kremlin spokesmen, the Soviets are going to do just that in the next ten or fifteen or twenty years or some other such period of time.

What can be said to that, on the basis of the known facts, is that the hustle will have to be principally provided by the Soviets—and to a miraculous degree.

For instance, the American Petroleum Institute points out that to make our living standards approximate those of the Soviet Union, we'd have to get rid of four out of five of our homes, nine out of ten telephones, fourteen out of fifteen miles of paved roads, and nineteen out of every twenty cars and trucks. We're that far ahead.

This is no argument for complacency—or for underestimating Soviet achievements in science, industry or any other field. But it makes no sense to minimize our own achievement—or to ignore the fact that the American system has done more for more people than any other economic system known to man.

PASTE ON DOLLAR BILL ON YOUR WALL

We are now feeling the effects of a generation of extravagance and inflation which is politely called a recession. The causes of it are paying for work not done, paying for over-production of crops which could not be sold, higher and higher taxes, federal and state debt, skyrocketing peacetime federal spending above defense needs and promotion of the welfare state philosophy.

It doesn't take a Sherlock Holmes to discover that our national policies are penalizing savings, pricing our products out of world markets and constantly increasing the cost of living, as the purchasing power of the dollar is driven down.

Paste a dollar bill on your wall and mark off half of it with a red line for purchasing power already lost. Then as taxes and government debt, local and federal, go higher and higher, mark off more of it with red lines as the dollar value decreases. Also depreciate the purchasing power of your insurance, your savings account, your pension or any other fixed dollar asset as you add red lines to the dollar bill on your wall.

The future value of the dollar rests with the people through the interest they take in politics.

LONG MAY IT FLY

The following appears at the masthead of a Texas newspaper:

"The Pecos Independent is a non-partisan, conservative newspaper dedicated to promoting the individual's freedom and the growth of Pecos and West Texas. . . . What we should do is to get through to the parents that their children must be taught at home that they cannot have everything they want, that money and material abundance are not the acme of American democracy. . . ."

CUERO, TEXAS, RECORD: "It must be hoped that, somehow, the small independent farmer, and business man, will be able to find a place in this country—a place where he can work and prosper and retain that independence and individuality that forms a priceless safeguard against regimentation, sameness and loss of individualism."

OSWEGO, KANSAS, INDEPENDENT: "According to press reports the staged revolt with the Communists, the Labor Unions and the Socialists in Japan, calculated to withdraw the invitation to President Eisenhower to visit that country, cost the Communists a considerable cash outlay. Report is that they paid the participants \$1.65 a day. And in Japan that is said to be in the upper class wage group."

The inspired apostles have left instructions for the wife in preventing divorce. I will

therefore that the younger women marry, bear children, guide the house, give none occasion to the adversary to speak reproachfully" (I. Tim. 5:14). "Train the young women to love their husbands and children, to be sensible, chaste, domestic, kind, and submissive to their husbands, that the word of God may not be discredited" (Titus 2:5).

The husband likewise shares in the responsibility of preserving the home. "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also love the church, and gave himself for it" (Eph. 5:25). 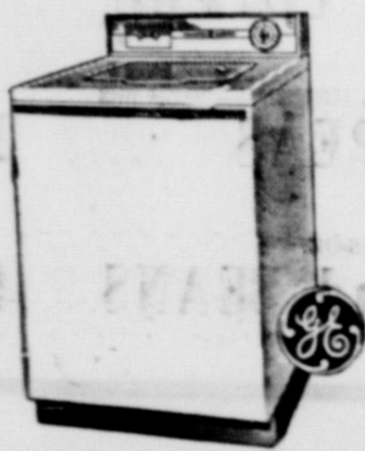

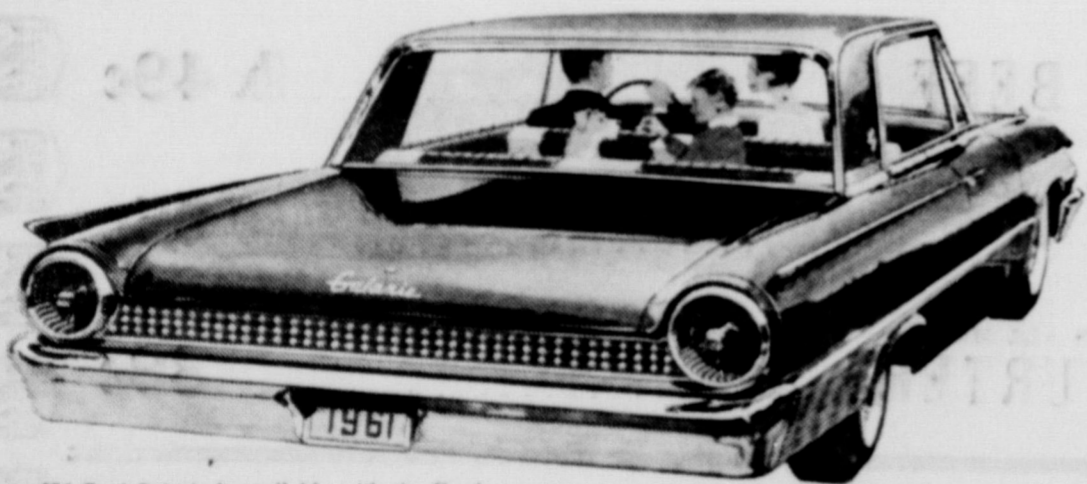

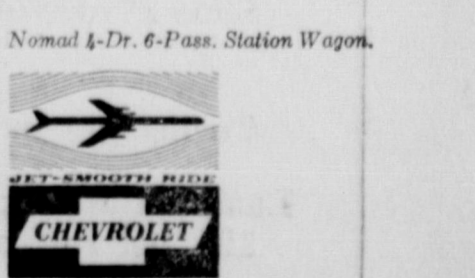
